It shall not be lawful for any vender, pedlar or other person to use any description of lamps, or other lights to exhibit their goods or wares in any avenue, street, lane, highway or public place, within the Corporate limits of the City of New York, unless such lamp or other light shall be securely enclosed in a glass globe, of sufficient size to prevent the flame from said lamp or other light from appearing above the top of such glass globe under a penalty of ten dollars for every violation of the provision of the ordinance.

Sec. 2. The Commissioner of Police are hereby directed to carry into effect the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in-consistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed. Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immedi-
