Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor of The City of New York :

SIR—Section 1085 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows :

"The board of education shall, between the first day of August and the thirtieth day of November in each year, make and transmit to the mayor of The City of New York a report in writing, bearing date on the thirty-first day of July next preceding, stating the whole number of schools within their jurisdiction, specially designating the schools for colored children ; the schools or societies from which reports shall have been made to the board of education, within the time limited for that purpose, the length of time such school shall have been kept open, the amount of public money apportioned or appropriated to said school or society, the number taught in each school, the whole amount of money drawn from the city chamberlain for the purposes of public education during the year ending at the date of their report, distinguishing the amount received from the general fund of the state and from all other sources ; the manner in which such moneys shall have been expended," etc.

In accordance with the provisions of this section, the Board of Education has the honor to transmit the following report, showing the operations of the Department of Education for the school year ending on this date.

In this connection it should be observed that the Department of Education of The City of New York did not come into existence until February 1, 1898; that the several school boards did not organize until the 9th of February, and the Board of Education not until the 21st of February. In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and in the Borough of Brooklyn, the School Boards are the former Boards of Education continued, and, consequently, there was no break in the continuity of administration. In the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, however, the School Boards took the place of a large number of boards of trustees, etc., having jurisdiction in the numerous school districts existing in these boroughs prior to consolidation. In these boroughs, therefore, it has not been found practicable to present statistics for the entire school year 1897-98.

By section 1101 of the Charter, the School Boards are required to make annual reports to the Board of Education "of such matters as the Board of Education may, by its by-laws or regulations, require."

In conformity with this section the Board of Education on October 26, 1898, adopted an amendment to its by-laws providing as follows :

"Each School Board shall, on or before the 31st day of July in each year, make and transmit to the Board of Education an annual report stating the whole number of schools within its jurisdiction during the school year then ending, specially designating the schools for colored children ; the number of teachers ; the number of pupils registered in each school and the average attendance ; the number of high schools and of training schools for teachers, with the number of teachers, the total register and average attendance at each, and the number graduated therefrom ; the number of evening schools, with the register of pupils and average attendance, specially designating the evening high schools ; the schools registered with the Regents of the University of the State of New York ; the number of centres at which free lectures for workingmen and workingwomen were given, the number of such lectures, and the total attendance at the same ; the corporate schools from which reports have been made to the Board of Education through the School Board, the number of teachers and the attendance at each such school, and the amount of money distributed to each ; the amount of the General School Fund apportioned for use within the jurisdiction of the School Board, and the manner in which it was expended ; and such recommendations, especially in respect to new school buildings and sites, as the School Board may see fit to make."

Full compliance with this provision is, of course, impossible for the last school year, and on his account, and for the reasons above set forth, the annual report of the Board of Education for the year ending July 31, 1898, is somewhat imperfect.

 2. Public School 29, Castleton Corners. Very little work was done on this contract before consolidation, and nothing has been done since. Effort has been made to have the contract set aside, as the building is absolutely not needed at this point.  
 The importance of speedily finishing the construction of school buildings under way, the completion of which has been interrupted by the bond limit complications, cannot be overestimated. The delays already chargeable to that cause will find school-houses that should have been ready for occupancy at the beginning of the next school year still far from completion, the consequence of which will be that accommodations that otherwise would have been available for children who will require them will not be ready. It is, therefore, urged that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take such steps as are possible under the law to provide the necessary funds for the completion, heating and furnishing of these buildings.  
 It is also respectfully recommended that steps be taken to make available funds that are necessary before the erection of school buildings can be begun on sites now in possession of the Board of Education.

The Commissioners of Estimate in quite a number of the proceedings hereinbefore enumerated, made application for extensions of time in which to make their report to the Court, for the reason that they were informed that the Comptroller was making an investigation into the financial condition of the city, and that until the result of said investigation was ascertained, it would be impossible to determine whether or not the proceedings could be carried on to completion and title taken by the city; the Corporation Counsel requested that the Commissioners defer making their report or proceeding further in the matter until such time as the Comptroller shall have completed his investigation and made his report thereon and the applications have been granted by the Court.

The subjoined reports from the several school boards set forth the operations of the Department of Education during the last school year, so far as is practicable at the present time.
