



Referring to your verbal complaint, I would respectfully suggest that there is always, as an incident of the holiday season, a largely increased quantity of paper and refuse to be found on the sidewalks or in the streets, growing out of the use of the same by vendors of articles for which there is hardly any market at any other period of the year, not to speak of the increase in the number of circulars, hand-bills, etc., inviting the attention of the pedestrian to the wares to be sold. As to the latter, I respectfully call your attention to my communication of the 31st day of December, 1890, recommending that the privilege of distributing such matter be no longer given. In view of the fact that you call my attention to the testimony given by employees of the Department of Street Cleaning as to the value, as an aid, of the Police Street Cleaning Company, I take the liberty, as the Sergeant in charge of said company, in comparing its work with that of another branch of the police force doing similar duty for another department of the City Government. Any person making an estimate for the work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to said Board, at said office, on or before the day and hour above-named, which envelope shall be indorsed with the name or names of the person or persons presenting the same, the date of its presentation, and a statement of the work to which it relates.

The bidder to whom the award is made shall give security for the faithful performance of the contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, in the sum of Three Thousand Four Hundred Dollars.

The Engineer's estimate of the quantities of material necessary to be filled in is as follows: About 90,000 cubic yards.
