

It appearing by the application made to me on the seventeenth day of December, 1879, by fifty reputable householders and taxpayers of the City and County of New York, in the State of New York, verified upon oath before a Justice of the Supreme Court, that there is need in said city and county of a steam railway or railways for the transportation of passengers, mails, and freight, and thirty days not having expired since said application, now, in pursuance of the provisions of the act entitled "An act further to provide for the construction and operation of a steam railway or railways in counties of the State, passed June 18, 1875, I, Edward Cooper, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby certify that I have this day appointed the following five persons, residents of said city and county, namely: Richard M. Hoe, John J. Crane, Gustav Schwab, Charles L. Perkins, and William M. Olliffe, to be Commissioners under and in pursuance of the provisions of said act.
