COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at an Adjourned Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at 11 A. M., on Friday, February 14, 1890.

Present-Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; and Thomas C. T. Crain, Chamberlain.

Absent-Walton Storm, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held on February 12, 1890, were read and approved.

The Recorder addressed the Mayor, and said: "Mr. Mayor, before we proceed with the regular business, I desire to state here, for the information of parties present, that the question of awarding the contracts upon the several bids for the work of erecting and completing the Criminal Courts Building, which were referred to the Comptroller for tabulation at our last meeting, that this Board has the matter still under discussion, and it has been agreed that the awarding of those contracts be laid over until Monday next, at 11 o'clock, at the Mayor's Office; and I move that the matter be so laid over."

Which motion was carried unanimously.

The Comptroller presented an agreement made and entered into on November 13, 1889, by and between the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting by the Department of Docks, for the sale and purchase of certain wharf property, beginning at a point on the northerly line of West Thirty-third street, and thence northerly about one hundred and one feet, for the sum of \$10,000, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Commissioner Cram appeared for the Department of Docks, and explained to the Board the location and character of the wharf property, the purchase of which had been agreed upon with the New York and Hudson River Railroad Company, by that Department, and the importance of the acquisition of it for the interest of the city, in view of the proposed improvement of the water-front.

The Comptroller stated that he had had the property examined by Mr. E. E. McLean, Engineer of the Finance Department, who had reported upon the purchase favorably, and that he considered the price to be paid for it under the agreement made by the Department of Docks as

A map of the property was submitted and examined by the Board, and after full consideration of the matter, a preamble and resolution approving of said agreement was offered by the Comptroller, as follows:

Whereas, An agreement was made and entered into on the 13th day of November, 1889, by and between the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, party of the first part, and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting by the Department of Docks, parties of the second part, for the sale and purchase of certain wharf property, beginning at a point on the northerly line of West Thirty-third street and thence northerly about one hundred and one feet, for the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund;

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby concur in and approve of said agreement, and do authorize and direct the Comptroller to pay the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) as the consideration for the said wharf property on the delivery of a good and sufficient deed thereof to the City, approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, upon a requisition of the Commissioners of Docks.

Which were unanimously adopted.

In connection with the foregoing matter, the Compiroller presented the following report and resolution relative to a resolution of the Department of Docks, changing the dimensions of the new pier to be established at the foot of Thirty-third street, North river, known as Pier, new 63:

> CITY OF NEW YORK-FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, February 14, 1890.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN -On January 10, 1890, a resolution of the Department of Docks, requesting this Board to approve of a change of the dimensions of the new pier at the foot of West Thirty-third street, North river, known as Pier 63, North river, from those heretofore approved, was referred to the Comptroller.

An examination has been made, and the proposed change in the lines of the pier is considered judicious.

A resolution of approval is therefore submitted.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby consent to and approve of the change in the dimensions of the pier foot of West Thirty-third street, known as Pier 63, North river, from the dimensions therefor as laid down on the plans determined by the Board of Dock Commissioners, April 13, 1871, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 27, 1871, to include an additional area adjacent to the northerly side of the pier and to the established bulkhead line; the amended dimensions of the pier to be as follows: Beginning at a point in the established bulkhead-line, which said point is also in the southerly side line of the pier, as formerly determined; thence running westerly along the southerly side line of the pier as formerly determined a distance of five hundred feet; thence running northerly along the westerly end line of the pier as formerly determined a distance of sixty feet; thence running easterly along the northerly side line of the pier as formerly determined a distance of three hundred and thirty-five feet; thence running northerly parallel to the established bulkhead-line a distance of sixty feet; thence running easterly parallel to the northerly side line of the pier as formerly determined a distance of one hundred and sixty-five feet to a point in the established bulkhead-line; thence running southerly along the established bulkhead-line a distance of one hundred and twenty feet to the point and place of beginning, as shown on a plan submitted in duplicate by the Department of Docks.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Mayor called up the report of the Comptroller on the petition of Henry V. Donnelly and Thomas F. Donnelly, executors of Sarah Donnelly, for a release from the City of a part of the old Fitzroy road, and the resolution to authorize such release, which were laid over upon his motion at the meeting of the Board held on December 5, 1889, and stated that he had satisfied himself by an examination that the prayer of the petitioners should be granted, and he moved the adoption of the resolution, as follows:

Whereas, The Counsel to the Corporation has advised that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, if they deem it best so to do, may sell in the usual way, at public auction, after public advertisement and appraisal, the City's interest in a certain part of the old Fitzroy road, between Fortyfirst and Forty-second streets, for which a release from the City has been asked by the adjacent owners; and

Whereas, The facts in the case as stated by the Comptroller in his report presented this day, in connection with the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, make this course advisable in order to remove a cloud from the title to the property by a release of the City's interest therein;

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 170 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to sell at public auction, after public advertisement and appraisal, all the right, title and interest of the Corporation of the City of New York in and to all that certain piece or parcel of land, being a part of the Old Fitzroy road, situate, lying and being in the City and County of New York, forming a portion of lots known as Ward Nos. 13, 131/2, in Block No. 88, on the tax maps of the Twenty-second Ward, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Forty-first (41st) street, distant three hundred (300) feet easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the northerly side of Forty-first (41st) street with the easterly side of Ninth (9th) avenue, running thence northerly and parallel with Ninth (9th) avenue sixty-two (62) feet and nine (9) inches to the westerly side of the Old Fitzroy road, as laid down on the map for the Commissioners appointed to close said Fitzroy road, by D. Ewen, City Surveyor, dated February, 1833; thence northeasterly along the westerly line of said Fitzroy road forty-one (41) feet to a point on the centre line of the block between Forty-first (41st) and Forty-second (42d) streets, distant three hundred and twentytwo (322) feet easterly from the easterly side of Ninth (9th) avenue; thence easterly along the said centre line of the said block ten (10) feet and two (2) inches; thence southerly and parallel with Ninth (9th) avenue fifty-five (55) feet and eleven (11) inches to the easterly side of said Fitzroy road; thence southwesterly along the said easterly side of said Fitzroy road fifty-one (51) feet and one (1) inch to the northerly side of Forty-first (41st) street, distant three hundred and six (306) feet easterly from the easterly side of Ninth (9th) avenue; thence westerly along the northerly side of Forty-first (41st) street six (6) feet to the point or place of beginning; the distances of the said described land, colored pink, being more or less, as shown on a diagram thereof; the purchase money and the auctioneer's fee to be paid in cash at the time of the sale, and all taxes, assessments and Croton water rents that may be due shall be paid on or before the delivery of said release; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized to appoint an appraiser of the interest of the City in said described land forming a part of the Old Fitzroy road, the appraisement to be approved by this Board before such sale.

The report was accepted, and the foregoing preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller called up the report and resolution upon the petition of Cyrille Carreau for a release from the city of a plot of land corner of One Hundred and Seventh street and First avenue, presented by him, and laid over November 8, 1889.

The Recorder moved that the petition be denied, without prejudice to the right of the petitioner a renewal of his application for a release.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed lune, 1887 he following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extracharges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned it arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretotore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters
are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water
by meter measurement shall be the only charge agains
such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through

such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every uature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COM-RULES MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modity, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwellinghouses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates sha be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath tub therein

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COMS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be a follows: Horses, Private.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each

two dollars.

Hosses, Livery.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar Horses, Omnibus and Cart.—For each horse, one dollar

ing thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar Horses, Omnibus and Cart.—For each horse, one dollar ber annum.

Horse Troughs.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

Hotels and Boarding Houses shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars oer annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Laundries shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars oer annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Laundries of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

Photograph Galleries shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

Soda, Minnral Water and Root Beer Fountains shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

Steam Engines, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

Water-Closets and Urinals.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urnal will be charged two dollars per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, terryhouses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished
for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all
expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water
rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton
water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water
is supplied, as now provided by law." * *
All manufacturing and other business requiring a large
supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC. No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to

another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste

of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per

The use of nose to wash coatener, seamon and any cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The west hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas.

saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a valation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

N UMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore trent or all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that wheneve their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed &r any portion of one year.
