SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 376 of the Laws of 1897, the Police Board of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending December 31, 1898:

REPORT.

On the 31st day of December, 1898, the number of the Force of all grades, including Surgeons and Telegraph Force, was 7,457. Number of Matrons, 38.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 23,102½ days; sick time paid, 11,551½ days; sick time unpaid, 11,551½ days; total, 23,102½ days. The total days' time of the Force was 685,704 days; per cent. of sick to full time, 3.37; amount paid for sick time, \$36,229.36; amount paid for preceding quarter, \$27,087.61; increase, \$9,141.75.

ARRESTS.

The number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was—Males, 27,337; females, 6,800; total, 34,137. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,763; number discharged without trial, 816; number acquitted, 370; number convicted, 417; number sent to other authorities, 44; number died, 11; number pending, 1,105; total, 2,763.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 322; females, 143; total, 465. brought to Central Office and other dispositions, 108; Restored to parents or guardians, 357; total, 465. Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

HOUSE OF DETENTION.

The number of persons committed to and detained in the House of Detention for Witnesses during the quarter was: Remaining in House October 1, 1898, 3; committed during month of October, 1898, 15; total, 18; discharged during month of October, 1898, 17. Remaining in House November 1, 1898, 1; committed during month of November, 1898, 17; total, 18; discharged during month of November, 1898, 12. Remaining in House December 1, 1898, 6; committed during month of December, 1898, 12; total, 18; discharged during month of December, 1898, 13. Remaining in House January 1, 1899, 5. The aggregate number of days of detention was 422; the number of meals was 1,266, at a cost of 25 cents each, amounting to \$316.50. For the names of persons detained and other particulars see schedule annexed marked "C."

SANITARY COMPANY.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company for the quarter, setting forth the number of steam-boilers examined and their condition, and the number of applicants for examination as Engineers, will be found in schedule annexed marked "D."

PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners, and other transactions of the Property Clerk's Office, will be found in schedule annexed marked "E."

BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The regular weekly meeting of the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, was held on March 3, 1899, in Hackett Building, Long Island City.

The following-named persons constituting the whole Board were present: Councilmen David L. Van Nostrand and Joseph Cassidy, Aldermen William F. James and Joseph Geiser, and President Frederick Bowley.

Minutes of the previous meeting were duly approved.

On motion the following was adopted unanimously:

Whereas, The Postal Telegraph Cable Company with office at No. 253 Broadway, New York City, did make an application to the Local Board of the Borough of Queens to vote in approval of draft of ordinance to be by it submitted to the Municipal Assembly, City of New York, by the adoption of which by said body, said company seeks to acquire the right to erect poles and string wires for its business purposes in and upon the streets and avenues through the Fourth and Fifth Wards, as in said ordinance specifically stated; and

Whereas, Upon public hearing had strong opposition was made by the property-owners along the Boulevard at Arverne-by-the-Sea, against the erection of poles along the Boulevard; and

Whereas, Thereupon this Board did refuse to comply with the petition of said company; and Whereas, Said company did renew its application upon an amended draft of ordinance by which said company finally stipulated that it would lay its wires underground from Edgemere avenue, along the Boulevard at Arverne-by-the-Sea, to the Sea Side Hotel at Sea Side avenue, Rockaway Beach; and

Whereas, Such amendment was accepted and opposition withdrawn by those along said Boulevard;

Whereas, Subsequent public hearing was afforded in order to fully learn the wishes of all concerned, whereat protest was filed setting forth that there is and has been for years a telegraph company operating through the district aforesaid, and that the Postal Telegraph Cable Company has had its requirements supplied over same through the lines of said company, and concluding with “We are informed that favorable terms can be made by said Postal Telegraph Cable Company to continue its business over said lines now in operation on said streets”; and

Whereas, The agent of said Telegraph Cable Company responded thereto, “that said local company has nothing tangible to dispose of, and that the company he represents not only aims to accommodate and secure local business, but that it was most desirable by means of the route asked for, for the purpose of facilitating the transmission of messages between its ocean cable stations at Fire Island and the chief commercial centre of America, New York City.”

Now in view of the foregoing, and after consideration of all matters relating to the subject as submitted, and mindful that competition is antagonistic to trusts, and also that the granting of public franchises by Municipal Assembly is safeguarded by the Charter of Greater New York, and that the erection of poles for such purposes and the placing of wires underground is also thereby subjected to the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Buildings, etc., who, we are assured, will exercise same in accordance with the best interests of all concerned, do therefore declare

That this Board does not, under present conditions, feel warranted in interposing any objections to the Municipal Assembly exercising the powers vested in it by the City Charter in respect to such draft of amended ordinance as submitted by said Telegraph Cable Company, of which copy is annexed hereto, same as is recorded on page 563 of CITY RECORD.

Public hearing in the matter of petition for the legal opening of Chase avenue, from the Atlantic Ocean to Jamaica Bay, was accorded and was followed by the adoption of resolution in approval thereof, which reads:

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens submitted to this, the Local Board of said borough, at a meeting held this 3d day of March, 1899, petition for the legal opening of Chase avenue, from Atlantic Ocean to Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach, Fifth Ward, Borough of Queens, and as due notice of public hearing thereon was published, and after such hearing having been had, it appearing to us for the best interests of the city that such should be done, do hereby recommend to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it cause the necessary proceedings to be instituted to accomplish the requirements of the petitioners.

Communication from William Dalton, Commissioner of Water Supply, imparting the information of having issued permit to the Jamaica Water Supply Company, to lay 6-inch water-supply mains in Spruce street, between Hillside and Central avenues, Richmond Hill, and to place one fire-hydrant thereon, was read and ordered on file.

Adjourned to 10th instant.

The following communications were also referred to the Treasurer:

From I. C. Diefenbach—Requesting permission to berth the steamer "Northport" on the north side of the Recreation Pier at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street.

From Frederick Horn—Submitting offer of \$75 per annum for the privilege of using the premises at the foot of Willow avenue, Bronx Kills, for boating purposes.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Brown & Fleming—To dredge under dumping board at the foot of Canal street, North river, and at the foot of Jackson street, East river.

Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company—To cut two holes in their bulkhead south of the Ninth Street Bridge, Gowanus canal.

Robert M. Ferris—To dredge in the slip adjoining the south side of Pier 19, East river.

Quintard Iron Works—To drive six fender piles at the foot of East Thirteenth street.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

T. C. Hoornbeck, to maintain a portable structure about 7 by 25 feet and to cut backing-log on the southerly side of Pier 19, East river, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

R. J. Foster, to replace and maintain ice bridge on the bulkhead, between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river.

From the Mayor—Inclosing copy of communication from the Commissioners of Accounts advising that the Physical and Chemical Laboratory attached to the office of the Commissioners of Accounts is available for the testing of asphalts, cement, etc.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting certified copies of bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of wharf property between Watts and Canal streets, North river; between Bank and Bethune streets, North river, and at Pier 39, East river, and adjoining bulkhead. Chief Clerk directed to prepare the necessary requisitions therefor.

2d. Transmitting approved form of lease to the estate of George Law, deceased, of the pier foot of East Eleventh street and the northerly half of the pier foot of East Tenth street. Officers of the Board authorized to execute same.

3d. Transmitting approved form of agreement with the estate of George Law, deceased, for the payment of one-half of the cost of rebuilding the pier at the foot of East Eleventh street.

4th. Transmitting copy of Senate Bill No. 297 confirming the grants of land under water originally granted to Jordan L. Mott and others. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to take such action as in his discretion may be necessary in the matter.

From the Department of Highways—

1st. Requesting information in relation to the unexpended balance of the Wallabout Improvement Fund. The action of the President in replying that such information can be obtained at the office of the Comptroller approved.

2d. Advising that the matter of paving Twelfth avenue, between West Fiftieth and West Fifty-seventh streets, has been brought to the attention of the President of the Borough of Manhattan for submission to the Local Board of the District. Secretary directed to urge that immediate action be taken in the matter.

From the Department of Sewers—In relation to the condition of the Wallabout Canal, in the Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board as to who should do the dredging in said canal.

From Mary A. P. Draper—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted February 10, 1899, granting permission for the erection of a temporary platform at the outer end of the pier near the foot of East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street.

From the Sureties on Contract No. 638—Consenting to the extension of time granted Edward S. Walsh, contractor, for the completion of the work of dredging on the North river north of West Thirty-fourth street.

From the New Jersey Dry Dock Company—Requesting a lease of water front property for the use of dry docks on the North river, below Fifty-fifth street, or on the East river below Twenty-third street. Secretary directed to notify said company that there is no property at the locations referred to available for the purpose of constructing dry docks.

From Thomas H. Joyce—Requesting the privilege of furnishing and distributing programmes of the musical concerts on the recreation piers during the season of 1899. Application denied.

From M. C. Dexter—Requesting permission to maintain swimming baths at the foot of West Twentieth and West Fiftieth streets.

On motion, the application for permission to maintain swimming bath at the Pier foot of West Fiftieth street was denied, and permission granted to maintain a bath on the north side of the Pier foot of West Twentieth street, commencing June 1, 1899, the privilege to continue during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

From Henry D. Steers—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 639.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building a new Pier at the foot of Watts street, North river, in the Borough of Manhattan, under Contract No. 639, Henry D. Steers, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including March 13, 1899, except for the inner 100 feet, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From George Ehret and Jacob Ruppert—Requesting a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of East Ninety-third street.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Department hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let to George Ehret and Jacob Ruppert all and singular the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupation of the bulkhead at the foot of East Ninety-third street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, the term of said lease, the date of commencement and compensation to be paid therefor to be hereafter fixed by Commissioners Murphy and Meyer.

It being understood that the above resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said George Ehret and Jacob Ruppert, shall, within ten days from receipt hereof, file in this Department their written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions embodied in the leases of wharf property now in use by this Department.

From the Estate of Moses Taylor and others—Requesting permission to extend Pier 13, East river, and to erect a shed thereon.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the owners of Pier 13, East river, to extend said pier outshore a distance of about 111 feet, so that said pier will extend on face, on a parallel with Pier 12 on the south, and with Pier 14 on the north side; also to erect an iron shed on said Pier 13, as extended, one story in height except at the inner end, where a two story shed 60 feet long may be erected, in accordance with the rules and regulations in such cases made and provided, and in conformity with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, all the work to be done under his direction and supervision.

The above resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said owners shall file in this Department a written agreement, to be approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, to pay for the use of the land under water owned by the city, covered by extension and alterations to said pier, the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing from the date the alterations to said pier are completed; and also, that in the event the Board of Docks shall decide that said pier is needed for the improvement of the water front, that then and in such case no additional item of value shall be claimed or allowed by reason of the extension or alterations to said pier, or the erection of a shed on said pier, in any proceedings being instituted for the acquisition of said property, either by purchase or condemnation.

From the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer—Recommending that the application of William Dougherty for permission to use the inner half of the dumping-board on the pier foot of West Nineteenth street be denied. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that permission be granted the New York and Maine Granite Paving Block Company to use and occupy the space in the rear of the bulkhead between East One Hundred and Seventh and East One Hundred and Eighth streets, and a portion of the bulkhead at the foot of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river, the privilege to continue during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation in each case to be at the rate of \$25 per month, payable in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Meyer & Co. for the use of the land in the rear of the bulkhead between East One Hundred and Seventh and East One Hundred and Eighth streets, Harlem river, be fixed at the rate of \$25 per month, instead of \$10 per month, the increased rental to take effect immediately.

3d. Recommending that permission be granted W. J. Brennan to erect and maintain an ice bridge at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Harlem river, on property owned by the Lynch estate, the structure to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and the consent of the owner to be first obtained. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that permission be granted H. L. Emerson to maintain swimming bath on the south side of the pier foot of Fifth street, East river, the privilege to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Charles W. Davis for the privilege of berthing the steamer "Mary E. Gordon" at Pier, new 32, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Joy Steamship Company for the use of berth on the north side of Pier, new 1, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$35 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending March 4, 1899.

From Dock Master Kennedy—Reporting repairs required to the sheathing on the bulkhead between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, North river. Secretary directed to notify the owners to make the necessary repairs thereto, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Dock Master Harrison—Reporting repairs required to the approach to Pier 9, East river. Secretary directed to notify the owner to make the necessary repairs thereto, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Dock Master Clark—

1st. Reporting repairs required to the sheathing on the piers foot of East Third and East Fifth streets, and to the pavement in rear of crib-bulkhead at the foot of East Fourth Street. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make necessary repairs thereto.

2d. Reporting dredging required in the slip adjoining the northerly side of the pier foot of East Fourth street, and in front of the bulkhead thereat. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging to a depth of 15 feet at mean low-water.

Resolved, That the rental determined upon in the agreement dated March 22d, 1897, between F. W. Rhinelander and others, for the area covered by the extension of Pier, old 28, North river, in excess of the area turned over to the city, amounting to eight hundred and seventy-three dollars and seventy-five cents per annum, be collected from the Old Colony Steamboat Company, said rental to be payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing January 4, 1898.

4th. Recommending that the Secretary be directed to advertise for estimates for furnishing about seven hundred tons of anthracite coal. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending a change in the bulkhead-line between East Twenty-third and East Twenty-fourth streets, East river.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The present bulkhead-line between East Twenty-third and East Twenty-fourth streets, East river, as shown on the map approved by the Secretary of War on April 25, 1890, extends from a point in the northerly side of East Twenty-third street distant 603.39 feet easterly from the westerly side of Avenue A, and runs thence westerly along said northerly side of East Twenty-third street to a point 322 feet easterly from the westerly side of Avenue A, and runs thence northerly in a line parallel with said westerly side of Avenue A and distant 322 feet easterly therefrom to the southerly side of East Twenty-fourth street, at a point 322 feet easterly from the said westerly side of Avenue A.

Resolved, That this Board recommends to the Secretary of War, that the bulkhead-line as above described be and hereby is modified so as to extend from the aforesaid point in the northerly side of East Twenty-third street, distant 603.39 feet easterly from the westerly side of Avenue A, and running thence westerly along said northerly side of East Twenty-third street 130 feet to a point distant 473.39 feet easterly from the said westerly side of Avenue A, and thence north-westerly to the aforesaid point in the southerly side of East Twenty-fourth street, distant 322 feet easterly from the said westerly side of Avenue A.
