**POLICE DEPARTMENT**

REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1917

The authorized strength of the Force, in all ranks, at the end of the quarter, was 10,891. There were then on the rolls a total of 10,717. The following changes in personnel occurred during the quarter:

Retired on application, 2 Captains, 8 Lieutenants, 4 Sergeants, 28 Patrolmen and 1 Chief Lineman; retired on Surgeons' certificate, 23 Patrolmen; died, 2 Lieutenants, 9 Patrolmen; dismissed, 1 Sergeant, 11 Patrolmen; 1 Patrolman on probation; dropped from rolls, 3 Patrolmen; resigned, 17 Patrolmen; 6 Patrolmen on probation; reinstated, 6 Patrolmen; appointed, 204 Patrolmen on probation; promoted, 4 to Captain, 15 to Lieutenant, 20 to Sergeant.

The personnel of the Department, other than members of the Force, numbered 326 on March 31, 1917 and 327 on June 30, 1917.

During the quarter the Medical Officers (Surgeons) of the Department made an aggregate of 14,252 visits to members of the Force absent through sickness, an aggregate of 28,550 days. They made 216 physical examinations of candidates for appointment and 60 examinations of Probationary Patrolmen, as well as one examination of candidate for reinstatement. They examined 27 members of the Force seeking retirement, 17 of whom were found physically disabled.

During the quarter a total of 624 disciplinary charges were preferred against members of the Force, and 552 charges were disposed of (including charges pending at the beginning of the quarter). Of these 15 were filed; in 63 cases the charges were dismissed; reprimands were given in 184 cases; and in 276 cases fines were inflicted while 14 cases resulted in dismissal from the Department.

The Motorcycle Squad served 1,000 summonses during the quarter. The total received from licenses during the quarter was \$397.50. A total of 1,636 persons, residents of the City, were reported missing. Inquiries were received concerning 285 missing persons, who, it was supposed, might be in the City. Of those so reported during the second quarter there were located during this quarter (including those who returned home) 1,506 residents and 217 non-residents. Cases of unidentified dead were reported to the number of 235, and 159 identifications of such dead were effected.

The Property Clerk received during the quarter a total of 2,151 lots of lost, stolen or abandoned property, condemned Department property, and property taken from prisoners to be used for evidence. The estimated total value of property delivered by the Department to claimants during the quarter was \$641,906.55.

There were 342 horses on hand March 31, and 347 on hand June 30, 1917.

The Steam Boiler Squad examined during the quarter 3,403 engineers and 239 firemen, and tested 3,772 steam boilers.

During the quarter 40 original applications for pension, 1 for increase and 7 for relief were granted. Five original applications and 3 for increase were denied.

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal or shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon.
