Dear Sir—Will you kindly call the attention of the Honorable Board of Aldermen to a flagrant case of neglect of duty on the part of Andrew J. Maguire, who is

acting as Supervisor of Public School Janitors. There has been no Janitor in Public School 16, in Wilson st., Brooklyn, for several months, and the boilers heating the forty-five classrooms have been in charge of a colored man instead of a licensed Engineer or someone from the office of Supervisor of Janitors, as required by the by-laws of the Board of Education.

Yesterday (Monday), there being no heat in the building, Lewis H. Tuthill, the Principal, went into the boiler room to investigate and found to his horror that although the fires were roaring, there was very little water in the boilers and that they were on the verge of exploding. As quickly as possible the fires were drawn and the lives of 1,500 children saved.

Last winter Maguire was guilty of a similar case of neglect of duty when he permitted Paul A. Ajas, the Janitor of Public School 123, Brooklyn, to employ a fourteen year old boy to run the high pressure boilers at night school session.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—As part of the action on the Corporate Stock Budget the sum of \$36,498.66 was rescinded on an authorization of \$100,000 for the extension of the high pressure water supply and irrigation system in Central Park, under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

This rescindment was made on the basis of a total cost of \$63,501.34. This amount has been expended, and there is still unpaid a voucher for \$1,500 in favor of the Hanover Contracting Company. This voucher is awaiting audit in the Department of Finance, and payment cannot be made until the additional \$1,500 is provided.

To provide this sum I recommend a further amendment of the original authorization by the adoption of the attached resolution. Respectfully,

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the President, Borough of The Bronx:

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held October 28, 1910, corporate stock to the amount of \$10,500 was transferred to pro-

vide for the reconstruction of damaged walls at the transverse road under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse at E. 204th st.

On September 25, 1907, a contract was entered into between The City of New York and T. K. Shaughnessy for the construction of this transverse road. This improvement consists of the transverse road running under the Concourse and four ramps, or inclines, two on the east and two on the west side, leading from the transverse road to the Concourse at a higher elevation. These ramps, or inclines, are built between concrete retaining walls facing the transverse road. Dry rubble masonry retaining walls on the outside and facing private property. Dry rubble retaining walls were built on only three of the inclines, viz., the northeast, southeast and southwest, the ground on the northwest incline being high enough not to require a retaining wall. The dry rubble retaining walls are built plumb, and are from 25 to 30 feet in height. The reason for building these walls plumb is for the purpose of not encroaching more than necessary on the width of the roadways and sidewalks of the ramps between the concrete and the dry rubble retaining walls.

This work was completed in February, 1910, but has never been accepted by the Borough President on account of the failure of the dry rubble walls by bulging out at a point approximately half their height. This failure exists in all three of the dry walls, but to a larger extent on the southeast and southwest walls than on the northeast wall, where the bulging is comparatively small and seems to have stopped. The walls of the southeast and southwest approaches have bulged to such an extent that the roadways and sidewalks have settled to a considerable extent and the movement has not yet stopped. The walls are in a dangerous condition and immediate steps should be taken to take them down and rebuild them. There is nothing in the records to indicate that the work has not been done in accordance with the certified plans and specifications. Payments were made from time to time, as certified by the Engineer.

It is impossible to determine the cause of the failure of these walls from any examination that can be made at this time. The only way to make a thorough examination would be to take the walls down. It is doubtful if even then the cause of the failure can be conclusively determined, and if it cannot the City will have to pay the contractor for all the work of taking down and rebuilding the walls, removing and replacing the fill, sewer, water main, pavement and railing on the top of the walls, at his contract prices, which would amount to approximately \$17,000.

The contractor offers to take down all of the damaged wall and rebuild the same, laying the stones in mortar beds. He also agrees to do all work incidental thereto, including removing and replacing fill, sewer, water mains, pavement and railing. In compensation for this work he is willing to accept his contract price for rubble masonry in mortar of \$5 a yard as the final price for the wall, and to reimburse the City at the rate of \$2 a yard for dry rubble masonry removed. This means that the City will obtain a rubble wall in mortar in place of the dry rubble wall at the same cost as if the dry wall had never been built. The estimated amount of wall which will have to be removed and rebuilt is 3,500 yards, thus making increase in the amount of the contract of \$10,500 due to the substitution of rubble in mortar for dry rubble, the price of dry rubble being \$2 and rubble in mortar \$5 a yard.

In view of the fact that had the City ordered these walls originally constructed of masonry in mortar, as should have been done, the amount of the contract would have been the same as now contemplated.

I am of the opinion that this offer is an exceptionally good one. The money is now available to construct this work and there is no limit clause in the contract.

In view of the fact that winter is rapidly approaching and some remedy must be applied in the near future to prevent the absolute failure of these walls, I would respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen give me authority to order this work without public letting, according to section 419 of the Charter. REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Report of Committee on Finance—

No. 2211.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on November 4, 1910 (Minutes, page 681), the Budget for 1911, respectfully

REPORTS:

The function of budget making is one of the most important duties which devolve upon the city government. The growth of the needs of the various departments with the spread of building, the rapid settlement of new localities and the vast annual increase of the population, has resulted in constantly increasing annual allowances, and the Budget for 1911 is not an exception in this respect; consequently each year the compilation of the annual Budget requires more labor and more time for its proper consideration. This year the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requested heads of departments to forward their estimates for 1911 by August 1, and did not finish with the work of budget making until the evening of the last day of statutory allowance (October 31). The Budget was received by the Board of Aldermen and referred to this Committee on Friday, November 4, but immediately thereafter was sent to the city printer for publication and was from him claimed by the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for purposes of comparison in the ground that owing to the large number of overleaving hour changes only the one copy was in existence, and it must be had for proofreading. This Committee has had actual possession of the Budget only since Tuesday, November 15, when it was returned. The Board of Aldermen is allowed by Charter provision but twenty days for action on the Budget. Under the above recited circumstances this Committee has had but half that time for its labors in preparation of this report. Notwithstanding the limited time at its command the Committee has attempted to furnish this Board with information never before placed at its disposal, by endeavoring to interpret into a simple and understandable form the medley of figures which compose the Budget, and which are wholly understood only by a few of those officials who were intimately connected with the framing of its provisions, but many details of which are Greek to the great majority. In preparing this key, which is appended to this report, the Committee has not had time to go into a minute digest of the many different appropriations, but it believes that it has set before the Board a memorandum which will be of value not only in the present consideration of the Budget but as a guide to future action in regard to requests from heads of departments during 1911.

Two of the new items which increase the Budget for 1911 call for appropriations totaling \$75,000 for the purpose of investigating the Departments of Education, Health, Public Charities and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. This is an entirely new departure, and one which this Committee believes to be in direct contradiction to the wording and meaning of the Charter, which is perfectly plain and distinct in conferring such duties upon the Board of Aldermen, as is shown by the provisions of section 54, which is given in its entirety herewith:

Section 54. The board of aldermen shall have power and it shall be its duty to see to the faithful execution of the laws and ordinances of the city; and it may appoint from time to time a special committee to inquire whether the laws and ordinances of the city relating to any subject or to any department of the city government are being faithfully observed, and the duties of the officer of such department or of any officer of the city are being faithfully discharged, also to examine and report whether there are any unnecessary, inefficient or unfit employees, any excessive salaries or compensations paid, and generally in respect of any and all matters which will conduce to the orderly and economical administration of the affairs of the city government or any department thereof. Such committee shall have access to the books and records of the city or of any department or officer thereof.

This is further borne out by the paragraph in section 243 of the Charter, which reads as follows:

Section 243. * * * And the board of estimate and apportionment shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as are vested in or cast upon it by any of the provisions of this act, or that may in accordance with the law be devolved upon it by the board of aldermen.

It was evidently the intent of the framers of the Charter that time should be given the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to perform the departmental duties to which they were elected, indicating that if patriarchal care was demanded none were so well equipped to furnish it as the Board of Aldermen, the direct representatives of the people. Should any member of this Board be in possession of information which might lead to an investigation of any department, under the foregoing Charter provision his duty is plain, and upon the presentation of such data or in response to any communication which his Honor the Mayor might address to this Board, prompt action would no doubt be taken to have a proper, legal and public investigation made.

For these reasons the Committee recommends that these items, amounting to \$75,000, be stricken from the Budget.

Another increase is an item of \$35,000 for an investigation of salaries paid and work performed therefor in all City departments. It appears to this Committee that in addition to the objection that the provisions of section 54 and 56 of the Charter completely cover the scope of this proposed investigation, that no necessity exists for the expenditure of this sum of money, for the reason that for the past decade, in conjunction with the Salary and Grade Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics has investigated and made exhaustive reports, now on file, of almost every position and the character of the work performed by nearly every employee in the City government, and that this Bureau, whose force has been augmented by the provisions of the Budget for 1911, is the body by whom this data should be logically prepared, it being in possession of the greater share of the facts contemplated to be obtained by the proposed investigation, with the very great advantage that no additional funds will be required should the investigation be authorized. For these reasons the Committee recommends that this item, amounting to \$35,000, be stricken from the Budget.

Another item which is a new comer in the Budget is the one calling for an appropriation of \$25,000 for a Budget exhibit during 1911. While the Committee makes no recommendation in regard to this matter it is decidedly of the opinion that this amount could be used to much greater advantage in some other direction. Each City department was called upon, at its own charges, to take part in the Budget Exhibit for 1910, at more or less expense, including the preparation of its part of the show and the time of its employees assigned to conduct it, which outlay must be added to the original cost. That the exhibit was framed to attract a large attendance of curiosity seekers may be surmised by the circular letter sent to every department by the Chairman of the Budget Exhibit Committee, in which he states, that:

"It is the purpose of the committee to diffuse, by means of an electric bulletin board, a vast number of municipal facts not generally known. It is the *strange, unique, unusual* or extremely important that best answers this requirement."

The Committee has communicated with all of the City departments in reference to increases of salaries covered by the Budget of 1911, and finds but one proposed increase which calls for what is apparently an excessive advance. It being difficult to properly look into this item, owing to the limited time afforded the Committee, it recommends that this increase be stricken from the Budget without prejudice to its future presentation in the regular way prescribed by section 56 of the Charter.

The Committee recommends that the accompanying resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That the Budget for 1911, as submitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

By striking out the following items:

1. "Code No. 58—Expenses of the committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appointed to inquire into the administrative and educational methods, equipment and finances of the Department of Education, to be disbursed on the certification or order of the Chairman of said committee, \$50,000."

2. "Code No. 59—Expenses of the committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appointed to inquire into the equalization and standardization of grades of salaries and wages of employees paid out of the treasury of The City of New York, to be disbursed on the certification or order of the Chairman of said committee, \$35,000."

3. "Code No. 60—Expenses of the committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appointed to inquire into the administrative and other methods, efficiency and adequacy of equipment and plant of the departments of Health, Public Charities and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, to be disbursed on the certification or order of the Chairman of said committee, \$25,000."

By further striking out under heading "Department of Finance, Executive Division," code number 25, Salaries, the words and figures "Medical Examiner, \$4,000," and inserting in lieu thereof the words and figures "Medical Examiner, \$2,500."

Dear Sir—I am writing in regard to the request of the New York City Commission on Congestion of Population for an appropriation of \$15,000. Unavoidable absence from town made it impossible for me to attend the hearing before your committee on yesterday, so that I do not know the points made by those opposing favorable action by the Board of Aldermen on this matter. In the absence of specific knowledge on this point I can only say in general:

That the Board of Aldermen in its wisdom saw fit to ask the Mayor to appoint such a Commission, and the Mayor, pursuant to this request, has done so.

That this Commission has a membership of nineteen, ten of whom are members of the Board of Aldermen.

Under the circumstances this Commission must investigate and report, and to investigate and report must have funds. The expenditure of those funds will be under the control of the aldermanic members of the Commission, since they are in the majority. I cannot see any propriety in the request that no appropriation be made. That some appropriation is necessary would seem to be obvious and the only question at issue, it seems to me, is for the Board of Aldermen to decide how much of an appropriation should be made.

I beg respectfully to call to your attention that this is no junketing trip; that the members of this Commission, if they do their work faithfully, as I believe all of them will, will have to give up a great deal of their time and energy to this work during the next eight months. The appropriation asked for is not in compensation for the work or efforts of the members of the Commission, but to permit the Commission to do its work as the Board of Aldermen meant it should when it passed the ordinance calling for the creation of the Commission. 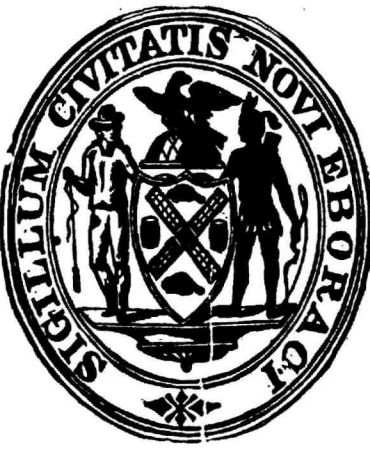

Whereas, The lines of said new White Plains road did not include that portion of Bear Swamp road between Morris Park avenue and said new road, and did not in all instances include all portions of the old White Plains road between said Bear Swamp road and Olin avenue, or Gun Hill road; and

Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company did, during the grading of said new White Plains road, construct, and has since maintained and operated a street surface railway upon said new White Plains road, between Morris Park avenue and Gun Hill road, claimed by The City of New York to be without proper authority; and

Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company did, upon the commencement of operation of its cars over the said new White Plains road, between Morris Park avenue and Gun Hill road, abandon the operation of its cars on Bear Swamp road, between Morris Park avenue and White Plains road, and upon those portions of the old White Plains road not included within the lines of the new White Plains road; and

Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company has, by a petition dated January 7, 1910, presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at its meeting held January 21, 1910, made application to said Board for the right or franchise to operate and maintain a street surface railway as an extension to its existing system upon and along White Plains road, from Morris Park avenue to Gun Hill road, in the Borough of The Bronx, in order that the title of said Company to operate over such route may be perfected and legalized; now therefore

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers, in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at the intersection of Morris Park avenue and White Plains road; thence northerly in, upon and along said White Plains road to and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at the intersection of Olin avenue, or Gun Hill road, with White Plains road.

And to cross such other streets and avenues named and unnamed as may be encountered in said route.

The said route, with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized, is shown upon a map entitled "Map showing proposed extension of the Bronx Traction Company, City of New York, to accompany petition dated January 7, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment," and signed by Edward A. Maher, President, and T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed; provided, that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board, or any authority, which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined

shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand two hundred dollars (\$4,200), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand two hundred dollars (\$4,200).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand six hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$4,625), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand six hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$4,625).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five thousand one hundred dollars (\$5,100), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand one hundred dollars (\$5,100).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five thousand six hundred dollars (\$5,600), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand six hundred dollars (\$5,600).

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than six thousand two hundred dollars (\$6,200), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of six thousand two hundred dollars (\$6,200).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to its total gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided, that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year from the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the Company to the City for the rights and privileges hereby granted.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right and privilege, upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues hereinbefore described, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid by the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any Company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure of the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permission has been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Tenth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power except locomotive or steam power, or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Eleventh—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereof, or of any connecting branch thereof, within the limits of the City. The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Twelfth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway. Thirteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Fourteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Fifteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company during the first five (5) years of this contract shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of one (1) o'clock a. m. and five (5) o'clock a. m. each day unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Seventeenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours, when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curbs, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part there-

of, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Nineteenth—The Company shall cause to be paved that portion of the street between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, upon and along the streets, avenues and highways of the route hereby authorized which are now either unpaved or paved with macadam. The work of such paving shall be done under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, and such authorities shall designate the character of the pavement to be laid.

Twentieth—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structure in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the railway shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-third—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall, within ninety (90) days from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, take the necessary legal proceedings for the abandonment of that portion of its former route granted by the Town Board of the former Town of Westchester June 7, 1892, described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Olin avenue or Gun Hill road and White Plains road, thence southerly along said White Plains road to the Bear Swamp road at Bronxdale; thence along said Bear Swamp road to its intersection with Morris Park avenue.

A certified copy of the certificate of abandonment shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment within ten (10) days from the date on which the same is obtained by the Company.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall, within thirty (30) days from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, remove at its own cost and expense all of its tracks, poles, wires and other equipment from those portions of its former route to be abandoned as hereinabove described, and shall thereupon restore the said streets and avenues to their original condition.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

and such other information, in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company, for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-eighth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to

appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-ninth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund herein-after provided for.

Thirtieth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-first—This grant is upon the express condition that any and all sums of money or any securities heretofore deposited with the Controller by the Company under and pursuant to franchises heretofore granted to it by the City for the faithful performance by the Company of the several franchises so granted, shall likewise form a fund for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board hereunder, relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of a violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Controller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount, and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-second—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Heermance Storage and Refrigerating Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of the City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this _____ day of 19____, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Heermance Storage and Refrigerating Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain conduits with the necessary branches and extensions therefrom, leading directly into private property, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, provided that no conduit be of a greater outside diameter than twelve (12) inches, including insulation or other covering; the same to be constructed and operated only beneath the surface of such of the streets, avenues and highways situated within the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as are included within the districts bounded and described as follows:

District Number 1.

Bounded on the north by the centre line of Reade street, on the west by the centre line of Washington street, on the south by an irregular line formed by the centre lines of Warren street, Greenwich street and Chambers street, and on the east by the centre line of Hudson street.

Provided, however, that upon written application to the Board by the Company, the Board may, by resolution, extend the lines of District Number 1 hereinabove described to all or any part of a district bounded and described as follows:

District Number 2.

Bounded on the north by the centre line of Duane street, extended to the centre line of Hudson street; on the west by the centre line of Washington street, on the south by an irregular line formed by the centre lines of Warren street, Greenwich street and Chambers street, on the east by the centre line of Hudson street.

Both of which districts being more particularly shown—District Number 1 by full red lines, and District Number 2 by dashed red lines—on a map entitled

"Map showing districts applied for by the Heermance Storage and Refrigerating Company to accompany petition dated July 6, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York."

—signed by Frederic H. Norton, President, a copy of which is hereto annexed and made a part of this contract.

Should District Number 1 be extended as hereinbefore provided, then the terms and conditions of this contract shall apply to such extended district.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months before the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within one (1) month after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three hundred dollars (\$300), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300).

During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

(c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents (\$0.25) for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway, excepting, however, such conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding.

(d) Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company and within one (1) month from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to the City the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750); said amount being due to the City by reason of the unauthorized occupation of the streets by the Company or its predecessors.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-

lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, or within the districts hereinbefore described.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any statute or otherwise, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit line, connections, manholes and other appurtenances and mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500 cubic feet.

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

(b) Consumers making yearly contracts:

Fifteen (15) cents per year per cubic foot of box.

These rates to apply to boxes located not above the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within District Number 1, or if such district be extended as hereinbefore provided, then within such extended district, shall extend its conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any building.

Sixteenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board by the Company on the first day of February, 1911, showing the exact location of

all conduit lines and manholes constructed, with reference to the street lines, the curb lines and the street surface, together with a statement of the total length of such conduit. On the same date of each succeeding year, during the term of this contract, a supplementary map shall be furnished the Board showing all conduits laid during the preceding year.

Seventeenth—The conduit lines hereby authorized shall be used only by the Heermance Storage and Refrigerating Company, and for no other purpose than supplying refrigeration.

Eighteenth—The Company shall submit a report to the Board not later than February 1, in each year, for the year ending December 31 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued; for cash; for property.

2. The amount paid in as by last report.

3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.

4. The funded debt by last report.

5. The total amount of funded debt.

6. The floating debt as by last report.

7. The total amount of floating debt.

8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.

11. Number of feet of conduit now laid.

12. The total amount expended for same.

13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation.

14. The total amount expended for same.

15. Quantity of refrigeration produced during the year and the average price received for same.

16. Quantity used in Company's own warehouses.

17. Quantity furnished to outside consumers.

18. Number and location of warehouses occupied by the Company, exclusively or in part, and the extent of such occupation by the Company.

19. Number of outside consumers supplied.

20. Amounts paid by Company for damages to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

21. Total expenses of operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its conduits and appurtenances as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

these events, the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each violation, which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

Twenty-fourth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-fifth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, courses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," included in the districts hereinabove described, and under the surface of, or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct or maintain its conduits.

Twenty-sixth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the buildings or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing of the building or buildings, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the costs and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All chimneys, plaster chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
