

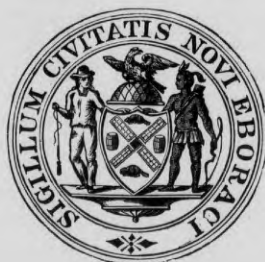

SIR—We have the honor to report that we have made an examination of the accounts of the Police Department for the year 1887, and find the same correct.

PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

The books of this office and the property for which the Clerk is responsible, were found in order. Each article received is first entered in the Record book (sec. 288, Consolidation Act of 1882) numbered, tagged and stored in its proper place. When called for and delivered on the proper order, a receipt is taken and the order pasted in a book kept for that purpose. In the examination of many entries selected at random from the Record book or book of original entry, covering the year 1887, each article was promptly produced, and found correct. In 1885 an exhaustive examination was made by this office of every package on hand, each one being opened and checked with the entry in the Record book, and found to agree.

The number of lots received in 1887, was..... 2,302
The number of lots delivered in 1887, was..... 888

The value of the lots delivered was estimated by parties receiving the same at \$355,635.36. Of this amount \$300,000 was made in one delivery, being the proceeds of a burglary committed in Philadelphia, of registered stocks and bonds.

The number of lots received by the Property Clerk from January 1, 1883, to January 1, 1888, was..... 8,726
Of which number there was delivered to owners..... 3,353
—of the estimated value of \$615,000..... 3,773
Lots disposed of by auction..... 7,126

Number of lots on hand January 1, 1888..... 1,600

—of the estimated value of about \$5,000.

The net proceeds of the auction sales amounted to \$9,399.22, which was duly turned into the credit of the Police Pension Fund (chap. 180, Laws 1884).

Goods are delivered by the Clerk on orders of Court, District Attorney's office, and on identification and affidavit. The responsibility of delivery rests with the Property Clerk, he being alone responsible if a delivery entails a loss on any one interested. He is under bonds to the amount of \$25,000.

The value of the lots delivered from the Precincts, Courts and Detective Squad during the year 1887, as per their reports, amounted to..... \$980,000 00
And for the period from January 1, 1883, to January 1, 1888..... 4,301,000 00

These lots consist of watches, money and other articles found on parties who are locked up over night and discharged next morning, and of trucks, cabs, etc., found by the Patrolmen on the street with drunken drivers, or with no driver at all.

These lots and deliveries are reported daily and weekly to the Property Clerk.

SANITARY AND BOILER INSPECTION BUREAU.

The books of the Sanitary company show that the amount collected and turned over to the Police Pension Fund during the year 1887 was \$10,250, being for 5,125 boiler licenses at \$2 each (chap. 437, Laws of 1885).

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 25, 1888:

There were 5,064 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
There were 545 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
There were 323 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.
There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 43 permits.
There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 8 permits.
There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 12 permits.

The certificates of 914 births, 73 still-births, 218 marriages and 836 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 25, 1888. This shows an increase of 122 births, 11 still-births and 40 deaths, and a decrease of 50 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1887 there was an increase of 271 births, 22 still-births and 157 deaths, and a decrease of 38 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 5; scarlatina, 3; diphtheria, 5; croup, 7; whooping cough, 2; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; rheumatism and gout, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; convulsions, 5; apoplexy, 10; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 1; suicide, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; malarial fevers, 2; diarrheal diseases, 1; pneumonia, 10; heart diseases, 13; aneurism, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis, gastro enteritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 4; surgical operations, 3. The number of deaths from erysipelas, typhoid fever and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 167 were in institutions, 470 in tenement-houses, 167 in houses containing three families or less, 13 in hotels and boarding-houses, 15 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 151 on the first, 195 on the second, 135 on the third, 113 on the fourth, 45 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 805 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 31 non-resident; 129 were stated to be single, 231 married, 103 widowed, and the condition of 373 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 836; still-births, 73; bodies in transit, 18; of the total burial permits issued for city and still births, 86 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 914 births, 218 marriages, 73 still-births, 836 deaths; 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 155 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 14 of marriage, and 99 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 25, 1888, was 37.9 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.888; the mean humidity was 90, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,131, and the total amount of rain-fall was 2.10 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overflowing the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-places, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, well-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 359, Laws of 1887, amending sections 359 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rates:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rates have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rates, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful

waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me next year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly. Jurors are summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
