A resolution to acquire title for a public park to the property bounded by Bedford ave., Atlantic ave., Bedford place and Brevoort place, which, on motion of Alderman Coleman, was denied.

211. A resolution to regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks 5 feet in width on Fuller place, between Windsor place and Prospect ave., which, on motion of Alderman Campbell, was laid over.

212. A resolution to regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks 5 feet in width on Howard place, between Windsor place and Prospect ave., which, on motion of Alderman Campbell, was laid over.

107. A resolution to amend resolution of May 6, 1907, initiating proceedings to construct a sewer in President st., between Classon and Bedford aves., to read as follows: To construct a sewer in President st., from Classon ave. to Bedford ave., and to reconstruct sewer in Franklin ave., from President st. to a point about 85 feet south of President st., which, on motion of Alderman Coleman, was unanimously adopted.

A resolution to grade to the level of the curb all lots located in Block 1171, bounded by Plaza st., Butler place, Sterling place and Underhill ave. and St. Johns place, and lots known as Nos. 16, 17, 19, 21, 26, 31 and 37 in Block 1172, south of St. Johns place, between Plaza st. and Underhill ave., Alderman Campbell made a motion to adopt, Alderman Campbell made a further motion to reconsider same and the matter was laid over.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Fire Department of the City of New York, Office of The Commissioner, July 11, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor of New York, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith report of the operations and action of this Department for the quarter ending March 31, 1910.

#### Financial.

The budget appropriations made to the department in the various Boroughs for the year 1910 aggregated \$8,153,542.40, of which there was expended during the quarter the sum of \$1,748,608.94, leaving a balance available of \$6,404,933.46.

#### Uniformed Force.

On March 31, 1910, the uniformed force in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond consisted of 2,681 officers and men, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens of 1,694, an aggregate of 4,375. This included 4 Chaplains. At the end of the quarter there were 143 apparatus companies in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 112 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, 255 in all. In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, 58 appointments of fourth-grade Firemen were made, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens 34, a total of 92. There were 54 promotions in the uniformed force in the first three Boroughs, and 16 in the last two, a total of 70. There were retired on half pay 18 officers and men in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 14 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 32, and on one-third pay a Fire Marshal and an Engineer of Steamer in the first-mentioned Boroughs. One Deputy Chief in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was retired on \$2,500 per annum. The dismissals from the Department number 8 in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 1 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 9. The resignations were accepted of 6 Firemen in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 2 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 8. There were 6 deaths in the active force, 4 in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 2 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. The deaths on the retired and the relieved lists were 6. The number of cases of illness during the first quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was 360, and the time lost as the result thereof was 3,274 days. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens these figures were 177 and 2,485½, respectively. The total number of cases of illness and injury in all Boroughs was 537, and the time lost thereby was 6,759½ days. During the quarter 51 applicants were examined for appointment in the uniformed force and 2 rejected. There was a total of 25 officers and men examined as to their fitness to continue longer in the service, reports in regard to whom were forwarded to the Commissioner for his action. In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond 2,648 alarms of fire were received, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens 1,239, a total of 3,887.

#### Civilian Force.

The civilian force on March 31, 1910, numbered 386 in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 132 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 518.

The Bureau of Repairs and Supplies was established on January 7, 1910, with six divisions, namely, Purchasing, Requisition and Property Accountability, Fire Apparatus, Horses, Buildings and Stores. This Bureau was immediately placed in operation under the charge of a Deputy Chief of Department and with a working force detailed from other branches of the service. On January 4 and 6, 1910, respectively, the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances and the Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau were placed under the control of the Chief of Department, to be administered as separate organizations, as provided in section 727 of the Greater New York Charter.

#### Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau.

At the end of the quarter the underground system in the Borough of Manhattan consisted of 139.27 miles of cable in subways or 1,232.17 miles of conductor. Aerial cable to the amount of 4,905 feet was strung, of which 600 feet were for extending the system and 4,305 feet for alterations and repairs. In the Borough of The Bronx 7,050 feet of wire were strung for alterations and repairs, and 3,115 feet of aerial cable for a like purpose. In the Borough of Richmond 5,074 feet of wire and 1,100 feet of aerial cable was strung for alterations and repairs. In the Borough of Brooklyn 1,102¼ miles of electrical cable are in operation. During the quarter 60,000 feet of wire were used for extension to the lines and 22,465 feet of wire were used for repairs. In the Borough of Queens 26,075 feet of wire were used for repairs.

#### Fire Prevention.

During the quarter ending March 31, 1910, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond 1,183 inspections were made of office buildings and 121 at the request of the Police Department and Bureau of Licenses of premises having theatrical, concert and common show licenses, and 3,355 inspections of theatres, making the total number of inspections in these Boroughs 4,659. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens these inspections numbered 15, 173 and 687, respectively, a total of 875. The total number of inspections in all Boroughs was 5,534.

#### Fires.

The total number of fires during the first quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was 2,418, with a total estimated loss of \$2,047,023 and an average loss per fire of \$846.58. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens the number of fires for the first quarter was 1,241, with a total estimated loss of \$589,600 and an average loss per fire of \$475.10. The aggregate number of fires in all Boroughs was 3,659, with a total estimated loss of \$2,636,623.

#### Combustibles and Explosives.

The receipts for licenses, permits and penalties for the first quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond were \$15,914, and in the Boroughs



of Brooklyn and Queens \$11,572, a total of \$27,486. Special surveys to the number of 11,861 were made in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustibles or explosive material, including investigation of complaints, etc., and 1,823 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 13,684. In the first three Boroughs 119 special surveys were made of places of amusement and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens 35, a total of 154 in all Boroughs. In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond 12,287 blasting operations were supervised.

#### Fire Apparatus, Etc.

During the quarter there were received two 75-foot aerial hook and ladder trucks for use in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, respectively, and two 65-foot aerial hook and ladder trucks for use in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. Fifty-five lengths of 2½-inch rubber fire hose were received for use of volunteer fire companies in the Borough of Queens. At the Repair Shops in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn considerable miscellaneous repair work was done.

#### Buildings.

During the quarter a new house for Hook and Ladder Co. 40, Manhattan, was completed; also additions and alterations to quarters of Engine Co. 56, Hook and Ladder Cos. 4 and 14, Repair Shops and Eldridge St. Storehouse, in the same Borough. Work was in progress on annex to Headquarters and to main building and on contracts for additions and alterations to quarters of Engine Co. 12, in the same Borough; 52 and 75, The Bronx, and Engine Co. 201 and Hook and Ladder Co. 101, Richmond. Also on new buildings for an engine and hook and ladder company on White Plains road, The Bronx, and to steam-heating systems at Repair Shops, Manhattan, and at various company quarters in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. In the Borough of Brooklyn contracts were completed for additions and alterations to quarters of Engine Co. 140 and to steam-heating work at various quarters. Repairs and replacements were completed at quarters of Engine Cos. 108, 124, 142, Hook and Ladder Co. 53 and Hook and Ladder Co. 69 and Engine Co. 151. Work was in progress during the quarter on new combination house on E. 14th st. and Kings Highway and on additions and alterations to quarters of Engine Cos. 111 and 115, Brooklyn. New building for Engine Co. 163 and Hook and Ladder Co. 67, in Long Island City, Borough of Queens, is practically completed. Plans and specifications have been prepared and await advertisement for new house at southeast corner of Smith and Lorraine sts., Brooklyn, and are in course of preparation for new buildings at St. Johns place and Classon ave., 12th ave. near 42d st. and Knickerbocker ave. near Palmetto st., in the same Borough. Plans and specifications have been prepared and in part executed for minor repairs to 18 apparatus houses in the Borough of Brooklyn and 8 in the Borough of Queens, a total of 26. Repairs were made by department mechanics to 38 department buildings in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

#### Horses.

At the close of the quarter there were 829 horses in service in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond and 668 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 1,497.

#### Contracts.

Contracts executed during the first quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond call for an expenditure of \$104,200 and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens of \$79,042.74, a total of \$183,242.74. Contracts awarded but which had not been executed at the close of the quarter amounted in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond to \$36,869 and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to \$30,483.25, a total of \$67,352.25. #### Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1910.

Hon. Rhinelander Waldo on January 3, 1910, was appointed by his Honor the Mayor as Fire Commissioner, in succession to Hon. Nicholas J. Hayes, and assumed charge of the Department on said date. Hon. Joseph Johnson, Jr., on January 21, 1910, was appointed Deputy Fire Commissioner, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, in place of Hon. Patrick A. Whitney, resigned. Hon. Arthur J. O'Keefe on January 4, 1910, was appointed Deputy Fire Commissioner, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, in place of Hon. Charles C. Wise, resigned. Mr. Winfield R. Sheehan on January 6, 1910, was appointed Secretary to the Fire Commissioner, in place of Mark Levy, resigned. Mr. Walter J. Nolan on January 11, 1910, was appointed Secretary to the Deputy Fire Commissioner, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, in place of George F. Dobson, resigned.

The following, among other general orders, were issued by the Fire Commissioner: On January 4, 1910, directing the Chief of Department, in addition to his other duties, to assume control of the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances, the same to be administered as a separate organization, as provided in section 727 of the Greater New York Charter. On January 6, 1910, directing the Chief of Department, in addition to his other duties, to assume control of the Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau, the same to be administered as a separate organization as provided in section 727 of the Greater New York Charter. On January 7, 1910, establishing the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies, consisting of six divisions, to wit: 1st, Purchasing Division; 2d, Division of Requisition and Property Accountability; 3d, Fire Apparatus; 4th, Horses, 5th, Buildings; 6th, Stores, and defining the duties of each. This bureau was immediately placed in operation by the detail of a working force from other branches of the service.

#### Personnel, Etc.

##### Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond.

On March 31, 1910, the active personnel of the Department in these Boroughs numbered 3,067, the uniformed force comprising 2,679 members and 2 Chaplains, assigned with the exception of 42 chief officers to the 143 companies of the 22 battalions. The companies are classified as follows: Engine companies, 89; hook and ladder companies, 45; hose companies, 1; marine engine companies (fireboats), 8; total, 143. Of the above companies, six are known as combination companies, each equipped with an engine and hook and ladder truck and hose wagon. Ten of the engines and nine of the hook and ladder companies are known as double companies, provided with two sets of apparatus, one of which remains in quarters while the other is absent in response to an alarm. Three of the engine companies are known as high-pressure companies, two of them each supplied with two high-pressure hose wagons (one an automobile hose wagon) and the third with two high-pressure hose wagons in addition to an engine and an ordinary hose wagon. One of the engine companies and two of the hook and ladder companies have each a water tower assigned to them. One engine company and one hook and ladder company are each equipped with a searchlight engine.

##### Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

On March 31, 1910, the active personnel of the Department in these Boroughs numbered 1,826, the uniformed force comprising 1,692 members and 2 Chaplains, assigned, with the exception of 35 chief officers, to the 112 companies of the 20 battalions. The companies are classified as follows: Engine companies, 73; marine engine companies (fireboats), 2; hook and ladder companies, 30; hose companies, 7; total, 112. Of the above companies 12 are known as combination companies, each equipped with an engine, hose wagon and hook and ladder truck. Three of the engine companies are known as double companies, one equipped with two engines, two hose wagons and one hook and ladder truck, and two each equipped with two engines and two hose wagons. One of the single engine companies is equipped with a chemical engine and one with a searchlight engine. One of the hook and ladder trucks has a water tower assigned to it.

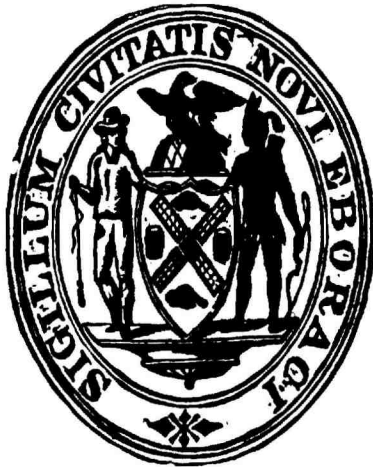

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
