The Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

SIRS—Concerning a resolution adopted March 29, 1910, regarding gas mains in Gleason avenue, from Olmstead avenue to Pugsly avenue, I am directed by the Commission to say that this matter is governed by an act of the Legislature, which requires gas companies to install pipes whenever a prospective consumer comes within 100 feet of an existing main. Consequently, if there are any prospective consumers upon Gleason avenue who would be successively within 100 feet of the present main, as extended from time to time, the gas company is under obligation to construct this main. If the company refuses to do so, the Commission will proceed to see that the law is obeyed. If consumers are not within 100 feet of the main, the Commission cannot compel the company, under the Public Service Commissions law as it now stands, to lay additional pipes.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to inform you that at a meeting of the Board of Managers of this society, held March 28, 1910, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Managers of the Sons of the Revolution in the State of New York, having considered the resolution No. 167, introduced by Mr. Courtlandt Nicoll in the Board of Aldermen, approves of the general purpose of Mr. Nicoll's resolution to restrict the use of explosives on the Fourth of July, but believes that in the present state of public opinion such a drastic ordinance as he suggests would not meet with that hearty approval which is necessary in the carrying out of the object intended by the passing of the resolution.

We notice with approval the action of the Sons of the Revolution at Albany, where through their efforts the city has adopted an ordinance forbidding the use of the heavier and more dangerous forms of explosives, after a discussion in the place and in the hearings before the Common Council, and we believe a similar ordinance would be wise in The City of New York.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I am informed that for the past two or three summers this department was unable to secure dockage for the locating and maintaining of a free floating bath, other than one on the Harlem River, on which river, at One Hundred and Fifty-second and One Hundred and Fifty-third streets, the last bath was maintained, during the summer of 1906.

For two or three seasons prior to 1906, private docks were leased at Port Morris, an excellent location for the purpose, and free from all sewerage contamination, such as existed in the Harlem River location.

Through the kindly aid of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, who has offered to loan this department a floating bath (there being none in this department's possession), it is possible to again maintain a bath in the Port Morris section, at a dock owned by the City, at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, and it is the desire of this department to have said bath in readiness for use not later than the 1st of July, and for the purpose of maintaining the same request is hereby made that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$2,000, based upon the following estimate of cost of maintenance for three months, namely, July, August and September:

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sirs—I am about to proceed with work incidental to the repaving and general restoration of Delancey street, between Centre street and the East River.

Since the widening of Delancey street, approximately five years ago, the street surface has been in a state of almost constant disorder. The original plan, calling for proper treatment of the parkway between the Bowery and the entrance to the Williamsburg Bridge, has never been effected. During the past eighteen months the immediate obstruction has been the work in process upon the subway loop, throughout the entire length of Delancey street, east of Centre. The completion of this work, promised within the next two or three weeks, will permit the Bureau of Highways to proceed with the final repaving of the section east of the Bowery, contracts for which have been let. The resoling of the parkways and the setting out of trees and plants that are to go into it should proceed at the same time. If this work is not attended to during the spring the present condition of the centre of the street must continue for another year. No appropriation has, however, been made for this part of the work. The estimates I have secured from the Park Commissioner, based upon the reports of the landscape architect of the Park Department, show that, in all, \$35,000 will be needed, \$21,000 for the erection of necessary fences about the parkway squares, and the balance for the resoling, purchase of trees and plants, and all necessary incidentals.

I would ask, therefore, that provision be made by the Board for the issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$15,000 to cover the immediate part of this work. As it can be done only at the present time, and ought to be under way by May 1, I would suggest that this comes very properly under the head of those emergencies for

which the Board may find it necessary to make provision before passing upon the general Corporate Stock Budget.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—A communication presented to your Board from the President of the Park Board on February 18, 1910, requesting the establishment of the grade of position of Secretary to the Park Board at \$4,000 per annum, was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration. We would report as follows:

It appears that provision was made in the Budget for the year 1910 for a Secretary to the Park Board at \$4,800 per annum. This position was vacated, however, by the former incumbent, who resigned with Commissioner Smith on January 2, 1910, on which date, at the request of the Mayor, Clinton H. Smith, who for years has acted as Assistant Secretary to the Board, assumed the duties of Secretary until such time as the appointment by the Mayor of a Commissioner of Parks for Manhattan and Richmond would complete the Park Board and make it possible to secure a vote of that body upon the appointment of a Secretary, as required by the Charter.

Action upon the matter was taken by the Park Board at its meeting held on January 27, 1910, the present incumbent, Clinton H. Smith, being appointed Secretary to the Board at a compensation of \$4,000 per annum. Owing to the fact that the grade of position of Secretary to the Park Board at \$4,000 had not been established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and Board of Aldermen under section 56 of the Charter, the Park Board, at its meeting held on February 3, 1910, rescinded the resolution appointing a Secretary at \$4,000 per annum, and substituted in lieu thereof a resolution appointing Clinton H. Smith Secretary to the said Board at \$4,800 per annum, as the grade existed for the position. The Board further authorized the President of the Board to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the establishment of an intermediate grade of the position of Secretary, at \$4,000 per annum.

This action was taken so that it would be possible to pay the compensation of the Secretary from the allowance made in the Budget for that position until such time as the lower grade of \$4,000 could be established, which will be a saving to the City of \$800 per annum.

We are further informed by the President of the Park Board that there is no intention on the part of that Board to request the re-establishment of the position of Assistant Secretary, which was abolished by the former Board on December 30, 1909.

In view of these facts we recommend favorable consideration of the resolution hereunto attached.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the matter of two requests, under date of March 1, 1910, from the Commissioner of the Department of Bridges for the establishment in such Department of certain additional positions and grades of positions, we present our report herewith, as follows:

The first request is for the establishment of the grade of position of Inspector of Electric Lighting and Conduits at \$1,500 per annum, for two incumbents.

We are advised that the desired position is intended for two Inspectors of Electric Lighting and Conduits attached to the Williamsburg Bridge, and now receiving \$4 per diem each. The Commissioner states that it is necessary to employ these men 365 days a year, and that they receive additional compensation for overtime. From statements made by the Engineer in charge of such bridge it appears that in addition to their services as Inspectors, these two employees are practical electricians, and personally make all repairs that may be needed to the lamps on the bridge. As the "Linemen" and "Wiremen" employed in several of the City Departments are paid at the rate of \$4.50 per diem or a total of \$1,642.50 for 365 days' work, the requested rate of \$1,500 per annum would not appear to be excessive.

In the opinion of your Committee, however, it is not desirable to increase the number of positions or grades of positions at annual salaries in the City service, unless good reasons can be advanced why such position or grade should not be fixed on a per diem basis of compensation. In the case under examination the character of the service performed would not appear to differ greatly from that performed by mechanics paid at per diem wages; and it is well known that when employees, whose services are required every day of the year, are placed on an annual salary basis, it is sometimes difficult to obtain the same amount of work as was rendered by them before the change in the manner of their compensation was made.

We are advised, however, that the Commissioner has stated that, as an alternative to placing these two employees on a salary basis, a position at the per diem rate of \$4.50 may be established in order that they may receive a compensation equal to that received by Linemen or Wiremen in the Department of Bridges. Such a course would appear to be proper and the establishment of the position of Inspector (Electric Lighting and Conduits), at \$4.50 per diem, is herewith recommended.

The second request relates to per diem positions or grades, and is, the Commissioner states, desired in order to make legal the rates of pay received by present incumbents, which were fixed in accordance with the Budget heretofore adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Axeman—The incumbent in this position is, we are advised, acting as Assistant to the Engineer in Charge of Cement Tests, and is regarded as a very valuable employee by the Department, well worth the compensation he is now receiving, namely, \$4.50 per day. While his Civil Service title would not appear to conform strictly to the duties he is now performing, it is to be noted that Axemen are attached to nearly all Engineering Divisions of City Departments, and these employees perform such services as may be required by the Engineers to whom they are assigned. Establishment of the requested grade would therefore appear to be proper.

Painter (Decorator)—Decorator—We are advised that the only work performed in the Department of Bridges requiring the services of a Decorator is the painting of signs, all other work called for being strictly Painter's work, for which the position of Painter at \$4 per diem is already established. As, however, the position of Decorator at \$4.50 per diem is now filled in the Department it would appear proper to establish this position. The title of Painter (Decorator) we are advised is not recognized by the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

The other positions or grades requested would appear to be required in the Department of Bridges and the compensation requested in no case exceeds the rates established for similar positions in other City Departments. As all of the positions may be broadly considered as belonging to the labor class there would appear to be no advantage to be gained by limiting the number of incumbents therein.

It will be noted that one of the requested positions is stated as "Helper" without further designation. This position we are advised is desired for a mechanic who has held such title for many years and has not qualified for the Civil Service title of Machinist's Helper, Mechanic's Helper or other special designation. Its inclusion in the list of established positions would therefore appear to be proper.

The grade of Inspector (Masonry) at \$4.93 per diem is not included in the recommendation for the reason that we are advised since making his request the Commissioner has stated that the creation of such a grade is unnecessary.

In view of the preceding statements, we recommend the adoption of the resolution hereunto attached.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the matter of a request under date of March 9, 1910, from the Commissioner of the Department of Bridges, for the establishment in such Department of the additional position of Deputy Chief Engineer with salary at the rate of \$7,500 per annum, which request was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, your Committee presents herewith its report as follows:

In the communication under consideration the Commissioner states:

There exists in the Department at the present time a grade of Principal Assistant Engineer, which is not included in the revised classification of the Civil Service. There is but one incumbent of the position and he is performing the duties and functions of the Deputy Chief Engineer. I therefore deem it proper and necessary that the grade of Deputy Chief Engineer be established. No addition to the engineering staff of the Department is contemplated in the proposed establishment of the grade.

From an inspection of the latest printed "Rules and Classifications" of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, it appears that the only positions therein recognized for the Competitive Class in the Civil Engineer Service, with the exception of the minor positions of Axeman, Rodman, etc., are:

Grade 4—Assistant Engineer, Assistant Topographical Engineer, Assistant Surveyor.
Grade 5—Engineer, Surveyor.
Grade 6—Deputy Chief Engineer, Chief Engineer.

While the position of Principal Assistant Engineer now exists in the Department of Bridges, as stated by the Commissioner, it would appear to be both proper and desirable to replace such obsolete title with the title of Deputy Chief Engineer, not only that the title of the incumbent in such position may more closely conform to the duties he is called upon to perform, but also that he may be clothed with the necessary authority to exercise the functions of Acting Chief Engineer during the enforced absence of his superior officer, in the same manner as the Deputy Commissioner exercises the functions of an Acting Commissioner during the Commissioner's absence.

In regard to the proper compensation of the position of Deputy Chief Engineer, it appears that while at present the position of Principal Assistant Engineer is paid at the rate of but \$4,500 per annum, the incumbent in such position was previously paid \$6,000 per annum, having been increased from \$4,500 to \$6,000 on December 1, 1903, and also that during the period from January 1, 1902, to April 30, 1902, the salary of the Principal Assistant Engineer was \$7,500 per annum.

In the schedules of salaries and wages adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 30, 1902, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 436 of the Laws of 1902, the salary of the Principal Assistant Engineer was fixed at \$4,500, but the grade of Assistant Engineer at \$6,000 was also therein fixed. From statements of the Commissioner's representative it appears that the fixing of the salaries of such two positions was due to a clerical error in preparing the schedules, it being the desire of the Commissioner to make the compensation of the Principal Assistant Engineer, who had formerly received \$7,500 per annum, \$6,000, and to make the compensation of the Assistant Engineer in question \$4,500. This statement would appear to be supported by the fact that an Assistant Engineer, subsequently appointed to the position of Principal Assistant Engineer at \$4,500, was on December 1, 1903, promoted to \$6,000, while holding the same title, as previously noted.

The Chief Engineer of the Department of Bridges now receives \$10,000 per annum and the two Consulting Engineers \$7,500 per annum each. The title of Engineer (without further qualification), it appears, does not exist in the Department; but Assistant Engineers, in charge of construction work, receive \$6,000 per annum, and Assistant Engineers in charge of certain East River bridges or of divisions of the Department receive \$5,000 per annum. Apart from the fact that the Deputy Chief Engineer will have under his jurisdiction the four East River bridges, which rank among the largest bridge structures in the world, and some forty or more bridges of less importance, as he will, from his title, be the superior officer of the Assistant Engineers previously referred to, his compensation, it would appear, should be somewhat in excess of those below him in rank. While the establishment of the requested position will increase the annual salary cost of the Department of Bridges by \$3,000, it is to be noted that the Commissioner has materially reduced the engineering force of the Department, and has stated, we are advised, that the vacancy in the position of Consulting Engineer at \$7,500 per annum, occasioned by the promotion of the former incumbent to the position of Chief Engineer, will not be filled.

Your Committee believe that in consideration of the importance of the functions to be exercised by the Deputy Chief Engineer and the manifest responsibilities attached to such position, the proposed compensation, namely, \$7,500 per annum, is in no way excessive. It is also to be noted that your honorable Board has recently approved the establishment in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the position of Deputy Chief Engineer at \$7,500 per annum. In relation also to the request of the Commissioner of Bridges for the establishment of the grade of Clerk at \$1,650, your Committee recommend favorable action, as the establishment of that grade will permit a saving in salary cost in the Department. A resolution for adoption is attached hereto.

Gentlemen—On February 26, 1910, the President of the Borough of Queens addressed a communication to your Board requesting the approval of the establishment of the position of Typewriting Copyist at the rate of \$1,050; \$900; \$750 and \$600 per annum. Having been referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, we submit the following report:

The President in his communication states that for some time past there has been employed in his Department Typewriting Copyists at salaries of \$600, \$750, \$900 and \$1,050 per annum, who were paid regularly until the past month, when the Department of Finance in the audit of payrolls refused to pass the salaries of the Typewriting Copyists, stating as a reason that the grades and positions do not appear to have been established by ordinance.

On December 23, 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved a request of the Borough President for the establishment of the position of Typewriting Copyist at \$900 per annum and on January 10, 1905, the resolution was approved by the Board of Aldermen. Therefore, consideration of the grade at \$900 is not necessary at this time. There does not appear to have been any other grades and positions established for Typewriting Copyist.

It would seem advisable that lower grades for Typewriter Copyists should exist than the \$900 grade, so as to provide for the entrance of new appointees to this position at the bottom. For this reason, and further to provide for those now holding the present positions, we would recommend the establishment of grades at \$1,050, \$750 and \$600, and we transmit resolution for consideration.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the matter of a request, under date of March 15, 1910, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the establishment in the Department under his jurisdiction of the additional position of Auditor, with salary at \$3,500 per annum, your Committee presents its report herewith as follows:

On March 19, 1909, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution recommending to the Board of Aldermen the establishment in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the position of Auditor at \$3,500 per annum, for one incumbent. As stated by the Commissioner, this resolution failed to receive favorable action in the Board of Aldermen, hence the desired position is as yet unestablished.

Such position was, however, provided for the office of the Water Register, Borough of Manhattan, in framing the 1910 Budget, and now appears in the revised schedule supporting the appropriation made for the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, entitled General Administration, No. 369, Salaries and Wages, Commissioner's and Central Office. The Commissioner states that in planning the reorganization of the Engineering and Auditing Bureaus he has made provision for such an employee, having determined that instead of a separate Auditor for each Borough, as originally planned, one Auditor can take charge of all the ledgers of control of the Water Revenue Collections in all the Boroughs, under the direction of the Chief Clerk and Auditor of the Department.

The request of the Commissioner's predecessor for such addition to the departmental force was endorsed by a joint committee representing the Department of Finance, the office of the Commissioners of Accounts, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Bureau of Municipal Research, in a communication under date of February 2, 1909, a copy of which communication the Commissioner has attached to his request; such committee suggesting the title "Auditor" and the compensation \$3,500. As previously stated, the establishment of such additional position has already been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Auditors of Accounts in the Department of Finance receive from \$3,000 to \$4,000 per annum each; hence the proposed compensation of such requested position would not appear to be excessive.

In view of the preceding statements, and of the fact that provision has already been made for the compensation of such additional employee during the present year, we recommend the adoption of the resolution herewith attached.

"A certified copy of this resolution was transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on February 8, 1910. Under date of March 15, 1910, the following communication was received:

"Hon. FRANK L. WILSEY, Chairman, Committee on Buildings, Board of Education:

"Dear Sir—I am in receipt of yours of the 8th inst., relative to the matter of the lease of the Southern boulevard property which you have recommended for school purposes.

"This Department still feels that it would not be proper to recommend a rental of the property at \$4,000 per annum, when, as a matter of fact, the property can be rented for \$2,500 per annum and the additional \$1,500 for three years, or \$4,000 in all, represents the expenses for installation and alterations, which would not be properly chargeable to a rent account.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on April 5, 1910 (Minutes, page 8), the annexed ordinance for \$780,000 corporate stock for acquiring property corner Irving place and Sixteenth street, Manhattan, for city offices, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, in its opinion, in considering this subject it is not inappropriate to revert to its history in this Board in the year 1909. On November 30 in that year the then Comptroller made a report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in which he estimated the value of this property at \$725,000, and stated that he could not deem the asking price reasonable and just. A short time subsequently (December 7, 1909), he made another report placing the value of the property at \$800,000, and submitted such report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with a recommendation that the property be purchased at \$850,000. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed upon an appropriation of \$855,000 for the purchase of this property and sent an ordinance for this amount to the Board of Aldermen for concurrence in December, 1909. This proposed ordinance was referred to the Committee on Finance but was not reported, dying with the last Board.

Since March 4, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has had this matter under consideration, and upon a report of the Comptroller has passed an ordinance for \$780,000, which was sent to this Board on April 5, 1910, on which date the measure was referred to this Committee. This Committee has heard from the heads of the Health and Tenement House Departments, and the Superintendent of Buildings, to accommodate which branches of the City government this building is proposed to be purchased, urging hasty action on the ground that the present leases of office space occupied by such departments expire on May 1, 1910, and time must be provided for them to move, say a week at the minimum. These three officers have also assured the Committee that this location is entirely practical for the business of their Departments, and the building well fitted for their needs.

The Committee has also been addressed by the counsel for the owners of the property, who has stated that in this proposed purchase, figuring upon valuations in this neighborhood, extending, however, to a somewhat wide scope westwardly, the City is acquiring a valuable piece of property at a bargain.

While this Committee feels that it is placed in a position where it is cramped for time to consider this matter owing to the necessity for a decision on account of arrangements by the Departments affected for accommodations after May 1, it has gone into the matter in a thorough manner. In the first place this building, without its lighting and plumbing fixtures is assessed on the books of the Tax Department under date of December 10, 1909, at but \$610,000. This in itself would cause a halt in the favorable consideration of this purchase. When it is considered that the City, if it should take the building, would entirely change any present plan of lighting and plumbing at its own expense, it will be seen that the additional valuation on this account could not amount to a very large sum. Further, this building is erected as a store and loft building, and not for office purposes, and would require an immense amount of revision not only greatly adding to the expense, but without doubt making it impossible for the Departments concerned to make a complete lodgment there for months to come. The Committee has been assured that these Departments can continue in their present quarters without additional rent until some more equitable arrangement may be made.

While it is the opinion of the Committee that the facts recited are sufficient to condemn this proposition, it calls attention to the new City building now under construction at Chambers and Centre streets, the principal reason for the erection of which is the housing of City Departments under one roof, in juxtaposition to the seat of the City government, the contract for which calls for its completion on July 1, 1912, and in which ample space has been set aside for the three Departments which seek accommodations in this building at Sixteenth street and Irving place.

The Committee recommends that this ordinance be rejected.

noisy and quiet patients alike. The covered passageway is required for the protection of the patients in stormy weather.

Dear Doctor—In response to your request communicated by your secretary, for a report on the overcrowded condition of the psychopathic wards, and the urgent necessity for immediate relief, I beg to state that the present building, as you know, was erected in 1898, with a capacity of fifty beds, which, no doubt, was adequate for that time.

However, since then there has been a tremendous increase in the number of admissions. In 1898, the yearly admissions were about 2,200, whereas in 1909, they were over 3,200, an increase of over 45 per cent., and, of a necessity, the accommodations are sorely overtaxed. We are frequently compelled to provide for patients by placing mattresses on the floor.

Overcrowding in any department of the hospital is most undesirable. But an overcrowded condition in the wards where the insane patients are treated is not only prejudicial to the welfare of the patients, but is, in addition, fraught with considerable danger. Experience shows that overcrowding of the insane patients increases their excitement and makes them more noisy, violent and unmanageable, and may lessen their chances of ultimate recovery.

Therefore, I respectfully urge that it is our duty to this unfortunate class of patients to provide adequate accommodation as soon as possible.

Another very important matter in this connection is the lack of provision for segregating the noisy from the quiet patients.

This matter was brought to the attention of your Board in 1902, shortly after the creation of the Department of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. It was carefully considered by your Board, and it was almost decided then to build an additional ward where the noisy might be separated from the quieter patients. However, the matter was postponed on the ground of economy, because a new Bellevue Hospital, with a properly equipped department for the care of the insane, was thought to be shortly built. This matter has been discussed almost every year since 1902, and unfortunately it has not been possible to construct the entire new hospital so far, and there seems to be no prospect of constructing the portion where the insane patients would be treated for some years to come.

The necessity for segregating the noisy from the quiet patients is so evident that I need scarcely dwell on its importance. In State hospitals, where all the patients are insane, the segregation of the noisy from the quiet patients is considered of prime importance. One noisy and violent patient may disturb many others who might have remained quiet. In the psychopathic wards of Bellevue Hospital, however, where patients are brought merely for examination to determine whether they are sane or insane, and where nearly one-fifth of the patients are found to be sane and are discharged as such, the lack of provision for the proper separation of the quiet from the noisy and violent patients, to say the least, is most unfortunate.

We frequently hear complaints on this score on the part of patients themselves as well as from friends and relatives which are only too just.

I need not discuss the subject from a medical standpoint to show that often irreparable injury may result and recovery may be materially retarded, as these patients come to the psychopathic wards at the most critical stage of their disease.

In behalf of the patients who come to the psychopathic wards, I urgently and respectfully plead that every effort be made to provide relief without delay.

Dear Sir—We beg to make the following explanation as to the cost of the temporary enclosed passageway leading from the Administration Building to Pavilions A and B, and the new temporary structure for the Psychopathic Wards.

We have obtained two estimates from reliable builders upon both structures, the lowest estimate being for the Psychopathic Wards, \$15,000, and for the covered passageway, \$3,000, respectively 24 cents and 9 cents per cubic foot, which seems a very low figure.

The cost of the passageway, which consists mainly of wood partitions covered with metal, we consider quite low, this passageway being 365 feet long, 7 feet wide, and an average of 13 feet high.

Adding to the estimates the percentage for architectural drawings, etc., we think that the total cost of the two structures will come very close to \$20,000. We therefore deem it advisable to request this amount.

Dear Sir—We beg to hand you herewith a short description of the proposed addition to the present pavilion for the insane of Bellevue Hospital.

The building is 38 feet 6 inches by 34 feet 10 inches, with a connecting corridor to the present pavilion 16 feet 6 inches by 8 feet 6 inches by 33 feet high, or a total of 49,071 cubic feet. There are two floors and a cellar. Each floor accommodates the following number of patients:

Each floor is provided with one single bathroom and one general toilet and bath. Both baths to be continuous baths.

The material for the exterior is of ordinary hard brick, and the interior simple plastered walls and hard wood floors; in other words, the cheapest possible construction.

Radiators in the Psychopathic Ward are not to be allowed, and therefore a system of indirect heating had to be provided, which adds materially to the cost. The large amount of plumbing, consisting of four continuous bath tubs, two wash basins and two water closets, also forms a considerable item of the estimate. In addition to this, all the exterior windows (twenty-six in all) have to be provided with strong iron guards, and an iron outside staircase added to these makes a comparatively high item for ornamental iron work.

In view of the facts herein given, namely, large amount of plumbing, special system of heating, iron guards and iron outside staircase, the price of \$15,000, or 30 cents per cubic foot, for this building is certainly not extravagant.

Trusting these data give you sufficient information.

Gentlemen—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals respectfully request that special revenue bonds be issued in the amount of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000) for the following purposes:

The total amount represented annually in the above request would be \$26,040. Inasmuch as it will not be possible to fill all of these positions at one time, it is thought that an appropriation of \$13,000, to cover practically a period of six months, will be sufficient.

It has long been known that Bellevue Hospital did not have Nurses enough with which to properly cover the hospital wards. There has never been a time, as least for a number of years, when there were Nurses enough on the wards, and to aggravate this condition, since January 1, 1907, there has been an increase of 236 beds for patients in Bellevue Hospital.

The Board of Trustees has realized this deficiency, but have recently had the fact presented to them more forcibly by the combined protests of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School, and of the Medical Board, composed of the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons to the hospital.

The following report is quoted from the minutes of the Medical Board:

"The Medical Board respectfully calls the attention of the Board of Trustees to the very inadequate number of Nurses in the hospital for the general ward service, which is a constant source of hindrance in securing the best treatment of the patients. The Nurses work hard and faithfully, but three Nurses cannot possibly care for thirty-six very ill patients with acute diseases, which is not infrequently the situation in the wards.

"It is impossible to carry out many orders for such common and necessary therapeutic measures as cupping, irrigation, etc., owing to lack of time of the Nurses.

"The balconies with which the hospital is especially provided for outdoor treatment cannot adequately be used, because a corps of Nurses properly dressed for outdoor work cannot be provided.

"The small rooms for the noisy delirious, off the wards in the new medical pavilion, cannot safely be used for lack of Nurses to watch and care for these cases.

"Serious accidents and scandals are occurring in the wards for the sole reason that the overworked Nurses cannot be omnipresent. Such, for example, are to be cited falling out of bed and breaking a collar bone, running naked through the ward in delirium, etc., etc. The time of the greatest need of additional Nurses in the pneumonia and typhoid season is, unfortunately, the time of the greatest illness among the Nurses themselves, so that the census of the school does not truly represent its working capacity at this time, and this year, in addition to ordinary ailments, a number have been victims of scarlet fever, which implies at least six weeks' quarantine.

"The ratio of Nurses per patient in Bellevue Hospital cannot fairly be compared with that of other hospitals of the City, because the patients of Bellevue have so often suffered from poverty, neglect and alcoholism that they frequently present a group of ailments instead of a single disease, and therefore require more time for their nursing. Moreover, many are so exceptionally dirty that a large share of the Nurses' time must be expended in making them vermin-free.

"For the above reasons the Medical Board regard the nursing situation as constituting a grave emergency and urge that an effort at once be made to secure sixty additional Nurses, twenty new paid Ward Maids and ten Orderlies, to enable the proper care of the ward patients. The estimated cost is as follows:

"20 Nurses at \$600 a year, 40 Nurses at \$96 a year.....	\$15,840 00
"20 Ward Maids at \$240 a year	4,800 00
"10 Orderlies at \$300 a year	3,000 00

"In order to meet this emergency, which evidently is not understood by the City authorities, it is suggested that a joint effort be made by the Trustees, the Managers of the Training School and the Medical Board to obtain the necessary emergency

appropriation, and explain the need of it and the grave scandals liable to ensue without it to the City authorities.

"It is, moreover, important that this request should be in no wise construed as casting any criticism upon the present methods of work of the school, but merely as demonstrating that the service is increasing for beyond the means provided to cope with it. It is not always appreciated that the means of modern scientific diagnosis and treatment require much more time on the part of the nurse than was the case a decade ago. It takes much more time and care to prepare patients for blood cultures, inoculations, antiseptic dressings and for operations. This is the work of skilled Nurses, but the routine work of passing food trays, bed pans, making beds, etc., may properly be done by Ward Maids, thereby saving much time for the Nurses and greatly promoting the efficiency of the service."

Accompanying this letter is a copy of a letter received from the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training Schools.

Upon careful investigation it is found that the proportion of Nurses to patients in Bellevue Hospital is, during the daytime, 1 to 8; at night, 1 to 21, with a total proportion of 1 to 6, which is far too small. The proportion should be 1 to 3, or 1 to 4 at least, to insure proper care of the patients.

It is generally conceded by hospital authorities that in a general hospital with an acute service nurses in proportion of one nurse to every three patients is none too many. It would be hard to find a hospital with a more acute or more difficult service than that of Bellevue.

Attention is called to several New York hospitals. In St. Luke's the proportion is 1 to 4. In Mount Sinai it is better than 1 to 4. In the New York Hospital it is 1 to 3. In the Presbyterian Hospital it is 1 to 2½, or even better. If the sixty Nurses requested were obtained our proportion would then be about 1 to 4.4-10.

The request for Orderlies and Ward Maids is in lieu of more Nurses, as they may be used to supplement the work of Nurses. The situation is acute just now, for the reason that the census is still very high. We are feeling the effects of the shortened course of training and the nursing force has never been what was needed.

In making up the Budget for 1910 it was not deemed of any use to ask for the great increase really needed, for the reason that the appropriation asked for Nurses has been cut down each year, and was even reduced about \$2,000 this year, while the amount asked for was far below our actual needs. In our request we ask for pupils and graduates, for the reason that pupils alone cannot be obtained in sufficient number, and even the division given may necessarily be subject to later revision.

The extra Ward Maids for Harlem and Fordham are needed as assistants to the Nurses. By performing some of the manual work now done by Nurses they will make it possible for the Nurses to give more of their time to strictly nursing duties.

It is urged that this request receive your prompt approval.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I hereby respectfully request that your Honorable Board issue special revenue bonds to the amount of twenty-four thousand dollars (\$24,000), to provide for the payment of the salaries of eight (8) Deputy Assistant District Attorneys, at three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per annum each, in the office of the District Attorney of the County of New York.

The necessity for this increase in the professional staff of this office is due to the fact that I desire to create a new bureau in the office, to meet the conditions which have arisen in this city and county, in respect to the congestion in the courts, the delay in bringing defendants to trial, and the lack of proper protection of poor and illiterate defendants or complainants in the police courts, and also to check the criminal and reckless use of automobiles in this county.

I do not pretend that it is possible to eradicate these evils, but I do believe that they can be remedied to a very great extent by placing a Deputy Assistant District Attorney in each of the police courts in this county. In order that your Honorable Board may better understand the necessity for such a provision, I have endeavored to enumerate below some of the factors which go to create congestion and the consequent delay in the administration of justice in this county.

During the year 1908, the number of prisoners arraigned in all the City Magistrates Courts in this County was 175,371, and of these arraignments the Magistrates had summary jurisdiction over 114,869. As recited above, the great mass of people having recourse to these courts are extremely poor and entirely helpless, and many of them have no knowledge of our language, and could not afford to engage counsel to protect their rights. Owing to the immense volume of business conducted in these Police Courts daily, it is impossible for the Magistrates to devote sufficient time to wading through the evidence in these cases. This condition can be better appreciated when I call your attention to the fact that during the year 1908 there were arraigned in the Night Court alone over 68,000 prisoners.

I believe that a Deputy Assistant District Attorney, assigned to each of these Courts, could considerably aid the Magistrates by investigating each case before it was presented to the Court. Furthermore, it would be his duty to protect the defendant from oppression when it appears that the complainant is actuated by some ulterior motive; and also see that the complainant has an opportunity to assert his rights before the Magistrate. This would insure a thorough examination in many cases where such examinations would be found necessary. As a result of these examinations many cases would be disposed of in the Police Courts, instead of being held for trial in the Court of Special Sessions, or to await the action of the Grand Jury and if indicted await final action in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court or the Court of General Sessions, the calendars of which courts are always crowded with many cases which should have been disposed of in the Police Courts.

The records of this office show that the number of complaints received during the year 1908 from City Magistrates, where the defendants were held to await the action of the Grand Jury, amounted to 7,095. Of this number 1,589, or over 22 per cent., were dismissed by the Grand Jury; 715 were acquitted after trial by jury, and 1,419 were discharged by the Courts; or, in other words, 52½ per cent. of the total cases held by the City Magistrates were either thrown out by the Grand Jury or by the Courts.

The following extract from our records shows that during 1908, 12,099 cases were disposed of in the Court of Special Sessions, of which number 1,145 were acquitted and 751 dismissed, or about 15½ per cent. of said cases were thrown out by the Court of Special Sessions. These reports disclose that of the 19,195 persons arrested, 5,619 were either acquitted or discharged. Of these 5,619, but few of them could procure bail, and the great majority, being poor and without friends, were committed to jail probably for weeks or months, awaiting the disposition of their cases, many of which may have been of a most trivial character, and in consequence thereof losing their employment, inflicting great hardship upon the many families dependent upon them, in addition to ruining the reputations of such persons, for even though acquitted the stigma of imprisonment always remains.

I believe that with a Deputy Assistant District Attorney in each Magistrates' Court, a great number of cases now occupying the time of this office, the courts, jurors, witnesses, etc., at great expense to the County and the public, will be disposed of in the Police Courts, thereby relieving the congestion in the higher courts and insuring a prompt and speedy trial for defendants, especially those charged with heinous crimes, for nothing deters the commission of crime so effectually as prompt and adequate punishment.

In reference to the matter of checking the criminal and reckless use of automobiles in this County, it is my purpose to endeavor to accomplish this by referring to the proposed bureau the explicit duty of enforcing and developing the criminal law in matters affecting the safety of the public in the streets. It will pay particular attention to street traffic dangers, especially those caused by automobiles and street cars.

The peril arising from the reckless use of automobiles is of comparatively recent development in the life of this County, and as yet no agency has been devised or used which has proved adequate to check this growing evil. My idea is that the rigorous enforcement of the criminal law by the District Attorney will be a powerful deterrent to the commission of numerous acts of criminal carelessness by the users of automobiles. The automobile peril, as it exists to-day, is due to two causes: In the first place, the present laws are grossly inadequate, and secondly, they are inefficiently enforced. I believe that the proposed Bureau can be a strong factor in remedying both of these defects.

It has been stated that within a period of one year, about ninety-six persons have been killed by automobiles in New York City. A recent compilation sets forth that four deaths were caused by automobiles in this City in the month of November, and that out of seventy-eight street accidents of a serious nature in the same month, more than half were due to automobiles. It may almost be said to be common knowledge that speed violation is to-day a routine, matter-of-fact occurrence, a thing taken for granted.

The nature and extent of this evil is quite apparent to your Honorable Board, but could such conditions exist if even the present laws were enforced? Now the efficient enforcement of a criminal law involves the apprehension of as many violators as possible, the obtaining and presenting to the courts of strong and satisfactory evidence, and the imposition of heavy penalties.

I believe that a system of gathering and perfecting the evidence at the earliest moment possible can be devised and worked out to advantage through the agency of the new Bureau, vigilant and alert, and continuously and persistently at work on this problem.

The automobile peril now demands, I believe, special treatment, and the District Attorney through the proposed Bureau can make it thoroughly understood throughout the community that as its criminal law officer he is determined that the laws affecting the safety of the public in the City's thoroughfares shall be enforced to the limit.

I believe that this Bureau can be made a medium through which the public sentiment of this community, outraged and indignant at almost daily casualties due to speed violation, can express itself in no uncertain manner on this matter of the right of the public to come and go safely in its highways. The moral effect of the mere existence of such a Bureau would in my opinion be of great and lasting benefit to the community.

Therefore, in order to protect the interests of the people, it would be essential that the Deputy Assistant District Attorneys assigned to the proposed Bureau be men of experience, honesty, and possessing considerable professional skill, and in order to retain such counsel for the people it is but wise economy that their salaries be commensurate with the responsible character of their duties.

I believe that the work of this Bureau, along the lines above stated, would be sufficiently effective to justify its existence, and I therefore respectfully request that the appropriation be granted.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—Following out our conversation of the other day, relative to additional facts why the Coroner's office of the Borough of Richmond should have an automobile, I beg to submit the following:

There are sixty-eight square miles of territory that the Coroner must cover in the Borough of Richmond in the least possible time. A greater part of the territory is inaccessible by transit facilities, and after 1 o'clock at night all transit facilities are practically shut down and the only means of satisfactory transportation would be an automobile.

We have on Staten Island three large fireworks manufactories, the large Procter & Gamble Soap Works employing 400 men, Milliken Brothers' Iron Works employing 600 men, the Linoleumville Manufacturing Company employing 700 men, the S. S. White Dental Works employing about 600 men, the DeJonge Paper Mills, several shipbuilding companies, in all of which the work is more or less of a hazardous nature and serious accidents are frequently occurring. Many of these concerns are located in extreme parts of the island, and in case of accident the only prompt way for the Coroner to get to the scene is by aid of an automobile.

In the summer time Staten Island is a Mecca for thousands of summer excursionists who visit our numerous bathing beaches and there is constantly occurring fatalities at these resorts. In drowning cases it is not very pleasant for bodies to lay on the beach to be gazed at by thousands of people awaiting the arrival of the Coroner. It has frequently happened, however, that bodies have lain several hours owing to the inability of the Coroner to arrive on the scene because of lack of traveling conditions.

In addition to this, Staten Island, owing to its location, is a receiving basin for drowned bodies from New Jersey, North River, East River and the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, and during the course of a year the Coroner is called upon to care for quite a number of these unfortunates. Aside from these drowning cases, which usually come from distant shores, within the Borough proper the Coroner has some three hundred cases yearly to look after.

In view of the facts here presented I think you will agree with me that for the prompt and efficient conduct of the office of the Coroner in this Borough an automobile is a necessity, and believing that this administration is desirous of doing business in a business way I am certain that the Board of Aldermen will lend its assistance toward making the Coroner's office of the Borough of Richmond up to date and efficient by having the appropriation asked for made.

My Dear Sir—On January 11, 1910, in reporting to you on the work of this office, I used the following language:

"No contingent fund has ever been provided for this office. The outlay at times is very large and more than Mr. Hartmann or the Process Servers feel able to supply. I have for years supplied a contingent fund for the office, Mr. Hartmann settling with me when jury trials cease, only to have new advances made when jury trials open again. I would, therefore, recommend that a contingent fund be supplied for this office."

Since the 1st of October last I have advanced \$300 to meet the contingent expenses of this office, more particularly in the trial of cases. I have been deprived of the use of that sum for some months and will in all probability be deprived of it until about the middle of July next.

This is not the first time that I have made such advances. There may be other offices without a contingent fund, but I know of none situated as this is.

I would, therefore, respectfully recommend that a contingent fund of such sum as you may deem proper be provided for this office.

Sec. 2. Whenever any person shall be arrested by a member of the Police Department of The City of New York upon a charge of violating a corporation ordinance, the officer making such arrest shall not at that time take the said person so arrested into custody, but shall serve him with a summons similar to the one above, filling in the blank parts thereof, the name of the offender, the nature of the charge, the court in which he shall appear and the day and date thereof.

Upon being served with a summons as herein provided the offender shall be allowed to depart.

Sec. 3. In the event of a refusal on the part of a person arrested as above to give his name and address to the officer or upon his refusal to accept such summons the said officer shall forthwith take him into custody and arraign him for examination on such charge before the nearest Magistrate.

Sec. 4. In the event of an offender served with a summons under the conditions herein set forth failing to put in an appearance pursuant to the command contained in said summons, he shall be subject to immediate arrest.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 1. No person shall conduct on or in any street in The City of New York, the business of selling or offering for sale any ticket of admission or any other evidence of any license, contract or right of entry to any performance or exhibition in or about the premises of any duly licensed theatre, concert hall, place of public amusement, circus, common show, or any place of public amusement for which a license is not required by law. Nor shall any person solicit by words, signs, circulars or other means any person to purchase any such ticket upon any such street. Any person guilty of a violation of this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall, upon conviction before a City Magistrate, be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars, and in default of payment of any fine so imposed, shall be committed to the City Prison for a term not exceeding ten days, each day of such imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of one dollar of such fine.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

Whereas, The increased cost of living has fallen heavy upon the Laborers in the various City Departments, whose salary has not been increased in the last fifteen years, and

Whereas, It is a hardship for them to maintain their families at the rate of wages they receive from the City at the present time, and

Whereas, The amount which many of them received last year in many cases was less than \$400 for the entire year, owing to condition of the weather, and

Whereas, The City has no desire to pauperize its employees by paying starvation wages, and

Whereas, The employees of all the other Departments have received a substantial raise to combat the high cost of living; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen do hereby recommend that the Laborers receiving \$2 and less per day be increased to the rate of \$2.50 per diem, thereby doing justice to them and their families.

Which was referred to the Committee on Laws and Legislation.

No. 819.

By the same—

Whereas, The City of New York has in operation at the present time as a school-house an old stone and brick building, with three frame portable buildings adjoining, and all combined are known as Public School 15, situated on the north side of Westchester avenue and St. Lawrence avenue; and

Whereas, The City of New York is contemplating the erection of three more portable buildings, at a cost of about \$1,500 each; and

Whereas, The Principal of the said school is compelled to form classrooms in the cellar of this old, antiquated stone building, for the lack of room caused by the large number of pupils in attendance; and

Whereas, The above condition causes the taxpayers of this section to send their children to either the Van Nest, West Farms, Westchester or Unionport schools, which is a distance of a mile or a mile and a half from their respective homes, which entails an unnecessary expense of extra time and carfare and a hardship on the children; and

Whereas, The children of tender age are in the majority, and are compelled to go through a densely wooded district to the various above mentioned distant schools, thereby endangering their lives from attacks from unscrupulous persons and also the danger of crossing many car tracks; and

Whereas, The number of pupils now in attendance is 540 and the seating capacity is only 459, the result is that they have not seats or desks for the difference in the above statistics, and many of the children have been required to bring a chair from home to sit on; and

Whereas, The health of the children is endangered by being overcrowded, and also by being compelled to attend classrooms in the cellar of the old building and in the portable buildings, where in stormy weather the building leaks very badly; and

Whereas, The City of New York has purchased at considerable expense sixteen lots on Beach avenue for a school site; and

Whereas, The said site is lying waste and unused and the City's money lying idle for the past three years or more; and

Whereas, This existing condition is outrageous in a city like New York, and the taxpayers of this section affected are not getting proper representation in return for their taxes; be it

Resolved, That we, the Board of Aldermen of the Greater City of New York, hereby recommend the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate enough money to erect on the said vacant site a building of about sixteen classrooms that will relieve the situation, which is growing worse every day, and would also relieve the congestion in the other schools herein mentioned.

Which was adopted.

No. 820.

By the same—

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be requested to install a light on Parker avenue, between Westchester and Lyon avenues.

Which was adopted.

No. 821.

By the same—

Whereas, The Fire Department has ordered the disbandment of Volunteer Hose Companies 1 and 2, to take effect May 1, 1910; and

Whereas, The streets are not in a condition for any heavy apparatus to navigate through; and

Whereas, The above named companies have saved considerable property throughout this section; and

Whereas, The taxpayers of the Mapes estate, McGraw estate and Gleason estate desire and request to have Hose Company 2 retained, owing to the impassable condition of the streets, and also in view of the fact that the continuation of the said company is no expense on the City; therefore be it

Resolved, That we the Board of Aldermen of the Greater City of New York do hereby recommend the Fire Commissioner retain Fire Company 2.

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of improvements and other work done at the District Prisons for the three months ended March 31, 1910:

The installing of a new steam-heating system at Jefferson Market Prison has been practically completed, also a heat regulator and sterilizer.

The installing of a new Fairbank scale to weigh coal at Essex Market Prison has been added as one of the improvements most necessary.

Repairing of plumbing at Yorkville Prison and fastening new spring cots to wall with the proper devices as supplied by the Department has been done by prison help.

At Harlem Prison the installing of a complete electric lighting system has been finally finished, also a local telephone has been supplied for each tier.

At the West Side Prison the installing of new hot water line from engine room to bath room in male and female prison has been practically completed.

The female prisoners under sentence here transferred from the Workhouse as help are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and around the female prisons and offices and doing laundry work in all of the District Prisons.

The male prisoners under sentence here transferred from the Workhouse are employed in cleaning in and around the male prisons, repairing, painting, kalsomining and doing such other routine work as is necessary for the transaction of the business of the District Prisons.

Attached herewith please find a statement showing the disposition of prisoners for the three months ending March 31, 1910, the amount of fines received from prisoners committed by the City Magistrates and paid over to the City Chamberlain and to the Health Department's Pension Fund.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF BRANCH WORKHOUSE, RIKERS ISLAND,
FOR QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1910.

Outdoor Labor.

By prisoners employed at excavating and removing bank, 1,000 cubic yards of earth have been removed from this bank and used to back up sea wall in course of construction, in doing which three-sixteenths of an acre of ground was added to the island.

Men have also been employed in grading and spreading top soil where the excavating has been completed, one-half an acre being covered with this soil.

The road in rear of the dormitories has been covered with 10 inches of ashes, the same being rolled and tamped until at present it is in good condition.

Men have been constantly employed repairing and keeping the roads in good condition, removing snow, ice, etc.

Carpenters.

Built guardhouse at south end of dormitories, built shed for repairing launches, repaired steering post on launch "Mohican," 30 wheelbarrows, 16 chairs, put handles in 25 sledges, 30 picks, 10 axes, 30 hammers, sharpened 25 saws, 35 axes, 15 wedges, butcher knives, scissors, small tools, etc.

Repaired floor in Keepers' kitchen and dining room, put 50 feet of white pine siding on outside of mess hall building, repaired stoop in rear of mess hall; repairing as follows was done in the Keepers' quarters, repaired 3 doors, put 2 knobs and 1 lock on them, 3 sash cords in windows, put glass panels in doors of Keepers' rooms, put 4 shelves in large room for fire pails, put 4 sash cords in windows of dormitory No. 1, 5 in dormitory No. 2, 2 in dormitory No. 3.

Material Used—500 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ white pine, 150 feet of 3-inch yellow pine flooring, 200 feet of old lumber, 100 pounds of 8-penny nails, 30 pounds 6-penny nails, 15 pounds 10-penny nails, 15 pounds 6-penny nails (wire), 1 gross of assorted screws, 3 door knobs, 1 lock, 2 pounds glue.

Painters.

Dormitory No. 1—Painted ceiling, painted and trimmed side walls, partitions, window frames, sashes, bars, toilets and wash rooms, painted 8 radiators and 4 lamps in same dormitory.

Dormitory No. 2—Painted ceiling, painted and trimmed side walls, window frames, sashes, bars, partitions, toilets, wash rooms and shelves, painted 6 radiators and 4 lamps.

Dormitory No. 3—Painted wash rooms and toilets, painted 8 radiators and 4 lamps.

Dormitory No. 4—Painted 8 radiators and 4 lamps.

Painted prisoners' kitchen, painted Keepers' kitchen and dining room, painted new guardhouse, painted new shed for launches, painted iron doors and bars in dark cells, painted boiler in hospital building, painted launch Rikers Island No. 2 ("Sweep"), hull, deck and roof, and varnished inside of cabin, painted the ceilings and varnished the side walls of 12 rooms in the Keepers' quarters, painted ceiling and varnished side walls of hall in this building, whitewashed the cellar of Warden's house, whitewashed the stable (12 stalls and 2 store rooms), put glass in the following buildings: Dormitory No. 1, 18 lights; dormitory No. 2, 22 lights; dormitory No. 3, 3 lights; dormitory No. 4, 5 lights; Keepers' quarters, 8 lights; hospital building, 2 lights; prisoners' kitchen, 2 lights; Keeper's kitchen and dining room, 5 lights; mess hall, 4 lights.

Material Used—900 pounds white lead, 5 pounds ultramarine blue, 20 pounds drop black, 35 pounds emerald green, 10 pounds aluminum, 1 barrel turpentine, 20 gallons raw oil, 30 gallons boiled oil, 10 gallons Japan dryer, 15 gallons of spar varnish, 20 gallons black asphaltum, 2 gallons copper paint, 10 gallons banana oil, 25 gallons roof paint.

Blacksmiths.

Shod 2 horses, made 2 rivet sets, repaired 50 cot frames, 75 picks, 6 sledges, 2 crow bars, 5 pinch bars, 3 chains, 4 carts, 2 chains and hooks for launch Rikers Island No. 2.

Material Used—8 horseshoes, 60 feet 1-inch round iron, 15 feet $\frac{3}{8}$ round iron, 25 feet $\frac{1}{4}$ round iron, 1 barrel coal.

Note—During the quarter we only had a blacksmith for two weeks.

Tinsmith and Plumber.

Repaired boiler and put new waterback in hospital, repaired pipe and put new damper on furnace under Keepers' quarters, put 4 new grates in and repaired old ones in large furnace under prison buildings, repaired furnace in Warden's house, repaired roof of dark cell, repaired roof of Keepers' kitchen and dining room, repaired leaders on dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, repaired leaders on mess hall, made ice shoe for launches Rikers Island Nos. 1 and 2 ("Mohican" and "Sweep"), respectively, made 2 suction pumps for launches, repaired toilets of dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, repaired wash basins in Keepers' quarters, repaired 5 faucets in Keepers' and prisoners' kitchens, repaired tanks in dormitories Nos. 3 and 4, repaired 30 pots, 50 pans, 15 kettles, sharpened all knives and tools.

Material Used—2 boxes of tin, 60 sheets of bright tin, 25 pounds solder, 10 pounds resin, 5 pounds muriatic acid, 10 feet $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch galvanized iron pipe.

Shoemakers.

Repaired 250 pairs of shoes, using 3 sides of leather, 9 pounds nails, 6 pounds Swede nails, $\frac{1}{4}$ pound wax and 1 pound of hemp.

Dear Sir—I most respectfully submit a report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter commencing January 1, 1910, and ending March 31, 1910.

Five prison vans and eleven horses, with five drivers, were turned over to this institution by the Sheriff of Kings County on January 1, 1910. Four of the vans have been repaired, painted and lettered and the fifth is still undergoing repairs. Steel window bars were put on window of counsel room. Wire mesh screens were put on windows and skylights of male prison. A new driveway has been cut through old stable. The new female prison, stable and granite wall around prison are now in course of construction.

The female prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and around the female prison and administration building and working in the prison laundry.

The male prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning around the male prison, kitchen and stable and repairing and painting about the institution.

Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners at commencement of quarter, the number received, discharged and transferred, the amount of fines received from Special Sessions and ten City Magistrates' Courts, which have been paid over to the City Chamberlain, as section 1550 of the Greater New York Charter requires.



No water closet or privy vault shall be constructed without adequate provision for the effectual and proper ventilation and cleansing thereof.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
