The President laid before the Board the following communication from the State Comptroller:

STATE OF NEW YORK, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, ALBANY, June 8, 1895. Hon. WM. H. TEN EYCK, Clerk, Board of Aldermen, New York City: DEAR SIR—

In your report of valuations, taxes, etc., for 1894, your deduction of "assessed value of personal property not taxable locally for State purposes," amounted to \$97,861,788.

If you are to take the valuations for 1895 as the basis, it will not show the same amount of this personal estate as you had in 1894, and will require a new report as of 1895.

You can readily see the necessity of a report of these valuations as per 1894 tax rolls, which have already been made out and which can be obtained with due diligence.

I see no reason, therefore, for any further delay in making the report of incorporated companies for last year, and shall expect the matter to receive your immediate attention.

Kindly inform me at once when I may expect it.

STATE OF NEW YORK, ATTORNEY-GENERAL'S OFFICE, ALBANY, June 3, 1895. Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, New York City: DEAR SIR—
After a continuous correspondence for three or four months, the Comptroller has yet to receive a report of the incorporated companies, as required by section 16, title 4, chapter 13, eighth edition of the Revised Statutes. In your report of valuation, etc., you have deducted over \$97,000,000 of personal property not taxable locally for State purposes; and when your report of incorporated companies was sent to the Comptroller's office, only the total valuation was set opposite each company; but the same was not subdivided into real and personal estate, as shown by the blanks which necessitated of the return of that report to you.
It is very necessary that a subdivision of the property included in your report of incorporated companies should be made so as to show the amount of personal property of each company not taxable locally for State purposes, which, when added, will make the \$97,000,000 deducted in your report of valuation.

The President laid before the Board a communication from the Trustees of the Public Library of Boston, being the forty-third annual report of that institution.
Which was ordered on file.
The President laid before the Board the following communication from property-holders and citizens :

Protest and Notice.
We, the undersigned, being the owners in fee, or otherwise, of certain real property situated, lying and being in the City, County and State of New York, and described as "all that certain block, piece or parcel of land, bounded on the north by Ninety-seventh street, on the east by Madison avenue, on the south by Ninety-sixth street, and on the west by Fifth avenue," hereby protest against the action of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, in passing, on 25th April, 1895, a General Order No. 114, being a resolution and ordinance, as follows :
"Resolved, That the block known or bounded by Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, Madison and Fifth avenues, be inclosed with a picket fence, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioners of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted."
—said resolution and ordinance being printed in the CITY RECORD, number of April 25, 1895, on the ground that the said block of land had been fenced in, at great expense, several years ago, in accordance with a resolution and ordinance of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, passed at that time, and that the substantial fence then erected was not properly protected by the proper authorities and officials of said City, the same being the private property of the undersigned residents, but said fence so erected was wantonly disfigured, torn down, destroyed and carried away by parties unknown, to the great loss of the undersigned, in less than three years after it had so been erected. And the undersigned hereby give notice that they have complied with the said resolution and ordinance of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, passed April 25, 1895, and have caused to be erected a new and substantial picket fence about said block of land; that the same is now complete, and that they, the undersigned, their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, will hold the City of New York responsible in the event of said last newly erected picket fence being disfigured, torn down, destroyed and carried away, and not being properly guarded and protected by the proper authorities and officials of this City. And the undersigned have sent copies of the within protest and notice to the Mayor, the Comptroller, the Corporation Counsel, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Captains of the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth Police Precincts, and the President of the Police Commissioners, all officials of the City of New York, bound to protect the private property of residents by virtue of their respective offices.

By Alderman Goodman—
Whereas, The Board of Aldermen, on December 27, 1894, passed a resolution permitting Mr. Julius Stern, a blind newsdealer, to place and maintain a stand on grounds belonging to the City, corner Ninety-second street and Columbus avenue, for the sale of newspapers, said resolution being approved by his Honor the Mayor, December 31, 1894; and
Whereas, The present Board of Aldermen refused to rescind said resolution, thereby substantially indorsing the action of the previous Board, and approving of the use of said premises for the purpose designated; and
Whereas, Under chapter 115, Laws of 1888, there seems to be ample authority for the action of the Board of Aldermen to grant privileges as above indicated for the sale of newspapers and periodicals, especially on public property; and
Whereas, Said authority is either disputed or disregarded by the Honorable Commissioner of Public Works, who, because of objection to the erection of the stand on the part of certain citizens and of the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, refuses to permit Mr. Julius Stern to enjoy the privileges accorded him by this Board; therefore
Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to furnish opinions on the following interrogatories :
1st. Has the Board of Aldermen, with and by approval of the Mayor, power and authority to give permission to the use of sidewalks for the sale of newspapers, within the stoop-line, on property belonging to the City?
2d. If said power exists, was the permission to Mr. Julius Stern, as above cited, granted in proper form under the law?
3d. Has the Commissioner of Public Works, or any other head of department, the legal right to prevent Mr. Stern from enjoying the benefits accorded him by the action of the Board of Aldermen?

District Number Thirty-three shall consist of that portion of the Twenty-first Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Harlem river and East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, and running thence along East One Hundred and Nineteenth street to Fourth, or Park avenue, to East One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, to Fifth avenue, to the Harlem river, to the place of beginning, together with that portion of the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York within and bounded by a line beginning at the Harlem river and East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and running thence along East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to the East river or Long Island Sound, to Bronx Kills, to Harlem river, to the place of beginning, and also North Brother Island. Citizen population, 38,691.

Assembly District Number Two shall consist of that portion of the Tenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Whitehall street, running thence along Whitehall street to Broadway, to Wall street, to William street, to Fulton street, to Broadway, to Canal street, to the Bowery, to Division street, to Market street, to Monroe street, to Catharine street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,785.

Assembly District Number Three shall consist of all that part of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the North or Hudson river and Canal street, to Hudson street, to Dominick street, to Varick street, to Broome street, to Sullivan street, to West Houston street, to Varick street, to Carmine street, to Sixth avenue, to West Eleventh street, to Greenwich avenue, to Perry street, to Waverley place, to Charles street, to West street, to place of beginning. Population, 38,544.

Assembly District Number Four shall consist of that portion of the Tenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Catharine street, and running thence along Catharine street, to Monroe street, to Market street, to Division street, to Grand street, to Jackson street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 40,427.

Assembly District Number Five shall consist of all that portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at Sullivan street and Spring street, and along Spring street to Broadway, to East Fourth street, to Third avenue, to Fourteenth street, to Sixth avenue, to West Fifteenth street, to Seventh avenue, to West Nineteenth street, to Eighth avenue, along Eighth avenue to Greenwich avenue, to West Eleventh street, to Sixth avenue, to Carmine street, to Varick street, to West Houston street, to Sullivan street, to Spring street, to the place of beginning. Population, 38,419.

Assembly District Number Six shall consist of that portion of the Eleventh Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at Canal street and Broadway, and running thence along Broadway to East Fourth street, to the Bowery, to Third avenue, to St. Mark's place or Eighth street, to Second avenue, to Second street, to First avenue, to Houston street, to Eldridge street, to Stanton street, to Chrystie street, to Division street, to the Bowery, to Canal street, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 39,410.

Assembly District Number Seven shall consist of that portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the North or Hudson river, along Charles street to Waverley place, to Perry street, to Greenwich avenue, to Eighth avenue, to West Twentieth street, along West Twentieth street to Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. Population, 38,497.

Assembly District Number Twelve shall consist of that portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Jackson street, and running thence along Jackson street, to Grand street, to Division street, to Norfolk street, to Rivington street, to Cannon street, to Stanton street, to the East river, to the place of beginning. Citizen population, 41,871.

Assembly District Number Thirteen shall consist of that portion of the Sixteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the Hudson or North river and West Thirty-sixth street, and running thence along West Thirty-sixth street to Tenth avenue, to West Thirty-eighth street, to Eighth avenue, to West Thirty-seventh street, to Seventh avenue, to West Fortieth street, to Eighth avenue, to West Forty-third street, to Tenth avenue, to West Forty-sixth street, to the Hudson or North river, to the place of beginning. The Committee on County Affairs, to whom was referred the annexed resolution and ordinance in favor of lights on passenger vehicles, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed ordinance to be advisable. They therefore recommend that the said resolution and ordinance be adopted.

Resolved, That the following ordinance be adopted, the same to take effect immediately:

Lights On Passenger Vehicles.—Any person using or permitting to be used a cab, coach, light wagon, or any other vehicle used or intended to be used for the carrying of passengers, whether the same shall be actually carrying passengers other than the driver or not, shall be required to carry on such vehicle, after sundown and before sunrise, a light or lights of sufficient illuminating power, and so placed as to be visible at a distance of two hundred feet in front of said vehicles. Any violation of this ordinance shall be punished as a misdemeanor.

Further, Resolved, That the foregoing ordinance shall become and be made a section of the chapter on "Miscellaneous Ordinances," in the new Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, when the same shall be adopted; this provision not to be considered to defer or postpone the operation of the foregoing ordinance, which foregoing ordinance shall take effect immediately.
