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2 This is just a map showing the 3 various Brooklyn wastesheds; if you 4 look towards the bottom, you see in 5 that yellowish, gold color, the 6 Southwest Brooklyn wasteshed which is 7 the same as used to be before, the MTS 8 was -- ceased operations. Some key features of the 9 10 converted MTSs, there's going to be 11 advanced odor control system, there's 12 going to be more on-site space for 13 truck queuing and I'll go through these 14 in a little more detail, and it will 15 have containerization of the waste as 16 opposed to the previous method of just 17 dumping raw waste into open barges. This is a cross-section of a 18 19 typical marine transfer station after 20 it's converted. If you look on the 21 right, you can see trucks will arrive 22 at this level, the tipping floor level 23 by coming up the facility on the ramp. 24 The trucks will then back up and tip 25 waste onto the next level which is the
