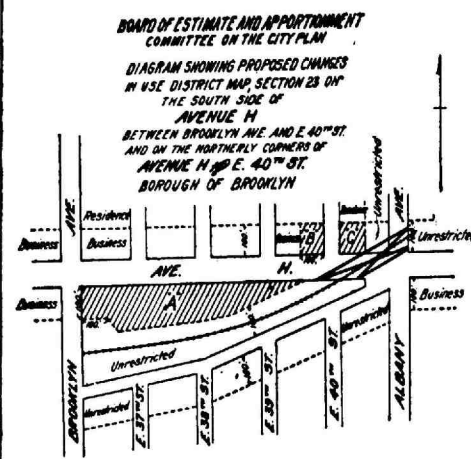

IN USE DISTRICT MAP SECTION 13 ON

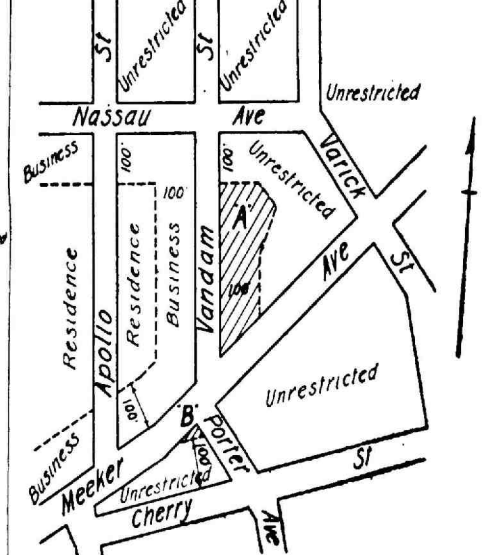

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Thursday, September 21, 1916.

Present at Roll Call—Frank L. Dowling, President, Board of Aldermen; Albert E. Hadlock, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Edward F. Barrett, Deputy and Acting Chamberlain; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

His honor the Mayor arrived later. See note.

The Minutes of the meeting held September 14, 1916, were approved as printed.

Dock Department—Amendment to Resolution Consenting to the Subletting by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey to the United Fruit Company, of Pier New 9, North River, Together with Adjoining Bulkheads.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Requesting Amendment to Resolution.

Pier A, North River, September 6, 1916.

Honorable JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held August 3, 1916, a resolution was adopted approving of the action of the Commissioner of Docks in consenting to the subletting by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey to the United Fruit Company of Pier New 9, North River, together with the

adjoining bulkheads, and more particularly described as parcels "B" and "D" in the lease from the City to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company dated January 13, 1914.

In the lease made by The City of New York to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, dated January 13, 1914, as modified by an agreement dated March 14, 1914, duly approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the property involved is referred to as follows:

Parcel "A," Pier 8, North River.

Parcel "B," Pier 9, North River.

Parcel "C," Bulkhead beginning at the centre line of the slip between Piers 8 and 9 and extending southerly a distance of 203.52 feet.

Parcel "D," Bulkhead beginning at the centre line of the slip between Piers 8 and 9, extending northerly a distance of 256.73 feet.

These figures are as shown on the survey sheets of this Department.

On November 14, 1914, the Commissioner of Docks consented to the assignment by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey of all its right, title and interest in the following described property, to wit:

"Pier New 9, North River, the northerly 256.84 feet of the bulkhead described in said lease as parcels "C" and "D," together with the sheds on said pier and bulkhead and on the marginal wharf, street or place extending inshore a distance of 50 feet from said bulkhead when said piers, bulkheads and sheds shall be completed."

In the agreement dated October 23, 1914, between the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company and the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey providing for the assignment of this property the description above quoted is followed and the bulkhead assigned is described as:

"The northerly 256.84 feet of the bulkhead described in said lease as Parcels 'C' and 'D'."

In view of the fact that the assignment from the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey and the consent thereto has already been acted upon and forms to a certain extent a link in the company's chain of leasehold title to the premises in question and will also form one in that of the United Fruit Company, the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey requests that the consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of August 3, 1916, should follow the consent of the Commissioner of Docks of November 24, 1914, above quoted.

There is a difference of only one or two inches involved but in view of the long period of the lease and the assignment and subletting, etc., I beg to request that the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of August 3, 1916, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the action of the Commissioner of Docks in consenting to the subletting by the Central Railroad of New Jersey to the United Fruit Company of:

"Pier New 9, North River, the northerly 256.84 feet of the bulkhead described as parcels 'C' and 'D' in the lease from the City to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company dated January 13, 1914, and modified by supplemental agreement dated March 14, 1914, together with the sheds on said pier and bulkhead and on the marginal wharf, street or place, extending inshore a distance of 50 feet from said bulkhead."

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held August 3rd, 1916, approving of the action of the Commissioner of Docks in consenting to the subletting by the Central Railroad of New Jersey to the United Fruit Company, of Pier New 9, North River, together with adjoining bulkheads, and more particularly described as parcels B and D in the lease from the City to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, dated January 13, 1914, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the action of the Commissioner of Docks in consenting to the subletting by the Central Railroad of New Jersey to the United Fruit Company of 'Pier new 9, North River, the northerly 256.84 feet of the bulkhead described as Parcels "C" and "D" in the lease from the City to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, dated January 13, 1914, and modified by supplemental agreement dated March 14, 1914, together with the sheds on said pier and bulkhead and on the marginal wharf, street or place, extending inshore a distance of 50 feet from said bulkhead."

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Armory Board—Lease for, of Premises at No. 60 Gerry St., Nos. 23-25 Bartlett Street, and 191-203 Harrison Street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

September 18, 1916.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication from the Armory Board to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requesting a lease of property known as 60 Gerry Street, 191-203 Harrison Avenue and 23-25 Bartlett Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of five years from September 15, 1916, for the use of the Fifteenth Infantry, N. G., N. Y.

These premises consist of a plot of ground with a frontage of 150 feet on Harrison Avenue, 50 feet on Bartlett Street and 25 by 100 feet on Gerry Street, together with the buildings and improvements thereon. The owner is to pay taxes, and the City is to pay for water used, furnish heat, light and janitor service, and make such inside and outside repairs as it may deem necessary.

The original rental of these premises was \$8,000 per annum, but after negotiations, I have been able to obtain the same for \$5,700 per annum.

I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease from Abraham Rosenberg, of premises known as 60 Gerry Street, 191-203 Harrison Avenue and 23-25 Bartlett Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of five years from September 15, 1916, for use of the Armory Board, at an annual rental of \$5,700, payable monthly; the lessor to pay taxes; the City to pay for water used and to make such inside and outside repairs as it may deem necessary, and to furnish heat, light and janitor service.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from Abraham Rosenberg, of the premises known as 60 Gerry Street, 191-203 Harrison Avenue and 23-25 Bartlett Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use as an Armory for the Fifteenth Infantry, N. G., N. Y., for a period of five years from September 15, 1916, at an annual rental of five thousand seven hundred dollars (\$5,700), payable monthly; the lessor to pay taxes; the lessee to pay for water used and make such inside and outside repairs as it may deem necessary, and to furnish heat, light and janitor service; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Gentlemen—On November 1, 1916, there will become due Eleven million seven hundred and ninety-six thousand seven hundred and fourteen and 32-100 Dollars of Bonds and Stock of The City of New York, as constituted prior to January 1, 1898, of which Seven million four hundred and eighty-two thousand eight hundred and ninety-two and 91-100 Dollars of said Bonds and Stock are held by the Public, and payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 1; the balance, Four million three hundred and thirteen thousand eight hundred and twenty-one and 41-100 Dollars, held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the

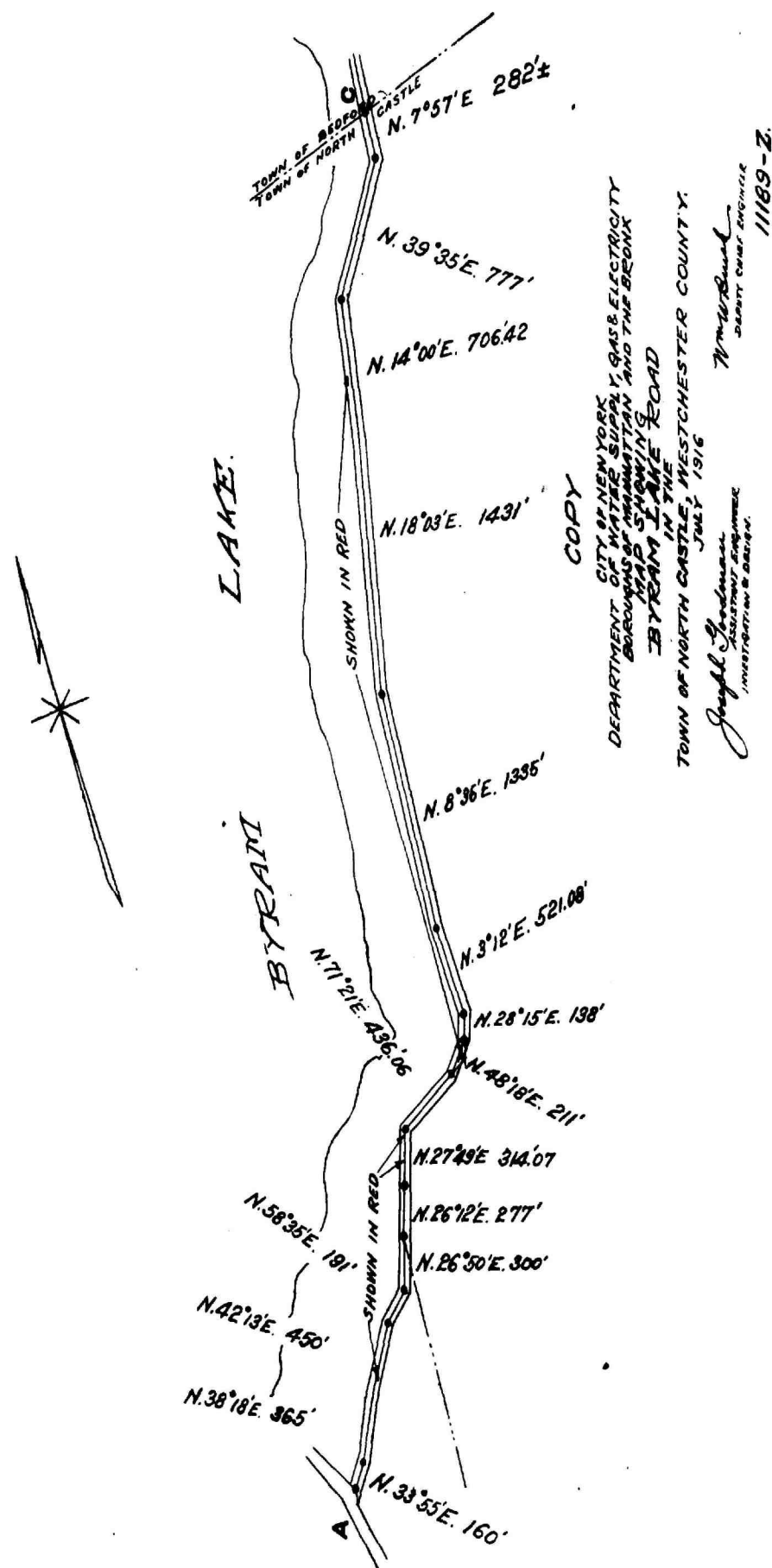

Greenpoint Methodist Episcopal Church (Tabernacle).
Trustees of the First Methodist Episcopal Church of Newtown.

Note—These matters, which were favorably reported on by the Comptroller, were Nos. 12, 13, 14 and 15 on the calendar.

They received the affirmative vote of all the members present (four votes), and failed of adoption for the reason that they require a unanimous vote of the full Board (5 votes).

They will be put on the calendar of the next meeting in order that they may receive the necessary number of votes for adoption.

The Following Matters, Not on the Calendar, Were Brought Up by Unanimous Consent.

Exchange of Property Owned by the City at the Southeast Corner of Thompson Avenue and Court Street, Borough of Queens, for Property at the Southwest Corner of Vernon Avenue and Sanford Street, Borough of Queens.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

September 21, 1916.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On July 13, 1916, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized an exchange of certain parcels of land owned by the City located in the Borough of Queens for property needed for an addition to Rainey Park. Since then I have ascertained that at the time the resolution was adopted the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had not authorized an addition to this park.

Subsequently the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a map showing the proposed addition to Rainey Park.

I think the appraisals and the exchange should be made in accordance with this map, and that the same appraisers appointed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 13, 1916, should be employed so as to avoid any additional expense in the transaction.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 13, 1916, and July 13, 1916, respectively, be rescinded, and that in place thereof the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution appointing Wallace J. Hardgrove, residing at Elmhurst, Borough of Queens; George E. Payne, residing at No. 251 Nott Avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, and George J. Ryan, residing at No. 236 Lincoln Street, Flushing, Borough of Queens, three discreet and disinterested appraisers, to appraise all that certain parcel of land owned by private owners, lying within Vernon Avenue, Sanford Street, the East River and the northerly boundary line of Rainey Park, Borough of Queens, as shown on a map entitled "Map showing the Proposed Addition to Rainey Park," adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 15, 1916, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners thereof in and to Sanford Street and Vernon Avenue and the East River in front of and adjacent to said premises, and also all riparian rights in said East River; and also to appraise all that certain piece or parcel of land, situate, lying and being in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, owned by The City of New York, and bounded and described as follows, which it is proposed to exchange for the above described property:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the southerly line of Thomson Avenue and the easterly line of Court Street; running thence easterly and along the southerly line of Thomson Avenue 531.04 feet, more or less, to the northerly line of the right of way of the Long Island Railroad Company; thence running westerly and along said right of way of the Long Island Railroad Company 380 feet to the easterly line of Court Street; running thence northerly and along the easterly line of Court Street 400 feet to the point or place of beginning; being premises shown on the Tax Maps of The City of New York, Borough of Queens, as Ward 1, Block 82, Lot 1, and Ward 1, Block 195, Lot 7.

Respectfully, ALBERT E. HADLOCK, Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held July 13, 1916, authorizing, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, an exchange of property owned by the City of New York at the southeasterly corner of Thomson Avenue and Court Street, Borough of Queens, for property owned by James S. Herrman at the southwest corner of Vernon Avenue and Sanford Street, in the Borough of Queens, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deem it for the interest of the City to authorize an exchange of the following property owned by the City of New York for the land owned by private owners; therefore be it

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of Section 205A of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby determine that the land owned by the City of New York, described as follows, is not required for departmental or public purposes:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the southerly line of Thomson Avenue and the easterly line of Court Street; running thence easterly and along the southerly line of Thomson Avenue 531.04 feet, more or less, to the northerly line of the right of way of the Long Island Railroad Company; thence running westerly and along said right of way of the Long Island Railroad Company 380 feet to the easterly line of Court Street; running thence northerly and along the easterly line of Court Street 400 feet to the point or place of beginning; being premises shown on the Tax Maps of the City of New York, Borough of Queens, as Ward 1, Block 82, Lot 1, and Ward 1, Block 195, Lot 7, and they further determine that the land of private owners hereinafter described is needed for public purposes:

All that certain parcel of land lying within Vernon Avenue, Sanford Street, the East River and the northerly boundary line of Rainey Park, Borough of Queens, as shown on a map entitled "Map showing the proposed addition to Rainey Park," adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 15, 1916, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners thereof in and to Sanford Street and Vernon Avenue and the East River in front of and adjacent to said premises, and also all riparian rights in said East River;

—and be it further

Resolved, That to determine the value of the land of the City of New York and the value of the land of private owners to be exchanged therefor, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby appoint Wallace J. Hardgrove, residing at Elmhurst, Borough of Queens; George E. Payne, residing at No. 251 Nott Avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, and George J. Ryan, residing at No. 236 Lincoln Street, Flushing, Borough of Queens, three discreet and disinterested appraisers, residing value of the land owned by the City of New York and the land owned by private in the Borough of Queens, who are hereby authorized and directed to appraise the owners which it is proposed to exchange and are both hereinabove described.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Sale at Public Auction of the Lease of Premises at the Northeast Corner of Underhill Avenue and Park Place, Borough of Brooklyn.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

September 21, 1916.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication requesting a lease of premises at the northeast corner of Underhill Avenue and Park Place, Borough of Brooklyn, owned by the City, having a frontage of 70 feet on the east side of Underhill Avenue and a depth of 150 feet on Park Place.

These premises were turned over by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on May 6, 1910.

The fair rental value of these premises is, in my opinion, \$1,000 per annum, and I think any lease thereof should expire on October 1st, which is the most advantageous date for renting property.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt the attached resolution. Respectfully,

Whereas, The Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity having turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as no longer required the premises hereinafter described, it is

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby authorize and order a sale for the highest marketable price or rental by public auction of the lease of the premises belonging to The City of New York, situated on the northeast corner of Underhill Avenue and Park Place, Borough of Brooklyn, having a frontage of 70 feet on the east side of Underhill Avenue and a depth of 150 feet on and parallel to Park Place, for a period from December 1, 1916, to October 1, 1919.

The minimum or upset rental at which said lease shall be sold be and is hereby appraised and fixed at the sum of One thousand dollars (\$1,000) per annum, payable quarterly in advance, and the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to

take the necessary steps for conducting such sale upon the following terms and conditions:

The highest bidder will be required to pay 25 per cent. of the amount of the yearly rental at the time and place of sale; the amount so paid shall be forfeited if the successful bidder does not execute the lease when notified that it is ready for execution.

No person shall be received as lessee who is a delinquent on any former lease from the corporation, and no bid shall be accepted from any person who is in arrears to the corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise upon any obligation to the corporation, as provided by law.

The lease will be in the usual form of leases of like property and will contain, in addition to other terms, covenants and conditions, as follows:

1. A clause providing that the lessee shall pay the usual rates for water, per meter measurement, and comply with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

2. A clause providing that the lessee shall not make any improvements on the property except with the consent and approval of the Comptroller.

3. A clause providing that all improvements placed upon the said property shall revert to The City of New York upon the termination of the lease.

4. A clause providing that the lessee shall keep the grounds around the house in a condition at least equivalent to their present state.

5. A clause providing that the lessee shall make all necessary repairs at his own cost and expense and comply with all the rules and regulations of the Health, Police and Fire Departments of The City of New York.

6. A clause providing that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall furnish the lessee with the necessary amount of heat from the pumping station adjoining.

The Comptroller shall have the right to reject any and all bids if deemed to be to the interest of The City of New York.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Dock Department—Request of, for Authority to Approve of the Assignment by the American Malting Company to George Ehret of a Lease of Bulkhead Property Between East 63rd and East 64th Street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Assignment of Lease.

Pier A, North River, September 20, 1916.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—Under date of August 28, 1916, this Department transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a communication requesting authority for the assignment of the lease from the American Malting Company to George Ehret of the bulkhead between East 63d and East 64th streets.

At the meeting of the Commission held September 14th I requested the withdrawal of this communication for the reason that the upland property owned by the American Malting Company was purchased by George Ehret, provided an assignment of the lease of the waterfront could be obtained from the City and, as the present lease expires December 31, 1919, and the bulkhead in question was essential to carrying on the business, my intention was to negotiate with the new owner for a longer term lease at an advanced rental.

Owing to the conditions of the terms of sale between the two parties, however, I found this to be impracticable, and that it was necessary to consent first to the assignment of the present lease and then for the surrender of the existing lease simultaneously with the making of a longer lease at an advanced rental to the new owner. I also obtained a check for a thousand dollars to be applied on the rental of the new lease when granted.

As soon as the existing lease is surrendered with the understanding that a new lease is to be granted I will forward the usual recommendation to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Very truly yours,

The Commissioner of Docks appeared before the Board and was heard in regard to the matter.

The following resolution was then offered for adoption.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks be and is hereby authorized to approve of an assignment or subletting by the American Malting Company to George Ehret, of the lease of the bulkhead property between 63d and 64th Streets, East River, Borough of Manhattan, authorized by resolution of this Board October 9, 1912, and dated November 11, 1912.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Dock Department—New Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront at Foot of Main Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks transmitting for approval proposed new plan for improvement of the waterfront at the foot of Main Street, Borough of Brooklyn, made and adopted in accordance with law September 19, 1916.

A public hearing being necessary the following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Thursday, October 19, 1916, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the proposed new plan for improvement of the waterfront at the foot of Main Street, Borough of Brooklyn, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks September 19, 1916.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Note—At this point his Honor the Mayor arrived, and the following matter on the Calendar, held over pending his arrival, was then considered:

Fort Lee Ferry—In the Matter of the Proposed Reduction of Passenger Fare.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, September 11, 1916.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—In the matter of reduction of passenger fare on the Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry:

Under date of June 10, 1914, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioner of Docks to negotiate with the lessees of the Fort Lee Ferry Company with a view to securing an agreement for the modification of the lease to that Company,

*** "which will not involve a financial disadvantage to the City and will at the same time bring about a reduction of the present ferry rate of five cents per person to three cents per person, or the equivalent thereof, in the interest of the great number of residents of the City whose benefit by such change will at once become a municipal benefit."

June 24, 1914, I reported to your Board I was unable to negotiate any agreement along the lines indicated by the Board's resolution.

Prior to the passage of your resolution of June 10, 1914, the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Bergen, New Jersey, passed a resolution to reduce the fare for passengers from 5 cents to 3 cents for adults and 2 cents for children under ten years of age.

An injunction was obtained against the enforcement of this resolution, which is still in force. The Corporation Counsel joined in the request that the bill be made permanent.

On May 5, 1915, your Board passed a further resolution directing,

"That the Commissioner of Docks * * * again take the matter up with the Ferry Company and make a second attempt to bring about the desired modification of the agreement."

Since that time there have been a number of conferences between the Ferry Company and the Board of Chosen Freeholders, which have resulted in the submission to me of a joint letter, signed by the General Counsel of the Ferry Company and the Counsel of the Board of Chosen Freeholders of Bergen County, in which they advise that a compromise has been reached in this matter, the Company agreeing to issue a 50-trip ticket or book of tickets for \$1.75, good during the calendar month—but not good on Sundays or holidays—the entire agreement subject to the consent of the City of New York. Copy of this communication is attached marked "A."

In the communication of the Ferry Company to the Board of Chosen Freeholders submitting the proposed compromise (copy attached marked "B") the Ferry Company states that in making the suggestion for a reduction in rates, as indicated, it does not admit or recognize the power of the Board of Chosen Freeholders of Bergen County to fix or alter rates; and that the reduction will only be put into effect:

"1st. After obtaining the consent of the City of New York to the change in the rate.

"2nd. After obtaining consent or an order from the District Court of the United States for the Southern District of New York in the case now pending in that court, to the satisfaction of all parties thereto and such further order in connection with such case as the parties may agree upon."

To ascertain the effect of the proposed rate upon the City's revenues I requested the Company to furnish me with a statement showing the passenger traffic over the ferry for a specified period, and received in reply a tabulation showing by actual count at the 130th street, Manhattan and Fort Lee terminals the number of passengers carried during a six-day period in November, 1914; this is presumably the latest available data. Copy of this statement is attached marked "C."

It shows the average number of passengers daily to Manhattan during this period to have been 5,973; from Manhattan to Fort Lee, 6,241. It is difficult to say just what proportion of this daily traffic would be benefited by a commutation rate, but for the purpose of estimating the yearly loss from such a rate I have taken as a basis the passengers carried between 5 and 10 a. m.

The lease to the Ferry Company provides that rental shall be as follows:

When gross receipts are less than \$350,000, 5 per cent.; when gross receipts are between \$350,000 and \$400,000, 5 1/2 per cent.; when gross receipts are between \$400,000 and \$450,000, 6 1/2 per cent.; when gross receipts are over \$450,000, 7 1/2 per cent.

The gross receipts for the year ending July 1, 1915, were..... \$374,433 00

Of which the City received 5 1/2 per cent., or..... 20,593 81

The gross receipts for the year ending July 1, 1916, were..... 410,340 01

Of which the City received 6 1/2 per cent., or..... 26,672 10

There has undoubtedly been an increase in the daily passenger traffic since 1914, but assuming the loss in gross receipts to have been \$18,000, due to the commutation rate, the gross receipts reported for the year ending June 30th last would have been reduced below \$400,000, which would have meant a loss in revenue to the City of over \$5,000 last year.

I might also call attention to the fact that the rental received is less than that which would be exacted if the premises were used for commercial purposes.

I am submitting the matter to your Board without recommendation for such action as you deem proper in the premises.

The Commissioner of Docks, a representative of the Board of Chosen Freeholders of Bergen County, New Jersey, and Alderman Henry H. Curran were heard in regard to the matter.

It was the sense of the Board that the Commissioner of Docks should continue his negotiations with the Company with a view of settling the matter in a way which will not involve a monetary loss to the City.

The matter was then laid over until the next meeting.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, August 30, 1916, at 10:30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Alexander Keogh and Darwin R. James, Jr., Commissioners.

The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the adoption of the following proposed resolution:

Whereas, Clause 6 of Rule XVII of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York provides that "the positions of Engineer of Steamer and Pilot, in Grade 1 of the Fire Service, shall be filled by special competitive examination, open to all firemen of the first grade, as defined by Section 740 of the City Charter"; and

Whereas, It appears that at this time there are but two firemen of the first grade as defined by Section 740 of the City Charter who hold masters' and pilots' licenses with sufficient tonnage to take charge of fire boats of the Fire Department; and

Whereas, There is urgent necessity for the establishment of an eligible list for promotion to Pilot containing as many names as will probably be needed to meet emergencies of the service of the Fire Department; therefore be it

Resolved, That, with the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XVII be waived and that firemen of the second grade, as defined by Section 740 of the City Charter, who hold masters' and pilots' licenses with sufficient tonnage to take charge of the fire boats of the Fire Department, be declared eligible to enter the special competitive examination ordered for the position of pilot by the Municipal Civil Service Commission on July 19, 1916.

There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the following proposed amendments to the Municipal Civil Service Rules and Classification:

1. Amending paragraph 3 of Rule IV, to read as follows:

"3. The Competitive Class, the Non-Competitive Class and the Labor Class shall be subdivided, for the purpose of these rules, as hereinafter provided."

2. Amending paragraph 3 of Rule XVIII, to read as follows:

"3. A vacancy in any position in Part II of said class, the incumbent of which is employed at an institution at a compensation not exceeding the limit, if any, set in the classification for such position, may be filled by the appointment of any person who upon nomination by the appointing officer and upon proper non-competitive examination shall be certified by the institutional examiner to be qualified to perform duties of such position. A vacancy in any position in Part II of such class, the incumbent of which is employed in the central office of the department or in a detached bureau of the department outside an institution, may be filled in a similar manner, except that the non-competitive examination therefor shall be conducted by the Board of Examiners. In any department or institution having a number of such employees in the same class of work, the appointing officer, in order to provide a list permitting of immediate selection in case of necessity, may nominate for examination more than one person."

3. Amending Rule XVIII by adding thereto the following paragraphs:

"11. Whenever there is a vacancy in a position in Part I of the non-competitive class, the head of department shall nominate a person to the Commission for non-competitive examination on a form provided by the Commission and if such nominee is certified by the Commission as qualified after such examination, he may be appointed permanently to fill such vacancy.

"12. Whenever there is a vacancy of an emergency character in a position in Part I of the non-competitive class and it is not practicable to fill the position in the manner provided by clause 11 of this rule, an appointment may be made without certification or examination, subject to subsequent approval of the Commission, for a period not exceeding fifteen days, and such appointment may be renewed for only one additional period of fifteen days, subject, however, to the approval of the Commission."

4. Amending the Classification by striking therefrom all positions appearing under the heading "The Non-Competitive Class," and substituting therefor the following:

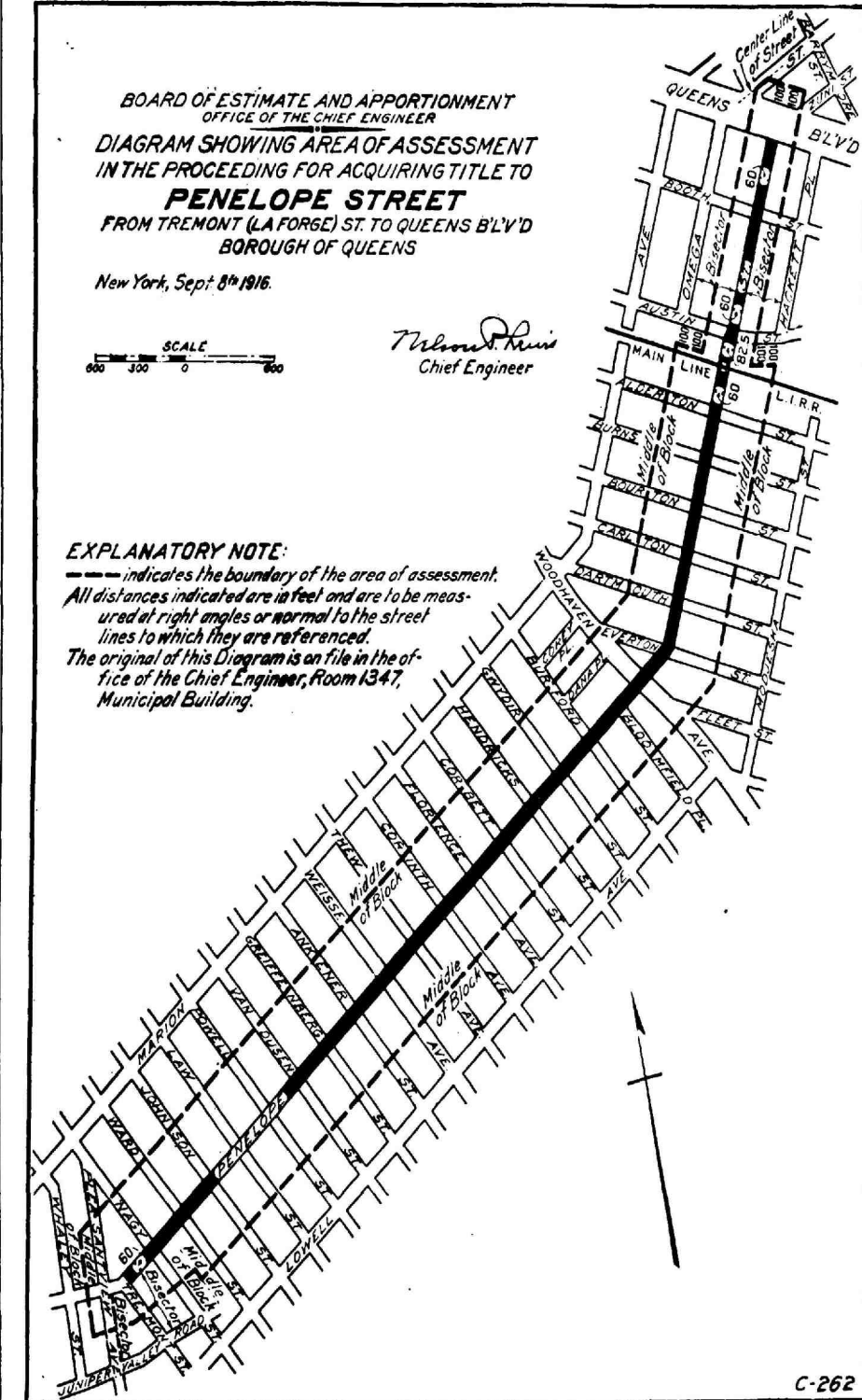

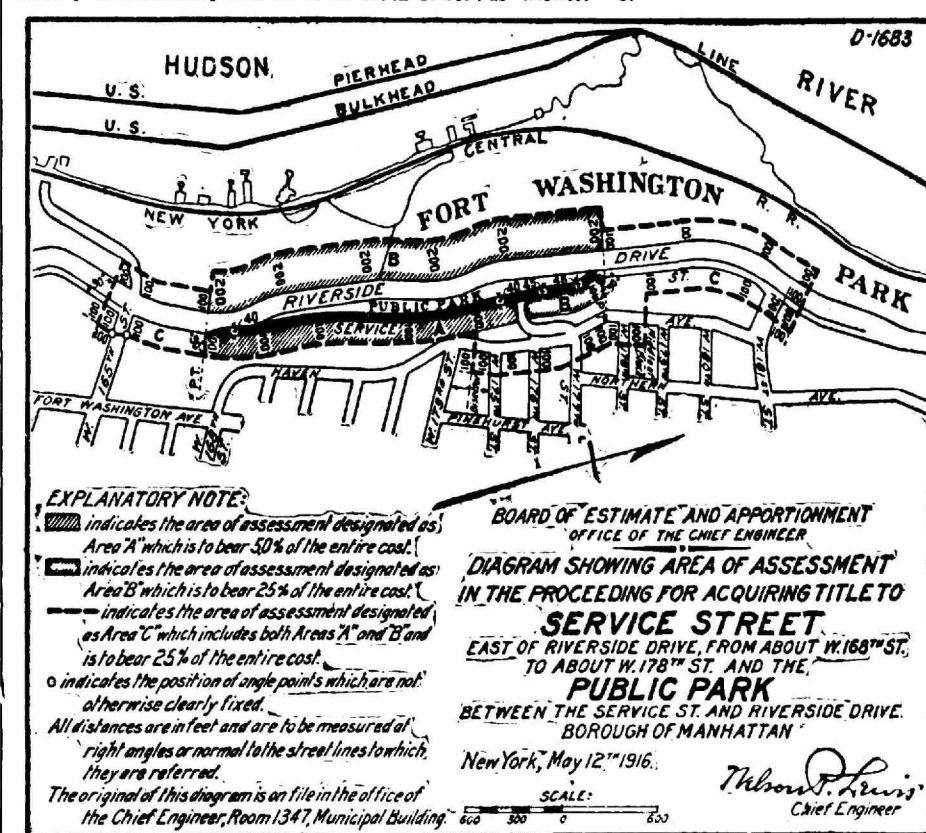

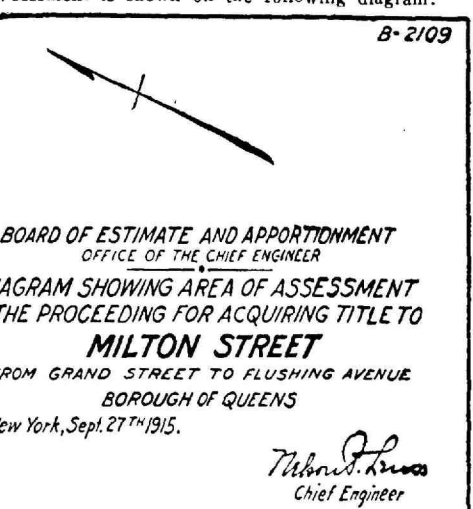

Beginning at a point on a line midway between East 54th Street and East 55th Street, where it is intersected by a line midway between Farragut Road and Glenwood Road, and running thence easterly along the said line midway between Farragut Road and Glenwood Road to the intersection with a line midway between East 57th Street and East 58th Street; thence southerly along the said line midway between East 57th Street and East 58th Street to a point distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Glenwood Road; thence easterly and parallel with Glenwood Road to the intersection with a line midway between East 58th Street and East 59th Street; thence southerly along the said line midway between East 58th Street and East 59th Street, to a point distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Glenwood Road; thence easterly and parallel with Glenwood Road and its prolongation as laid out west of Ralph Avenue to the intersection with a line midway between East 75th Street and East 76th Street; thence southeasterly along the said line midway between East 75th Street and East 76th Street to the intersection with a line midway between Glenwood Road and Flatlands Avenue; thence northeasterly along the said line midway between Glenwood Road and Flatlands Avenue to the intersection with a line midway between East 77th Street and East 78th Street; thence southeasterly along the said line midway between East 77th Street and East 78th Street to the intersection with a line bisecting the angle formed by the intersection of the prolongations of the center lines of Flatlands Avenue and Paerdegat 1st Street as these streets are laid out between East 77th Street and East 78th Street; thence southeasterly along the said line bisecting line to the intersection with the northeasterly bulkhead line of Paerdegat Basin as shown on a map adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 5, 1915; thence northwesterly, southwesterly and southeasterly along the said bulkhead line of Paerdegat Basin to the intersection with a line parallel with Flatlands Avenue as this street is laid out between Ralph Avenue and East 76th Street and passing through a point on the easterly line of Ralph Avenue where it is intersected by the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Avenue I, the said distance being measured at right angles to Avenue I; thence southwesterly along the said line parallel with Flatlands Avenue to the easterly line of Ralph Avenue; thence westerly along the said line parallel with Avenue I and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with a line midway between East 57th Street and East 58th Street; thence northerly along the said line midway between East 57th Street and East 58th Street to the intersection with a line midway between Avenue H and Avenue I; thence westerly along the said line midway between Avenue H and Avenue I to the intersection with a line midway between East 56th Street and East 57th Street; thence northerly along the said line midway between East 56th Street and East 57th Street to a point distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Avenue H; thence westerly and parallel with Avenue H to the intersection with a line midway between East 55th Street and East 56th Street; thence northerly along the said line midway between East 55th Street and East 56th Street to the intersection with a line midway between Glenwood Road and Avenue H; thence westerly along the said line midway between Glenwood Road and Avenue H to the intersection with a line midway between East 54th Street and East 55th Street; thence northerly along the said line midway between East 54th Street and East 55th Street to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth.—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit together with the damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of the City of New York, No. 166 Montague Street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in said City, there to remain until the 23rd day of October, 1916.

Sixth.—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment, or to either of them, the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to Sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale.

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurte-

nances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
