The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the hiring of premises at 326 to 330 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as a show room for the Budget exhibit:

August 11, 1910.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen-Hon. George McAneny, President of the Borough of Manhattan, in a communication addressed to your Honorable Board, under date of August 3, 1910, requests the rental of the premises known as the Tefft, Weller Co. store at 326, 328 and 330 Broadway, on the east side of Broadway, between Pearl and Worth sts., Borough of Manhattan, for the month of October next, said premises to be used as a show room for the Budget exhibit.

The property in question fronts 75 feet on Broadway and extends back 175 feet, with an L 25 by 75 feet, extending to Worth st., the 75 feet being Worth st. frontage, and another L 24 feet 11 inches by 75 feet extending to Pearl st. The building is five stories and basement, and has been occupied by the wholesale dry goods firm of Tefft, Weller Co. for years, at a rental of \$60,000 a year for the building, as stated.

The building is now empty, and the firm has agreed to rent to the City the store, basement and first loft, having a total floor area of about 45,000 square feet, for the month of October, 1910, for a rental of \$3,000, to be paid October 1, the City to make such alterations and repairs as are necessary to fit the premises for the purposes of the exhibit, and to furnish light and janitor service, no heat being required; the lessor to furnish water and to allow the City to take possession of the premises by September 15, or earlier if necessary, in order to get them ready for the Budget exhibit, which is to open on October 1.

The present fair rental value of the premises to be occupied by the City, if taken under a regular lease by the year, would be \$24,000 a year for the store and basement, and \$10,000 for the first loft, making a total of \$34,000, the lessee to furnish heat, light, water and janitor service.

Under these circumstances, the offer of Tefft, Weller Co. to the City to use the premises during the month of October, for the purposes of the Budget exhibit, and to allow the City to take possession on September 15, or earlier, for the purpose of pre-paring for the exhibit, for a total rental of \$3,000, is, in my opinion, reasonable and

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay to the Tefft, Weller Co. the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) on the first day of October, 1910, in full of rental of premises consisting of the basement, store and first loft at 326, 328 and 330 Broadway, with extensions to Worth and Pearl sts., Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, for the purposes of the Budget exhibit, for the period from October 1 to October 31, 1910, with the privilege of possession from September 15, or earlier, for the purposes of preparing for such exhibit, without the necessity of entering into a lease therefor.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted by the following vote: Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the Deputy and Acting Chamberlain, and the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen—4

The Acting President of the Board of Aldermen was excused from voting.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of additional rooms in the Park Row Building, 13 to 21 Park row, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

August 16, 1910. To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen-In accordance with chapter 220 of the Laws of 1910, the office of Aqueduct Commission was abolished on June 1, 1910, and all papers, documents and records in possession of the Aqueduct Commissioners were delivered to the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, who, in accordance with this act, was vested by law with all the powers of said Aqueduct Commission.

The Aqueduct Commissioners were created by chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883. In section 41 of this act, they are authorized to provide suitable offices and conveniences for the transaction of the business of the Commission.

When the act above mentioned abolishing the Aqueduct Commission went into effect on June 1, 1910, the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity provided temporary quarters for the Consulting Engineer and his

assistants, and space for the storage of records in offices occupied by the Bureau of Lamps and Gas. This space is entirely too small for the purposes for which it is used, and the Commissioner requests that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of a lease for Rooms 2518 to 2522, inclusive, on the twenty-fifth floor of the Park Row Building, 13 to 21 Park row, Borough of Manhattan.

These rooms contain a combined area of 897 square feet, which, at the rental

of \$1,800 per annum, asked by the agents for the building, amounts to \$2 per square foot. While this is a higher rate than that paid by the City for other offices occupied in this building, it is a fair one, inasmuch as the offices are lighter and in every way better than those at present under lease.

The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity deems the rent to be ust and reasonable.

The Aqueduct Commissioners formerly occupied about 5,000 square feet of office

space at No. 280 Broadway at a rental of \$7,500 per annum. I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve the application of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a lease with the Park Row Realty Co. for Rooms 2518, 2519, 2520, 2521 and 2522, in the Park Row Building, 13 to 21 Park row, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of eight months from August 1, 1910, to April 1,

1911, at an annual rental of \$1,800, payable quarterly, to be paid from the fund known light, heat, elevator and janitor service. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from the Park Row Realty Co. of Rooms 2518, 2519, 2520, 2521 and 2522, in the Park Row Building, 13 to 21 Park row, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a period of eight months from August 1, 1910, to April 1, 1911, at a rental at the rate of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800) per annum, payable quarterly; said rental to be paid from the fund known as the Additional Water Stock of The City of New York, the lessor to furnish light, heat, elevator and janitor's service; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered On motion of the Deputy Chamberlain, John Korb, Jr., was elected Secretary pro the following resolution relative to the assignment of rooms in the Tefferson Market Building at 8th st. and 6th ave., Borough of Manhattan, to the Department of Correction, for use as a place of detention for women in connection with the night court: August 16, 1910.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: Gentlemen-Hon. Patrick A. Whitney, Commissioner of the Department of Correction, in a communication to the Finance Department, under date of July 23, 1910, states that under a law recently enacted by the Legislature, relating to the inferior courts of criminal jurisdiction in The City of New York, he is compelled, on or before October 1, 1910, to provide a place of detention convenient to the night court for women, where women may be detained both before and after being heard, and in such detention place the young and less hardened shall be segregated, so far as practicable, from the older and more hardened offenders. He suggests as proper rooms for this purpose:

First—That part of Jefferson Market Court Building now occupied by one of the

Parts of the Municipal Court. Second—That portion of Jefferson Market Building directly over the market proper, and at present occupied for business purposes and by the Exempt Firemen's Association.

Third—124 6th ave., a three-story building. The City is now leasing to Bryan G. Hughes & Bro., ten rooms on the second and third floors of the Jefferson Market Building, 6th ave. front, at a total rental of \$55 a month, on a month to month lease. These rooms have a total floor space of 2,442 square feet, and have all been sublet by Hughes & Bro.

As the rooms in the Jefferson Market Court Building occupied by the Municipal Court and the rooms occupied by the Exempt Firemen's Benevolent Association in the Jefferson Market Building fronting on Greenwich ave. cannot well be vacated, and as Commissioner Whitney is willing to take the ten rooms now under lease to Bryan G. Hughes & Bro., as sufficient for his purposes, I would respectfully recommend that proper notice be given without delay to Bryan G. Hughes & Bro. to vacate the said ten rooms on the second and third floors of the Jefferson Market Building on 6th ave., within thirty days from the date of such notice, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution, assigning said rooms to the Department of Correction, to be used as a place of detention for women in connection with the night court. The Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present, Commissioner of Health and Health Officer of the Port.

The Finance Committee presented various bills which had been audited by the Chief Clerk; which were approved and ordered forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

The Sanitary Superintendent submitted weekly reports of the work performed in the various divisions of the Sanitary Bureau; which were ordered on file.

Premises on the northeast corner of Morris Park ave. and Holland ave., Borough of The Bronx, were ordered vacated.

Orders for vacation against certain premises were rescinded, the cause for the same having been removed. Miscellaneous applications for permits

were granted. Miscellaneous applications for permits were denied.

Extensions of time in which to comply with provisions of orders issued against certain premises were granted. and certain applications for relief from orders were denied.

The weekly report of the Bureau of | Nurse, from August 1, 1910.

The Registrar of Records was directed to record corrected certificates of vital statistics relating to various persons.

Certain certificates of birth which failed of record owing to the failure of the physicians and midwives to comply with the provisions of the Sanitary Code, were ordered filed in the volume of delayed and imperfect certificates.

Leaves of absence on account of sickness were granted to several employees in each Borough.

The Sanitary Superintendent was directed to cause certificates of employment to be issued to various applicants who had complied with the requirements of the law relating to the employment of women and children in mercantile and other establishments.

Appointment-Sara A. Sheldon, Otisville Sanatorium, Otisville, N. Y., Nurse, salary, \$900 per annum, from June 25, 1910.

Transfer-The Municipal Civil Service Commission approved of the transfer of Julia Weber, a Typewriting Copyist, to the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan; salary, \$720.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment June 3, 1910, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to provide means for the preparation of plans for a reformatory on Harts Island under the jurisdiction of the Department of Correction, and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.



NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to fine head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties make ing the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or con sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-ment, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract

awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do. Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
