

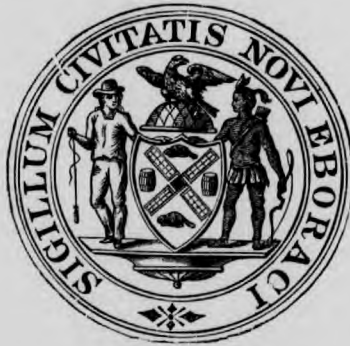

SIR—We have the honor to submit herewith the undermentioned financial statements of the second quarter of 1887, showing a total balance of \$4,033,423.67, for publication in the CITY RECORD, viz.:

City Treasury—Special and Trust Accounts.
City Treasury—Appropriation, General Fund and Taxes.
Sinking Fund—Redemption Accounts.
Sinking Fund—Interest Accounts.
Registered Interest—Witness and Jury Fees.
Registered Interest—Checks remaining unpaid in the hands of the City Chamberlain.
City Depositories.
Condensed Statement of Warrants.
Abstract of Stocks and Bonds issued and canceled.
City Debt—Represented by Stocks and Bonds outstanding.

The above balance agrees with the balance as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and its correctness is vouched by the certificates of the several banks of deposit. The balance as stated in the Comptroller's quarterly report, page 1885, CITY RECORD, is \$500,000 greater, arising from the fact that that sum which is due from the Marine National Bank (insolvent) is counted as cash by the Comptroller, whereas it stands on the Chamberlain's books not as cash but as a book balance to the debit of the Marine National Bank.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
