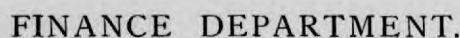

GENTLEMEN—In the Comptroller's Report for the year ending August 1, 1882, I stated the reasons why certain City and County Stocks and Bonds held by the Commissioners of the Sinking

Fund may be lawfully canceled by them, and that I intended to recommend the cancellation of such City indebtedness.

The subject is one of great importance, and as it is fully explained in my report, I now respectfully present the statement of the law and the facts which were made therein, as follows:

"At the last session of the Legislature, a bill was introduced and referred to the Committee on the Affairs of Cities, in the Assembly, entitled,

"An act to provide for the cancellation or destruction of all bonds and stocks of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, belonging to or acquired for the sinking funds of said Corporation."

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund protested against the radical and sweeping provisions of this bill, as expressed in its title, and a memorial to the Legislature was presented, accompanied with documents fully explaining the legal and practical objections to its radical provisions for canceling and destroying the stocks and bonds held or acquired by them, thus virtually abolishing the Sinking Fund and violating existing laws and pledges of the good faith of the City to its creditors.

"The bill was not reported by the Committee, and it failed.

"The memorial of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund was printed in the CITY RECORD of April 1, with their proceedings at the meeting of the Board, held March 28, 1882.

"Had this proposition been carried out, its effect would have been to abrogate and destroy the Sinking Fund, which has been faithfully guarded through a period of seventy years, and to seriously impair the credit of the City.

"The proposition was made without full knowledge of the laws on the subject, and its practical operation in connection with the finances of the City.

"The proposal to cancel and destroy all the city stocks and bonds held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is wholly inadmissible, but a portion of them may be canceled without violation of law, or in any degree alienating or impairing the security of the fund now pledged for the Redemption of the City Debt. The authority to cancel certain stocks and bonds held by them has been conferred upon the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in their discretion, and I shall accordingly recommend to them the cancellation of such stocks and bonds as may be lawfully canceled.

"The effect of such partial cancellation will be to simplify the Sinking Fund, while it will be in strict conformity with law and the obligation of contract.

"The Charter of 1873 provides as follows:

"Section 102. * * * It shall be lawful for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, in their discretion, and they are hereby empowered in such discretion, to cancel any portion of the indebtedness of the said city held by them, which is by law redeemable from the Sinking Fund."

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund did not exercise the power thus conferred upon them. There were legal reasons against such action which were not properly understood when the statute was enacted.

"No portion of the city indebtedness held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund could be lawfully canceled before the enactment of an act entitled, 'An act relating to certain indebtedness of the City of New York, and to provide for the payment and cancellation of the same,' passed June 3, 1878.

"That act repealed the statute which operated as a prohibition on the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to cancel any stocks and bonds held by them, as authorized by the charter provision above cited.

"The repealing provision is as follows:

"Section 2, chapter 383, Laws of 1878:

"The fund known as the 'Sinking Fund of the City of New York, for the payment of the interest accruing and to accrue upon the stocks of said city, until the same be fully and finally redeemed,' shall be continued, and after providing for the payment of the interest on the bonds and stocks of said city, now payable therefrom as provided by law, shall form a fund which shall be transferred after the year 1878 to the 'Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt,' and which transferred fund is hereby, in addition to the revenues and moneys aforesaid, pledged and appropriated to said last-mentioned Sinking Fund, until all the bonds and stocks of said city as aforesaid are fully redeemed and paid."

"The surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt had previously been transferred to the General Fund, by a statute passed in the year 1862, as follows:

"Section 1, chapter 163, Laws of 1862:

"It shall and may be lawful for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to transfer the surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt, at the end of the present and every future year, to the fund known as the General Fund of said corporation, to be applied to the diminution of the taxes of said city, as hereinafter provided."

"Now, as the interest accruing on those stocks and bonds payable from the Sinking Fund for the payment of the interest on the City Debt, when held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, was paid into the fund for the redemption of the debt, it will be seen that if such stocks and bonds had been canceled the interest payable on them would have become a surplus in the interest paying fund, and, under the statute of 1862, above cited, would have been transferred to the General Fund, and thus have impaired the Redemption Fund, by diverting its revenues which are pledged by law for the redemption of the City Debt.

"But under the statute of 1878, which provides for the transfer of the surplus revenues of the 'Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt,' to the 'Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt,' all the receipts of the former fund go into the latter fund, as interest or surplus revenues, except interest paid on bonds held by the public.

"It will therefore make no difference in the receipts of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, whether the stocks and bonds payable from the Sinking Fund held by the Commissioners are now canceled or not.

"It is obvious, too, that the cancellation of such City indebtedness at any time before the maturity of the stocks and bonds will not impair the Redemption Fund, as the principal is redeemable therefrom.

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may therefore now lawfully act under the provision of the charter authorizing and empowering them, in their discretion, to cancel such portion of the indebtedness of the City of New York held by them, which is by law redeemable from the Sinking Fund. They have no authority, however, to cancel any portion of the indebtedness of the City held by them, which is by law payable from taxation. Nor is there any power in the Legislature to authorize the cancellation of such indebtedness, for such cancellation would directly impair the

"revenues of the Sinking Fund pledged for the Redemption of the City Debt and violate the contract existing by law between the city and its creditors.

"If the city indebtedness held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund which may be lawfully canceled, is canceled, as now proposed, the effect will be to reduce the amount in the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, and a corresponding amount of the gross Funded Debt, without reducing the net City Debt, which will remain the same.

"The amount of such City indebtedness held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund which is by law redeemable from the Sinking Fund, and may be canceled under the provision of the Charter of 1873, is \$6,030,972.47, as follows:

"Six per cent. Water Stock, payable in 1902.....	\$25,000 00
"Six per cent. New Aqueduct Stock, payable in 1884.....	150,000 00
"Five and six per cent. additional New Aqueduct Stock, payable in 1900.....	2,287,335 11
"Six per cent. Croton Aqueduct Bonds, payable 1907.....	490,000 00
"Five and six per cent. Croton Reservoir Bonds, payable 1907-17.....	950,637 36

I now respectfully recommend that the above city indebtedness held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be canceled, and submit a resolution accordingly.

Whereas, chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873 provides, inter alia, as follows:

"Section 102. It shall be lawful for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, in their discretion, to cancel any portion of the indebtedness of the said City held by them, which is by law redeemable from the Sinking Fund;" and,

Whereas, By the provisions of law contained in section 2 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, authorizing the transfer of the surplus revenues of the "Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," to the "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," the foregoing statute became operative, and it is now in force, empowering the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to cancel a portion of the City Indebtedness which is by law redeemable from the Sinking Fund, and they may lawfully exercise such power, in their discretion; and,

Whereas, The cancellation of such portion of city indebtedness would be in strict conformity with law, and the obligation of contracts now existing with all creditors holding city stocks and bonds which are by law redeemable from the Sinking Fund; therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby order and direct that a portion of the indebtedness of the city held by them, which is by law redeemable from the Sinking Fund, shall be canceled on December 1, 1882, amounting to six million and thirty thousand nine hundred and seventy-two dollars and forty-seven cents (\$6,030,972.47), as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That upon the face of each certificate of stock representing such portion of the city indebtedness, there shall be written a certificate of its cancellation, to be signed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as evidence thereof, under their authority, besides the usual defacing of the seal and signatures, and when the said certificates of stock are so canceled they shall be filed in the office of the Comptroller.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolutions were adopted, all the Commissioners voting in the affirmative.

TAXES ON CORPORATIONS.

In 1880 an act was passed by the Legislature, entitled

"An act to provide for raising taxes for the use of the State upon certain corporations, joint stock companies and associations."

This act was amended by chapter 361 of the Laws of 1881, section 8 of which provided that the personal estate of all such corporations, joint stock companies and associations, as were mentioned in the act as subject to State taxes, "shall hereafter be exempt from assessment and taxation for State purposes, except upon their real estate, and as herein provided; but they shall, in all other respects, be liable to assessment and taxation as heretofore." Under this provision of law, all corporations deemed to be liable to State taxes, as therein provided, doing business in the City of New York, were exempted in 1882 from local taxation on their personal estate for State purposes.

The assessed valuations of the personal estate of such corporations, in the year 1882, was \$29,547,074, and the special rate of tax thereon was 2.0152 per cent., as previously stated.

BANK TAXES OF 1880.

In the Comptroller's report for the year ending August 1, 1881, reference was made to the taxes of 1880, levied upon the capital stock of banks and other corporations in this city, amounting at that time to \$1,941,927.17.

The question of their liability was then pending in the courts, and litigation was continued until recently, but a settlement has been made with the banks by the Counsel to the Corporation with the approval of the Comptroller, and the taxes of 1880, due by them, have been paid into the City Treasury, excepting a few corporations against which legal proceedings are still pending.

The bank taxes for 1881 and 1882 have been paid without litigation. Legal proceedings are still pending, however, between the city and many corporations in relation to taxes for a large amount in 1880 and 1881.

The Court of Appeals has, however, recently decided the questions involved in these litigations, in favor of the city, and such proceedings will soon be brought to a determination.

TAX SALES.

A sale of property advertised to be held at the Comptroller's Office on March 5, for unpaid taxes, levied in the years 1877, 1878 and 1879, and of Croton-water rents, for the years 1876, 1877 and 1878, has been postponed until May 7, 1883.

UNPAID ASSESSMENTS.

The amount of assessments confirmed, for local improvements, remaining uncollected December 31, 1882, was as follows:

The collection of the whole amount due on assessments for street openings may be relied on, but a considerable portion of the assessments for street improvements, regulating, grading, sewerage, paving, etc., will not be paid, on account of vacations by order of the Courts, and reductions of assessments for certain improvements by the Assessment Commission, appointed for their revision and correction under chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880. The amount of these assessments which will probably be collected, after making allowance for such vacations and reductions, may be estimated at about six million dollars, to which should be added interest due on assessments, amounting to at least half a million dollars. The assessments are an offset against the city bond debt, for the amount collected.

APPROPRIATIONS.

The total amount of appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the present year (1883), in the Final Estimate, adopted December 29, 1882, is \$30,593,535.79; the estimated amount of the General Fund deducted being \$2,000,000, the same as for the year 1882. The following comparative statement shows the amounts of the appropriations made for 1882 and 1883 to the various Departments and for special and general purposes, and also the decrease for some objects and increase for others, making a net increase of \$1,180,704.33, in the appropriations for 1883, as follows:

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

[From Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen, March 27, 1883.]

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, March 26, 1883.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted March 13, 1883, permitting the New York Electric Lines Company to lay wires or other conductors of electricity in and through the streets, avenues and highways of New York City, and to make the necessary connections by means of vaults, test-boxes, etc., in accordance with an "Ordinance to regulate the laying of subterranean telegraph wires and electric conductors in the streets of the city," passed by the Common Council in December, 1878.

The right to use the public streets for purposes which involve the tearing up of pavements, excavations in the street, and the consequent obstruction of crowded thoroughfares, with all the damage, annoyance and danger to life, limb and health which such obstructions and excavations occasion, should be granted only when great public benefits are to be realized. In the case of the overcrowded "down-town" streets of the city such rights should not be granted, unless these public benefits are positively assured, and the work undertaken either by individuals or companies of undoubted responsibility and legality, or else by the city.

The petition of Sidney F. Shelbourne, President, in behalf of the New York Electric Lines Company, recites that "the said company was incorporated and organized under the laws of this State for the purpose of constructing, laying, and maintaining lines or trains of wires in the cities of New York and Brooklyn." It appears, from such investigation as I have been able to make, that this company at present exists only on paper, and that its further development depends upon its obtaining the right to lay and maintain lines or trains of wires under the streets of New York and Brooklyn, which wires it proposes to lease to such corporations or individuals as may have occasion to use them for electrical purposes, and that from these sources alone the revenue of the company is to be derived.

It does not appear that the Electric Lines Company can in any sense be called a Telegraph Company, for it does not, as I understand it, propose to carry on to any extent the business of telegraphing, and I am advised that it is at least doubtful whether under existing general laws of the State such a company may be formed or not. If, however, such a company can be formed under existing laws, the fact remains that the right to lay wires under the streets of this city has already been granted to three other companies which have the wires and are already using them for electrical purposes, and the further fact that there is no sufficient evidence that the methods and devices proposed to be employed by the Electric Lines Company will answer the purposes for which they are intended. To grant the right asked for in the petition of Mr. Sidney F. Shelbourne would, in my opinion, be again to surrender the streets of the city for experimental purposes to a company of unknown responsibility, which would involve the tearing up of pavements in any and all the streets, and excavations therein to an unknown extent. In my opinion the privilege should not be granted.

I append hereto a communication on this subject from George P. Andrews, Esq., the Counsel to the Corporation.

FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the New York Electric Lines Company to lay wires or other conductors of electricity in and through the streets, avenues, and highways of New York City, and to make connections of such wires or conductors underground by means of the necessary vaults, test-boxes, and distributing conduits, and thence above ground with points of electric illumination, or of telegraphic or telephonic signal in accordance with the provisions of an "Ordinance to regulate the laying of subterranean telegraph wires and electric conductors in the streets of the city," passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor, December 14, 1878; provided, however, and it is hereby ordained and

Resolved, That whenever the said New York Electric Lines Company, in the progress of laying its lines of electric conductors, shall be prevented or obstructed from placing its wires in the spaces which may have been generally selected under the ordinance passed and approved as aforesaid, by manholes of sewer, gas, steam, or water-mains, or other underground or pavement impediments, now and heretofore existing, then and in such cases the said company may, under the privileges hereby granted, vary the space selected, by adopting, appropriating, and using equivalent and nearest practicable spaces as may be found necessary; and provided further, and it is hereby further

Resolved and ordained, That the connection vaults or test boxes aforesaid, may be extended under ground not more than four feet in depth or two feet in any lateral direction beyond the limited spaces contemplated for the lines of wires in the ordinance passed and approved as aforesaid, and may be fitted with covers or other means of access at the level of the pavements of the several streets and avenues.

Resolved, That in addition to the requirements and provisions to be observed, contained in the said ordinance, the said New York Electric Lines Company, as a further compensation for the opening and use of the streets of the city, shall pay into the City Treasury, within ten days after taking up the pavements, for each one thousand feet in length of trench to be excavated, the maximum sum or sums of money which have been, or which may hereafter be, required of grantees or licensees to be paid, under any general or special ordinance of the Common Council heretofore enacted, authorizing the laying of electric conductors under the streets of the city.

Resolved, That the permission to the said New York Electric Lines Company hereby intended by the Common Council is conditioned that the said company shall not transfer or dispose of the franchise hereby granted without the further authority of the Common Council, and that it will make no discrimination of individuals or corporations in the rental and use of its lines of wires which may be laid down hereunder.

Resolved, That the city shall have the option, after the first day of January, 1885, to require that the said New York Electric Lines Company shall pay into the City Treasury two per cent. of its gross receipts derived from the rental of its wires under the franchise hereby granted, in lieu of the donation to the city of the two wires in each line of conductors, as provided in the general ordinance passed and approved as aforesaid, and said option may be declared at any time after the said first day of January, 1885, by resolution of the Common Council.

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor :

DEAR SIR—Referring to your oral request for information as to the present state of the law in regard to laying wires underground, to be used by gas-light, telegraph, and telephone companies, I have to advise you as follows :

Chapter 265 of the Laws of 1848, as amended by chapter 471 of the Laws of 1853, authorized telegraph companies to erect and construct the necessary fixtures for lines of telegraph upon, over, or under any public road, street or highway in this State; and the consent of the local authorities was not necessary to authorize such construction.

Chapter 37 of the Laws of 1848, as amended by chapter 95 of the Laws of 1871, authorizes gas-light companies to lay conductors for conducting gas through the streets, lanes, alleys, squares, and highways in any city, village, or town of the State, with the consent of the municipal authorities of said city, village, or town, under such reasonable regulations as they may prescribe.

On December 11, 1878, an ordinance of the Common Council was passed, to regulate the laying of subterranean telegraph wires and electric conductors under the streets of this city; and permission was granted to certain persons named in the resolution to lay telegraph wires and electric conductors in accordance with the provisions of said ordinance. (See CITY RECORD, December 16, 1878.) The general provisions of this ordinance were afterwards included in the revision of the ordinance adopted in December, 1880, and are to be found at page 258. A special resolution was also passed in 1881, authorizing the Metropolitan Telegraph and Telephone Company to lay wires. (Proceedings of Common Council, Volume 49, page 406.) I believe a resolution was also passed authorizing the Western Union Telegraph Company to lay wires under ground, though I cannot state the date of such resolution at the present moment.

In 1879 another statute was passed (chapter 397), authorizing telegraph companies to lay lines of electrical conductors underground, in any city, village or town, provided, that the company should first obtain from the Common Council of cities, or the other authorities of towns and villages, permission to use the streets for such purpose, and a similar act was passed in the same year in relation to gas-light companies (chapter 512).

The present situation of the law, therefore, is that any telegraph company or gas-light company, incorporated under the laws of this State, can, with the consent of the Common Council, place wires underground for their respective purposes. If a special resolution authorizing this to be done in any particular case contained the terms and conditions under which the power could be exercised, of course this would be controlling; otherwise if a mere naked permission was given, the laying of the wires would have to be done pursuant to the provisions of the general ordinance above referred to.

It does not appear from the papers that you handed me, whether the so-called Electric Lines Company is incorporated as a telegraph company, or as a gas-light company. I think that there may be some question whether, without further legislation, such a company could be legally incorporated under the general law relating to telegraph companies or gas-light companies, or both, whose sole object was to lay wires underground, for the combined use of telegraph, telephone and gas-light companies. The authority for the incorporation of such a company is not expressly conferred by either of such general statutes, and there is some doubt if it exists.

From Lehigh Valley Railroad Co.—In reference to the measurement of dredged material. Secretary to reply thereto.

From George H. Jones—Requesting permission to place three fender piles on the outer corner of the easterly side of Pier 24, East river. Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had granted a permit therefor, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, his action was approved.

From Stephen H. Mills—Requesting permission to place ten fender piles on the easterly side of Pier 23, East river. Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had granted a permit therefor, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, his action was approved.

From Pennsylvania Railroad Co.—In reference to conferring with the Commissioners as to rental for Piers, old 4 and 5, North river.

From Homer Ramsdell Transportation Co.—Requesting permission to make repairs to Pier, old 35, North river. Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had granted a permit therefor, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, his action was approved.

Secretary directed to notify the lessees thereof to repair the same within ten days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work at their cost and expense.

5th. Reporting that the outer westerly corner of Pier 42, East river, required to be repaired. Secretary directed to notify the owners thereof to repair the same within ten days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work at their cost and expense.

6th. Reporting as to dredging required at the foot of Fourteenth street, East river. Secretary directed to notify the owner of the bulkhead south of Fourteenth street, East river, to dredge the same to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, within thirty days after service of notice, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the

work at his cost and expense. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make requisition for dredging at the foot of Fourteenth street, East river, to a depth of fifteen feet, and also to place thereat a mooring pile.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2940, that repairs had been made to the Pier at Little West Twelfth street, North river, at a cost of \$18.54. Treasurer directed to make bill therefor and collect from the lessee of pier.

A communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, in reference to extending the time for the closing of the contract for the purchase of wharf property on South street until April 18th proximo, at 12 o'clock noon, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following preamble and resolution unanimously adopted:

Whereas, This Board have heretofore, on December 4 and 27, 1882, entered into two several contracts for the purchase by the City of New York of certain bulkhead and wharf property situated on South street, in front of and extending from No. 40 to 55 South street, inclusive, together with all interest in Piers 12, 13, and 14, East river, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and it appearing by the communication from the Counsel to the Corporation that it is desired to extend the time for the closing of the said contract until April 18, 1883, at 12 o'clock noon, and the several owners of the said premises having consented thereto; therefore

Resolved, That the time for the closing of the said contracts be and is hereby postponed until April 18, 1883, at 12 o'clock noon, and the officers of this Board are hereby authorized and directed to execute in proper form such instrument in writing as may be necessary for that purpose, and to affix thereto the seal of this Department.

A communication from the Comptroller of the City, remitting the penalty imposed on John Kelly for delay in completing his contract for building a crib bulkhead, between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, North river, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following preamble and resolution, offered by the President, unanimously adopted:

Whereas, by virtue of the power vested in the Finance Department by section 31, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Comptroller has decided to remit the penalty imposed by this Department against John Kelly, for non-completion of work within the time agreed upon under his contract for building a crib bulkhead, from Seventy-eighth street to Seventy-ninth street, North river, dated June 16, 1882, and numbered 157, and for which there was deducted from audited claim No. 7615, on September 25, 1882, the sum of \$100; therefore

Resolved, That a requisition be and is hereby directed to be drawn upon the Comptroller for the sum of \$100, being the amount now due said John Kelly under said audited claim consequent upon the penalty being remitted, and that the Bookkeeper charge the amount to the said contract, so that the accounts of the Department shall exhibit Estimate No. 3 (final) under said contract as settled and paid in full in the sum of \$4,793.97.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief, on Secretary's Order No. 2563, submitting plans, specifications and form of contract for extending the sewer box under and through Pier, new 40, North river, at an estimated cost of \$1,500, was received, read and ordered on file, and the following resolution, in relation thereto unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the plans, specifications and form of contract, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for extending the sewer box under and through Pier, new 40, North river, be and are hereby approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms or proposals printed, and proper advertisements, inviting bids for doing the said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

The communication from John H. Starin, requesting permission to make repairs to Pier 19, North river, in accordance with the plans submitted therefor, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief in respect thereto, on Secretary's Order No. 2901, was ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Vanderpoel, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to John H. Starin to erect and construct on the platform in front of bulkhead north of Pier, old 19, North river, an additional story to the shed thereon erected, such additional story to be about fifty feet by fifty-five feet, and about ten feet in height, and constructed above the present roof of the said shed, in accordance with the plans submitted therefor, and hereby approved; provided, however, that the said structure be and remain only during the pleasure of this Board, and that the same is erected and constructed under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and further provided that the same be constructed subject to the regulations required by chapter 249, Laws of 1875.

The communication from John Chester requesting permission to erect a dumping-board at foot of Fifty-eighth street, North river, and the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2893, in relation thereto, were,

On motion, taken from the table and ordered on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to John Chester to erect and maintain at the pleasure of the Board a dump, to be located on land under water at the intersection of Twelfth avenue and Fifty-eighth street, North river, the same not to exceed 50 x 50 feet in size, and to be constructed under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, in accordance with plans herewith submitted and hereby approved and placed on file, provided that the said Chester shall cause, at his own cost and expense, the water leading and adjacent to said dump, to be at all times during the continuance of this permit sufficiently dredged, and shall pay to the City of New York an annual rental for the use of the land under water occupied for said dump the sum of \$365, payable quarterly in advance.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Department of Street Cleaning that about 1,000 loads of clean ashes will be received by this Department at foot of Twenty-fourth street, North river, the same to be received and deposited under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

PROPOSALS FOR ESTIMATES FOR FURNISHING the Gas or other illuminating material for and Lighting, Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing, and Maintaining the Public Lamps (and supplying Gas, etc., for new lamps when required) on the Streets, Avenues, Piers, Parks, and places in the City of New York, for the period of one year, commencing May 1, 1883, and ending April 30, 1884, both days inclusive.

Estimates for the above will be received at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, No. 31 Chambers street, in the City of New York, until 12 o'clock M. of Friday, April 6, 1883, at which place and time they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and read.

one mile from the place of manufacture) or other illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing, and painting lamp-posts and lanterns, and replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, cross heads, lamp irons, and lanterns thereto, for the period from May 1, 1883, to April 30, 1884, both days inclusive, stating the price, for the above named period of one year, for each lamp.

Bidders proposing to furnish electric lights must state the kind or system of light (whether the Voltaic Arc or Incandescent) they propose to furnish, and also whether the electric lamps are to be used on the ordinary lamp-posts of the city, or on special lamp-posts to be fitted up by the bidder without cost to the city for such lamp-posts or their fittings. If the light is to be by the Voltaic Arc, the bidder is to state the number of such lamps to be used for lighting the streets or district for which the bid is made and the diameter of the carbon electrodes to be used in such lamps.

Bidders are also required to state a price for which they will repair lamp-posts, including straightening and re-leading, and for each new lamp fitted up, as follows:

For each lamp-post straightened, stating the price per post.

For each column refitted, stating the price per post.

For each lamp-post removed, stating the price per post.

For each lamp-post reset, stating the price per post.

For each new lamp fitted up, stating the price per post.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The number of public lamps to be contracted for is about 24,000.

The burners for illuminating gas are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour under a pressure of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be oil or naphtha, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometrical test) equal to the light given by the gas-burners in use in the public lamps in the City of New York.

Should any alteration or any attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which estimates are made in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than gas, then such alteration shall be done and such attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the city.

The number of hours the gas or naphtha lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is 4,000, and electric lamps are to be kept lighted 3,818 hours.

The amount of security required is \$60,000 on all contracts which will amount to \$100,000 or more, and on smaller contracts the security shall be sixty per cent. of the total amount of the bid.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the National Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract.
