

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon applica tion therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and draw-ings of construction work may also be seen there,
