Hon. John H. Starin, Vice-President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

Dear Sir-Replying to your letter of May 27, 1907, in regard to transmission lines across Broadway, at or near Kingsbridge, and answering the two specific questions therein asked, I beg to say:

First—"By what authority your company claims the right to string wires over the rapid transit structure?"

(1) This company has the right, generally, to operate its road by electricity (subdivision 7, section 4 of the General Railroad Law).

(2) Section 4 of chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903 specifically authorizes the use of electricity as therein specified, and further prohibits this company from operating trains by steam locomotives in Park avenue after a date fixed. Proper compliance with the provisions of that act as a whole required the extension of electric operation to the point in question.

(3) Having the right to operate by electricity, and the wires in question being necessary and incident thereto, the company has the right to maintain them.

Second—"Whether there is any legal or insurmountable difficulty in placing the

- (1) I do not know whether, strictly speaking, there would be any legal or insurmountable difficulties in placing the wires underground. I am advised that the difficulties would be very great and would increase the dangers incident to the situation. The objections, from a standpoint of safety, to placing them underground being briefly stated as follows:
  - (a) Danger from lightning storms due to the fact that the aerial lines pass through lightning arrestors, thence to underground cables, produces an ele-ment of danger when grounding lightning discharges.

Possible explosions in manholes, which would be necessary underneath or adjacent to rapid transit structure, would be a source of danger thereto. (b)

(c) The Railroad Company has already granted rights to the Interborough Company to cross its right-of-way at this point with ducts and cables and their conduits are now in place. It would be necessary for the Railroad Company to either pass over or under these conduits and the complication thereby occasioned might be a source of danger.

(2) I am further advised that our Electrical Engineering Department has proposed a scheme which it is thought would meet any possible objection to the wires being placed overhead rather than underground. This scheme is illustrated on the three

placed overhead rather than underground. This scheme is illustrated on the three sheets herewith enclosed, numbers 1106-1, 2 and 3.

These drawings have been submitted to Mr. Hedley, General Manager, and Mr. Scott, Superintendent of Power, of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and to Mr. Latey, Consulting Electrical Engineer of the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, and our engineers have been led to believe that, in the opinion of these gentlemen, the proposed construction would be safe and satisfactory. A set of the drawings have also been submitted to Mr. Rice, Chief Engineer of your Board. I understand that he did not offer any engineering objection to the plan, but I do not know that he has expressed himself affirmatively on the subject.

I am, therefore, led to believe that if this proposed scheme were carried out, a greater degree of safety both to the operation of this company's trains and to those of the Rapid Transit Railroad, will be secured and I trust that the plan may meet with the approval of all interested.

Application of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company for Permission to Make Certain Deviations from the Plan and Profile Incorporated in the Certificate Dated October 9, 1902.

To the Honorable Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of

The petition of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company respectfully shows:

That under and pursuant to section 32 of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891 (commonly known as the Rapid Transit Act), as amended by chapter 584 of the Laws of 1902, the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York granted certain franchises to petitioner for the construction and operation of a tunnel railroad from a point under the Hudson river at the boundary line between the States of New York and New Jersey, thence under and across the Borough of Manhattan, of the City of New York, and under the East river to a point of intersection with the tracks of The Long Island Railroad Company, in the Borough of Queens, of said City.

That said franchises and the routes of said proposed railroad, as fixed and determined by the said Board, are particularly described in the certificate dated October 9, 1902, and executed by said Board on the 15th day of October, 1902, and in the plan and profile annexed thereto and incorporated therein.

That petitioner duly accepted said franchises and all the terms thereof and has complied with and performed all conditions precedent to the enjoyment and exercise

That petitioner is now and at all times since the granting of said certificate has been engaged in the prosecution of the work of construction of said railroad.

That in the course of the prosecution of said construction work it has developed that certain deviations from a strict compliance with the said plan and profile annexed to the said certificate of October 9, 1902, will be necessary for the proper completion of the proposed railroad. Said deviations are shown in detail on a map or profile hereto annexed, marked Exhibit A and made a part hereof. Said deviations from the said original plan and profile are in no respect inconsistent with any of the provisions or terms of the said certificate of October 9, 1902, and involve no new or additional encroachment or burden upon property not owned by petitioner, but will facilitate the completion of the railroad in conformity with the general plan adopted therefor.

Article VIII. of the said certificate of October 9, 1902, provides as follows:

The plan and profile of the railroad herewith attached are to be deemed a part of this franchise and to be construed with the text hereof. The same shall be substantially followed, but deviations therefrom not inconsistent with the other provisions hereof may be permitted by the Board."

Wherefore, Petitioner prays that the deviations from the said original plan and profile indicated in Exhibit A hereto annexed may receive the permission and approval of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, under and pursuant to said Article VIII. of the certificate of October 9, 1902.

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of your letter of yesterday's date, in which you enclose a letter of Arthur C. Fraser & Usina, "attorneys and experts in patent cases," in which they call attention to letters patent granted May 7, 1907, to Henry Blackman covering a system of ventilation for subways. They assert that the system is "used upon the New York Subway," and suggest compensation to Mr. Blackman for the use of his invention. They fail, however, to make any suggestions as to the amount of such compensation.

Mr. Rice, to whom you have referred this letter, writes, under date of June 4.

that the principles involved are not new.

It is obvious that the lawyers' letter is merely intended to be the basis for a suit, and it seems to me, from my examination of the patents, that such a suit could hardly succeed.

Under these circumstances I should think the proper course for the Rapid Transit Commission to take would be to direct a communication to Messrs. Arthur C. Section 79 of the Plumbing and Drainage Regulations is Amended to Read as Follows:

A FRESH-AIR INLET MUST EXTEND TO the outer air, and open into the side of a box not less than eighteen inches square, placed below the sidewalk at the curb. The bottom of the box must be eighteen inches below the underside of the fresh-air inlet pipe. The box may be of cast iron or it may be constructed with eight-inch walls of brick or flagstone laid in hydraulic cement. The box must be covered by a flagstone fitted with removable metal grating, leaded into the stone, having openings equal in area to the area of the fresh-air inlet, and not less than one-half inch in their least dimension. The fresh-air inlet must be of the same size as the drain up to four inches; for five-inch and six-inch drains it must not be less than four inches in diameter; for seven-inch and eight-inch drains not less than six inches in diameter, and for larger drains not less than eight inches in diameter, the removable portion of grate to be at least eight by twelve inches in area.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
