**STEAM BOILER INSPECTION AND ENGINEERS' BUREAU.**

Operations of the Steam Boiler Inspection and Engineers' Bureau for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1913.

The Steam Boiler Inspection Bureau is empowered by law to inspect and subject all steam boilers carrying over ten pounds of steam to the square inch, to a hydrostatic test once a year, and to examine and qualify engineers and firemen to operate them.

The force of the Bureau consists of eleven members of the uniformed force, three Deputy Clerks and one Stenographer, two civilian Boiler Inspectors and four civilian Drivers, under command of a Lieutenant.

Two members of the uniformed force who are practical engineers, are assigned to examine applicants for engineer's and firemen's certificates, and to hear and determine charges preferred against engineers and firemen for neglect of duty. There are nine Boiler Inspectors, seven are members of the uniformed force and two are civilians.

Engineers—Certificates renewed, 2,602; certificates transferred, 553; new applicants, 264; total number of examinations, 3,419; incompetent, certificates refused, 128; total number of certificates granted, 3,291; certificates of first class granted, 348; certificates of second class granted, 581; certificates of third class granted, 2,231; Fire Department (special), granted, 131; certificates revoked, 2; reinstated, 4.

Firemen—Certificates renewed, 274; certificates transferred, 10; new applicants, 32; total number of examinations and certificates granted, 316.

Steam Boilers—Boilers tested, 3,522; City Department boilers tested (exempt from fee), 200; boilers tested, at \$2 each, 3,322; cash transactions for quarter, \$6,530; cash collected on current quarter accounts, \$5,660; cash collected on previous quarter account, \$870; uncollected on quarter's account, \$870; total cash collected, \$6,530.

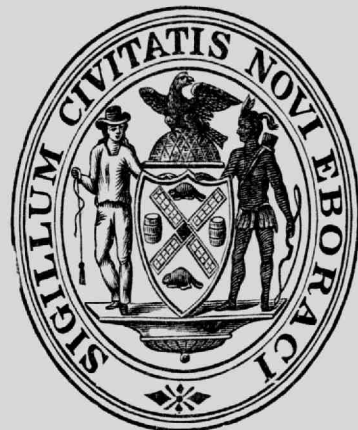

### DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

#### Amendment to Rules.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held July 30, 1913, the following rules and regulations for the sale of dipped milk and cream in stores in The City of New York were adopted, to take effect on and after August 26, 1913:

1. Milk and cream shall not be stored, handled or sold in any stable, or in any room used for cooking or domestic purposes, or in any room which communicates directly with any such stable or room, or in any room in which

there is a water-closet apartment or with which a water-closet apartment communicates, unless such apartment be enclosed by a vestibule, and both apartment and vestibule be properly ventilated to the external air.

2. The term "domestic purposes" shall be held to apply to rooms used for sleeping purposes or for cooking purposes other than the preparation of the midday meal.

3. Milk or cream shall not be handled or sold in any room which is unduly crowded.

4. Milk or cream shall not be dipped from cans stored in a room in which butter or cheese is manufactured.

5. Milk or cream may be stored in a cooling or refrigerating room, or ice chest, the construction of which has been approved by the Department.

6. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in a milk booth.

7. Milk shall be kept at a temperature of 50 degrees F., or below, at all times.

Equipment.

1. Rooms in which milk or cream is handled or sold shall be well lighted.

2. The floors, walls and ceilings shall be smooth, and must be kept clean and sanitary.

3. All windows and doors shall be properly screened.

4. An adequate supply of hot water shall be provided for the washing of utensils.

5. A sufficient number of properly constructed ice tubs, or other adequate refrigerating facilities, for cans of milk or cream shall be provided.

6. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be of the seamless sanitary type, heavily tinned.

Methods.

1. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in any room in which rubbish or dirty material is allowed to accumulate, or in which there are offensive odors.

2. All cans or other receptacles used for milk or cream shall be cleaned thoroughly upon emptying.

3. The cans from which milk or cream is dipped shall be backed in ice, and shall be kept covered at all times, except when the milk or cream is being actually dipped therefrom.

4. After each day's use all utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned with hot water and soda, and then with boiling water.

5. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be kept clean.

6. The ice tubs in which milk or cream is stored shall be painted inside and outside, and shall be kept clean at all times.

7. A separate dipper shall be provided for each can from which the supply is being served, and such dipper shall remain in the can between dippings until all the milk in the can has been disposed of.

8. All goods sold in milk stores must be either in unbroken packages, or must be so placed, protected and handled that no dust, or odors therefrom can injuriously affect the milk.

9. Dry sweeping and dusting in rooms in which milk or cream is dispensed is prohibited.

10. The tags on cans of milk or cream must be kept on file in the store for at least two months, for inspection by the Department of Health.

11. The attendants shall wear clean, washable clothing.

12. Only such persons shall be employed as are free from infectious disease which may be transmitted in the handling of milk.

Failure to comply with any of the above rules and regulations will be cause for prosecution.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held July 30, 1913, the following amendment to the rules and regulations of the Department of Health relating to the sale of milk, in so far as said amendment relates to Grade C, for cooking and manufacturing purposes only, was adopted, to take effect on and after August 26, 1913:

Definition.

Milk not conforming to the requirements of any of the subdivisions of Grade A or Grade B and which has been heated according to the rules and regulations of the Board of Health.

Requirements, Rules and Regulations.

Rules and regulations for the heating of Grade C milk:

No less than 160 degrees F. for at least 2 minutes; no less than 158 degrees F. for at least 3 minutes; no less than 155 degrees F. for at least 5 minutes; no less than 152 degrees F. for at least 10 minutes; no less than 148 degrees F. for at least 15 minutes; no less than 145 degrees F. for at least 18 minutes; no less than 140 degrees F. for at least 20 minutes.

1. The caps of all bottles containing milk of Grade C shall be white and shall contain in red the words "Grade C" in large type and "for cooking" in plainly visible type.

2. Cans containing milk of Grade C shall be painted red on necks or shall have properly sealed metal collar, painted red, on necks, and shall have affixed to them white tags with the words "Grade C, for cooking," printed thereon in red letters in large type.

All creameries handling milk of different grades will be required to demonstrate to the Department of Health that they are capable of keeping the grades separate, and must keep satisfactory records of the Department of Health concerning the amount of milk of each grade handled each day.

All milk brought into The City of New York to be pasteurized and sold for public consumption shall have a tag affixed to each and every can, indicating the grade of the milk, the place of shipment, date of shipment and the words "To be Pasteurized at —" (stating location of Pasteurizing plant).

### Proposals.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK, ACTING BY THE Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called "the Commission"), invites proposals to construct Section No. 1 of the Astoria, Woodside and Corona Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

In addition and as further security fifteen (15) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the contractor will be deducted until the amounts so deducted and retained shall equal ten (10) per centum of the sum of the amounts resulting from the product of the estimated approximate quantities and the unit prices as contained in the Schedule of Unit Prices in the Contractor's Proposal. Copies of which were filed in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens August 23, 1910, in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens August 23, 1910, and in the office of the Corporation Counsel August 18, 1910, as amended by a man showing a change in the street system heretofore laid out within the territory bounded by Irving avenue, Schaeffer street, Wyckoff avenue, Summerfield street, Cypress avenue and Coover street, in the Second Ward, Borough of Queens, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment September 19, 1912, and approved by the Mayor September 30, 1912, copies of which were filed in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens December 16, 1912, in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens December 10, 1912, in the office of the Corporation Counsel December 7, 1912.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 19th day of December, 1912, duly fixed and determined the area of assessment for benefit in this proceeding as follows: Beginning at a point on the southerly line of Halsey street midway between Irving avenue and Knickerbocker avenue, and running thence northwesterly along the southerly line of Halsey street to the intersection with the southerly right of way line of the Evergreen

Branch of the Long Island Railroad; thence southwesterly along the said right of way line to the intersection with a line midway between Eldert street and Covert street, thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Eldert street and Covert street and along the prolongation of the said line to a point distant 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Wyckoff avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Wyckoff avenue, thence southwesterly and parallel with Wyckoff avenue to a point midway between Summerfield street and Decatur street; thence northwesterly along a line midway between Summerfield street and Decatur street as these streets are laid out between Wyckoff avenue and Cypress avenue to the intersection with a line bisecting the angle formed by the intersection of the prolongations of the centre lines of Summerfield street and Decatur street as these streets are laid out between Cypress avenue and Forest avenue, thence northwesterly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Decatur street as this street adjoins Myrtle avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Decatur street, thence northwesterly along the said line parallel with Decatur street and along the prolongation of the said line to a point distant 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Myrtle avenue, thence easterly and parallel with Myrtle avenue to the intersection with the northwesterly right of way line of the Manhattan Beach Division of the Long Island Railroad, thence southwesterly along the said right of way line to a point distant 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Cooper street, the said distance being measured at right angles to the said line parallel with St. Felix avenue and along the prolongation of the said line to a point distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Cooper street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Cooper street, thence westwardly and always distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Cooper street to the intersection with the westerly right of way line of the Manhattan Beach Division of the Long Island Railroad, thence southwesterly along the said right of way line to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Knickerbocker avenue and Irving avenue, thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Knickerbocker avenue and Irving avenue and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with a line midway between Moffat street and Cooper street, thence southwesterly along the said line midway between Moffat street and Cooper street to the intersection with the line between the Borough of Brooklyn and the Borough of Queens, thence northwesterly along the said borough line to the intersection with a line midway between Irving avenue and Knickerbocker avenue, thence northwesterly along the said line between Irving avenue and Knickerbocker avenue to the point or place of beginning.

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, or rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, or being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to the purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
