## BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, January 19, 1876.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Wednesday, January 19, at 4 o'clock P. M., at the Hall of the Board.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Caylus, Dowd, Fuller, Goulding, Halsted, Hazeltine, Kane, Kelly, Klamroth, Mathewson, Place, Schell, Traud, Walker, West, Wetmore, and Wilkins—20.

Absent—Commissioner Vermilye—I.

The consideration of the minutes of the last meeting was postponed until the next meeting. On motion of Commissioner Goulding, the Board proceeded to the election of Clerk for the ensuing year, when Lawrence D. Kiernan was declared duly elected.

On motion of Commissioner Wetmore, the Board proceeded to the election of Auditor, when John Davenport was declared duly elected.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Trustees of Schools:

From the Ninth Ward, asking for authority to advertise for proposals for erecting wings to Grammar School Building No. 16. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Twelfth Ward, to discontinue a Teacher at Grammar School No. 6, Randall's Island, on account of the removal of part of the children. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Twelfth Ward, for provision for a new Primary School. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Twenty-first Ward, asking for leave of absence for three months for a tutor. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Nineteenth Ward, asking for two new pianos for Grammar School No. 27. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

From the Twenty-second Ward, to continue a Teacher in Grammar School No. 9. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.



From the Twenty-second Ward, for permission to make certain alterations, etc., in Grammar School building No 9. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Twenty-second Ward, nominating a Teacher for the Evening School. Keferred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

The President laid before the Board the Annual Report of the City Superintendent. Ordered to be printed in the usual form.

Also, the Annual Report of the Superintendent of Truancy. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc., and printed under their direction.

The Semi-monthly Report of the Superintendent of Truancy. Ordered to be printed in the minutes, and placed on file.

The President announced the appointments of the Standing Committees of the Board.

Also, that he would be at the President's Room every day, from 11 A. M. till 1 P. M., to meet all parties who may wish to consult with him on business relating to the schools—Saturdays to be reserved for teachers.

The President announced that a suit, to establish a question relative to the bill of Ephraim Holbush, bequeathing money for School Libraries had been commenced, and recommended that the Board take action in the matter. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

The President laid before the Board the following communications :

From the Deputy Comptroller, relative to a payment under a contract. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From Samuel Legald and M. Schloss, relative to heating and ventilating apparatus. Referred to the Committee on Warming and Ventilation.

From F. M. Roser and Timothy Madigan for appointment as Agents of Truancy. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Elections and Qualifications.

Commissioner Dowd offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is requested to deposit with the City Chamberlain the sum of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000), from the amount "Apportioned" by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for "Public Instruction," for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-six (1876), subject to the drafts of this Board on and after this date. Adopted.

Commissioner Dowd also offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Committee on By-Laws, Elections and Qualifications be and they hereby are authorized to take measures, if any may be required, to carry into effect the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, on file, in reference to the funds of this Board. Adopted.

The special order of the day being the report of the Committee on Course of Study and School Books, relative to the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia, Commissioner Klamroth offered resolutions that the Board take part in the Centennial ; that \$2,000 be appropriated, and a committee designated or appointed, etc. The question being taken on the first resolution, it was decided in the negative.

Commissioner Baker, in accordance with previous notice, called up the report of the Committee on German and French. After debate, on motion of Commissioner Kane, it was made the Special Order at the next meeting of the Board, after the third order of business.

On motion, the Board then adjourned.

## APPROVED PAPERS.

Whereas, In the approaching centennial year, every marked or important event connected with the independence of this Republic, particularly so if of acknowledged general interest, should be commemorated by our people, and in an especial manner by the people of this city, who have ever held in the most grateful remembrance the labors, sacrifices, and sufferings of the participants in the struggle of the thirteen colonies for liberty, and who have, on all occasions, manifested their gratitude for the blessings then secured and since enjoyed, as the result of those labors, sacrifices, and sufferings ; and

Whereas, The first day of the centennial year marks such an event in our history. On that day, one hundred years ago, the patriot army at Cambridge, then besieging Boston, under the immediate command of the immortal Washington, adopted as its standard, The Star Spangle Banner, and although the Continental Congress did not, until a subsequent period (June 14, 1777), ratify this action of the American army, the first day of January, 1776, is, nevertheless, the natal day of that emblem of liberty then, for the first time, unfurled amidst the acclamations of the soldiers, many of whom, in the struggle that followed, sealing their devotion to the emblem and the cause it typified with their blood : be it therefore

Resolved, That in commemoration of this important event in the history of our country, and as an appropriate inauguration of the centennial year, the Commissioner of Public Works cause the national standard to be displayed, from sunrise until sunset, on every public building in this city, on the first day of January, 1876 ; that the owners and occupants of private buildings, the proprietors of hotels, public places of amusement, and other public places controlled by private individuals, and the masters of vessels in the harbor, be and they are hereby requested also to display their flags on that day ; and be it further

Resolved, In order, if possible, that this commemoration may be general, in every portion of our extended country, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and from the St. Lawrence to the Rio Grande, it is hereby respectfully suggested, and most earnestly recommended, that the newspaper press of this city cause this recommendation to be published in, or telegraphed to, all parts of the country, in the hope that our patriotic people may enter into the spirit of the occasion, and thereby, while honoring our national emblem, inaugurate in the most appropriate manner the centennial year of the Declaration of American Independence.
