DR. JOHN T. NAGLE, Chief of Bureau of Municipal Statistics, No. 13 Park Row, Borough of Manhattan:

SIR—In response to your inquiry under date of the 29th instant, to be informed of the designation or title of certain medals which are annually presented to members of the Uniformed Force of this Department, to commemorate deeds of bravery and heroism on their part during the preceding year, I am directed by the Commissioner to state that there are three such medals: the Stephenson, established in 1867 by John Stephenson & Co., the railway car builders, and which is awarded annually to the captain of the most efficient and best disciplined company during the year preceding its award; the Bennett, originated in 1869 by the late James Gordon Bennett; and the Bonner, established in 1897 by a friend of the former Chief of the Department, Hugh Bonner.

The so-called William L. Strong medal was really never established. The first contribution of this character was made by the ex-Mayor in 1897, and in 1898 he repeated its purchase; but no fund has ever been established by him to be invested, the proceeds of which to be applied annually for the purchase of a medal. It therefore cannot be classed with those above enumerated, and in view of recent correspondence had on this subject, it was evidently never his intention to establish such a fund.

There was never a medal in the history of this Department known as the Rhinelander Medal.
