SIR—There were 624 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 8, 1884, which is a decrease of 4, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 45 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending March 1, 1884, was 595, which is 82.0 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.02 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,343,869.

A^T 9.39 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had provide security.

The section south of Foners, where smaller insures had previously occurred. The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet m length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 p. M., on Saturday, the ryth instant. While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservor was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water.
