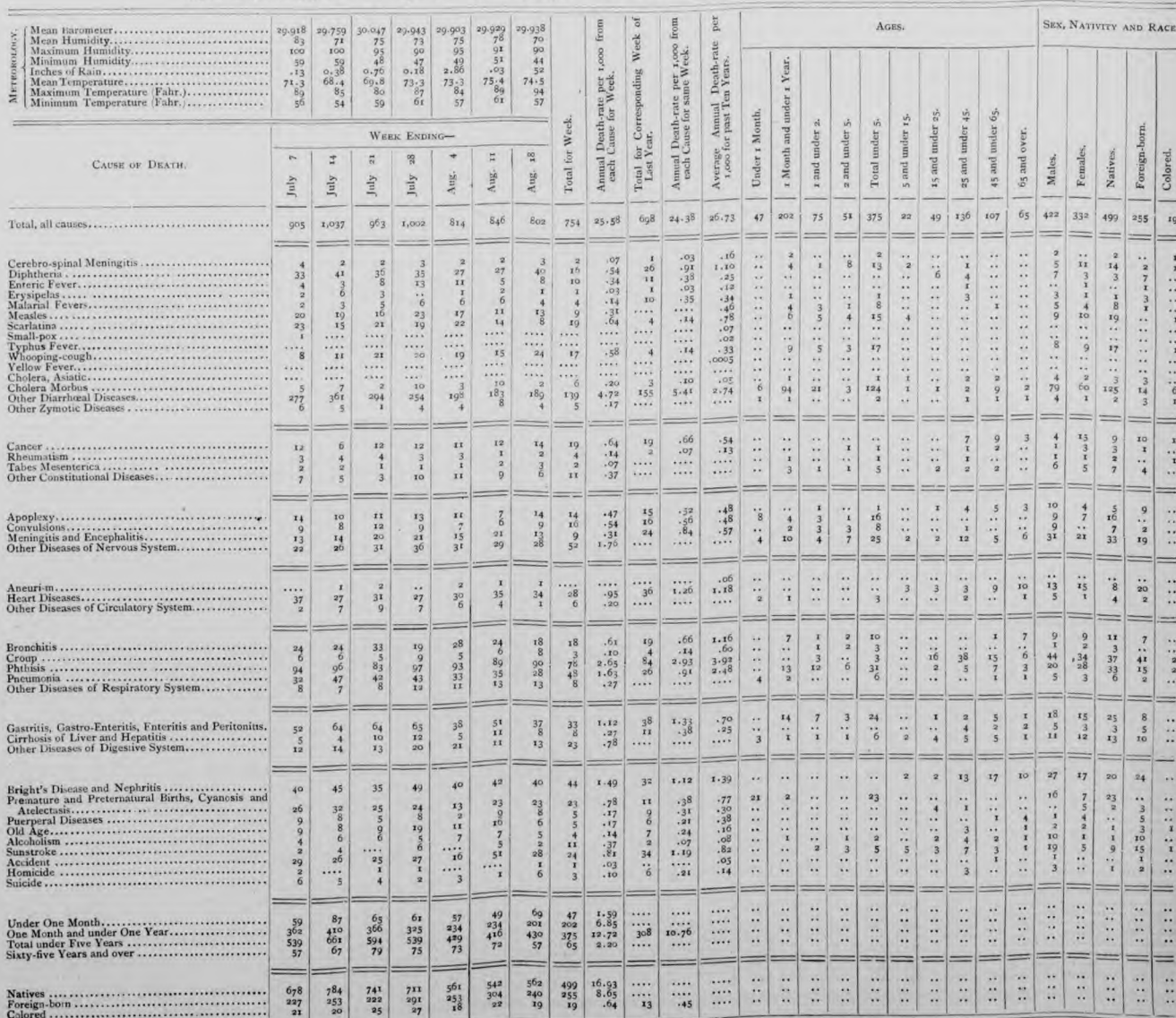

The 802 deaths represent a death-rate of 27.22, as against 28.73 for the previous week, and 26.49 for the corresponding week of 1887.

The decrease of 44 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 6 deaths from scarlatina, 8 from inflammation of the brain and its membranes, 6 from bronchitis, 7 from pneumonia, 15 from diseases of the digestive organs, 10 from old age and 23 from violence, while there was an increase of 13 deaths from diphtheria, 3 from enteric fever, 9 from whooping-cough, 10 from apoplexy and convulsions, and 5 from suicide.

The decrease of scarlatina was most marked in the Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards, and the increase of diphtheria in the Seventeenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards.
