

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office at 1 o'clock P. M. on Thursday, December 29, 1892.

Present-Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; Thomas C. T. Crain, Chamberlain; and Nicholas T. Brown, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held December 9, 1892, were read and approved. The Comptroller presented the following report on sale of \$64,760.28 School-house Bonds :

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN-On the 23d day of December, 1892, at 2 o'clock P. The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works for the renewal of leases of premises for the Department :

> DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS-COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, No. 31 CHAMBERS STREET, NEW YORK, December 21, 1892.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund : DEAR SIR-This Department desires the authority of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the renewal of leases which expire on the 31st instant for premises required for the business of this Department :

No. 134 West Thirtieth street; ground floor; occupied as a repair shop and place of storage for the water-pipe repair gang, covering the district bounded by Houston street, Forty-second street, the East river and North river. The lessor is Mrs. W. H. Mutha, No. 172 Montague street,

Brooklyn, and the rental is \$600 per annum, payable monthly. No. 186 Mulberry street ; first floor and cellar ; occupied as a repair shop and storage place for the force employed in repairs of pavements. The lessor is George Kracht, No. 185 Mulberry street, and the rental is \$360 per annum, payable monthly.

Two vacant lots on the north side of One Hundredth street, between First avenue and East river. These vacant lots are needed for the storage of material for pavement repairs, for which they have been used for a number of years past. The lessor is W. H. Simonson; address, toot of One Hundredth street, East river; the rental is \$250 per annum, payable quarterly. Rooms 10, 11 and 12 in the Oriental Bank Building, southwest corner of Bowery and Grand street. These rooms have for many years been occupied and are required as a photometric station for testing the quality of the gas supplied to the city for lighting purposes. The lessor is the Oriental Bank, and the rental is \$600 per annum, payable quarterly. The ground floor of No. 221 Fast Seventy night street heretofore occupied and required for

Oriental Bank, and the rental is \$600 per annum, payable quarterly.
The ground floor of No. 231 East Seventy-ninth street, hererofore occupied and required for the ensuing year as a photometrical station for tests of illuminating gas in the upper parts of the city. The lessor is Oscar T. Marshall, and the rental is \$560 per annum, payable quarterly.
The Department has heretofore occupied and paid rental at the rate of \$50 per month for premises No. 3351 Thurd avenue as a repair shop and storage place for the repair gang in charge of water-mains and fire-hydrants in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards. The owner or lessor of the premises asks an increase of the present rental of \$50 per month to \$60 per month.
Mr. Ernest Friese, of No. 173 Front street, offers to lease for these purposes premises at the junction of Thurd and Franklin avenues, which include ground floor and space which will be much more commodious and convenient than the pr mises heretofore used, and he offers a lease of these premises at the rental of \$50 per month. I consider it advantageous to the City to accept the offer of Mr. Friese, and, therefore, respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will authorize the making of a lease of his premises for one year, commencing January I, 1893, at the rental ci \$600 per annum, payable monthly.

The Department has heretofore occupied and paid rental for premises No. 302 East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street as a repair shop and storage place. These premises will not be needed after the close of this year, as the necessary accommodations are provided for in the new Harlem Court building.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to prepare leases to the City of the following-described premises for the use of the Department of Public Works, for the term of one year, from January 1, 1893, at yearly rents specified in each case, and on the same terms and conditions as are contained in former leases, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such leases should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such leases when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, to wit :

Hon. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN-I have the honor to inform you that at a meeting of the Board of Fire Commis-sioners held yesterday the following was adopted : Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby requested to authorize a lease for a term of two years of the premises No. 253 Spring street, from the corporation of Trinity Church, for use as quarters of Engine Co. 30 of the Fire Department. In a letter from the comptroller of the corporation of Trinity Church, dated the 8th instant, he states that the terms of such new lease are \$540 per annum, which is the same as the amount beretofore naid

heretofore paid.

GENTLEMEN-Herewith I present a communication from the Acting President of the Fire Department, transmitting a resolution of the Board of Fire Commissioners adopted on the 14th inst., requesting a renewal of the lease of premises No. 253 Spring street for two years, from January 1, 1893, at the same rental as heretofore paid, viz. : \$540, for quarters of Engine Company No. 30.

These premises have been occupied by the Fire Department for a number of years; the rent is deemed just and reasonable, and I offer for adoption the following resolution to authorize the lease upon the same terms and conditions as the former lease.

Respectfully, THEO. W. MYERS, Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from the corporation of Trinity Church of the premises No. 253 Spring street, to be used as quarters for Engine Company No. 30, for the term of two years, from January 1, 1893, at a yearly rental of five hundred and forty dollars (\$540), payable quarterly ; the owner to pay all assessments and the lease to contain the usual covenants and conditions, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease should be made ; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented a report on the insurance of the New Criminal Court Building, as follows :

The Comptroller said : I second that resolution. It has given me great pleasure during the past four years to be associated with his Honor the Mayor in municipal affairs, and I sincerely regret his withdrawal from the City Government.

The Recorder : I desire to add my testimony in appreciation of the manner in which the Mayor has performed not only his duties as a member of this Board, but of the manner in which he has discharged his duties as Mayor of this city; and I desire to say further that 1 believe that no man who has heretofore occupied the position from which the Mayor is now about to retire, has accomplished more good for the inhabitants of this great city than has the present Mayor. I am in the habit of judging men from the results which they achieve, and I think the citizens of New York will agree with me-those who think upon the subject and who have used their eyes during Mayor Grant's two administrations of the office-that he has done more to benefit the citizens of our city than any man who has preceded him.

I regret exceedingly that the official relations of his Honor the Mayor with this Board are to cease within a very few days; but it is a source of gratification to me to know that he will be

succeeded in his high office by one who has acted in concert with him during his entire administration; who has given the present Mayor the benefit of his judgment, and who has made an excellent officer in his present position-it is, I say, a source of gratification to me, while I regret parting officially with you, Mr. Mayor, that you should be succeeded by one so eminently fitted to discharge the duties from which you are about to retire.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Mayor replied in substance as follows :

GENTLEMEN--After the very kind and complimentary words which you have used with regard to me and my administration, it only expresses the feeling I have to say in response thereto, that any slight service which I may have been able to render in this Board has always been through your kind assistance and good judgment, and more through your action than mine. I am sure that there is nothing I regret in leaving office more than severing official relations with the Sinking Fund Commission-a Commission that, with its responsibilities, has always displayed a wise and conservative judgment. Appreciating the valuable advice I have received and the cordial relations which have existed between us, I am but expressing a natural feeling when I say that I regret -- not going out of office, because that I am very glad to do-but I regret leaving the associations I have had with the members of the Sinking Fund Commission. I thank you all very kindly, and I can assure you that, in the words of the Recorder, you will find in my successor one who will be in every respect equal to the responsibilities of the office which I am about to leave.

The 850 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.82 against 23.56 for the previous week, and 27.70 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The deaths numbered only 10 more than in the previous week. There was an increase of 7 in the deaths from measles, of 9 from scarlet lever, of 7 from typhus lever, of 5 from whooping cough, and of 13 from heart diseases, and a decrease 5 in deaths from diarrheal diseases, of 11 from phthisis, of 14 from pneumona, of 5 from Bright's disease, and of 6 from violence,

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Fourteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Seventeenth Ward.



The S66 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.25, against 23.82 for the previous week and 26.43 for the corresponding week of 1892. Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable falling off, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 99, 97, 141, 9, 16, and 7, against 140, 94, 143, 14, 26 and 4 for the previous week, a total of 369 against 421. Diphtheria increased in the Twentieth Ward, but decreased noticeably in the Twelfth, Thirteenth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. There was an increase of measles in the Seventh, Eleventh, Twelfth and especially in the Twenty-third Ward, while there was a noticeable decrease in the Fourteenth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was most marked in the Twelfth, Thirteenth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Swenty-second and Twenty-fourth Wards; 6 of the 9 cases of typhoid fever were above West Fortieth street; 2 cases of typhus fever were above Four-teenth street, the rest being in the locality already infected; 6 of the 7 cases of small-pox were between Twenty-sixth and Eighty-sixth streets, West.
