AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, Wednesday, September 23, 1885, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Com-missioners James C. Spencer, William Dowd and C. C. Baldwin. Also, Chief Engineer Church, Deputy Chief Engineer Fteley, and Consulting Engineer Davis. Also, Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works.

Works.
The minutes of the stated meeting of September 16, 1885, were read and approved.
The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in
Vouchers Nos. 1113 and 1118, which vouchers, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, were approved
by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.
The Committee also reported the sale by the Sceretary, under their direction, of ten sets of the
Plans for Section No. I, and one set of the Plans for Sections 2 and 9 of the New Aqueduer, and
the payment of the proceeds (\$115) to the City Chamberlain to the credit of "The Additional
Water Fund."
The Committee on Construction made report, dated September 22, in relation to communications received by them from the Chief-Engineer, as follows:
Ist. Transmitting an estimate of the coal required for the coming winter in the offices of the
Engineers on Divisions I and 6, amounting to 190 tons.
On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the Purveyor was instructed to purchase the coal promptly.
2d. Recommending the appointment of a Tunnel Inspector, and nominating Joseph Gill for the position.

On motion of the Mayor, action thereon was deferred until the next meeting.
3d. Recommending the purchase of an additional transit instrument, with mining shade, and two steel lining rods, for use in the tunnel on the Sixth Division, the cost thereof not to exceed \$250.
On motion of Commissioner Squire, this recommendation was approved by the Commissioners, and the purchase authorized, within the above named limit of cost.
4th. Recommending the promotion of the following persons in the Engineer Corps, to date from October 1. next viz :

October I, next, viz. : Ramsey Turnbull, from Chainman to Rodman, with compensation at the rate of \$75 per

month. David B. Lewis, from Leveler to Transitman, with compensation at the rate of \$1,500 per

annum. On motion of Commissioner Spencer, these recommendations were approved by the Commissioners and the promotions made.

sioners and the promotions made. The Committee further reported under date of September 22, as follows: Ist. Recommending that the Committee on Construction be authorized, when they deem it advi-sable, to direct the sale by the Purveyor, of wood cut by the Engineers upon the line of the New Aqueduct, and now lying upon the land decaying. On motion of Commissioner Dowd, this recommendation was approved, and the Committee

therein named as the amount of the consideration for said lands, the payment of which speched sum had been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 21st of February, 1885; and "Whereas, By recent re-surveys, errors have been disclosed in the courses and distances named in said agreement, and the true area of the land taken ascertained to be twenty-one acres and three hundred and sixty-one thousandths of one acre (21.361), exceeding the area named in said agreement to the extent of seven hundred and eighty-nine thousandths of one acre (.789); therefore it is "Resolved, That in the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Mr. Jay Gould is entitled to payment for the now ascertained correct area of the land taken, to wit : 21,361 acres, at the agreed price of \$325 per acre, making the sum of sixty-nine hundred and forty-two 32-100 dollars; and that the payment to him having been long delayed by reason of the consumption of time in search-ing title, and making the re-surveys, he is entitled to interest upon the purchase money from the date of his formal agreement (April 7, 1885), to the time of payment; therefore "Resolved, That for the 21,^{20,00} acres of land taken from Mr. Jay Gould, m the town of Greenburg, for the construction of the New Aqueduct, he be paid the sum of \$6,942.32 with interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, from the 7th of April, 1885, to the time of payment to him ; such adjustment being subject to approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, as required by section 23, chapter 490, Laws of 1883. "And the Secretary is hereby directed to comunicate this action to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to request its approval thereof." These resolutions were adopted by the affirmative vote of all of the Commissioners. The Chief Engineer presented a further report, dated September 23, in relation to the office of an Engineer of Construction for further consideration and report. The Commissioners then adjourned. The Secretary made a report to the Commissioners, dated September 22, in relation to the settle-ment with Mr. Jay Gould for lands taken from him by agreement with the Commissioners, and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 21st of February, 1885; said report showing that the area of the land taken by the city exceeds the quantity named in the agreement executed by Mr. Gould (April 7, 1885), to the extent of 789-1000 of an acre, amounting at the agreed price per acre to the sum of \$256.42; and also that Mr. Gould claims interest on the pur-chase money from the date of his agreement until payment is made to him; whereupon Commis-sioner Spencer offered the following resolution: "Whereas, It was heretofore agreed between the Aqueduct Commissioners and Mr. Jay Gould that payment should be made to him at the rate of \$325 per acre for land taken from him for the construction of the New Aqueduct in the Town of Greenburg, in Westchester County ; and a formal agreement therefor was executed and delivered by him on the 7th day of April last, in which courses and distances are set forth and the area stated to be twenty acres and 572-1000 of one acre (20,572) and the sum of six thousand six hundred and eighty-five and 90-100 dollars (\$6,685.90),

Six—There were 600 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 26, 1885, which is a decrease of 59, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 47 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending September 19, 1885, was 683, which is 81.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.25 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,406,526.
