It shall be the duty of the parents of any child born in said city (and if there be no parent alive that has made such report, then of the next of kin of said child born), and of every person present at such birth, within ten days after such birth, to report to the Department of Health, in writing, as far as known, the date, borough and street number of said birth, and the name, sex and color of such child born, and the name, residence, birthplace and age of the parents; the occupation of the father and the maiden name of the mother. It shall be the duty of physicians and professional midwives to keep a registry of the several births in which they have assisted professionally, which shall contain the date of birth, borough, street and street number where such birth took place; the sex, color of the child, and also, as near as the same can be ascertained, the name of said child, the number of previous children born of the mother, the number now living; the name, residence, birthplace and age of the parents; the occupation of the father and the maiden name of the mother, and to file a written copy of the said registry of birth with the Department of Health in the borough office of the borough where the birth occurred, within ten days after such birth, upon blank forms furnished by the said Department. Physicians and midwives shall certify they attended at the birth so reported, and that all the other facts stated in the copy of the said registry are true to the best of their knowledge, information and belief.
