To the Board of the Health Department: I, John E. Comfort, holding the position of Assistant Sanitary Inspector, in the Health Depart-ment of the City of New York, do report: That on the 23d day of October, 1875, I did inspect carefully and personally examined the premises situated as hereinafter described in the City of New York, and found the facts to be as follows: Said premises consist of an unopened street and were found in a condition dangerous to life and detrimental to health, for the following reasons, viz.: That there runs along north side of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, an open drain that is in a very offensive condition, as surface and waste water therein con-tained stagnates and contaminates the soil on each side of the drain, from which offensive and dele-terious odors arise. This drain commences in Tenth avenue, near One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and at various points receives waste water and sewerage from houses on Tenth avenue and discharges on One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, west of Tenth avenue. The drain was covered several years and at various points receives waste water and sewerage from nouses on Tenth avenue and discharges on One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, west of Tenth avenue. The drain was covered several years ago for 200 feet on said One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street with timbers. These latter have become decayed land broken down in many places, so that waste water and sewage flow through the broken places over the top of the timbers and on the sidewalk north of the drain. This drain runs along

north side of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street for 400 feet westerly of said Tenth avenue where it north side of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street for 400 feet westerly of said Tenth avenue where it discharges into a vaca at lot, whence it runs in a westerly and northerly direction about 300 feet and discharges through a culvert on Eleventh avenue, about 100 feet south of One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, into a private sewer in Audubon Park, and thence into North river. There are six or eight private residences on One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, all of which are almost rendered untenantable by this drain or open sewer that comes directly in front of their doors. South of these dwellings are several shanties that are built within the line of the street in close proximity to the drain. The street has, I believe, never been declared open, and has never Leen regulated, graded, or sewerd. sewered.

I respectfully recommend, as a sanitary necessity of the most urgent importance, that One Hun-dred and Fifty-sixth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, be declared open, and that the same be regulated, graded, and that a sower be constructed therein that shall receive all surface and waste water from Tenth avenue, and that it shall be made to discharge into the sewer in Eleventh avenue, at the intersection of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York .

GENTLEMEN-1 am instructed by the Board of Police to submit to you, on behalf of said Board, a respectful protest against the action of the Board of Apportionment in deducting from the Departmental Estimate for the ensuing year the sum of 5411,422. The Departmental Estimate called for a total sum of 5418,832

mental Estimate for the ensuing year the sum of 5411,422. The Departmental Estimate called for a total sum of 54,538,822. It is insisted that the estimate was carefully considered, and the sum is not in excess of the probable requirements of the service for the ensuing year. There are several points of objection to the action of the Board of Apportionment, viz. : First—The deduction of the sum of 54,800 from the item of salaries of Clerks, Stenographers, Telegraph, and Steamboat Employees is not warranted by any facts within the knowledge of the Board of Police.

Telegraph, and Steamboat Employees is not warranted by any facts within the knowledge of the Board of Police. The business of the ensuing year is likely to demand an increase rather than a reduction of the number of this class of employees. Second—From and since May, 1874, the quota of Patrolmen has been established by law at 2,300. The number and the pay of this class of officers being estab-lished by law, the duty of raising and appropriating an amount sufficient to pay the salaries of that number of Patrolmen for a full year is incumbent upon the authorities charged with providing means for paying salaries established by law. There has been times during the current year, when there has been the full number of 2,300 Patrolmen borne on the rolls of the Depattment. There is a general demand and carnest pressure from most of the Precincts for a larger number of Patrolmen. An addition of 100 (making the quota 2,400) ought to be made in the course of the year, to commence on the 1st January, next. The appropriation ought to be sufficient to pay the salaries of the full quota of 2,300. If the sum of 546,500.00 (the salary of 39 Patrolman) should be restored, the appropriation would barely cover the salaries of the legally established quota of Patrolmen. If it is not restored, the practical effect of the action of the Board of Apportionment will be a reduction of the Police Force 39 men. This course is not con-sistent with the exigencies of the service. The appropriation for Patrolmen's salaries, as finally fixed by the Board of Apportionment, ought to be increased by the anount of S16, 500.00, which would then be solo,000.00 less than the Departmental Estimate. This would enable the Board of Police to respond to the earnest demand for an increase of the force of Patrolmen, by adding too men to the present force, to be appointed from time to time during the year 1876. Third—The sum of \$5,000 was deducted as the salaries of two Sergeants at \$1,600, and two Doormen at \$900 each. The Departmental Estimate does not include more Sergeants nor Doormen than are needed, and the number of Sergeants and Doormen is much below the number allowed by law.

Fourth-The Departmental Estimate of "Supplies for Police" was not too large, and the deduction of the sum of \$14,085 from that amount ought not to have been made, and ought to be restored.

Considering the penal section, which prohibits a public officer from making any obligation where there is no appropriation of means of payment, it is plain that whatever may be the emblic authority to remove the snow and ice.

embar.assments of street movements by reason of snow and ice, nothing can be lawfully done by any public authority to remove the snow and ice. It will be remembered that in a recent year, the Board of Police placed in their Departmental Estimate an item of \$100,000 for the removal of snow and ice. On the prophetic assumption that there would be no snow during the subsequent winter, the item was disallowed, and the appropriation denied. In the face of the prophecy, there occurred during the winter a most unprecedented fall of snow. Public clamor induced the then existing Board of Police to expend money not appropriated for that purpose, and to incur obligation when no appropriation was made. With the present provisions of law such an unwarranted use of the public money ought not to occur or be expected. For these reasons, and others which will readily occur to the Honorable Board of Aldermen, the report of the Board of Apportionment ought to be amended by restoring the above items which have been disallowed.
