DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held Thursday, February 27, 1896, at 12 o'clock M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meetings held February 18 and 20 were approved.

The following communications were tabled :

Jones & Govin, attorneys for Compagnie Generale Transatlantique—Requesting lease of the bulkhead southerly of Pier, new 42, North river, at an annual rental of \$500.

From Farrand & Votey Organ Company—Respecting the dumping of ashes at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, Harlem river.

From Dock Master Darrow—Reporting dredging required at the Pier foot of West Thirty-fourth street.

The following communications were referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report :

From the Department of Correction—Requesting the building of a dock 120 feet long, north of the City Hospital landing at Blackwell's Island.

From the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—Reporting that the dock at the foot of Main street, West Chester Creek, is in a dangerous condition.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms :

Atlas Steamship Company—To make necessary repairs to Pier, new 55, North river, until May 1, 1896.

The following permit was granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board :

Bridgeport Steamboat Company—To berth the steamer "Rosedale" at Pier foot of East Fifth street, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master.

The following communications were ordered on file :

From the Finance Department—Requesting information relative to the claim of James H. Plummer, assignee of Powis & Co., in reference to furnishing piles to this Department in June, 1893. The Secretary directed to reply.

From the Counsel to the Corporation—

1st. Inclosing leases, in duplicate, of the 80 feet of bulkhead next southerly of Pier, new 24, North river, and the half bulkhead north of Pier, new 40, North river. Approved as to form. The officers of the Board authorized to execute.

2d. In reference to the storage of brick on the new-made land in rear of the bulkhead-wall, between Piers 60 and 61, East river, by Murtagh & McCarthy, and advising: 1st, that a penalty may be imposed for violation of Rule 5 of the Rules and Regulations of this Department; 2d, that a complaint may be made to the proper authorities, and said parties punished for misdemeanor, in accordance with section 717 of the Consolidation Act; 3d, that the Department has the power to store said brick, and the expenses thereof be made a lien on the property.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify Murtagh & McCarthy to remove the brick from the new-made land in the rear of the bulkhead between Piers 60 and 61, East River, and in case said brick is not removed within ten days, a penalty of twenty dollars per day will be imposed for each and every day thereafter during which any part of said brick shall remain upon said premises, in accordance with the provisions of Rule 5 of the Rules and Regulations of this Department, and in addition, a complaint will be made to the proper authorities to have said Murtagh & McCarthy punished for the commission of a misdemeanor, in accordance with the provisions of section 717 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; and also, that said brick will be removed by this Department, and the cost of removing and storing same made a lien on said brick.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments :

1st. Transmitting roll containing two descriptions and four maps of grants of land under water in the Twenty-fourth Ward, east of the Bronx river, made subsequent to the annexation of this district.

2d. Inclosing statement showing the assessed valuation of private property between the Battery and Gansevoort street on the North river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Comptroller to furnish a statement showing the taxes collected on private property between above points.

From the Department of Public Works—Stating that the Commander of the United States Steamship "New Hampshire" has complained of the approach to Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street.

On motion, the Department of Public Works was requested to repair same.

From the New York City Civil Service Boards—Requesting to be advised what disposition has been made of Charles T. Waterbury, certified January 16, 1896, as eligible for appointment as Steamfitter.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to advise that his services are not required.

From R. P. Staats—Inclosing the consent of the sureties under Contract No. 518, to the extension of said contract to February 18, 1896.

From F. & M. Schaefer Brewing Company and others—Requesting repairs and dredging at the Pier foot of East Fifty-fourth street. The Secretary directed to notify them that repairs and dredging have been ordered.

From James Arkell & Co.—Requesting an extension of time in which to commence the work of dredging at the north side of Pier, new 56, North river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify said parties that if the dredging is not commenced within ten days from date, the work will be done by this Department under contract, at the expense of the lessees.

From George Grossman—Requesting dredging at the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging in front of said bulkhead in the half-slip north of Pier at West One Hundred and Thirty-first street and the half-slip south of Pier at West One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river.

From Albert H. Hastorf—Requesting permission to change plans of dumping-board at bulkhead between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, East river. Application granted.

From Thomas Dorsey & Co.—Requesting permission to berth oyster-boats at the south side of Pier, old 58, North river. Application denied.

From H. C. Rogers, requesting that the resolution of the 20th instant be modified by fixing the time for vacating said pier at July 1, 1896. Application granted.

From Stokes & Thedford, accepting the terms of the resolution granting permission to erect a fence on the bulkhead between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river, and waiving their right and inclosing the waiver of H. S. & A. H. Mott to erect a shed on the northerly half of said

bulkhead, during the continuance of their lease. On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify them that unless a waiver of the right to erect a shed on the entire bulkhead is filed in this Department, in accordance with the resolution of the 20th instant, the permission to erect the fence will be revoked.

From the Treasurer, recommending that the compensation to be charged Doherty Brothers for ice platform foot of East One Hundred and Fourth street be fixed at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, payable quarterly, in advance, to the Treasurer, commencing March 1, 1896. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent :

1st. Recommending that the Union India Rubber Company be directed to remove fences from City property at One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Lexington avenue, or be required to make application for permission to maintain same at a proper compensation.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to make a survey of the premises and report to the Board what portion of the City's property is occupied by said company.

2d. Reporting as to the erection of a platform north of High Bridge on the easterly side of the Harlem river by the Department of Public Works.

3d. In reference to the arrangements made for the vacating of the bulkhead between Perry and West Eleventh streets, by the oyster boats, and the arrangements made for their accommodation at the bulkhead between Piers, old 57 and 58, North river.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted :

Whereas, In order that the prosecution of the work of improvement of the water-front under the "New Plan" between Perry and West Eleventh streets may be proceeded with at once, it is necessary that the oyster boats now occupying berths thereat be removed; and

Whereas, Alexander Frazer, the lessee of the 89 feet 6 inches of bulkhead next northerly of Perry street, has paid to this Department the sum of \$387.50 for rental until May 1, 1896, and it therefore devolves upon this Department to substitute a proper berth for said oyster boats; therefore, in accordance with the report of the Dock Superintendent, be it

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify the owners of the six oyster boats now occupying the bulkhead between Perry and West Eleventh streets that, in order to facilitate the work of improvement by this Department at that point, the bulkhead must be vacated not later than March 10, 1896.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Michael Reilly to assign to Frederick A. Slingerland so much of the wharfage and craneage granted by a certain lease dated April 23, 1895, as may accrue at the bulkhead between Piers, old 56 and 57, North river, provided the written consent of the sureties on said lease be filed in this Department.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Frederick A. Slingerland to assign to Alexander Frazer so much of the wharfage and craneage granted by a certain lease dated April 23, 1895, as may accrue at the bulkhead between Piers, old 57 and 58, North river, provided the written consent of the sureties on said lease be filed in this Department.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Alexander Frazer to locate six oyster-boats at the bulkhead between Piers, old 57 and 58, North river, during the pleasure of the Board, and the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to drive six to ten mooring-piles thereat, at the cost and expense of this Department.

Resolved, That one hundred and thirty-one dollars and twenty-five cents of the amount of rent paid by Alexander Frazer for rent to May 1, 1896, of the bulkhead north of Perry street, about to be vacated by him, be applied to the rental of the bulkhead between Piers, old 56 and 57, North river, the lease of which has been assigned by Michael Reilly, at the request of the Department, and that the Chief Clerk be directed to make his entries accordingly.

From the Executive and Confidential Clerk—Recommending that Nicholas Cornell, Jr., Laborer, be suspended for thirty days, from February 8, and that John Prentiss, Laborer, be discharged. Recommendations adopted.

From Dock Master Walsh :

1st. Reporting repairs required to the sewer at West Eightieth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

2d. Reporting the sinking of the canal-boat "Myron Ingolsbie," loaded with coal, at the foot of West Seventy-ninth street, and the sinking of tugboat belonging to the West Shore Railroad Company at the south side of West Seventieth street.

On motion, James Thedford, consignee, and the owner of said canal-boat, were ordered to remove the boat and cargo, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Engineer-in-Chief :

1st. Report for the week ending February 22, 1896.

2d. Reporting the completion of Contract No. 522.

3d. Reporting repairs required to fender at bulkhead between Pier A and Pier, new 1, North river, Pier, old 57, North river, and Pier at West Nineteenth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

4th. Recommending that the lessee be directed to repair the Pier at Little West Twelfth street, North river. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company be directed to repair platform in front of the bulkhead south of Pier, old 56, North river. Recommendation adopted.

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted the following reports on Secretary's Orders :

No. 15729. As to the cost of taking up and relaying pavement at bulkhead between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river, to permit the tapping of water-main thereat. The Treasurer authorized to collect from Stokes & Thedford.

No. 15917. Submitting a map showing the pierhead and bulkhead lines at One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, easterly side of Harlem river, and also maps and grants to George Briggs and Elizabeth M. Stevens.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the General Repairs and Construction force for the week ending February 21, 1896, amounting to \$4,660.74, were approved, audited and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Einstein, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending February 26, 1896, amounting to \$6,226, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows :

The amount of said bonds issued hereunder shall not exceed six millions of dollars, and not more than two millions of dollars of said bonds shall be issued in any one year, and none of said bonds shall be sold for less than the par value thereof. The said bonds shall be issued in addition to the dock bonds of said city provided for in section one hundred and forty-three of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, above mentioned, and shall be used for the same purposes as the other dock bonds of said city are used under and by the provisions of section one hundred and forty-three of said chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two. The moneys received from the sales of the said bonds shall be deposited in the treasury of the city and shall be drawn out and paid by the comptroller of said city for the several objects and purposes provided in said title one of chapter fifteen of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, above mentioned, relating to the said department of docks of the city of New York, its powers and duties, upon the requisition of the board of docks of the said department of docks, countersigned by the commissioners of the sinking fund.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT for the acquirement of property for the improvement of the water front of the city of New York, on the North river, between Bethune street and Gansevoort street, in said city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section 1. In all proceedings which may be hereafter taken by the department of docks of the city of New York under chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, for the acquirement of any wharf property, rights, terms, easements, or privileges or lands under water and uplands, if said wharf property or lands under water or wharf property to which said rights, terms, easements or privileges are appurtenant is or are situate between the southerly side of Bethune street and the northerly side of Gansevoort street upon or adjacent to the North river in the city of New York, it shall not be necessary for the said department of docks to make any attempt to agree with the owners of any such property, rights, terms, easements, privileges, uplands or lands under water upon a price for the same before commencing the proceedings authorized by section seven hundred and fifteen of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, already mentioned.

§ 2. In a proceeding brought for the acquirement of any such wharf property, rights, terms, easements or privileges or uplands or lands under water situate as set forth in the preceding section, the title to the said wharf property, uplands and lands under water, rights, terms, easements and privileges shall vest in the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York four months after the filing in the office of the clerk of the supreme court, wherein said proceeding is brought, of the oaths of the commissioners of estimate and assessment in said proceeding appointed, and all of the rights, title and interest of any and all the owners or persons interested in said wharf property, rights, terms, easements, privileges or lands under water or uplands shall cease and determine and be extinguished at such time. All awards made in such proceeding for the value of property acquired or interests extinguished shall draw interest from the time of the vesting of the title in the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York.

§ 3. Except as hereinbefore directed, each and every of the provisions of title one, chapter fifteen of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two shall be applicable to the proceedings for the acquirement of the property or the extinguishment of the interest therein hereinbefore specified.

§ 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

§ 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT for the acquirement of property for the improvement of the water front in the city of New York between the southerly side of East Eighteenth street and the southerly side of East Twenty-third street upon the East river in the city of New York.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section 1. In all proceedings which may be hereafter taken by the department of docks of the city of New York under chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, for the acquirement of any wharf property, rights, terms, easements or privileges or lands under water and uplands, if said wharf property or lands under water or wharf property to which said rights, terms, easements or privileges are appurtenant is or are situate between the southerly side of East Eighteenth street and the southerly side of East Twenty-third street upon the East river in the city of New York, it shall not be necessary for the said department of docks to make any attempt to agree with the owners of any such property, rights, terms, easements, privileges or uplands or lands under water upon a price for the same before commencing the proceedings authorized by section seven hundred and fifteen of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, already mentioned.

§ 2. In a proceeding brought for the acquirement of any such wharf property, rights, terms, easements or privileges or uplands or lands under water situate as set forth in the preceding section, the title to the said wharf property, uplands and lands under water, rights, terms, easements, and privileges shall vest in the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York four months after the filing in the office of the clerk of the supreme court, wherein said proceeding is brought, of the oaths of the commissioners of estimate and assessment in said proceeding appointed, and all of the rights, title and interest of any and all the owners or persons interested in the said wharf property, rights, terms, easements and privileges or lands under water or uplands shall cease and determine and be extinguished at such time. All awards made in such proceeding for the value of property acquired or interests extinguished shall draw interest from the time of the vesting of the title in the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York.

§ 3. Except as hereinbefore directed each and every of the provisions of title one, chapter fifteen of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two shall be applicable to the proceedings for the acquirement of the property or the extinguishment of the interest therein hereinbefore specified.

§ 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

§ 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to amend section nineteen hundred and sixty-four of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the city of New York," in relation to proceedings to open and improve streets, avenues, roads, public parks, squares and places in said city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section 1. Section nineteen hundred and sixty-four of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the city of New York," as amended by chapter six hundred and sixty of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three, is hereby amended so as to read as follows :

§ 1964. Whenever the grade of any street, road or avenue, or part of any street or avenue, has been heretofore or shall hereafter be fixed and established, such grade shall not be changed, except as hereinbefore provided, unless the owners of two-thirds of the land in lineal feet fronting upon the street, avenue or road, or part of such street, avenue or road, where change is proposed to be made shall first consent in writing to such change of grade, and file their consent in the office of the department, board, or officer or commissioner having cognizance and control of the grading, improvement or maintenance of said street, avenue or road as the case may be. And upon such consent being so filed, such grade may be changed by said department, board, officer or commissioner, if it or he shall deem it expedient to make such change, and if any such change of grade shall be so made by the said department, board, officer or commissioner it or he shall cause maps, plans or surveys showing such change of grade as may be so made to be filed in the said department or the office of said department, board, officer or commissioner as the case may be. The board of street opening and improvement shall have exclusive power, however, whenever they have heretofore or hereafter may lay out, widen, enlarge or extend any public square, place, park, road, street or avenue in any part of said city, to alter and establish without such consent the grades of such square, place, park, road, street or avenue, and of the adjacent and intersecting streets, roads and avenues, as they may deem necessary for the perfecting of such square, place, park, road, street or avenue so laid out by them; and whenever the department of docks of the city of New York shall have established a plan or plans or have altered or amended such plan or plans for the improvement of the water front of the city, the said board of street opening and improvement shall have exclusive power upon the application of said department of docks to alter and establish, without the consent hereinbefore mentioned, the grades of any streets, roads or avenues which may be adjacent to or which shall intersect the water front of the said city which the said board of street opening and improvement may deem necessary for the convenient use of the water front of said city.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT to amend chapter five hundred and sixty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, entitled "An act for fixing and determining the salaries of the commissioners of docks in all cities of this state having, according to the last census, a population exceeding eight hundred thousand."

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section 1. Section five hundred and sixty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, entitled "An act to provide for fixing and determining the salaries of the commissioners of docks in all cities of this state having, according to the last census, a population exceeding eight hundred thousand," is hereby amended so as to read as follows :

§ 1. The board of estimate and apportionment in the cities of this state having, according to the last census, a population exceeding eight hundred thousand, is hereby authorized to fix and determine the salaries of the commissioners of docks therein at not less than three thousand dollars each per annum, or more than five thousand dollars each per annum, payable monthly at the end of each month; and the said commissioners of docks are hereby authorized and empowered to fix and determine the salary of the engineer-in-chief of the department of docks therein at not less than six thousand dollars per annum nor more than twelve thousand dollars per annum, payable monthly at the end of each month.

§ 2. The title to said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows :

"An act to provide for fixing and determining the salaries of the commissioners of docks, and of the chief engineer of the board of docks, in all cities of this state having, according to the last census, a population exceeding eight hundred thousand."

§ 3. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

§ 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is respectfully requested to transfer the sum of three thousand (\$3,000) dollars from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1895, entitled "Police Fund—Salaries of Employees," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1896, entitled "Supplies for Police," which is insufficient. The transfer is desired to enable the Police Board to purchase bicycles to equip additional officers upon the avenues and boulevards of the city, and to supplement the present mounted force in the upper part of the city.

DEAR SIR—In order to close the books of the Department of Public Charities and Correction, it becomes necessary to ask for a retransfer of \$4,000 from the "Insane Asylum Supplies" to "Institution Supplies" for 1895.

When your Honorable Board transferred \$19,000 from "Institution Supplies" to "Insane Asylum Supplies," during the latter portion of last year, the amount was based upon as close an estimate as was then available. AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 17th day of March, 1896, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 30. That no calf, pig or lamb, or the meat thereof, shall be brought, held or offered for sale as such food in said city, which (being a calf), when killed and dressed, weighs less than forty-five (45) pounds; or (being a pig), when killed, not more than five weeks old; or (being a lamb) was, when killed, not more than eight weeks old. Nor shall any meagre, sickly or unwholesome fish, birds or fowl be brought, held, sold or offered for sale as such food in said city.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 32. That no meat or dead animal above the size of a rabbit shall be taken to any public or private market for food until the same shall have fully cooled after killing, nor until the entrails, head and feet (except of poultry and game, and except the head and feet of swine, and except the heads of lambs, between December 1st and June 1st, and the feet of the same at all times provided they are thoroughly cleaned) shall have been removed; nor shall the body or any part thereof of any animal which is to be used as food be carried or carried through the streets except it be covered so as to protect it from dust or dirt, and no meat, poultry or game shall be hung or exposed for sale outside of any shop or store in this city, or in the open windows or doorways thereof.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE PROVISIONS OF an act passed by the Legislature of this State on April 1st, 1895, as follows:

CHAPTER 201.

"AN ACT to provide for the assessment and collection of the expense of removal of snow and ice from the sidewalks of public streets and avenues in the City of New York.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, or occupant or person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City of New York shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the said city for the removal of snow and ice from the sidewalk or gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which the said building or lot fronts, the Commissioner of Public Works of the said city shall cause such removal to be made, and thereupon the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said Commissioner of Public Works to the Comptroller of the said city, who shall pay the same in the same manner as the expense of removing snow from the streets of the city is paid; and immediately after the making of the payment of such expense as so certified to him, the said Comptroller shall make and deliver a certificate thereof to the Board of Aldermen of the said city, and the said amounts so certified shall, by the said Board of Aldermen, annually be added to and made to form a part of the annual taxes of the next ensuing fiscal year against the lots against which the said amounts shall be so certified respectively, and the same shall be collected in and with and as part of the annual taxes for such fiscal year, for or during which the same shall have been so incurred and certified.

Section 2. This act shall not be regarded as interfering with the owner of any lots throwing into the roadway of the streets or avenues any snow or ice which may be removed from the sidewalk or gutter directly in front of such lot.

Section 3. The term lot, as used in this act, shall include a space not to exceed twenty-five feet in width fronting the street, avenue or lane upon which the violation is charged to have been committed or omitted.

Section 4. This act shall take effect on the first day of November, eighteen hundred and ninety-five."

The City Ordinance to which the above statute applies reads as follows:

"Section 669. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City of New York shall, within eight hours after the fall of any snow, and within eight hours after the forming of any ice on the sidewalk or in the gutter in front of any such building or lot, remove, or cause the same to be removed, from such sidewalk or gutter, under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge severally and respectively; but where said snow falls or ice forms between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning, this ordinance will be complied with by removing, or causing the same to be removed, before nine o'clock of the morning succeeding its fall or formation."
