## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held at the Mayor's Office, at 12 o'clock A. M., on Friday, January 18, 1901.*

Present—Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain; Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council; and Robert Mah, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held December 27, 1900, were approved as printed.

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to bonds sold December 26, 1900:

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to four leases for the Brooklyn Public Library:

JANUARY 4, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

Sir—At a regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Brooklyn Public Library, held at No. 26 Brevoort place, Tuesday, December 18, 1900, the following proceedings were had:

"Mr. Sargent, Chairman of the Committee on Sites and Buildings, reported on the following sites for new branches and on a new site for the Prospect Branch:

" City Park Branch, corner Nassau and Bridge streets, at	\$1,200 00
" Carroll Park Branch, corner Carroll and Smith streets	750 00
" Bushwick Branch, corner Montrose avenue and Humboldt street	500 00
" Prospect Branch, corner Sixth avenue and Ninth street	950 00

"On motion, the Board adopted this report, and recommended that leases be drawn for these respective sites for a term of three years, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. The whole matter was referred to the Law Committee, with the request that they communicate with the proper city authorities."

I have caused an examination to be made of each of the premises above mentioned, and beg to report as follows:

### First—City Park Branch:

It is proposed to lease the store floor of a new five-story and cellar brick building, situated on the northwest corner of Bridge and Nassau streets. The floor consists of two connecting rooms, one 24 feet by 42 feet, and the other 23 feet by 47 feet, making a total of 2,089 square feet, with ample cellar facilities and the use of certain portions of the cellar for the storage of coal.

The store is heated by a hot-air furnace in the cellar. Terms—three years from date of occupation, at \$1,200 per annum. Owner—S. Epstein, No. 1422 Fifth avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

### Second—Carroll Park Branch.

This lease is proposed to cover the store floor of a four-story brick and brownstone building, No. 322 Smith street, located on the southwest corner of Smith and Carroll streets, and having an area of 954 square feet.

The owner agrees to make such alterations in the store as required by the Directors of the Library, and to install a furnace in the cellar, to furnish gas fixtures and make all necessary repairs.

Terms—three years from date of occupation, at an annual rental of \$720. Owner—S. M. Rogert, No. 6 Wall street, Borough of Manhattan.

### Third—Bushwick Branch.

The premises consist of the store floor of a two-story frame building, 30 feet by 80 feet, on the southeast corner of Montrose avenue and Humboldt street.

Terms—three years from date of occupation, at \$500 per annum. Owner to make repairs to floors and walls, take out partitions, and furnish apparatus for steam heat. Owner—Louisa Maurer, wife of Ulrich Maurer, No. 201 Montrose avenue, Brooklyn, and Rosa Huberty, wife of Peter P. Huberty.

### Fourth—Prospect Branch.

The premises consist of the ground floor of a three-story building, situated on the southwest corner of Sixth avenue and Ninth street, containing two connecting rooms, one 34 feet by 27 feet, and the other 20 feet by 34 feet, making a total of 1,632 square feet.

The owner agrees to put in a new furnace in the cellar, furnish gas fixtures, take out partitions, clean, paint, decorate, and put premises in first-class condition, and to allow a part of the cellar for storage of coal. Terms—three years from date of occupation, at \$950 per annum. Owner—Edward P. Day, corner Third avenue and Fifty-fourth street.

These rentals I consider reasonable and just in each case, and may properly be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare leases to the City of the following premises for use as branches of the Brooklyn Public Library, as follows:

1. City Park Branch—The store floor of premises situated on the northwest corner of Bridge and Nassau streets, Borough of Brooklyn, for a term of three years from the date of occupation at an annual rental of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), payable quarterly; lessor, S. Epstein.

2. Carroll Park Branch—The store floor of building No. 322 Smith street, located on the southwest corner of Smith and Carroll streets, Borough of Brooklyn, for a term of three years from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of seven hundred and twenty dollars (\$720), payable quarterly, the owner to make such alterations in the store as required by the Directors of the Library, to install a furnace in the cellar and to furnish gas fixtures and make all necessary repairs; lessor, S. M. Rogert.

3. Bushwick Branch—The store floor of premises on the southeast corner of Montrose avenue and Humboldt street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a term of three years from the date of occupation at an annual rental of six hundred dollars (\$600), payable quarterly, the owner to make repairs to floors and walls, take out partitions and furnish apparatus for steam heat; owners—Louisa Maurer and Rosa Huberty.

4. Prospect Branch—The ground floor of premises situated on the southwest corner of Sixth avenue and Ninth street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a term of three years from the date of occupation at an annual rental of nine hundred and fifty dollars (\$950), payable quarterly, the owner to put in a new furnace in the cellar, furnish gas fixtures, take out partitions, clean, paint, decorate and put the premises in first-class condition, and to allow a part of the cellar for storage of coal; lessor, Edward P. Day.

—and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rents fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such leases be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 247 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises at Nos. 67 and 69 Schermerhorn street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the Brooklyn Public Library:

JANUARY 15, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

Sir—At a meeting of the Directors of the Brooklyn Public Library held December 18, 1900, resolutions were adopted ratifying certain arrangements made with the Union for Christian Work, whereby the Free Lending Library was turned over to the Brooklyn Public Library, with all books, fixtures, etc., the latter agreeing to pay rental for the library rooms, as now occupied, the yearly sum of \$1,800, which includes heat.

The premises proposed to be leased consist of the second floor of the four-story brick building, 50 feet by 80 feet, on the northerly side of Schermerhorn street, between Court street and Boerum place, and known as Nos. 67 and 69 Schermerhorn street.

When the building was constructed, this floor was intended for library purposes, and in consequence, is well adapted to the same. It contains over 3,000 square feet, which is at the rate of 60 cents per square foot per annum.

Under the conditions as named, it would appear to me that the price asked is reasonable and just, and in order that this lease may be co-existent with others recently applied for by the Brooklyn Public Library, I would recommend that the same be made for the term of three years,



commencing from the date of occupation; owners, Union for Christian Work of Brooklyn, New York, to provide steam heat.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from the Union for Christian Work of Brooklyn, New York, of premises known as Nos. 67 and 69 Schermerhorn street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Brooklyn Public Library, for a term of three years from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800), payable quarterly, the lessor to provide heat; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of Rooms Nos. 1223 and 1224, in the Park Row Building, for the Department of Bridges:

JANUARY 14, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. John L. Shea, Commissioner of Bridges, in a communication under date of January 11, 1901, makes application for additional office space comprising two rooms, Nos. 1223 and 1224 on the twelfth floor of the building Nos. 13 to 21 Park row, Manhattan.

These rooms are located in the Ann street wing of the building, immediately opposite the offices at present leased for the Bridge Department, and the Commissioner states that they are necessary for the use of the Department.

The floor space amounts to 389 square feet, and in the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund January 20, 1899, authorizing the leasing of 47,915 square feet in this building, which limit we have not as yet leased, the price is at the rate of \$1.65 per square foot or an annual rental of \$641.85, which I consider reasonable and just.

The lease should be drawn from date of occupation, to terminate on April 1, 1904, with the privilege of renewal for five years thereafter, when it will be co-existent with the present lease. Lessors, The Park Row Construction Company, to partition same as required by the Department of Bridges.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City of Rooms Nos. 1223 and 1224 on the twelfth floor of the building Nos. 13 to 21 Park row, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Bridges, for a term from the date of occupation to April 1, 1904, with the privilege of a renewal for five years thereafter, at an annual rental of six hundred and forty-one dollars and eighty-five cents (\$641.85), payable quarterly; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following report and resolution were received from the Board of Education relative to a renewal of the lease of building on Washington avenue and building on Lincoln avenue, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred a resolution adopted by the School Board for the Borough of Queens, requesting that the leases of buildings occupied by Public Schools 42 and 43, Rockaway Beach, be renewed for a term of three months from January 1, 1901, the date of expiration, respectfully submits the following:

The buildings in question are situated on Washington avenue and on Lincoln avenue, Rockaway Beach, and upon investigation it is found that they will be required for a longer period to accommodate the pupils in that vicinity. Your committee would therefore recommend that the request of the School Board be granted.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to execute a renewal of the lease of premises on Lincoln avenue and on Washington avenue, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, occupied by Public Schools 42 and 43, for three months from January 1, 1901, the date of expiration, at a rental of fifty dollars per month each, upon the same terms and conditions as mentioned in the existing lease.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City, from S. Murray, agent, of building on Washington avenue and building on Lincoln avenue, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, occupied by the Board of Education, for a term of three months from January 1, 1901, at a rental of fifty dollars (\$50) per month each, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following report and resolutions were received from the Board of Education relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of premises corner Park avenue and Ninety-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that it is in receipt of a communication from the Deputy Comptroller, stating that Francis J. Schuigg, owner of the premises corner Park avenue and Ninety-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, occupied as an annex to Public School 86, has refused to renew the lease longer than to May 1, 1901, at the present rental, \$960 per year, asking \$60 per month from that date.

Your Committee considers the increased rental asked excessive for the accommodations afforded, and therefore recommends that the premises be vacated on May 1, 1901.

The following resolutions are offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the resolution found on page 1644 of the Journal of the Board of Education for 1900, requesting the renewal of the lease of the store floor of premises corner Park avenue and Ninety-sixth street, for use as an annex to Public School 86, for one year from January 1, 1901, at an annual rental of nine hundred and sixty dollars, be and the same is hereby rescinded; and be it further

Burke, Secretary, Department of Docks, in a communication under date of December 29, 1900, transmits for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund an agreement approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, made with Michael Halpin, for the purchase of wharfrage rights, etc., appertaining to the northerly half of Pier, old 34, East river, Borough of Manhattan, in the sum of \$25,000.

In reply I beg to report that the purchase of this pier has twice before been presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: the first time on March 5, 1900, for the sum of \$35,000, and the second time on June 1, 1900, for the sum of \$33,000, which latter application was the subject of a report by me on July 20, 1900, in which I stated as follows:

"This half of the old dilapidated pier, which it is proposed to purchase, is assessed on the tax books at \$6,000, and the price agreed upon, \$33,000, is 5½ times this valuation. I consider the price altogether too high."

"I am of the opinion that where there are so many uncertain factors to be considered, if such property is necessary for the improvement of the water front, it ought to be acquired by condemnation proceedings."

The price now submitted, \$25,000, being 4½ times the assessed valuation, I consider excessive.

I am still of the opinion expressed in my report of July 20, 1900, that condemnation proceedings should be resorted to.

The Department of Docks and Ferries at a regular meeting held on November 2, 1900, granted a permit to Beadleston & Woerz "to run a salt water pipe across the Marginal street and through the bulkhead at the foot of Charles street, North river, in accordance with plans submitted, the compensation for said privilege to be fixed by the Treasurer."

Would report that the present West street at this point is 250 feet wide, the westerly portion called Marginal street in the permit to Beadleston & Woerz is 180 feet wide, and is under the direct supervision and control of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and, as noted in the permit, the compensation for said privilege will be fixed by the Treasurer of that Department.



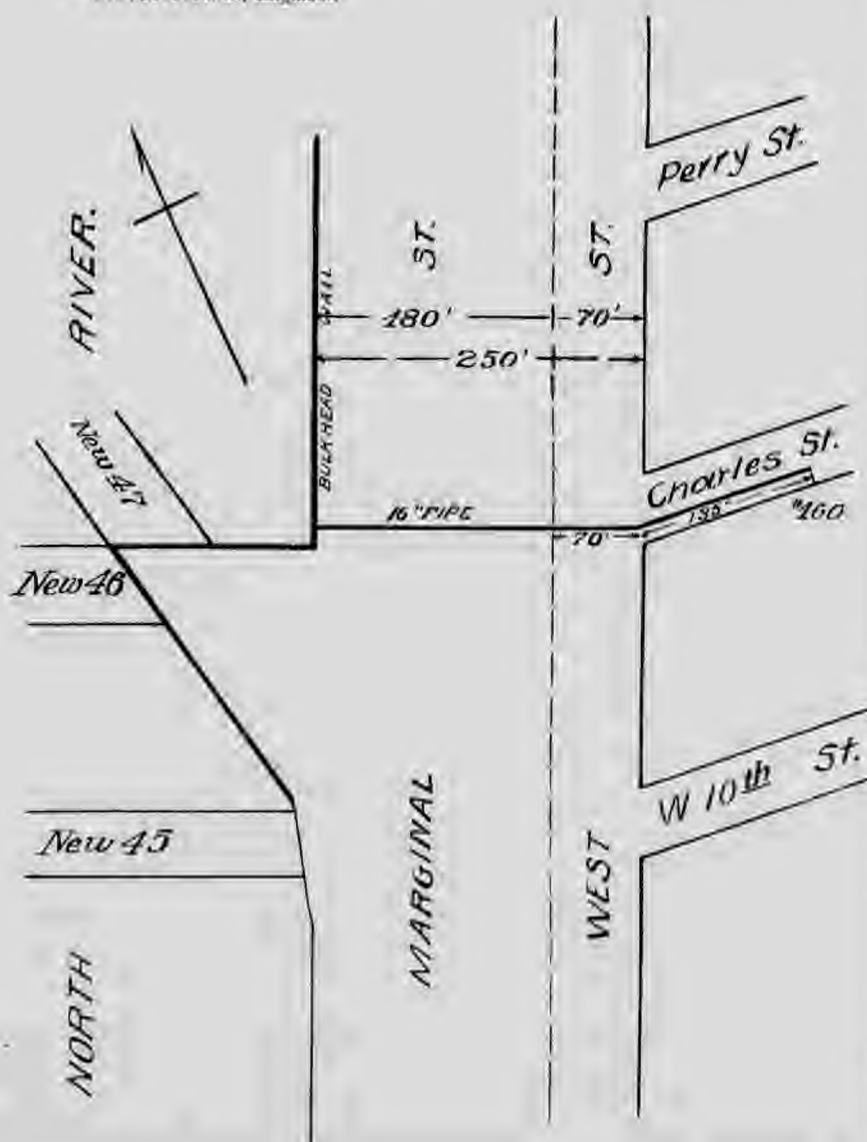

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred a report and resolution adopted by the School Board for the Borough of Manhattan and The Bronx, requesting the Board of Education to secure a lease of location on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Fifteenth street and Union avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for the use of Public School 152, for one year, respectfully submit the following:

Upon investigation it is found that the premises proposed to be leased consist of a store floor and a room for the storage of fuel, etc., in the cellar, in a four-story brick building on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Fifteenth street and Union avenue, and will afford one classroom, no alterations being required.

The owner has agreed to rent the premises for a term of two years at an annual rental of \$360, including stove heat, which is considered reasonable.

Agent, Charles M. Kasppel, Third Avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-first street.

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises, which consist of part of the ground floor, 15 feet 6 inches by 33 feet, of the four-story and cellar brick building situated on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Fifteenth street and Union Avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

The building is now leased by steam, and there are ample boiler facilities.

The floor space is about 500 square feet, which, at the rental asked, is at the rate of 72 cents per square foot per annum, but, in my opinion, this rental is excessive for a store at the location named, especially when a lease for a term of two years is to be made. I consider \$270 per annum, the owner to furnish stove heat, to be fair value for the premises named, and I would therefore recommend a lease, from date of occupation, of the Board of Education for a term of two years, at such rental.
