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### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office at 1 o'clock P. M. on Thursday, December 29, 1892.*

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

DEAR SIR—This Department desires the authority of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the renewal of leases which expire on the 31st instant for premises required for the business of this Department:

No. 134 West Thirtieth street; ground floor; occupied as a repair shop and place of storage for the water-pipe repair gang, covering the district bounded by Houston street, Forty-second street, the East river and North river. The lessor is Mrs. W. H. Murtha, No. 172 Montague street, Brooklyn, and the rental is \$600 per annum, payable monthly.

No. 186 Mulberry street; first floor and cellar; occupied as a repair shop and storage place for the force employed in repairs of pavements. The lessor is George Kracht, No. 185 Mulberry street, and the rental is \$360 per annum, payable monthly.

Two vacant lots on the north side of One Hundredth street, between First avenue and East river. These vacant lots are needed for the storage of material for pavement repairs, for which they have been used for a number of years past. The lessor is W. H. Simonson; address, foot of One Hundredth street, East river; the rental is \$250 per annum, payable quarterly.

Rooms 10, 11 and 12 in the Oriental Bank Building, southwest corner of Bowery and Grand street. These rooms have for many years been occupied and are required as a photometric station for testing the quality of the gas supplied to the city for lighting purposes. The lessor is the Oriental Bank, and the rental is \$600 per annum, payable quarterly.

The ground floor of No. 231 East Seventy-ninth street, heretofore occupied and required for the ensuing year as a photometric station for tests of illuminating gas in the upper parts of the city. The lessor is Oscar T. Marshall, and the rental is \$360 per annum, payable quarterly.

The Department has heretofore occupied and paid rental at the rate of \$50 per month for premises No. 3351 Third avenue as a repair shop and storage place for the repair gang in charge of water-mains and fire-hydrants in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards. The owner or lessor of the premises asks an increase of the present rental of \$50 per month to \$60 per month. Mr. Ernest Friese, of No. 173 Front street, offers to lease for these purposes premises at the junction of Third and Franklin avenues, which include ground floor and space which will be much more commodious and convenient than the premises heretofore used, and he offers a lease of these premises at the rental of \$50 per month. I consider it advantageous to the City to accept the offer of Mr. Friese, and, therefore, respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will authorize the making of a lease of his premises for one year, commencing January 1, 1893, at the rental of \$600 per annum, payable monthly.

The Department has heretofore occupied and paid rental for premises No. 302 East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street as a repair shop and storage place. These premises will not be needed after the close of this year, as the necessary accommodations are provided for in the new Harlem Court building.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to prepare leases to the City of the following-described premises for the use of the Department of Public Works, for the term of one year, from January 1, 1893, at yearly rents specified in each case, and on the same terms and conditions as are contained in former leases, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such leases should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such leases when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, to wit:

Rooms 10, 11 and 12 in the Oriental Bank Building, southwest corner of Bowery and Grand street; the Oriental Bank, owner; present rental, six hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly.

Two rooms on first floor of No. 231 East Seventy-ninth street; Oscar T. Marshall, owner; present rental, three hundred and sixty dollars, payable quarterly.

First floor and cellar of No. 186 Mulberry street; George Kracht, lessor; present rental, thirty dollars per month.

First floor of No. 134 West Thirtieth street; Mrs. W. H. Murtha, trustee and lessor, No. 132 Jerolamon street, Brooklyn; rental, fifty dollars per month.

Two vacant lots, fifty by one hundred feet, north side One Hundredth street, between First avenue and East river; William H. Simonson, lessor, foot of East One Hundredth street; rental, two hundred and fifty dollars per annum, payable quarterly.

Premises at junction of Third and Franklin avenues, including first and second floors, yard on Third avenue and first floor of building adjoining on Franklin avenue; Ernest Friese, lessor, No. 173 Front street; rental, fifty dollars per month.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to inform you that at a meeting of the Board of Fire Commissioners held yesterday the following was adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby requested to authorize a lease for a term of two years of the premises No. 253 Spring street, from the corporation of Trinity Church, for use as quarters of Engine Co. 30 of the Fire Department.

In a letter from the comptroller of the corporation of Trinity Church, dated the 8th instant, he states that the terms of such new lease are \$540 per annum, which is the same as the amount heretofore paid.

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I present a communication from the Acting President of the Fire Department, transmitting a resolution of the Board of Fire Commissioners adopted on the 14th inst., requesting a renewal of the lease of premises No. 253 Spring street for two years, from January 1, 1893, at the same rental as heretofore paid, viz.: \$540, for quarters of Engine Company No. 30.

These premises have been occupied by the Fire Department for a number of years; the rent is deemed just and reasonable, and I offer for adoption the following resolution to authorize the lease upon the same terms and conditions as the former lease.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from the corporation of Trinity Church of the premises No. 253 Spring street, to be used as quarters for Engine Company No. 30, for the term of two years, from January 1, 1893, at a yearly rental of five hundred and forty dollars (\$540), payable quarterly; the owner to pay all assessments and the lease to contain the usual covenants and conditions, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented a report on the insurance of the New Criminal Court Building, as follows:

GENTLEMEN—On the 15th inst. twenty-seven policies of insurance amounting to \$290,000 expired on the New Criminal Court Building, secured by Messrs. Dawson & Archer, twenty-six of which were for \$10,000 each, and one for \$30,000. The various companies, the number of policies, and the amounts in each, were as follows:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of copy of preamble and resolution adopted on November 2, relative to the charge and control of the water-front of Castle Garden. The matter was duly considered at a meeting of the Board of Parks, held on the 14th instant, and I am directed to request that your Board authorize this Department to remove the platform at this location except so much thereof as may be required for the use of the Fire Boat.

"Resolved—That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to secure from the Dock Department a proper assignment of a pier at which to moor the ship 'New Hampshire,' to be used as an Armory for the First Naval Battalion."

On motion, the application was approved, and the resolution transmitted to the Board of Docks for its action.

Application of the New York Foundling Asylum for lease of two lots adjoining the public school on south side of Sixty-eighth street, between Third and Lexington avenues.

Referred to the Comptroller.

The Special Committee appointed to protest against the proposed Act of Congress to authorize the erection of a bridge over the Hudson river, between New Jersey and New York, submitted the following report:

NEW YORK, December 29, 1892.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of your Board, held on the 9th day of December, 1892, a communication was received from the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company, stating that the Commissioners appointed in and under chapter 233 of the Laws of 1890 had located a bridge over the North river at about Seventieth street, and had located one of the approaches to said bridge along the east side of the Hudson river, from about Seventieth street to One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between the bulkhead line and westerly boundary line of Twelfth avenue; and at the same meeting it came to the knowledge of your Board that a bill was pending in Congress which, if passed, would give life and legal effect to certain illegal and unconstitutional acts of the said Commission, and render effective and valid certain defects in the charters of the said New York and New Jersey Bridge Company which otherwise would be invalid and of no effect. By resolution of the Board, the aforesaid notice was referred to us as a special committee to protest against the passage of the proposed Act of Congress in relation to the said corporation, and to ask to be heard in opposition thereto in behalf of the local authorities, and to report back to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the facts, with such recommendations as may be considered necessary, with a view to the repeal of chapter 233 of the Laws of 1890.

Having given this matter our careful consideration, we respectfully submit the following REPORT:

A hearing on this subject was had at the Comptroller's Office, in the City of New York, on the 14th day of December, 1892, due notice of the object, time and place, of such meeting having been by us first given to the Commissioners appointed pursuant to the provisions of chapter 233 of the Laws of 1890, and the officers of the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company, and the various gentlemen representing an association known as the "West End Property Owners' Association," and to others.

The proceedings of this meeting will be found at length in the stenographer's minutes accompanying this report.

As a result of the statements and arguments made at this hearing, and of our examination of the provisions of chapter 233 of the Laws of 1890, and of the proposed Act of Congress above referred to and of various maps produced and shown to us at such hearing, showing the location and extent of what are termed the "approaches" of the aforesaid bridge, we have no hesitation in denouncing the purposes and objects of the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company as one of the most outrageous attempts at corporate aggrandizement which have ever been sought for at the expense of this municipality.

We believe that we voice the opinion of the citizens of New York, as well as of their official representatives, in stating that there is no opposition to bridge legislation as such on the part of those who appreciate the needs of our city. A proper system for continuing the various railroads which now terminate in Jersey City and Hoboken, connecting them with the City of New York, and affording to them at some convenient point in this city a central railroad station or depot, would be a great convenience to the people of our city and an advantage to its commerce. But this scheme does not contemplate a bridge to be built for the benefit of our city or our citizens; it is designed solely for the benefit of private corporations, and would work incalculable injury to the municipality and its property owners. The location of the bridge is probably the worst that could have been selected on the whole westerly water front of Manhattan Island. That portion of New York City adjacent to Seventieth street and the North river is now one of the most desirable residential neighborhoods, possessing a unique value by reason of its proximity to the Riverside Park and Drive. Its selection can only be accounted for on the theory that the New Jersey charter of the bridge company requires that the bridge shall be constructed north of the southerly line of Union township in the County of Hudson, in the State of New Jersey. This fact, however, we regard as sufficient in itself to illustrate the contemptuous indifference shown to the interests of this city by promoters of this scheme in rendering every consideration of our municipal interests entirely subservient to the necessities of the bridge corporation.

Under the disguise of building "approaches" to this bridge, it is proposed to construct through the streets of New York a railway system joining the great trunk systems of the continent converging in and about New York, and consisting of two spurs, one running southwards from Seventy-first street, through Eleventh avenue to Forty-second street, thence eastwards to a point between Seventh avenue and Broadway; the other running from Seventy-first street and the Hudson river northwards to One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between the bulkhead line and the westerly boundary line of Twelfth avenue; thence across Manhattan Island, the Harlem river and the Twenty-third Ward to Port Morris. We regard the location chosen for the construction of this bridge as a menace to public and private property rights, calling for the severest condemnation. The railroad and other construction contemplated by the corporation known as the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company under the disguise of "bridge approaches" would inflict great pecuniary injury, not only to individual property owners, but to the municipality and the people at large. The bi-section of this metropolis in the heart of one of its choicest and most valuable localities by a railway which would serve as a connecting link between the great trunk systems, over whose tracks there would pass by day and night a continuous procession of freight and passenger trains, could not fail to degrade that part of our city to the level of a railway junction, and ruin a large portion of Manhattan Island which now derives its chief value from its desirability for residential purposes. Such damage as this would fall not merely upon private individuals, some of whom might find a remedy in law, but also upon the municipality, which would inevitably suffer an irreparable loss of many millions of dollars in the assessed valuation of its real estate.

We have already forwarded telegrams to Senators Hiscock and Hill requesting, in the name of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that further action on the proposed Act of Congress be deferred until the municipal authorities could be heard in opposition thereto, and we now further recommend—

(1.) That a copy of the report be forwarded to our Senators, and to the various members of Congress representing the State of New York in the House of Representatives.

(2.) That a Committee be appointed by the Chairman of your Board to represent the City of New York in Washington, and to protect its interests by opposing by all proper means the passage of the Congressional legislation above referred to.

(3.) That the Corporation Counsel be requested to prepare and submit to the next Legislature such amendments to chapter 233 of the Laws of 1890 as will adequately protect the rights of the city, and that he take all needful action to secure the passage of such amendments; that in his discretion he take action to secure the repeal of the Act above referred to.

The Recorder moved that the Comptroller and the Chamberlain be appointed as the Committee called for by the report to represent the city authorities in opposition to the bridge.

Which was agreed to.

The report was then accepted and the recommendations unanimously adopted.

Petition of Mary White, executrix, etc., of Bridget Bird, deceased, for a confirmatory deed of two lots of ground on West street, south of Hammond street, in the Ninth Ward.

Referred to the Comptroller.

Letter of Mr. Albert E. Henschel in the matter of the location of the New York and New Jersey Bridge, approaches thereto, appurtenances and stations.

Referred to the Comptroller.

Application of the Mount Sinai Hospital was presented by Mr. Edward Lauterbach, attorney, for a lease of the parcels of ground on East Sixty-seventh street, near Lexington avenue, and on the northeast corner of Lexington avenue and Sixty-seventh street, for a period of ninety-nine years, under chapter 553, Laws of 1892.

Referred to the Counsel to the Corporation.

Letter from Hon. Alfred C. Chapin relative to purchase of the property of the Screw Dock Company at Pier 39, East river.

Referred to the Comptroller.

Memorandum received from the Dock Department relating to purchase of the Screw Dock property, consisting of bulkhead westerly of Pike Slip and Pier 39, East river.

Referred to the Comptroller.

Memorandum received from the Dock Department relating to bulkhead and water rights next westerly of Clinton street, East river, offered for sale by Mr. James Keese.

Referred to the Comptroller.

The Recorder reported orally for the Special Committee on the agreement for the purchase from Mr. Thomas Smith of certain water-front property between Eightieth and Eighty-fifth streets, in front of Riverside Park, as follows:

At the last meeting of this Board the Chamberlain and myself were appointed a Special Committee in reference to this water front at Riverside Park, to report concerning its purchase. We held a meeting at the office of the Chamberlain and notified the Comptroller, and the Comptroller was represented on that occasion by Mr. McLean. We also heard statements in reference to the value of the property, and the propriety of taking the property at once for the purposes of the City, by Mr. Hawes, by Mr. Fairchild, Mr. Phelan, representing the Dock Department, and by Mr. Ward, and from Mr. McLean. We had before us gentlemen deemed to be as expert in the value of this property as any in New York, and those gentlemen stated that the price is a fair and reasonable one, and they appear to be men who have had experience in matters of this sort.

The Chamberlain and myself have come to the conclusion upon the evidence that, although the price of that property appears to be large, yet we think the interests of the city would best be subserved, under the circumstances, by recommending the approval of the contract made between the Dock Department and the owners of that property.

The Comptroller stated that he was obliged to dissent from the report of the committee. He could not approve of the purchase of this property at the figures asked for it. There was great doubt, also, as to the title. The property should be taken by condemnation proceedings.

Discussion followed, participated in by all the members of the Board.

The Comptroller then moved that the papers be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion as to whether the water-front property in front of Riverside Park can be acquired by condemnation proceedings.

The motion was lost, the Comptroller alone voting in the affirmative.

The vote was then taken on the recommendation of the Special Committee to approve the agreement received from the Board of Docks for the purchase of the property described in the said agreement for the sum of \$175,000 from Mr. Thomas Smith, and resulted as follows:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Recorder, the Chamberlain and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen—4.

Negative—The Comptroller—1.

A transcript of the stenographer's notes of the proceedings at the hearing before the Special Committee was ordered on file.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the proper measures be taken, in case title shall be acquired to the said land by the City, to turn the property over to the Department of Public Parks, to be used for park purposes.

Which was agreed to, the Comptroller not voting.

The Mayor then stated that one of the objects of the resolution was to prevent the building of a bridge or its approaches over the land in question, there being a statute prohibiting the use of a public park for railroad or kindred purposes.

The Chamberlain offered the following:

Whereas, Our presiding officer, Hon. Hugh J. Grant, is about to terminate his official relations with the board; and

Whereas, We desire to express our regret that these relations are to cease, and our appreciation of the value of his services; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York hereby express their regret at the termination of the official relations which have existed between them and the Hon. Hugh J. Grant, as their presiding officer, and their appreciation of the value of his services to the City; and, be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be entered upon the minutes of this Board.

The Comptroller said: I second that resolution. It has given me great pleasure during the past four years to be associated with his Honor the Mayor in municipal affairs, and I sincerely regret his withdrawal from the City Government.

The Recorder: I desire to add my testimony in appreciation of the manner in which the Mayor has performed not only his duties as a member of this Board, but of the manner in which he has discharged his duties as Mayor of this city; and I desire to say further that I believe that no man who has heretofore occupied the position from which the Mayor is now about to retire, has accomplished more good for the inhabitants of this great city than has the present Mayor. I am in the habit of judging men from the results which they achieve, and I think the citizens of New York will agree with me—those who think upon the subject and who have used their eyes during Mayor Grant's two administrations of the office—that he has done more to benefit the citizens of our city than any man who has preceded him.

I regret exceedingly that the official relations of his Honor the Mayor with this Board are to cease within a very few days; but it is a source of gratification to me to know that he will be



succeeded in his high office by one who has acted in concert with him during his entire administration; who has given the present Mayor the benefit of his judgment, and who has made an excellent officer in his present position—it is, I say, a source of gratification to me, while I regret parting officially with you, Mr. Mayor, that you should be succeeded by one so eminently fitted to discharge the duties from which you are about to retire.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Mayor replied in substance as follows:

GENTLEMEN—After the very kind and complimentary words which you have used with regard to me and my administration, it only expresses the feeling I have to say in response thereto, that any slight service which I may have been able to render in this Board has always been through your kind assistance and good judgment, and more through your action than mine. I am sure that there is nothing I regret in leaving office more than severing official relations with the Sinking Fund Commission—a Commission that, with its responsibilities, has always displayed a wise and conservative judgment. Appreciating the valuable advice I have received and the cordial relations which have existed between us, I am but expressing a natural feeling when I say that I regret—not going out of office, because that I am very glad to do—but I regret leaving the associations I have had with the members of the Sinking Fund Commission. I thank you all very kindly, and I can assure you that, in the words of the Recorder, you will find in my successor one who will be in every respect equal to the responsibilities of the office which I am about to leave.

Whereas, The barge of the St. John's Guild, used as a floating hospital, was loaned to this Department in September last, for its use in the care of persons sick with cholera, and was thoroughly fitted up for that purpose, at an expense to the City of six thousand six hundred and eleven dollars and thirty-four cents ; and

Whereas, This barge, or a similar one, will be necessary for the public purposes of this Department during the present year, in case the cholera should reappear in this City ; and

Whereas, The St. John's Guild has requested the return of said barge unless the City desires to purchase the same for the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, and also requests a decision on this subject on or before February 1, so that in case the barge is purchased by this City said St. John's Guild may be able to build and complete a new boat by July 1 next, to be used as floating hospital in place of the barge above referred to ; and

Whereas, From estimates obtained by this Department it appears that a new barge similar to the one above referred to would cost from forty thousand to forty-five thousand dollars, and could not be completed at the time when it might be needed for the public purposes of this Department (say May 1, 1893) ; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars from any unexpended balances at the disposal of said Board, to the appropriation of the Health Department for 1893 entitled "Hospital Fund—Hospital Supplies, Improvements, Care and Maintenance of Buildings and Hospital on North Brother Island, and at foot of East Sixteenth street, and Transportation for Care of Contagious Diseases (sections 549, 550 and 551, New York City Consolidation Act of 1882)" for the purchase of the barge of the St. John's Guild heretofore used by said association as a floating hospital, and now in the possession of this Department.

The 850 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.82 against 23.56 for the previous week, and 27.70 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The deaths numbered only 10 more than in the previous week. There was an increase of 7 in the deaths from measles, of 9 from scarlet fever, of 7 from typhus fever, of 5 from whooping cough, and of 13 from heart diseases, and a decrease 5 in deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 1 from phthisis, of 14 from pneumonia, of 5 from Bright's disease, and of 6 from violence.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Fourteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Seventeenth Ward.
