DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Monday, August 14, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Meyer and Murphy.

Absent—President Cram.

The minutes of the meeting held August 7, 1899, were approved.

A representative of the Carroll Box and Lumber Company appeared and requested a rebate in the rental for the use of the remaining portion of the Pier at the foot of East Eighteenth street, now used by them. He was informed that a written application would receive the consideration of the Board.

The communication from David McClure, attorney for the Consolidated Gas Company, in relation to the proposed improvement of the water-front between Twentieth and Twenty-second streets, East river, was again tabled for one month.

The communication from the Anchor Line, requesting to be advised as to the terms upon which this Department would extend Pier, new 54, North river, and grant said Company a renewal of the present lease for a term of ten years, with the privilege of a further renewal of ten years, was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer.

The communication from M. C. Dexter, requesting a reduction in the rental charged for the berth occupied by bath at the foot of West Thirty-fifth street, was referred to the Treasurer.

The application of the Hudson River Bass Fishing Club for permission to place a fishing and life saving station between One Hundred and Twelfth and One Hundred and Thirteenth streets, North river, was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, advising that the Local Board of said borough has authorized the Department of Sewers to rebuild and improve the sewer extending out into the East river at the foot of Broadway, Long Island City, and requesting that a dock be constructed by this Department over said sewer, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, to make general repairs to its ferry premises foot of Roosevelt, Grand, East Tenth and East Twenty-third streets, Borough of Manhattan, and at the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Grand street, and between South Sixth and South Ninth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, during the ensuing sixth months.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Department of Water Supply, to repair water-main at Thirteenth avenue, between Twenty-eighth and Thirtieth streets, North river.

Brown & Fleming, to dredge under dumping-board at the foot of West Fifty-fifth street, North river.

John F. Doyle & Sons, agents for owners, to repair Pier 15, East river, and the pavement on the approach thereto, the work to be kept within existing lines.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to drive fender piles at Pier 40, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Brooklyn Wharf and Warehouse Company, to rebuild its Pier 39, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Hubbard R. Yetman, to construct a dock on his property at Tottenville, Borough of Richmond, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications to be first approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Daniel Burbank, to dredge at the foot of Nelson avenue, Great Kills, Borough of Richmond.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Police Department, to erect three additional rooms on the northerly side of the lower deck of Pier "A," North river, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

Mount Morris Electric-light Company, to erect a carrying pole on the easterly line of the marginal way south of Morton street, North river.

Richard Fitzpatrick, to place and maintain a portable engine on the Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street.

A. J. and J. J. McCollum, to erect and maintain a coal hoisting tower on their wharf at Newtown creek, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted, as amended.

Harden Brothers Trucking Company, to maintain a temporary coal hoisting mast on the Pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—Advising that his certificates have been indorsed upon Contract No. 656, for furnishing screw bolts, spikes, etc.; No. 659, for furnishing Manila rope; No. 660, for building a new pier at the foot of West Thirty-ninth street, and No. 665, for dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, and that the same are now valid contracts.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving forms of Contracts Nos. 661 and 662.

2d. Inclosing copies of bills of costs in favor of "The Sun," in the proceedings for the condemnation of the property fronting upon Riverside Park, and requesting that requisition be drawn for one-half of the amount, the other half to be paid by the Department of Parks. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions.

3d. Transmitting copy of application to be made by James Douglas for grant of land under water on the Hudson river, north of Palisade avenue.

From Philbin & Beekman, attorneys—Transmitting copies of applications to be made by Patrick Ward, for grant of land under water, between Halsey and Munson streets, East river, Long Island City, and by Stephen B. Halsey, for grants of land under water, between Munson street and Fulton avenue, and between Main and Halsey streets, East river, Long Island City.

From George Ehret and Jacob Ruppert—Accepting the terms and conditions of the proposed lease to them of the right to collect wharfage at the bulkhead foot of East Ninety-third street. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of lease.

From the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children—Complaining of the practice of permitting nude bathing in the Battery bath. Secretary directed to state that the public bath thereat is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and that any complaint in relation thereto should be addressed to said Department.

From the New York and College Point Ferry Company—Advising that the construction of a double ferry slip foot of East Ninety-ninth street will be commenced in the immediate future under the plan heretofore filed.

From J. F. Smith—Requesting information in relation to the construction of docks and the improvement of the water front in the Borough of Richmond. Secretary directed to reply.

From the Union Ferry Company—Requesting that about 100 feet of the outer end of the pier to be constructed at the foot of Catharine street, East river, be left unshedded. Secretary directed to state that said request cannot be considered until such time as the pier itself shall have been completed.

From O'Brien, Sheehan & McBean—Declining to pay the rental of \$800 per annum for the use of the southerly side and outer end of the pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, North river.

On motion, the permit granted O'Brien, Sheehan & McBean to use the Pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, North river, was revoked, to take effect immediately.

From the Receivers of the Atlantic Transportation Company—Advising that said Company is insolvent, and is therefore unable to make any repairs to the Pier foot of West Forty-fourth street.

On motion of Commissioner Meyer, the order of the Board directing the Engineer-in-Chief to make the necessary repairs to said pier at the cost and expense of the Atlantic Transportation Company, was rescinded, and the following preamble and resolutions adopted:

Whereas, In and by an indenture made the 29th day of July, 1898, by and between The City of New York, through the Board of Docks, the party of the first part, and the Atlantic Transportation Company, party of the second part, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of all that certain public wharf property situated on the North river, in The City of New York, and known and described as the "Pier foot of West Forty-fourth street," was leased for a term of ten years from the first day of November, 1898, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years upon the expiration of the first term; and

Whereas, In and by said lease the party of the second part covenants and agrees that if the rent or sum of money therein reserved, or any part thereof, shall at any time be due or unpaid for the space of ten days after the same shall have become due and payable according to the terms of the lease, or if the said party of the second part shall fail to perform, keep, do, or observe any or either of the covenants, agreements, promises, things, terms or conditions therein contained on the part and behalf of the said party of the second part to be performed, kept, done, or observed, or shall neglect or refuse to make repairs to the wharf property leased, for the space of ten days after notice so to do shall have been given by the Board of Docks, that then and in such case, the lease shall cease, determine and come to an end; and

Whereas, The said indenture provides that the said party of the second part shall and will pay, or cause to be paid, to the said party of the first part, the rent or sum of \$7,500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance; and

Whereas, On the 1st day of August, 1899, there became due and payable the sum of \$1,875 as and for rent for the said Pier at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, as described in said indenture of lease for the quarter beginning the 1st day of August, 1899; and

Whereas, On the 7th day of April, 1899, the said Atlantic Transportation Company was directed to clean and repair the said Pier at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, in accordance with the terms of its lease; and

Whereas, Said company has failed to make necessary repairs to said pier, as provided under the lease, and has also failed to pay to the Treasurer of the Board of Docks the rental for the quarter due August 1, 1899; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the lease to the Atlantic Transportation Company of the wharf property described in said indenture of lease, dated July 29, 1898, be and the same is hereby declared null and void, to take effect on the date of service of a copy of these preamble and resolutions; and further, be it

Resolved, That a copy of these preamble and resolutions be served upon the said Atlantic Transportation Company by personal service, and by posting or by causing to be posted in a conspicuous place on said wharf property of a notice in printing, or in writing, or partly in one and partly in the other, of these preamble and resolutions.

Resolved, That the Atlantic Transportation Company be and it is hereby directed to remove at once all structures which may have been erected on the Pier at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, the work of removal to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to clean and to make the necessary repairs to the Pier foot of West Forty-fourth street.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that the compensation to be charged Brown & Fleming for the privilege of maintaining a dumping-board on the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Sixtieth street, in accordance with the permit granted July 25, 1899, be fixed at the rate of \$2,500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing from the time said dumping-board shall have been completed and ready for use. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending August 5, 1899.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending August 5, 1899.

2d. Reporting completion of the work of dredging north of West Thirty-fourth street, on the North river, under Contract No. 638, August 5, 1899; and the commencement of the work of dredging in the Wallabout Canal, Borough of Brooklyn, under Contract No. 657, August 9, 1899.

3d. Recommending that the Local Board of the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Districts be notified that this Department will construct a platform at the foot of Railroad avenue, Harlem river, for the accommodation of the local business thereat, provided said Local Board will see that Railroad avenue at the approach to said proposed platform is paved from the point where the present pavement ends, near the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to such proposed platform. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting the failure of the owners to make necessary repairs to the Pier foot of Pier street, Rockaway Beach, Jamaica Bay, and recommending that the premises be fenced off by this Department, and that the Dock Superintendent be directed to prevent the further use of the pier until such time as the necessary repairs shall have been made thereto. Recommendation adopted.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to execute such contract within five days from receipt of a notice to that effect, and in case of failure or neglect so to do, he or they will be considered as having abandoned such contract and as in default to the Corporation, whereupon the Commissioner of Street Cleaning will readvertise and relet the work, and so on till the contract be accepted and executed.

Bidders are required to state in their estimate, under oath, their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein, and if no other person be so interested they shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making any bid or estimate for the above work or supplies, and that it is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Municipal Assembly, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.
