The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures:

No. 853.

Commissioner of Plant and Structures—Request for Authority to Contract for Repairs to Ferryboat "Queens" Without Public Letting; Amount, \$3,000 (Approximately).

City of New York, Department of Plant and Structures, Municipal Building, October 7, 1918.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—Your Honorable Board is hereby requested to grant me permission, pursuant to section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, to give an open market order

without public letting, for emergency dry dock repairs to the ferryboat "Queens," amounting to approximately \$3,000.

An examination of this ferryboat disclosed the fact that both propeller wheels were in such condition that they will have to be removed. This necessitates the installation of new propeller wheels. One of the rudders will have to be taken down for the purpose of installing new pintle nut and bushing. Considerable replacement of bolts and rivets in rudders is also necessary. The urgency of these repairs precludes taking the usual time for advertising for bids. Yours truly,

**Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$5,328, to Cover Expense of Hiring Laborers to Trim Vessels Used for the Disposal of Garbage.**

City of New York, Department of Street Cleaning, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, October 15, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen pass a resolution authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds amounting to five thousand three hundred and twenty-eight dollars (\$5,328), pursuant to section 188, subdivision 8 of the Greater New York Charter, to cover the expense of hiring laborers to trim the vessels used for the disposal of garbage.

On October 2, 1918, the Metropolitan By-Products Company, Inc., which had a contract with the City for the final disposition of garbage in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, notified this department that it would discontinue operations after said date, and it actually did so. In consequence, the work of disposing of the garbage has fallen upon this department directly, and it is using its own vessels to transport the garbage and dump it at sea. In order that these vessels will float upon an even keel it is necessary that the materials dumped upon them from the carts shall be trimmed, and in the emergency it has been necessary to hire labor for this purpose, consisting of eighteen (18) laborers at \$4 per day each. No funds are available for the purpose, because of the fact that the Metropolitan By-Products Co., Inc., was supposed to pay the City a revenue for the privilege of taking away this garbage, and all vessels used were furnished and trimmed by them and at their own expense.

The prompt disposal of garbage is necessary to preserve the public health, and the operation is a continuous one and cannot be interrupted without seriously affecting the public health. It is therefore requested that this application be acted upon at once.

**Board of Trustees, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$105,000, to Meet Deficits in Appropriations for Fuel and Other Supplies.**

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Office of the Board of Trustees, 1st avenue and 26th street, New York, October 15, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals respectfully request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$105,000 to meet the deficits in the appropriations for fuel and other supplies for the hospitals of the department. The deficiencies in the appropriations are due primarily to the emergencies which have arisen in the hospitals of the department and the high costs prevailing at the present time.

The large deficit in the appropriation for fuel supplies is due to the high cost of coal and the fact that the department has placed in operation during the past year a new wing to Harlem, thereby actually doubling the size of the hospital, and opened the new building for the Out Patient Department at Gouverneur.

The need of replenishing certain appropriations of the department was included in our request of May 18, 1918, for special revenue bonds in the sum of \$238,550, which was allowed by the Board of Aldermen, and concurred in by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the extent of \$209,525. The Trustees under date of October 15th applied to that Board for the additional \$19,500, and at the same time informed the Board of Estimate of the application about to be made for a further issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$105,000 to meet the deficits in the appropriations, and also that the department would be glad to have the funds made available from any source, such as by transfer from balances in appropriations of other City departments or from such accrual funds as may be available.

**President, Borough of Manhattan—Request for Authority to Purchase Gasoline Without Public Letting; Estimate, \$1,850.**

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, Municipal Building, October 17, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—Under date of January 25, 1918, proposals were invited for 45,000 gallons of gasoline required by this Department, but no bids were received.

Inquiry disclosed the fact that the various concerns supplying this material were reluctant to bind themselves under a yearly contract, on account of the unsettled condition of the market, and the probable demands of the Government upon them for the materials in their possession.

Under date of April 2, 1918, a resolution was adopted by your Honorable Board authorizing the purchase in the open market without public letting, of 25,000 gallons of gasoline.

This quantity has been purchased and approximately used and there will be required for departmental use to the end of the year about 15,000 more gallons at an estimated cost of \$1,850, the prevailing market price being 24½ cents per gallon.

I respectfully request permission to again purchase the quantity needed without public letting, at an estimated cost not to exceed \$1,850, as the conditions which prevailed at the time the resolution of April 2, 1918, was adopted, still exist.

**Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Authority to Make Repairs to a Dumping Scow Without Public Letting; Amount, \$2,241.42.**

City of New York, Department of Street Cleaning, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, October 16, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request that the Board of Aldermen authorize the making of certain necessary repairs to department dumping scow No. 5, without public letting, at an expense not to exceed \$2,241.42.

On March 2, 1918, the firm of Dailey and Ivins, which had the contract with the City for the disposal of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, abandoned their contract and the City was unable to obtain another contractor to complete the same, and in consequence this work fell upon this department, which has continued it ever since. In order to do so it was necessary to purchase certain of the plant owned by Dailey and Ivins, consisting of seven sea dumping scows used for the purpose of transporting ashes and dumping them at sea. These vessels dispose of the materials by means of a mechanism which opens the gates in the bottoms of their hulls, permitting the refuse to be deposited into the sea directly. On one of these vessels, known as No. 5, one of the gates was found to be broken and in want of repair, but in order to ascertain the extent of such repairs it was necessary to place it in drydock. Investigation then revealed that it needed several other repairs, including caulking.

In the meanwhile the Metropolitan By-Products Company, Inc., which had the contract with the City for the final disposition of garbage in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, abandoned its contract on October 2, 1918, and in consequence the department is obliged to handle this material and dispose of it by dumping it at sea.

It is most urgent, therefore, that we have the use of dumper No. 5 for this purpose at the earliest possible time. If we are obliged to prepare a contract and specifications, have the same printed, advertised and let, in all probability more than four (4) weeks' time will be lost. In the meanwhile the City will be without the use of this scow and unable to dispose of the fast accumulating quantity of garbage which, of course, is at all times a serious menace to the public health.

I therefore request that the above permission be granted at the earliest possible time.

**President, Borough of Manhattan—Request for Authority to Contract for Repaving a Part of Chambers Street Without Public Letting.**

*Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:*

Dear Sir—Under date of July 25, 1918, a contract was entered into between the City and W. J. Fitzgerald for repaving with granite blocks on a concrete foundation the roadway of Chambers street, from Broadway to a point 75 feet east of the intersection of West Broadway.

At the time of the consummation of the contract the area running from West Broadway to a point 75 feet easterly therefrom was omitted on account of subway construction work, which has since been completed and the temporary pavement restored.

In order to complete the repaving of Chambers street to the intersection of West Broadway, it will be necessary to issue an order to the contractor for the additional work. I therefore respectfully request permission to contract, without public letting, for the repaving of Chambers street, from the intersection of West Broadway to a point 75 feet easterly therefrom, at an estimated cost not to exceed \$2,250.

As you can see, the contract prices of September 18 and October 11 are the highest in the whole year, when, as a matter of fact, they should be the lowest, owing to the fresh butter coming in from the West and stored in the various storage houses.

On September 15 and October 15, the Navy Department sent a request to the different butter people, and I understand no bids were received by them. Also, for your information, on or about September 1, the United States Government requisitioned 50 per cent. of all butter held in storage, and that is the reason of the high price and the scarcity of this commodity. I also wish to state that I heard representatives of the Government are going into the different storage houses and selecting the largest quantities and the best quality of butter for the Army, Navy and Allies.

After the rejection of the September contract, open market bids were sent to six butter merchants, and only two responded.

**An Ordinance in Relation to Minors Under Sixteen Years, Unaccompanied by Parent or Guardian.**

By Alderman Haubert—

AN ORDINANCE in Relation to Minors Under Sixteen Years, Unaccompanied by Parent or Guardian.

Section 1. No child, actually or apparently under the age of sixteen years, shall unnecessarily remain or loiter, nor be suffered or permitted by a parent, guardian or other person having custody of such child to unnecessarily remain or loiter, in any public park, concert hall, dance hall, theatre, museum or other place of amusement, or on the public highway or in or upon any other public place, land or building, unless accompanied by a parent, guardian, or other proper custodian, between the hour of 10 o'clock p. m. and sunrise the following morning, during the months of and from May to September, both inclusive, and between the hour of 9 o'clock p. m. and sunrise the following morning during the months of and from October to April, both inclusive.

Sec. 2. Any child, actually or apparently under the age of sixteen years, found violating the provisions of this ordinance by any police officer or other peace officer may be conducted to such child's home, if in the county where said child is found; or if not in the county, or if its home cannot be ascertained, then to the shelter of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children in the county where said child has been found. Such officer shall, whenever possible, *forthwith* notify the parent or guardian or member of the child's family in the event of the child's detention.

A summons shall be served either upon the parent, guardian or other legal custodian, as the case may be, or upon the child, or both, by said officer in the manner provided generally in the case of violation of the corporation ordinances to answer for any violation hereof, and recourse shall be had to arrest only in case of disobedience thereof, or where otherwise absolutely necessary.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately and shall be limited to the duration of the present war, and twelve months thereafter.

No. 763—*Sheriff, Queens County—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$2,000, to Replenish Account for "Transportation, Carfare," Code 3567.*

*Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen:*

Sir—In accordance with your request dated October 4, 1918, I have investigated this matter and submit the facts relating thereto.

At the time of the preparation of the tentative budget for 1917, an allowance of about \$1,200 was made to the Sheriff for an automobile van for the transportation of prisoners in Queens County. The question of jurisdiction arose and the main committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment set up the allowance under the Department of Correction.

The Department of Correction failed to take over the transportation of prisoners on January 1, 1917, owing to the lack of legal interpretation of the law, and an opinion of the Corporation Counsel was requested.

The opinion, which was rendered on June 29, 1917, stated that the jurisdiction of the transportation of prisoners in the Borough of Queens was properly with the Department of Correction.

In accordance with this decision, a proper allowance was again set up under the Department of Correction for this activity in the 1918 budget.

Recently the Commissioner of Correction advised that a van would be purchased this year and this activity taken over beginning January 1, 1919.

Until the transfer of these duties is made, the sum of \$1,400 will have to be provided to the Sheriff to meet the transportation expenses from June 1, 1918, to the end of the year. Respectfully, JAMES V. DIXON, Examiner.

*To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, Municipal Building, New York City:*

Gentlemen—In the budget for the year 1917 there was set apart for the use of this office the sum of three thousand dollars to defray the necessary expenses incident to the transportation of prisoners between the Jail and the various Magistrates' Courts and the Court of Special Sessions in the Borough of Queens. This appropriation was made under "contract or open order service for transportation, carfare," Budget No. 3567.

The same practice had been followed for many years, but latterly objection has been made by the Comptroller to this method of providing this transportation, and we were advised that, in future, the City would supply the necessary automobiles for conveying these prisoners.

Relying on this advice, when our estimate for the year 1918 was submitted, we asked for an appropriation of only one thousand dollars for the above purpose, to be

used in case it should be necessary, in conjunction with the conveyances to be furnished, and an appropriation for that amount was accordingly made in this year's budget. No conveyance has, however, been furnished, the appropriation has been exhausted, and it now becomes necessary to supplement the same to the extent of two thousand dollars, or otherwise we will be unable to provide for the transportation of the prisoners.

Code 2654, Food Supplies—Owing to the increased cost of food supplies the original appropriation has been exhausted. The requested amount of \$100,000 seems reasonable, based on the present census of the Correctional Institutions and the current prices of food staples.

Code 2656, Forage and Veterinary Supplies—There is an unencumbered balance in this code of \$2,693.01. The average monthly expenditures have been approximately \$1,760. In order to meet the present estimated expenditures, the requested amount of \$2,000 will be necessary.

Code 2657, Fuel Supplies—Owing to the increased cost of obtaining fuel last winter over the estimated cost, as provided in the 1918 appropriation, the fund is practically exhausted. It is necessary that an additional sum be provided in order to purchase coal with which to heat the institutions and provide necessary gasoline and kerosene. Based on the quantities consumed during the past winter and the present prices, the requested amount of \$10,000 is reasonable.

Code 2658, Office Supplies—The requested amount of \$600 is reasonable, the principal item being postage.

Code 2660, Laundry, Cleaning and Disinfecting Supplies—This account is entirely exhausted and the needs of funds with which to purchase the necessary supplies is very urgent. The expenditures in this code have averaged approximately \$1,000 per month, and the requested amount of \$3,000 seems reasonable.

Code 2666, Household Equipment—The principal items for which money is needed in this code are necessary, beds and blankets. It was brought out, during the preparation of the tentative budget for 1919, that these items were badly needed and the requested amount of \$10,000 seems reasonable, taking into account present prices.

Code 2671, Wearing Apparel—An examination of the storehouse ledger at the time of examining the 1919 budget request for code, showed that there was practically no clothing on hand and it is estimated that the money with which to buy the necessary winter garments for inmates will require the requested amount of \$25,000.

Code 2672, General Plant Equipment—The amount requested, \$4,500, is a reasonable amount in order to provide the necessary equipment in the manufacturing industries of the department. This account, at the present time, shows a balance of \$14.39, with many necessary requisitions pending.

Code 2673, General Plant Materials—This account is exhausted and with very little of the material on hand, as shown in the stores' accounts, with which to make necessary urgent repairs to existing structures. It is estimated that the requested amount of \$13,000 is necessary.

Code 2680, General Plant Service—This account is practically exhausted. The monthly expenditures have averaged about \$500. The requested amount of \$1,200, it is estimated, will be necessary for necessary service to the end of the year.

Sir—I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution authorizing the issue of revenue bonds amounting to \$42,585, pursuant to section 188, subdivision 8, of the Greater New York Charter, to cover the expenses of dredging the slips adjacent to our fifteen (15) dumping boards in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

No appropriation was made in the annual Budget to meet this expense because of the fact that the duty to do so rested upon the contractors who had the contract with the Department for the final disposition of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. These contractors, Dailey & Ivens, abandoned their contract on March 2, 1918, leaving all of the dumps in urgent need of dredging. In fact, they had failed and neglected to dredge the dumps at West 96th street, West 134th street, East 60th street, East 72d street and Lincoln avenue in The Bronx, since the year 1916.

Since March 2, 1918, we have been unable to do any dredging at any of the dumps for the lack of funds. In the meanwhile loading of scows at all of these dumps has been seriously interfered with due to the fact that they frequently go aground and, in several instances, the hulls of these vessels have been seriously damaged and claims for the same have been filed against the City by their owners. The grounding of these vessels resulted also in delays to our carts and thus retarded the Department work.

Request was made to the Department of Docks and Ferries to perform this dredging but said Department was also without funds and could not do it. The estimated cost has been fixed by the Dock Department and the contract will be let and the work done under their supervision.

The Department at the present time is requesting bids for a contract for the final disposition of refuse for the next three years under which it will be the contractor's duty to perform the necessary dredging but the Department is advised that it should deliver the dumps to the new contractor on January 1, 1919, properly dredged. Upon examination of the "soundings" at the Department of Docks and Ferries, it appeared that at some of the places in the list submitted the water is of such depth that immediate dredging is unnecessary.

Taking the matter up in conference with the Commissioner of Street Cleaning and Engineer Stearns of that Department, it has been determined that dredging at the following named dumps may be deferred until next year:

West 47th street, North River; West 77th street, North River; West 96th street, North River; West 134th street, North River; East 72d street, East River.

The total quantity eliminated is 11,000 cubic yards, the estimated cost of dredging which is \$9,400.

The dumps at which dredging is urgently needed are as follows:

Canal street, North River; West 30th street, North River; Jackson street, East River; Stanton street, East River; 19th street, East River; 46th street, East River; 60th street, East River; 107th street, Harlem River; 139th street, Harlem River; Lincoln avenue, Bronx.

The quantities to be dredged at these locations aggregate 36,300 cubic yards at an estimated cost of \$33,245.


