Whereas, It appears from a report of Dr. H. M. Biggs, Pathologist and Director of the Bacteriological Laboratory of the Health Department that the sum of twenty-two thousand six hundred dollars will be required during the year 1895 for the salaries of Inspectors, Experts, and other employees, in the diagnosing of diphtheria and tuberculosis, and in producing and using diphtheria anti-toxine ; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer from the appropriation to the Health Department for 1895 designated "For Bacteriological Laboratory, including thirty thousand dollars to be used for the purpose of producing and using diphtheria anti-toxine, thirty thousand five hundred dollars" to the appropriation designated "Salaries for 1895," the sum of twenty-two thousand six hundred dollars.

Resolved, That the Attorney and Counsel be and is hereby directed to prepare a bill for presentation to the Legislature, after it has been submitted to his Honor the Mayor, amending sections 553 and 554 of the New York City Consolidation Act so as to authorize this Board to use diphtheria anti-toxine, produced in its laboratories for the relief of the poor of this city sick with diphtheria, and to sell diphtheria anti-toxine whenever the amount produced exceeds the amount required in the proper performance of its duties, the avails of such surplus to be accounted for and paid to the City Chamberlain, to be set apart and constitute a distinct fund to be known as the "Diphtheria Anti-toxine Fund," which fund shall be subject to the requisition of said Board in the production and use of the anti-toxine serum.

The 775 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.29, against 17.55 for the previous week, and 23.79 for the corresponding week of 1894.

The increase of 105 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 5 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 6 from measles, of 6 from phthisis, of 24 from diseases of the nervous system, of 32 from bronchitis, of 30 from pneumonia, and of 11 from Bright's disease, partially offset by a decrease of 8 in the deaths from heart disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, from measles in the Eleventh, Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards, and from scarlet fever in the Eleventh and Twelfth Wards.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

The Board met, pursuant to notice.

Present—Commissioners Charles G. Wilson, Cyrus Edson, M. D., the President of the Board of Police.

The following report was received from the Sanitary Superintendent:

Report recommending that permit to keep lodgers at No. 196 Greenwich street be revoked.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permit No. 114, to keep lodgers at No. 96 Greenwich street, be and is hereby revoked.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, An application has been made to the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the removal of the Health Department from the Criminal Court Building for the alleged reason that its presence is dangerous to other occupants of such building, therefore

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Board and of its chief medical officers, there is not the slightest possible danger to the occupants of the Criminal Court Building from the location and operations of the Bacteriological Laboratory now located therein.

Resolved, That the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, be and are hereby informed that during the twenty-eight years this Board occupied the much frequented building Nos. 300 Mulberry street and 301 Mott street, Police Headquarters (during most of which period the Division of Contagious Diseases was in the same building), no case of contagious disease occurred which was or could be attributed to the presence of the Health Department in said building.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Board and its chief medical officers, the presence in the building at all times of one or more of its expert diagnosticians of contagious disease, and of other medical officers, is a protection to the officers of the Criminal Courts and other occupants of the building, as well as to those who visit it on business, as the presence of any persons in the court rooms or any other part of the building who is in the early stage of contagious disease would probably come or be immediately brought under the observation of such expert medical officers, and they would be able to secure the prompt removal of such sick person from the building.

Resolved, That the opinions as above expressed are not intended to be an objection to the removal of the Health Department from the Criminal Court Building, as it is greatly desired by this Board, and the unanimous wish of its officers that a suitable building should be erected for its exclusive use, which shall be specially constructed for and adapted to its important public purposes.

Resolved, That a copy of the above preamble and resolutions be forwarded to the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to His Honor the Mayor, and to the Comptroller and the Recorder.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Sanitary Inspectors and Officers of this Department be and are hereby directed to aid so far as possible the Department of Police in the enforcement of the laws and ordinances which prohibit the throwing of ashes, garbage and other refuse into the streets, and which requires that suitable receptacles shall be furnished and used for all refuse; and that they are particularly instructed in all regular or special inspections of tenement houses to report in writing whether suitable and sufficient receptacles have been provided and are in use, and to report the names and addresses of owners of premises where the receptacles are unsuitable or insufficient.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

Commissioner Bell presented a report of E. V. Nicholson, Master Machinist, to the effect that the filters and pumps at present in the Aquarium are not adequate, and recommending additional filters and pumps, and stated that the two filters now in the Aquarium cost about \$7,000 a piece, and are made of Tobin bronze; that the pumps were purely experimental and have been found to be not large enough, and that they can be returned and larger ones purchased for a very small additional sum; that from personal inquiry made of the National Filter Company and others, he has ascertained that said company can make and set up for one-half the price of the Tobin bronze filters, a wooden filter equally as good if not better, with a guarantee to stand a pressure of forty pounds to the square inch. Commissioner Bell offered the following:

Whereas, The filters now in operation at the New York Aquarium in Battery Park are not, in the opinion of this Board, of sufficient capacity to allow of a suitable supply and circulation of water in and through the tanks and pools of the Aquarium; and

Whereas the delay that would be incurred by going through the regular process of advertising would make it to the best interest of the public that authority herein asked for be conferred;

Resolved, That this Board request the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, under the provisions of the Charter, to authorize the purchase of an additional filter for said Aquarium without public letting, at a cost not to exceed four thousand seven hundred and fifty-five dollars.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Clausen, Tappen, Bell—3.

Commissioner Bell reported that the tanks in the Aquarium nearly all leak in consequence of the glass being improperly set; that he had found a party who could reset the glass so that it would not leak, and who would furnish bonds in the sum of \$1,500 to guarantee that it would not leak in a year, for the sum of \$950; but that the cost of taking the glass out and putting it back again, according to figures given by the Manhattan Glass Company, would be \$720.

On motion, the issue of an order to Arthur Drant for doing the work at an expense not to exceed \$950, upon his filing a bond guaranteeing the work for one year, was authorized by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Clausen, Tappen, Bell—3.

Commissioner Tappen presented a letter of J. O'B. Webster, of the Department of Public Works, submitting a plan for widening the foot-bridge over Spuyten Duyvil Creek at Broadway, at an estimated cost of \$7,300, and moved that a copy of the letter be sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the request that an appropriation be made of \$7,300, or so much as may be necessary for this purpose. Carried.

On motion of Commissioner Tappen, the Superintendent of Parks was directed to remove the pieces of stone fence lying along the west side of Central Park, and incumbering the sidewalk.

RELATIVE TO THE GRANTING OF PERMITS FOR THE TEMPORARY OCCUPANCY OF PUBLIC STREETS BY LICENSED VEHICLES
