## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for Week Ending September 4, 1902.

The following communications were received and ordered on file:

From the Corporation Counsel, approving form of Contract No. 751.  
From the Comptroller, advising that on August 28, 1902, the sum of \$200,000 was deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Dock Fund.

From the Private Secretary to the Attorney General, stating that upon the return of the Attorney General, his attention would be called to the communication of this Department relative to the present status of water grants.

From Hon. Julius M. Mayer, opinion in the matter of the People of the State of New York vs. William Roe, being an investigation into the alleged unlawful influencing of certain employees of the Department of Docks and Ferries in the discharge of their duties, and in the matter of withdrawing Pier 33, East river, from general commercial use and renting same exclusively to the W. W. Brauer Steamship Company.

The communication from the Municipal Civil Service Commission submitting list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Topographical Draughtsman, was laid over for further consideration.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, but not longer than May 1, 1903:

Cusick & Ryan, to use and occupy the new-made land in rear of the north half of bulkhead between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, North river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$900 per annum, payable monthly in advance at the office of this Department.

J. G. Lyons, to maintain a small news stand in front of the Barclay Street Ferry; compensation to be paid for the privilege at the rate of \$1 per month, payable monthly to the Dockmaster.

Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, to lay a temporary track on the marginal street on the south side of West Fifty-eighth street, from the westerly side of Twelfth avenue to a point about five feet east of the bulkhead line, as shown in the accompanying plan; compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$600 per annum, payable monthly at the office of this Department, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Jamieson & Bond, to extend bulkhead 150 feet further out, at the foot of Bond avenue, Rockaway Beach.

A. J. & J. J. McCollum, to erect a revolving coal screen pocket and elevator between Shawnett and Oakland streets, Newtown creek.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, work to be kept within existing lines:

P. Sanford Ross, Incorporated, to repair fender rack on their property at Clifton, Staten Island.

Jamieson & Bond, to renew piling at the outer end of pier foot of Bond avenue, Rockaway Beach.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to make general repairs to piers and bulkheads on the North and East rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn for a period of six months from September 1, 1902.

The following communications were received and the respective parties notified that the matters therein referred to would receive due consideration:

From William J. McGirr, protesting against the granting of a permit to the Empire Transportation Company to erect and maintain a dump at Twenty-ninth street, East river.

From United Electric Light and Power Company, American Lumber Company et al., protesting against the granting of a permit for the placing and operation of a dump on the property at Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, East river.

From Samuel H. Evins, attorney for J. H. Lozier, complaining that J. B. King & Co. are engaged in the construction of a crib dock at New Brighton, S. I., which infringes his client's rights. After hearing both sides the work was ordered suspended and both parties permitted to submit briefs.

From M. J. Hess, requesting removal of abandoned dumping-board between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, East river. Permit to Brown & Fleming revoked and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove structure.

From C. W. Hunt Company, requesting permission to construct an additional strip to the dock they are now building at West New Brighton, S. I. Company notified that there is no objection to their doing the work, provided the method of construction pursued is similar to that provided in original permit.

From Hoboken Ferry Company, requesting that arrangements be made at once

for the lease of premises in the vicinity of West Twenty-second street. Company notified that a proposition based upon a rental of \$24,500 per annum would receive consideration.

From Manhattan Horse Manure Company, requesting permission to load manure at the pier foot of West Thirtieth street. Application denied.

From North and East River Steamboat Company, requesting a rebate on wharfage charges for April and May for landing at pier foot of East Thirty-first street. Application denied.

From Mary E. Humphrey, application for a grant of land under waters of the Kill von Kull, in the First Ward, Borough of Richmond. Referred to the Corporation Counsel.

From Old Dominion Steamship Company, requesting refund of money spent in dredging slips adjoining Pier, new 26, North river. Referred to the Corporation Counsel for opinion.

From E. E. Olcott, in relation to lease of new pier to be built at the foot of West Twenty-second street. Secretary directed to state that the Department will do everything possible to preserve the interests of the Hudson river traffic, as such.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Recommending that Bushey & Hanley be notified to cease work on structures at Bement avenue, West New Brighton, S. I., in excess of that specified in permit granted. Said parties notified to appear and show cause why a penalty should not be imposed for violation of the rules and regulations of the Department.

2d. Reporting that Peter Taylor, Lumber Inspector, has been guilty of disobedience of orders and absence from duty without leave, and that it is absolutely impossible to properly administer the affairs of the timber basin while he is in charge of the books. Engineer-in-Chief ordered to prefer formal charges against said Taylor.

3d. Reporting completion of deliveries under Contract No. 744. Secretary directed to notify the Comptroller.

4th. In reference to the construction of ferry racks, etc., between East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Port Morris, by the New York and College Point Ferry Company. Filed.

5th. Reporting the advisability of extending Pier, new 43, North river, out to the new pierhead line. Secretary directed to communicate with the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique and ascertain if they are willing to pay the additional compensation for the extension to Pier, new 42, which would be rendered necessary by the extension of Pier, new 43.

6th. Reporting that James Lawless, Laborer, appeared for duty in an intoxicated condition. Said Lawless, having appeared before the Commissioner, was reprimanded and ordered to be assigned to laboring work.

7th. Recommending that the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company be directed to either repave the old pier at the foot of Conway street, Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach, under permit granted them, or remove same, it being a menace to navigation. Company so notified.

From the Superintendent of Docks, reporting the rescue by William H. Koepfel, Watchman in this Department, of an unknown man who fell overboard from the bulkhead between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river, on August 29, 1902.

From Auditor, recommending that Brown & Fleming be required to obtain a permit for dumping-board on land under water belonging to the City between Gouverneur slip and Jackson street, East river, and that at least 25 cents per square foot be charged them for the privilege. Secretary directed to notify them to make application for permit at once, or steps would be taken for the removal of the structure.

From Assistant Secretary, recommending that the Engineer-in-Chief be directed to place a series of monuments a distance of 75 feet west of the westerly line of West street to designate the easterly line of the space within which freight may be stored temporarily while in transit; also recommending the adoption of a rule in relation thereto. Engineer-in-Chief was directed to place the monuments specified, and the Commissioner thereupon adopted the following rule and regulation:

"On and after January 1, 1903, all goods, merchandise and materials of every kind which shall be placed or left at any time on the marginal street, wharf or place easterly of a line 75 feet from the westerly line of West street, will be liable to be removed by the Department to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such goods, merchandise or material, and all expenses incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expenses of such removal and storage have been paid."

From the Comptroller, requesting information relative to Claim No. 14,006, filed by Frederick W. Bach, for the sum of \$2,009.50, alleged to be due him for salary as Recreation Pier Attendant. The Secretary directed to furnish the information.

From Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in relation to the removal of bath from the pier foot of Noble street, Brooklyn. The time for the removal of the bath postponed until September 15, 1902.

From Department of Bridges, stating that the contractors for the masonry work of the Blackwell's Island Bridge require the use of the south side of Pier foot of East Sixtieth street. Secretary directed to advise that at an interview with the contractors it was agreed that the northerly side of the pier would be equally serviceable.

From the Local Boards, Morrisania and Chester, relative to the operation of boats from the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street. Secretary directed to state that preparations are under way to provide the Health Department with another landing place and also for additional wharfage facilities in that vicinity.

A communication from John W. Wainwright, requesting permission to construct a crib bulkhead and fill in rear of same; also to place a small boat landing between Conway street and Wainwright place, Rockaway Beach, was placed on file, the Engineer-in-Chief having reported that it is not the intention of the applicant to construct the bulkhead and boat landing at present.

The Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company were notified to cease the work of construction of board walk and dancing pavilion at North Beach until a permit therefor is first obtained.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to place three flagpole standards and two inscription tablets on boat landing at Pier "A," at a cost not to exceed \$1,000, and to place electric light standard at the outer end of breakwater at Pier "A," the cost not to exceed \$1,000.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to make necessary repairs to bulkhead at foot of Seventy-ninth street, East river, at a cost not to exceed \$425, and to resheath the Clinton Street Pier, East river, at a cost not to exceed \$900.

The name of Thomas Johnson, Laborer, deceased, was ordered to be taken from the roll.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to recover the body of John Costello at the foot of West Ninety-sixth street.

The lessees were directed to dredge the slip on the south side of pier foot of West Seventy-ninth street.

Specifications and form of contract for about 1,500 piles from 75 to 85 feet in length, and for dredging between the Battery and West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, North river, were approved subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

Credit wharfage accounts were opened with Thomas Norton & Co., Maritime Building, New York City, and John H. Flannery, No. 22 South street, New York.

The following orders were awarded:

First. George Snyder for sixty days' use of horse, cart and driver in connection with the working of cleaning piers, bulkheads, etc., in the Borough of Manhattan, at \$3.50 per day.

Second. Wyckoff, Seamans & Benedict, one Remington typewriter, No. 6. \$87.75.

Third. To W. T. Haines, for labor and material in doing certain electric wiring at Pier "A," North River.

The Commissioner recommended that the following amendments to the permit to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to erect a shed in front of pier foot of West Thirty-seventh street be inserted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund before approval of permit:

First. That said shed extend a distance of only 50 feet inshore from the bulkhead line.

Second. Said shed in its construction to provide for a flat roof, said roof to be



paved with asphalt and be open for the use of the public, suitable railings and staircases to be provided by the permittee. The company to be permitted to erect an extension to the shed a distance of 8 feet inshore from the 50-foot line aforesaid, and to file an agreement to remove, when ordered so to do, the addition to the shed lying inshore of a line 50 feet from the bulkhead line, which order should become operative upon the completion and opening of the marginal street, wharf, or place, between Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets, and between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, North river.

Third. Detail plans of construction to be first submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks.

The Commissioner recommended that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of a lease to Alexander Crawford Chenoweth for a term of five years from a date ten days after such lease shall have been approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at an annual rental of \$6,570 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department, of 200 feet of the northerly side of Pier at the foot of West Forty-seventh street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, extending from the bulkhead outshore a distance of 200 feet, together with the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the term of said lease a dumping board extending from a line parallel to and about eighteen feet north of the northerly line of said pier to a line parallel to and about eighteen feet south of the northerly line of said pier; and with the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the term of said lease the necessary runways, ramps and approaches to said dump, the plans and specifications for said dumps and runways, ramps and approaches to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The lessee is to keep posted in at least two conspicuous places on the pier, printed in large type, the prices to be charged by the lessee to the public for the privilege of dumping cellar dirt, which prices are also to be made a condition of the lease, to be not more than twenty-five cents per cubic yard; for regular and ordinary dumping carts, which contain two cubic yards, not exceeding fifty cents; for ordinary cellar digger's cart, which contains one and one-half cubic yards, not exceeding thirty-five cents; for brick trucks, containing between two and one-quarter and two and one-half cubic yards, not exceeding sixty cents. The lessee to keep during the term of the lease true and correct books of account, showing moneys received, the quantity of material dumped thereat, rates charged therefor, and the names of persons using said dump, said books to be at all times during the term of the lease open to inspection by the Commissioner of Docks; the remaining terms and conditions of said lease to be fixed by the Commissioner of Docks.

Sealed bids were received by this Department for the above mentioned lease and opened by the Commissioner. The following bids were received:

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made, according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of The City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by The City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
