Whereas, On account of these conditions it is necessary, in order to properly and humanely care for the patients in the contagious disease hospitals, and for the proper transaction of business, to add to the existing plants and the appurtenances thereto to such an extent as may be required to put them in a condition to properly isolate and treat cases of contagious diseases arising in the different boroughs of the City, and to conduct the business of the Department of Health; and for the purposes mentioned the sum of four million five hundred and twenty-two thousand dollars (\$4,522,000) is required as follows:

Minutes of an Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, Monday, February 20, 1905, at 2 P. M.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and Chief Engineer Smith.

Minutes of February 16, 1905, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 16765 to 16782, inclusive, amounting to \$5,631.99, and of estimates contained in Vouchers Nos. 16783 to 16785, inclusive, amounting to \$34,615.65, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The President reported that on February 17, 1905, he addressed communications to the Municipal Civil Service Commission as follows: (1) asking permission to retain certain Levelers and Rodmen until an appropriate eligible list is established from which to make permanent appointments; (2) requesting the holding of special examinations for persons willing to accept positions at a distance from the City, and submitting schedule of salaries in the various grades; which action was approved.

Report No. 1168 of the Acting Chief Engineer, dated February 20, 1905, in regard to acceptance of new highways by the towns of Westchester County and as to compensation for maintenance of highways and guard-rail fences, etc., was received and ordered filed, and the following preambles and resolutions offered:

Whereas, The City of New York is now impounding water behind the New Croton Dam, which eventually will submerge various highways in the Towns of Cortlandt, Yorktown, New Castle, Bedford, Lewisboro, North Salem and Somers, Westchester County, N. Y., and The City of New York has constructed and is constructing other highways, under the orders of the Supreme Court, to be substituted for these highways, and desires to acquire the right, title and interest of the county and towns in said highways which are to be submerged and their alleged rights in the various bridges situated on said highways; and

Whereas, The City of New York, under chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, as amended, is liable for all expense, loss or damage caused to said county or said towns arising from the change of location of the highways within the limits of the flow-lines of the New Croton Reservoir; and

Whereas, Under the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 of the State of New York, and the acts mandatory thereof, the Aqueduct Commissioners, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, are empowered to agree with said county and towns as to the amount of compensation to be paid to them for the taking, using and occupying of said highways proposed to be submerged, including the increased cost of maintenance arising from the change of location of said highways; and

Whereas, Claims were duly presented by said county and towns for damages, as aforesaid, amounting to upwards of \$130,000, and conferences have been held from time to time by the representatives of the county and towns affected and the Aqueduct Commissioners, with the view of entering into an agreement as to the amount of damage suffered by the towns and county by reason of the substitution of the new highways for the old highways, the acceptance of the new highways upon completion, the conveyance of all right, title and interest in the old highways, and the waiver of all claims regarding the old bridges; and

Whereas, The Chief Engineer of this Commission submitted Report No. 1168, dated February 20, 1905, stating that, after conference with Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Mr. Eugene E. McLean, Engineer of the Department of Finance, he is of the opinion that the sum of \$50 per mile per year increased cost of maintenance for the length of the new roads, and \$75 per mile per year increased cost of maintenance for the excess mileage of the new roads over the old roads in the towns of Somers and Cortlandt, and 2½ cents per linear foot per year for the maintenance of the guard-rail fencing, is a reasonable compensation for all loss or damage suffered by the said county and towns by reason of the substitution of the new roads for the old roads; and has also stated that, in his opinion, it is distinctly to the advantage and for the best interests of the City to make a settlement in accordance therewith, the City to be relieved forever from the maintenance of the roads and guard-rail fencing and from responsibility for any damages arising from accident on the roads and from any liability from the taking of the county bridges; and the representative of said county and towns have expressed their willingness to make a settlement upon these terms and withdraw their said original claims and convey their interest in the submerged highways to The City of New York; and

Whereas, The approximate length of the new roads is 30.82 miles, of which 0.26 mile in the Town of Somers and 1.43 miles in the Town of Cortlandt are 1.69 miles in excess of the mileage of the old roads; and the approximate length of guard-rail fencing is 113,038 feet; and

Whereas, It appears from said report that the amounts to which said towns would respectively be entitled, said annual cost of maintenance being capitalized on a 5-per cent. basis, are as set forth in the following table:

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Tuesday, February 21, 1905, at 9 A. M. All the Commissioners were present.

A letter was presented from the State Civil Service Commission, dated February 15, acknowledging the letter from this Commission under date of February 9, requesting a reconsideration of the resolution including in the Exempt Class in the Department of Bridges the position of Stenographer to the Commissioner, and stating that it will be necessary for this Commission to pass a new resolution, requesting a rehearing of the matter by the State Board, which resolution must be signed by the Mayor before the matter can be reopened.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, with the approval of the Mayor, the State Civil Service Commission is hereby respectfully requested to reconsider the following resolution of this Commission, passed March 30, 1904:

Resolved, That the classification of offices and positions in the Department of Bridges, in the Exempt Class, be amended by including therein the following title: Stenographer to the Commissioner."

—which resolution was denied by the State Commission on December 16, 1904; it appearing that the said position of Stenographer to the Commissioner of Bridges has now been established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, in accordance with the requirement of the State Board.

A letter was presented from the State Civil Service Commission, dated February 16, returning a resolution of this Commission, duly approved, increasing the number of Chaplains in the Exempt Class in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals from two to three. Millmore, Edward Martin, John Reed and Michael Wood, all of whom reside outside the City limits, and who are employed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for service outside the City limits, be and they are hereby exempted from competitive examination under the authority of rule 12, paragraph 7, of the Civil Service Rules, such action to date from the 1st day of June, 1904; and it is further

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to pass the pay-rolls of the said five (5) men, namely, Charles S. Crane, Edward L. Millmore, Edward Martin, John Reed and Michael Wood, from June 1, 1904.

A letter was presented from the Change of Grade Damage Commission, dated February 14, requesting that the Commission certify the pay-rolls of Edgar A. Martin, Messenger in that Department. A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Friday, February 24, at 9:30 A. M. All the Commissioners were present.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Labor Class, Part I, by substituting for the title "Foreman of Laborers," the following:

Foreman of Laborers, Common.

Foreman of Park Laborers, Department of Parks.

Foreman of Dock Laborers, Department of Docks and Ferries.

Mr. Frank A. Spencer, Labor Clerk, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also addressed the Commission. There was no opposition to the amendment. The hearing then closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Labor Class, Part I, as fixed by the Civil Service Rules, be amended by substituting for the title "Foreman of Laborers," the following:

Foreman of Laborers, Common.

Foreman of Park Laborers, Department of Parks.

Foreman of Dock Laborers, Department of Docks and Ferries.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to forward copies of the foregoing resolution to the Mayor and to the State Civil Service Commission for their approval.

A letter was presented from the Assistant Secretary, submitting for the approval of the Commission certain proposed changes in sections 3 and 4 of Rule XVII, relative to the rating of candidates for admittance to the Police and Fire Departments.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with Commissioner McAdoo and First Deputy Commissioner McAvoy, of the Police Department, and request that they attend the meeting of the Commission to be held Friday morning, March 3, in order that the Commission may have the benefit of their opinion on the proposed amendment before taking action on same.

The Secretary presented for the approval of the Commission a new form of experience paper for use in coming examinations, the same to be filled out and sworn to by the candidate at home and filed in the office of the Commission before the day of the examination; such procedure to take the place of the method now in operation of submitting an experience paper the day of the examination.

On motion, the form was adopted as amended and the Secretary was instructed to proceed with the printing of the same.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission transmitting a copy of a report and recommendation presented by him at a meeting of that body held January 20, with reference to the following appointments and transfers in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses:

The appointment of Mr. Frederick L. C. Keating, as Commissioner of Licenses.

The appointment of Mr. John C. Caldwell, as Secretary to the Commissioner of Licenses.

The provisional appointments of a number of Inspectors, and the extension of the period allowed for such appointments by Rule XII.

The transfer of Henry Frank from the position of Clerk in the Department of Taxes and Assessments at a salary of \$1,500 per annum to the position of Clerk at a salary of \$1,500 per annum.

The transfer of Edward P. O'Connor from the position of Stenographer and Typewriter in the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School, at a salary of \$750 per annum, to a similar position in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses at a salary of \$1,500 per annum.

The report of the Secretary of the State Commission concluded as follows:

"I would respectfully recommend that a copy of this report be transmitted to the Municipal Civil Service Commission and its attention be especially called to the matter of the certification of the accounts of Keating and Caldwell in contravention of the provisions of the Civil Service law and Rules; also to the extension of the time of the provisional employment of the Inspectors, and to the matter of the transfer of Henry Frank and Edward P. O'Connor."

The Secretary stated that the pay-roll of the Commissioner of Licenses was being passed under an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated December 23, to the effect that that office is an independent one, and that therefore it is not necessary to classify same; that the Inspectors were appointed provisionally, pending the establishment of the eligible list for that position, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 3; that when the sixty days allowed by Rule XII. for such appointment had expired the list was not yet ready for certification, and that the services of the Inspectors being urgently needed, it was impossible to discontinue same; that the transfer of Henry Frank from the Department of Taxes and Assessments at \$1,500 per annum had been allowed, for the reason that Mr. Frank had previously received a compensation of \$1,500, and was considered eligible for restoration to same; that the transfer of Edward P. O'Connor from the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School at \$750 per annum to the office of the Commissioner of Licenses at \$900 was approved, for the reason that Mr. O'Connor lived at the Training School and his maintenance more than equaled the difference in the salaries. 
