Martin, attorney; of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and others, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; of the New York Knickerbocker Real Estate Company, filed by Daly, Hoyt & Mason, attorneys; of George H. Penniman, trustee, by John C. Shaw, attorney, together with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated May 29, 1899, in regard to the objections filed to the assessment, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors on September 13, 1899.

Mr. Baldwin was heard in opposition to assessing upon the property the amount of the awards made for damages and also to the excessive charge for interest caused by unreasonable delay in making the assessment after the completion of the work.

In the matter of the claim of Augusta G. Genet, under chapter 595 of the Laws of 1896, for an award for damages to her property, known as No. 748 East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, by reason of the change of the original grade of the said street, which was referred to the Corporation Counsel at meeting of October 30, 1896, for investigation and report, the Comptroller presented the papers submitted and the testimony taken in the said matter, together with the report of the Corporation Counsel, as follows:

GENTLEMEN—On the 13th day of November, 1896, there was received in this Department a communication from the Chief Clerk of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments inclosing a claim filed by Augusta G. Genet for damages for changes of the street grade in front of premises on One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, between Washington and Third avenues, filed with that Board, pursuant to chapter 595 of the Laws of 1896, a special law empowering the said Board to ascertain and determine damages to the said real property.

Pursuant to a stipulation entered into between the attorney for the claimant and the Corporation Counsel, the testimony as to damages was taken by deposition in this office.

After the conclusion of the trial, the claim, testimony and title deeds of the claimant, together with a report of the assistant to whom the claim was assigned, was prepared for submission to your Board. In some way those papers have been mislaid, and at the request of the attorney for the claimant, copies of all of the papers, with the exception of the photograph and title deeds, were prepared in order that the claim might be submitted to you for decision.

In the communication first referred to, referring the claim to this Department, a request was made for advice as to the proper course to pursue.

I advise you that the Board of Revision of Assessments should review the testimony and papers submitted with this communication, and decide the amount of damages suffered by the claimant.

In accordance with section 1 of the said chapter 595 of the Laws of 1896, it is the duty of the Board to transmit to the Comptroller of The City of New York a certificate setting forth the amount of the said awards.

I inclose a copy of the report of the assistant having charge of the claim, in which he expresses an opinion that the damages suffered by reason of said change of grade did not amount to more than \$25. This is submitted as a contention of the counsel who tried the case, leaving it with your Board to determine the amount of damages suffered.

The papers inclosed herewith are as follows:

1st. A copy of the report of the counsel having charge of the claim for the City.

2d. A copy of the Act under which the claim is made.

3d. A copy of the claim filed with your Board.

4th. A stipulation between the attorneys.

5th. The testimony taken for the claimant and for the City.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, February 23, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held February 16, 1900, were approved.

Henry P. McGowan appeared and objected to the storage of material on the marginal way between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, Harlem river.

The matter of the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Pier 36, East river, and of the removal of the extension to said pier, was again tabled for two weeks.

The communication from the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of New York, requesting a ten years' lease, with the privileges of four renewals, of land under water between East Thirty-eighth and East Thirty-ninth streets, and at the foot of East Thirty-ninth street, with the privilege of erecting a bulkhead wall and pier thereat, and of running condensing pipes through such pier, was referred to Commissioner Murphy.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 19839, in relation to the application of the Department of Bridges for the setting aside of land under water and bulkhead at the foot of Pike slip, East river, Borough of Manhattan, and at the foot of Washington street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the towers and anchorages of the proposed East River Bridge to be constructed between said points, was referred to the President.

The communication from James Biggart & Co. complaining of the methods employed by Joseph Morgan at the premises foot of Depot place, High Bridge, and requesting the privilege of collecting wharfage thereat, was referred to the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Brown & Fleming, to use and occupy a berth at the bulkhead foot of West Ninety-eighth street, North river, for the purpose of loading stone thereat; compensation for the privilege to be fixed by the Treasurer.

John J. O'Hare, to erect a platform and scale on the bulkhead south of East Third street, and covering a portion of Tompkins street, about eight feet inshore and parallel to the bulkhead; all work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and the compensation for the privilege to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Albert H. Hastorf, to dredge in front of the bulkhead between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, East river.

Maine Steamship Company, to drive about ten piles on the west side of Pier 38, East river, to prevent damage to the pier by their steamers, the piles to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 676, for building Pier, new 32, East river, and Contract No. 674, for furnishing about 3,000 piles.

2d. In relation to substitution of sureties on Contract No. 675.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted for the substitution of the American Bonding and Trust Company of Baltimore City and the Union Surety and Guaranty Company, as sureties in the place of William R. Thompson and J. P. Hamblen, on the estimate of John Early's Sons, contractors, for furnishing about 10,000 barrels of Portland cement under Contract No. 675.

3d. Transmitting certified copy of order of the Supreme Court confirming the report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the proceedings for the acquisition of the southerly half of the block between Bank and Bethune streets, North river, and requesting that requisitions be drawn for the awards contained therein. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting certified copy of order granting extra allowance to the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the proceedings for the acquisition of the southerly half of the block between Bank and Bethune streets, North river. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions therefor.

2d. Transmitting approved form of agreement for the purchase of the property owned by the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, near the foot of Pike slip, East river, in accordance with the resolution adopted January 19, 1900. Commissioners authorized to execute same, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the agreement when executed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

3d. Approving form of bond given by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company for the maintenance of its asphalt pavement in front of Piers, new 54 and 55, North river.

4th. Advising that the injunction obtained by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company restraining the Department from proceeding with the construction of the bulkhead between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, North river, has been vacated.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to proceed with the construction of such wall. From the Department of Buildings—Claiming jurisdiction and supervision over the erection of structures on wharves and piers in The City of New York. Action of the Secretary in replying that, under the provisions of section 844 of the Charter, such jurisdiction is vested wholly in the Board of Docks, approved.

From the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—Requesting to be advised as to whether this Department has any unoccupied buildings that could be used by the Second Naval Battalion between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn. Action of the President in replying that there are no unoccupied buildings thereat, approved.

From the Department of Public Improvements—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Sixth District of the Borough of Brooklyn, requesting that dredging be done in the slip at the foot of Harrison street, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to again request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board as to the ownership of the property in question and to notify the Department of Public Improvements that no action in regard to dredging can be taken by the Board until such time as the opinion from the Corporation Counsel has been received.

From the Department of Street Cleaning:

1st. Requesting permission to land the material to be used in the construction of the dump in the vicinity of Seventy-fifth street, East river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to provide accommodations for the unloading and storage of said material at the timber basin foot of West Seventy-fifth street until such time as the same shall be required for use in the construction of the proposed dump.

2d. Requesting that dredging be done under the dumping-board at the foot of Gold street, Borough of Brooklyn. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat, and the Secretary directed to request the Department of Street Cleaning to remove the overhang of the dump in order to facilitate the work of doing such dredging.

From the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, lessee, and the United States Fidelity and Guarantee Company, surety—Accepting the terms of the resolutions adopted January 5, 1900, agreeing to lease to said company Pier, new 56, North river, with the land and land under water

thereat, and agreeing that their respective obligations under the provisions of the lease shall in no manner be affected or impaired by reason of the sub-letting of a portion of the pier to the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company.

From Jones & Govin, attorneys for the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique—Requesting a lease of the two bulkheads adjoining Pier, new 42, North river. Secretary directed to state that one of the bulkheads is now leased and that a new lease cannot be granted until after the expiration of the present lease.

From the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique—Requesting that this Department make necessary repairs to the water-pipe in front of Pier, new 42, North river, and agreeing to pay the cost thereof. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs and to report the cost of the work for collection from said company.

From the President—Recommending the cancellation of the leases of the land under water for platforms between Piers, old 45, and new 36, East river, and for widening and extending Pier, old 45, East river, the property being required for the improvement of the water front thereat; and also recommending that the lessees of Pier, new 36, East river, be notified that the Department intends to proceed with the construction of a bulkhead wall and to fill in from the old bulkhead line to such new bulkhead wall in the rear of said pier.

On motion, the recommendation of the President was approved and the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, In and by indenture made the 1st day of June, 1890, by and between the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, by the Board of Docks, parties of the first part, and Jabez A. Bostwick, party of the second part, the said parties of the first part have leased, demised and to farm-let to the said party of the second part for a term of ten years from the 1st day of June, 1890, all that certain land covered with water, situated on the East river, in the City and County of New York, known and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Pier, new 36, East river, distant northerly about 82 feet from the established bulkhead line; thence westerly 130 feet to the easterly side of Pier, old 45, as widened (in 1888) at a point northerly about 80 feet from the established bulkhead line; thence northerly 49 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet along the easterly side of Pier, old 45, East river, as widened (in 1888) to the face of the crib bulkhead between Piers, old 45 and new 36, East river; thence easterly along the face of said crib bulkhead about 128 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet to the westerly side of Pier, new 36, East river; thence southerly along the westerly side of Pier, new 36, East River, 50 $\frac{3}{4}$ feet, to the point or place of beginning.

Together with the right to enter upon the said land under water, or any part thereof, for the purposes of this lease, and to use and occupy the said premises as herein provided; and

Whereas, by an indenture made the 1st day of February, 1890, by and between the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, by the Board of Docks, parties of the first part, and Jabez A. Bostwick, of the City, County and State of New York, party of the second part, the said parties of the first part have leased, demised and farm-let to the said party of the second part, for a term of ten years from the 1st day of June, 1890, all that certain land covered with water, situated on the East river, in the City and County of New York, and known and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at the intersection of the easterly side line of Pier, old 45, East river, with the face of the crib bulkhead, and from thence along the easterly side of said pier southerly about 385 feet to a point 22 feet inshore from the outer end of same; thence northerly 384 16-100 feet to the face of the crib bulkhead between Piers, old 45 and new 36, East river, at a point about 10 feet easterly from the easterly side of Pier, old 45, East river; thence westerly along the face of said crib bulkhead about ten feet to the point or place of beginning.

Together with the right to enter upon the said land under water, or any part thereof, for the purposes of this lease, and to use and occupy the said premises as herein provided; and

Whereas, In and by said leases, the said party of the second part covenants and agrees that if at any time during the term hereby created, or any renewals thereof as herein provided, the said Board of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within a section or district of the water front which shall include the said land under water, or any part of it hereinbefore described, according to any plan or plans now adopted or approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any future or existing law, and if the said Board shall determine that, for the purpose of such building and rebuilding it will be necessary to terminate the interest hereby granted to the said party of the second part in the said land under water, or any part thereof, or if at any time during the term hereby created, the said Board of Docks shall determine that the said land under water, or any part thereof, shall be required or used for the purpose of improving the water front in accordance with the "new plan" as herein provided, then and in either case this lease, and any renewal or renewals thereof or right to any renewals, shall immediately cease, terminate and be of no effect whatever, provided the Department shall serve a notice in writing upon the lessee, or his legal representatives, of the adoption of a resolution or resolutions to that effect and of its intention so to do, describing the property or the part thereof affected thereby, and thereupon the interest of the said party of the second part in said land under water, or any part thereof, hereby granted, shall thereupon terminate, and the rent hereby reserved shall cease from the date of receipt of such notice, and no claims for damages or compensation in favor of said party of the second part by reason of the termination of such interest in said land under water, or for damages or injury to any steamer, sailing vessel, or water craft moored thereto, or on, in or about the same, or on account of any structures or improvements that may have been erected or made by the said party of the second part, or any other person or corporation, upon the said land under water hereby demised, shall at any time be made by the said party of the second part, or by any person or persons whomsoever, or allowed.

Resolved, That the Board of Docks hereby determines to proceed with the work of building wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within the section or district of the water front of The City of New York, between Catharine and Montgomery streets, East river, which district includes the wharf property hereinbefore described, according to the plan adopted by the Board of Docks on the 30th day of December, 1898, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 3d day of February, 1899.

Resolved, That the said Board of Docks hereby determines that, for the purpose of such building and rebuilding, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the said Jabez A. Bostwick, the party of the second part, in said leases mentioned, in the land under water, or any part thereof; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Docks hereby terminates the interest of Jabez A. Bostwick, the said party of the second part, in said leases mentioned, said termination to take effect March 1, 1900; and be it further

Resolved, That a notice of this resolution terminating the interest of Jabez A. Bostwick, the said party of the second part in said leases mentioned, be served upon Jabez A. Bostwick, and that also a copy of this resolution be served upon him in addition thereto.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, In and by an indenture made the 15th day of December, 1899, by and between The City of New York, by the Board of Docks, parties of the first part, and the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company, party of the second part, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due, for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of all that certain public wharf property situated in the City and County of New York, and known and described as "Pier, new 36, at the foot of Jefferson street, East river, together with the shed." Together with the right to enter upon the said wharf property for the purposes of this lease, and to collect the said wharfage, was leased for a term of ten years from December 31, 1898; and

Whereas, In and by said lease, it is among other things provided that "The said party of the first part reserves the right, if it shall deem it advisable so to do, to build said new bulkhead wall and filling out from old to new bulkhead line."

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base blocks and to build the new bulkhead wall, and to fill out from the old to the new bulkhead line, between the easterly side of Rutgers slip to the westerly side of Montgomery street, a distance of about twelve hundred and thirty-five feet, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 821 of the Greater New York Charter, and that it be done by the force of this department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all material, tools and dredging, necessary for the above-mentioned work, not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer, otherwise than by contract.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to take possession and to proceed with the work of building the said new bulkhead wall and filling out from the old to the new bulkhead line, in accordance with the resolution heretofore unanimously adopted by this Board.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Reporting his inability to collect the claim of \$51 against the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line for repairing the damage to Pier, new 26, North river, and recommending that the same be sent to the Corporation Counsel for collection. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted Hunt & Donaldson to use and occupy berth at Pier, old 42, North river, during the pleasure of the Board, compensation therefor to be charged at the rate of \$100 per month, payable monthly at the end of each month to the Treasurer, commencing from the time said line begins to use the berth. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged George Morton for berthing the steamers "Fanny Woodall" and "Peekskill" at the north side of Pier, old 42, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day for each boat, payable weekly to the Dock Master of the district. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that permission be granted T. G. & W. R. Patten to land their steamers at the Battery Wharf during the season of 1900, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$1,200 for the season; \$600 to be paid to the Treasurer July 1, 1900, and the remaining \$600 to be paid in like manner on August 1, 1900. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged H. L. Herbert & Co. for a lease of the outer 580 feet of the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street, together with 120 feet of bulkhead southerly therefrom, be fixed at the rate of \$875 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, such compensation to also include the privilege of laying tracks across the pier and bulkhead as more particularly set forth in the resolution adopted February 16, 1900. Recommendation adopted.

TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

MINUTES.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met at 2 P. M., March 15, 1900, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

HEARINGS.

Alexander Avenue Regulating and Grading, from One Hundred and Thirty-second Street to Bulkhead-line of Harlem River.

The petitions of Charles C. Boyce and the Twenty-third Ward Property Owners' Association laid over from the last meeting were called up, and, on motion of Alderman McGrath, seconded by Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Alexander avenue, from East One Hundred and Thirty-second street to the bulkhead-line of the Harlem river, be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid and approaches built where necessary, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Amendment to Final Maps and Profiles by taking therefrom Alexander Avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-second Street to the Bulkhead-line of the Harlem River.

The Secretary read the following communications:

March 13, 1900. }

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFEN, President, Borough of The Bronx:

DEAR SIR—We are forwarding to-day to the Local Board for the Borough of The Bronx a petition of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and the Harlem River and Portchester Railroad Company to initiate a change in the city map, so as to close that portion of Alexander avenue from the southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street to the Harlem river. The petition is similar to that addressed by the railroad companies to the Board of Public Improvements on the 30th of January, 1900.

We desire to correct what seems to be the impression, that in presenting a petition to the Board of Public Improvements the railroad companies intended any disrespect to the Local Board. The companies were advised that their petition should properly be addressed to the Board of Public Improvements, under section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, which provides, in part, as follows:

"The Board of Public Improvements is authorized and empowered whenever and as often as it may deem it for the public interest so to do, to initiate a change in the map or plan of The City of New York, so as to lay out new streets, parks, bridges, tunnels and approaches to bridges and tunnels and parks, and to widen, straighten, extend, alter and close existing streets and to change the grade of existing streets shown upon such map or plan."

The communication which was read at your meeting last Thursday to the effect that the companies be advised to address to the Local Board, was the first intimation to the companies or their counsel that the correctness or propriety of their practice was questioned, and no communication whatever to that effect has been received by the companies or their counsel.

We have called the attention of the Board of Public Improvements to the provisions of section 436, which seem to constitute that Board as the one which should pass upon the companies' application, and have inquired whether that Board will hold that it has no jurisdiction in the premises under that section.

Petition.

To the Local Board of the Borough of The Bronx:

Your petitioners respectfully represent that the land now occupied by Alexander avenue, between the southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street and the Harlem river, formerly belonged to your petitioner, the Harlem River and Portchester Railroad Company, and was leased by said company to your petitioner, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company; that the right, title and interest of the said companies in said land was acquired in the year 1892 by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in trust to be used for street purposes; that your petitioner, the Harlem River and Portchester Railroad Company, also owns, and your petitioner, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company leases, all of the land on both sides of said street, between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and the Harlem river; that said street has never been regulated or physically opened or used as a street, but has, ever since the title thereto was acquired by the City, been exclusively occupied by the tracks of your petitioners used for railroad freight yard purposes; that your petitioners believe that the portion of the said street above-described is useless for street purposes and that it is in the public interest that it should be closed.

Your petitioners therefore respectfully pray that your Honorable Body initiate a change in the map or plan of The City of New York, so as to close that portion of the street known as Alexander avenue, lying between the southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street and the Harlem river, and to take such steps and proceedings before any other department or officer of the municipal government, or before any court, that said change may become effectual to close said street.
