Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment August 27, 1914, which reads as follows:

"Resolved, That the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be authorized to have the maps of The City of New York, now being prepared in his office, copyrighted.

"Resolved, That 250 copies of these maps, each consisting of 35 sheets and an index, be furnished, without expense, as follows:

100 copies to members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment,
50 copies to various departments of the City Government, and
100 copies for the use of the office of the Chief Engineer of the Board.

"Resolved, That additional copies, whether to City Departments or to citizens, and whether in large or small quantities, be furnished at the uniform price of \$2.50 a set.

"Resolved, That copies of single sheets made by processed methods be furnished on request at the cost of reproduction.

"Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board be authorized to sell the maps at the prices above named, the receipts to be turned into the City Treasury."

Resolved, That 250 copies of these maps, each consisting of 35 sheets and an index, be furnished, without expense, as follows:

Resolved, That additional maps be furnished City departments at one dollar (\$1) a set, and to the general public at three dollars (\$3) a set, except where twenty-five (25) or more sets are purchased by the same party at the same time, when the price shall be two dollars (\$2) a set.

Resolved, That prints of single sheets at a scale of 600 feet to the inch, on regular white paper, be furnished to City departments for public use at fifty cents (50c.) a sheet, and to the general public at the following prices:

One or two prints of the same sheet..... \$1 25 each
Three prints of the same sheet..... 1 20 each
Four prints of the same sheet..... 1 15 each
Five or more prints of the same sheet..... 1 00 each

For blue prints, the price to the public to be as follows:

One or two prints of the same sheet..... \$0 55 each
Three prints of the same sheet..... 50 each
Four or more prints of the same sheet..... 45 each

For any of the above prints mounted on muslin, an additional price of fifty cents (50c.) each shall be charged.

To the Honorable The Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board held November 25, 1914, a communication from the Secretary in relation to the condition of the appropriation "Code No. 45TC,

Contingencies, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 1914," was presented and referred to your Committee on Organization.

From this communication and the accompanying estimate of requirements of this fund for the balance of the year 1914, it will be necessary to provide for a deficit estimated at \$39,828.27. The Secretary also states in his communication that some outstanding accounts, not included in said estimate, remain to be rendered, and suggests that the fund be replenished to the extent of \$45,000, either by transfer from some other appropriation or by the issue of special revenue bonds.

At the present time there appear to be no unexpended balances of appropriations available for the purpose of transfer, outside of appropriations for Personal Service, the transfer from which for the above purpose is not permitted by the resolutions adopted in connection with the Budget.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Aldermen be requested to recommend the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$45,000, under the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter, to meet the deficit in this appropriation. A resolution carrying this recommendation into effect, is submitted.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals—Request of Trustees for Authority to Purchase Six Motor Ambulances, Without Public Letting.

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to request the Board of Aldermen for permission to buy in the open market, without public letting, six motor ambulances for this department at a cost not exceeding \$15,000. Funds were provided in the Budget for 1915 for this purpose. The ambulances that are required are of a special character, and it would be difficult, if not impossible, to obtain acceptable ambulances by advertising for bids. This request is made at this time in order that the selection may be made early in 1915.

Department of Finance—Request to Amend Resolution for Special Revenue Bonds for Extradition Expenses of the District Attorney of Kings County.

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, November 30, 1914.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—On March 25, 1913, your Board adopted the following resolutions: "Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the District Attorney of Kings County for the purpose of paying expenses of extraditing fugitive criminals. All obligations contracted hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1913."

It appears now that despite the limitation of the incurrence of liabilities against this fund to the period ending December 31, 1913, that obligations against it have been incurred and paid in 1914 to the amount of \$954.34. Apparently the only criticism that can be made of these payments is that the obligations were not incurred in the period fixed by the resolution. To eliminate this defect in the procedure followed, it is proposed that the resolution shall be amended to read as follows:

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), the proceeds whereof to be used by the District Attorney of Kings County for the purpose of paying expenses of extraditing fugitive criminals. All obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 1, 1914."

The following statement shows the present status of the account, growing out of the resolutions of the Board of Aldermen of March 25, 1913, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of May 29, 1913: "R. Gentlemen—On August 27, 1914, you referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee a communication from the President, Borough of Manhattan, requesting amendment of the corporate stock authorization for the Children's Court, First Division, Borough of Manhattan, so as to provide for the purchase of equipment and furnishings out of the balance available.

On July 17, 1911, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$150,000 to provide means for the erection of a new building for Children's Court, First Division, including Architects' fees, Borough of Manhattan. On account of changes in the plans, a second authorization of \$85,000 was made on May 2, 1912. In order to meet additional cost due to the fact that the foundations had to be carried to a greater depth than had been anticipated, another authorization to the amount of \$27,000 was made on November 21, 1912.

The authorizations of corporate stock total \$262,000. The amount expended on the building to date is about \$216,000, which covers contracts for all of the building except lighting fixtures.

The first authorization has been exhausted. It is estimated that the balances available in the other authorizations will be sufficient to pay for all the interior equipment and furnishings required. It is requested that the resolutions authorizing the issues of corporate stock be amended to include the words "equipment and furnishing."

The proposed equipment and furnishing consists of lighting fixtures, furniture and furnishings. The lighting fixtures may be supplied under the original resolutions. It is customary for the architect to get a commission upon the cost of such fixtures.

The furniture proposed consists principally of desks, chairs, tables and cabinets for all of the rooms except those set aside for the religious societies. It is proposed to purchase the furniture out of stock supplies wherever possible. In the large waiting room, the Judge's chamber, the court rooms and some other rooms which are elaborately finished, it is proposed to provide furniture that will harmonize with the architectural features.

The estimated cost of the furniture, as requested by the department and as recommended by the Bureau of Contract Supervision, is as follows:

Gentlemen—On November 11, 1914, the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, requested the re-establishment of the grade of position of Examiner in Lunacy at a salary at the rate of \$1,500 per annum. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"In Personal Service, Salaries Regular Employees, Non-Institutional Care for Dependents, Dependent Sick or Poor, Adults, No. 1915, Brooklyn and Queens, it is proposed to reinsert the line 'Examiner in Lunacy, 1 at \$1,500.'

"This position was abolished by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of July 2, 1914, at the request of the Commissioner and upon his representation that the position was unnecessary and that he desired to use this amount for other purposes.

"The position in question is filled by Dr. Wm. H. Bates, who is a veteran of the Civil War, and who has been reporting for work daily. The Commissioner was informed that the occupant of the position was about to bring suit for reinstatement. On October 14, 1914, the question was taken up with the Corporation Counsel, who, on November 7, 1914, advised that Dr. Bates be restored to duty and paid his compensation.

"The Commissioner therefore now requests that the position be re-established. The necessary funds will be provided from an unassigned balance. The position is provided for at the same rate in the 1915 Budget."

In view of the foregoing facts we recommend the adoption of the attached resolution, recommending to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the grade of position of Examiner in Lunacy at the rate of \$1,500 per annum for one incumbent.

Department of Correction—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$2,629, to Provide Ten Emergency Keepers, Etc.

Department of Correction of The City of New York, Commissioner's Office, Municipal Building, Centre and Chambers Streets, New York, December 8, 1914.

Hon. GEORGE McANENY, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I am compelled to make another request upon your honorable Board for \$2,629 Revenue Bonds, to provide ten emergency keepers for three and one-half months, and to provide heavy boots for stormy weather for the farm colony and for the men assisting at the heavy work now going on at Riker's Island.

The census for December 6, 1914, for all institutions was 6,183, which is 1,727 in excess of the census for December 6, 1913, one year ago. Provision is made in the 1915 budget for ten keepers and six matrons and nurses in excess of those employed a year ago. This increase is utterly insufficient for dealing with the great influx of inmates which, according to present indications, will reach a total of 7,000 to 7,500 by the end of February. The appropriations for the year 1915 contemplate an averaged census of 5,000 for all institutions. It is positively unsafe to attempt to care for the present inmates with the present corps of workers. There is a limit to human endurance and to human ingenuity, and the department is compelled to care for any one sent to it by the courts.

I am enclosing herewith copy of a letter sent to the Board of Estimate in November, when conditions were not as acute as they are at present.

There are no funds available to provide heavy rubber or felt boots for the use of the men working out doors at the farm colony in Orange County, or for those working outdoors at Riker's Island. The department makes boots and shoes which are not in any way sufficient for the relatively few persons engaged continuously upon work which requires waterproof boots. I am asking, therefore, for emergency appropriation of \$285, for rubber boots, which were not provided for this year, and for the year 1915.

Immediate action upon this emergency request is urged, for I have been informed by the wardens of the different institutions that they are unable to cope with the situation with the present quota of keepers. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—On November 20, 1914, at the request of the Comptroller, I forwarded a statement of salary balances in excess of that required to pay the salaries of present employees. This balance was \$12,455.41. In that letter I indicated that if our census continued to increase, it might be necessary for me to ask for the use of a portion of these funds or for revenue bonds.

I am compelled to ask for permission to use sufficient of this \$12,455.41 balance to employ immediately two additional keepers, or two prison helpers, for Riker's Island Branch Workhouse, and four additional keepers for Hart's Island Branch Workhouse.

It is not safe to allow prisoners to operate the low pressure steam plant at Riker's Island without supervision. Within a few days it will be necessary to send from 150 to 200 more prisoners to Riker's Island. This will mean placing cots in the centre aisles of present open dormitories, where there is but one man to have charge of from 150 to 200 men. We shall soon open another dormitory at Riker's Island. There is, therefore, no possibility of reassigning the present keepers so that a keeper for day duty and night duty may be placed in charge of the prisoners who are employed in the fireroom.

I find it necessary to reoccupy the old dormitory building on Hart's Island, which was partially destroyed by fire last winter. The warden has covered the ceiling with heavy paper, fastened on with second-hand laths. The placing of men in this dormitory is a tremendous fire risk, which, under ordinary circumstances, I would not think of taking. The City ought not to require the placing of men in this building under the custody of orderlies or hospital helpers, taken from other work. First, because of the necessity for their services where they are and, second, because of the great risk the city would run in placing the kind of prisoner we must now send to Hart's Island under the custody of the kind of a person who accepts employment as hospital helper.

By placing two men in each cell at the penitentiary, we have been enabled to care for a total of 1,451 at that institution, six less than capacity under this plan. I consider the doubling up of penitentiary prisoners a vicious practice, and one which cannot be defended except as an emergency measure, in view of the terrific congestion.

I wish to call your attention to the fact that we have not yet received the great influx of prisoners from the surrounding counties which are always sent to the penitentiary. Under the circumstances it became necessary for me to transfer able-bodied penitentiary prisoners from the penitentiary on Blackwells Island to Hart's Island, where they are to be kept in dormitories. I doubt if this has ever been done before in the history of the city. It is a dangerous expedient, and I cannot accept the responsibility for good order on Hart's Island unless I am supplied with sufficient keepers to permit me to do so.

To-day's census at Blackwell's Island Workhouse is 1,440, an increase of 64 over that of yesterday. The increase on the 25th was 60 over that of the 24th. This increase is not confined to vagrants, who are more or less harmless and come in later in the year. They are disorderly conduct cases for the most part; active young men who are altogether too active to place in dormitory buildings. Under the present conditions we are forced to double up with this kind of prisoners on Riker's Island.

I wish to call your attention to the comparative census and employment list for the workhouse and the two branch workhouses, which is presented below:

Your early action upon this request will greatly facilitate our work.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on November 24, 1914 (Minutes, pages 612 and 613), and the annexed resolutions relating to certain apportionments of charges in the Budget for 1915, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, as the Board has acted on the Budget, it cannot give these resolutions proper consideration. It recommends that Aldermen Robitzek take up these matters with the Corporation Counsel, and that the resolutions be ordered on file.

Whereas, In the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1915, New York County is charged with \$949,667 as its pro rata share for the maintenance of the Supreme Court, while Bronx County is charged with \$114,822; and

Whereas, These charges were made up on the basis of percentage of the assessed valuation of real estate in New York County and Bronx County; and

Whereas, New York County has 31 Judges of the Supreme Court, while Bronx County has but 1; and

Whereas, There is no law empowering the Comptroller to arbitrarily apportion these charges on the basis of assessed valuation of real estate in the several counties; and

Whereas, The share of Bronx County is inequitable, unreasonable and unjust, and not based upon the service rendered to Bronx County as against New York County; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Finance Committee of this Board be and they are hereby empowered and authorized to investigate this matter and report to this Board as to whether or not Bronx County is paying more than its pro rata share for the maintenance of the Supreme Court, and whether or not the Comptroller was justified and authorized by law or otherwise to base these charges on the percentage of assessed valuation of real estate in these two counties.

Whereas, in the Budget of the City of New York for the year 1915, New York County is charged with \$82,980 as its pro rata share for maintenance of charitable institutions and Bronx County is charged with the sum of \$31,020; and whereas said charges are evidently out of proportion, and, upon investigation, it will be ascertained that the number of dependents in charitable institutions in Bronx County, as against the number of dependents in charitable institutions in New York County, would make the amount that Bronx County should be charged with considerably less than \$31,020; and

Whereas, in the Budget for 1914, a superintendent, stenographer, clerk and examiner were added to the Code, No. 1914, Bureau of Dependent Adults, Manhattan, for the purpose of establishing a branch office in the Bronx, which office was made necessary by reason of the Inferior Criminal Courts Act, which provides that a branch of the Department of Public Charities be maintained in or near the Court of Domestic Relations; and

Whereas, since the 1st of January, 1914, a Court of Domestic Relations is established in the Borough of Bronx, but no office was opened in the Bronx, except that on the 1st of April, 1914, a hospital helper receiving \$40 a month was detailed for the Borough of Bronx, and a Superintendent who had been detailed for the Borough of Bronx was instead sent to Brooklyn in a subordinate position; and

Whereas, Bronx County dependents are compelled to go to East 59th Street, in the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, in this Budget the Department of Public Charities asks for several increases in salary and several additional social investigators, superintendents and the like, all of which are unnecessary and do not in any way assist dependents, as can be better ascertained by the annexed communication from the Department of Public Charities and memorandum in reply; therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Finance Committee of this Board be and they hereby are empowered to investigate and inquire into the facts aforementioned, and report to this Board as to whether or not Bronx County is paying more than its pro rata share towards the maintenance of charitable institutions in the Budget of the City of New York for 1915, and further as to what became of the money appropriated in the 1914 Budget for the opening of a Bronx County office of the Department of Public Charities.

A taxicab is a coach driven by mechanical power on which a taximeter is affixed. Any vehicle that has a taximeter affixed and uses the streets and avenues of The City of New York for the purpose of carrying passengers for hire, shall be deemed a public hack and licensed under this ordinance.

This ordinance shall not apply to [or govern any vehicle hired or obtained from a livery stable or garage and which does not solicit passengers upon the streets; nor to] any omnibus running by authority of any ordinance, law, charter or permit upon a fixed route through the city.

§ 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Dear Sir—Owing to the proposed plan of lighting public streets, bridges and buildings on and after January 1, 1915, predicated on the allowance in the 1915 budget, it is incumbent on this Department that changes in the present 1914 lighting equipment be made before December 31, 1914. To accomplish this, certain fixtures must be procured and installed by this Department at its own expense in order to insure that the cost of lighting will be within the amount allowed the Department after the said changes, alterations or substitutions have been made.

It is the intention to replace certain existing electric arc lamps by nitrogen gas filled lamps in the following quantities:

Williamsburg Bridge	140
Brooklyn Bridge	166
Various street lamps throughout the City, estimated	700

—and to have the installations of same made on or about December 15, 1914.

With this end in view it will therefore be necessary to enter into arrangements with the manufacturers of the said fixtures as soon as possible, in order to purchase about 1,000 fixtures, costing about \$10.80 each and, in view of the fact that there are only two or three manufacturers of the said fixtures, any orders for the said equipment would involve in any event more than an expenditure of \$1,000. It is also to be noted that the above will involve an expenditure of about \$11,000, funds for which are now available in the 1914 appropriation accounts, and the said expenditure will be offset in 1915 by a saving in the cost of electric current of a sum amounting to over \$30,000.

Again, the said fixtures are not patented articles, and are manufactured by the General Electric Company and the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company, who are equipped and prepared to furnish on short notice the above needs of the Department.

In view of the above, as well as the emergency created in the 1915 budget, whereby this Department must install before January 1, 1915, the necessary lighting equipment to meet the said reduction, as against the existing 1914 equipment, I would respectfully request that your Honorable Board approve the necessary measures whereby I may be empowered to issue orders for the said fixtures as soon as possible, without entering into public letting.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on September 22, 1914 (Minutes, page 362), the annexed communication from the Comptroller in relation to the approval of the selection of the Williamsburg Trust Company Building as a suitable place for a court house for the Fifth District City Magistrates' Court, respectfully

REPORTS:

That it has given this question the most careful consideration, has held a number of hearings to accommodate those for and against this proposition, and has even made a physical examination of the property in order that it might be in possession of all the facts in connection therewith.

Contention has been made that this site is not convenient, that the price at which it is offered is excessive, and in addition a large sum will be needed to make it suitable for the purpose intended, that the City now owns property more centrally located in this judicial district upon which a satisfactory building could be erected, and that the court cannot be held in this building under favorable auspices because of the noise caused by vehicular and railroad traffic.

Its investigation has convinced the Committee that these objections are not well founded. The real estate expert of the Finance Department, whose experience and judgment is second to none, and the judges of the court, all declare that this is an opportunity for the City to secure at a price much lower than it could be had under any other circumstances a beautiful building in a commanding and convenient location, accessible for litigants, lawyers and witnesses by many transit lines. These officers further state that the necessary changes can be made at a moderate expense to the City, which will then have a well equipped court house which will be a credit to the City for many years to come. The suggested annoyance by noise is, in the opinion of the Committee, as a result of its visit to the building, a matter which is not susceptible of proof.

As regards certain City property within this judicial district available for a court house site, the Committee believes, after investigation and hearing testimony on this subject, that there is no site which is as available and upon which a court house of this convenience and appearance can be erected.

The Committee coincides with the recommendation made by the Comptroller in his letter of transmittal, and recommends the adoption of the attached ordinance approving this site.

AN ORDINANCE selecting and designating a site for court house purposes, under the jurisdiction of the Board of City Magistrates of The City of New York, Second Division.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby selects and designates as a site for court house purposes, under the jurisdiction of the Board of City Magistrates of The City of New York for the Second Division, the following described premises, with building thereon erected, to wit:

All that certain plot, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, City and State of New York, with the buildings and improvements thereon erected, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the westerly clearance line of the property taken by the City of New York for the purposes of the East River Bridge, 100 feet southerly from the intersection of said westerly clearance line with the southerly side of South Fourth Street; running thence westerly and parallel with said South Fourth Street 90 feet 1 1/4 inches; thence southerly parallel with Driggs Avenue 15 feet; thence westerly along retaining wall and again parallel with said South Fourth Street 10 feet; thence southerly along retaining wall and parallel with Driggs Avenue 51 feet 7/8 inches, more or less, to the northerly clearance line of the property taken by The City of New York for the purposes of the East River Bridge; thence easterly along said northerly clearance line 100 feet 5 1/2 inches, more or less, to the said westerly clearance line of the property taken by The City of New York for the purposes of the East River Bridge; thence northerly along said westerly clearance line 59 feet 4 1/4 inches to the point or place of beginning.

Sec. 2. The Corporation Counsel is hereby authorized and directed to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of said lands and premises.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall not preclude the acquisition of the above described lands and premises, or any part thereof, by purchase from the owner or the respective owners thereof, at a price authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 4. The Clerk of this Board is hereby directed to prepare two similar surveys, maps or plans of said lands and premises and file the same—one in the office of this Board and the other in the office of the Register of the County of Kings, in accordance with the provisions of section 1436 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Honorable Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication from the Honorable Louis H. Reynolds, Chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Repairs of the Magistrates' Court of The City of New York, Second Division, in which he transmits a copy of a resolution passed by the Board of City Magistrates, Second Division, at a meeting held on July 20, 1914, approving the selection of the Williamsburgh Trust Company Building as a suitable place for a court house for the Fifth District City Magistrates' Court.

This court is at present occupying premises No. 249 Manhattan Avenue, southwest corner of Powers Street, Borough of Brooklyn. The Board of Aldermen some time ago adopted a resolution stating that these premises are costly to the City on account of the constant repairs required, and that owing to the increase of business they are inadequate, and requesting the Comptroller, through his Real Estate Bureau, to investigate the conditions in connection with said location with a view to the acquisition by the City of a more suitable site for said court.

I have caused such an investigation to be made, and find that the building is unsanitary and absolutely unfit for the purposes for which it is used. In my opinion, the Williamsburgh Trust Company Building, which is located on the easterly side of Driggs Avenue, between South Fourth and South Fifth Streets, Borough of Brooklyn, is the most available property in this section for court house purposes, and the selection of the same has been approved by the Board of City Magistrates.

Before the purchase of the Williamsburgh Trust Company Building can be authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it must first be selected by your body as a court house site. It is very important that immediate action be taken in connection therewith, in order that preliminary steps may be commenced for the fitting up of this building as a court house.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution selecting and designating as a court house site the following described premises with the building thereon erected:

All that certain plot, piece or parcel of land, situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, City and State of New York, with the buildings and improvements thereon erected, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the westerly clearance line of the property taken by the City of New York for the purposes of the East River Bridge, 100 feet southerly from the intersection of said westerly clearance line with the southerly side of South Fourth Street; running thence westerly and parallel with said South Fourth Street 90 feet 1 1/4 inches; thence southerly parallel with Driggs Avenue 15 feet; thence westerly along retaining wall and again parallel with said South Fourth Street 10 feet; thence southerly along retaining wall and parallel with Driggs Avenue 51 feet 7/8 inches, more or less, to the northerly clearance line of the property taken by The City of New York for the purposes of the East River Bridge; thence easterly along said northerly clearance line 100 feet 5 1/2 inches, more or less, to the said westerly clearance line of the property taken by The City of New York for the purposes of the East River Bridge; thence northerly along said westerly clearance line 59 feet 4 1/4 inches to the point or place of beginning.

An Ordinance to Amend "An Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances Relative to Stands Within the Stoop Line and Under the Elevated Railroad Stations."

AN ORDINANCE to amend "An Ordinance to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relative to stands within the stoop line and under elevated railroad stations," as approved March 4, 1914.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 364 of chapter 7, article 4 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances, relative to stands within the stoop line and under elevated railroad stations, as amended, and approved March 4, 1914, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

Sec. 364. Every such stand must be strictly within the stoop line and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public, and shall not exceed the space of 10 feet long by 4 feet wide, except that in the case of bootblack stands a space not more than 3 feet wide and 4 feet 8 inches long may be occupied by each chair of such stand. *Thus, a stand for bootblack purposes only may be 10 feet long by 4 feet 8 inches wide.* The construction and erection of all stands permitted by this ordinance shall be at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which said stand is located. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of the structure or hold more than one license. The Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall have the power to transfer a permit or license to another location for the period of its unexpired term; provided, however, that the application for such transfer shall be accompanied by the consent of the owner of the premises to which the proposed transfer is to be made.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 18, 1911, which took effect July 31, 1911, without the approval or disapproval of the Mayor (pursuant to the provisions of Section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended and supplemented), entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the more conspicuous numbering of certain buildings in the City of New York," as amended by an ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 2, 1912, which took effect April 16, 1912, without the approval or disapproval of the Mayor [pursuant to the provisions of § 40 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended and supplemented], entitled "An Ordinance to amend section 1 of 'An Ordinance to provide for the more conspicuous numbering of certain buildings in the City of New York,'" is hereby further amended to read as follows:

§ [Section] 1. The owner, agent, lessee or other person in charge of each and every [residence or] building [used for residential purposes] in the City of New York upon a street to which house numbers shall have been assigned shall cause [to be placed or affixed on the fan-light or on the inner door] the proper [street] house number or numbers of [said] such building to be plainly and legibly displayed thereon in such manner and position that the same shall be at all times plainly visible and easily read from the sidewalk in front of such building [and shall have said number or numbers kept and retained and renewed thereon so]; provided, however, that [where such residence or building used for residence purposes is set back from the street line to an extent which would make such number or numbers illegible to persons in the street, then] such number or numbers may [shall] be [so] placed or affixed on a gate, gate post, fence or other object adjacent to the entrance and near the street line of the [such premises] building in such manner and position [and shall be kept and retained or renewed thereon so] that the same may at all times be legible to persons in the street.

§ 2. If the owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of any residence or building used for residential purposes in The City of New York, shall fail to provide, place and keep such number or numbers on any such building within thirty days after this ordinance shall take effect, the President of the Borough having jurisdiction shall forthwith serve such owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of the building with a copy of this ordinance, and if after thirty days service the owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of a building shall fail or neglect to comply with the provisions of this ordinance he shall be subject to a penalty of ten dollars [\$10], which shall be sued for and collected in the name of The City of New York.

Section 2. Section 105, of Article II of Chapter 5, of Part I of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, and § 73, Chapter 6, of Part III of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 11a. The Corporation Counsel shall, on or before the tenth day of each month, render to the head of each department of the City and to each Borough President an itemized statement showing the amounts of all fines, penalties, judgments, costs and other recoveries collected by him during the preceding calendar month, on account of actions or proceedings instituted or recommended to be instituted by the heads of such departments or Borough Presidents, or any of their subordinates, concerning matters within their respective jurisdictions.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BUREAU OF HIGHWAYS.

Contracts amounting to \$767,165.30, chargeable to appropriations, corporate stock and the Street Improvement Fund, were entered into by this bureau during the quarter. Contracts charged to budget appropriations were for paving blocks of various kinds, trap rock and screenings, used in the care and maintenance of highways. Those chargeable to other funds were for paving and repaving streets.

There were in course of preparation during this period 145 assessment lists for original improvements authorized and completed, of which 64, aggregating in value \$359,654.68, were sent to the Board of Assessors. Thirty-one profiles were also transmitted to the Board of Assessors. Fifty-six plans for new work were made, of which number 27 were for paving; there were also prepared 12 miscellaneous maps, tables and diagrams, and 100 sets of specifications.

Of reports for original improvements initiated in the Local Board upon petition of property owners, 106 were made, giving the estimated quantities of material required, estimated cost, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment according to the last preceding tax roll. Of this number 42 were for paving and 10 for regulating, grading and paving combined.

Assigning House Numbers.—Assigned, 2070; inspected, 125; notices served, 230; complaints of duplicates settled, 6; streets served with paving notices, 57.

Repairs to Defective Pavements.—Granite on concrete, 11,342 sq. yds.; granite on sand, 33,196 sq. yds.; Belgian block, 2,036 sq. yds.; cobblestone, 1,508 sq. yds.; wood block, 5,991 sq. yds.; asphalt block, 1,793 sq. yds.; Medina block, 382; iron slag, 104 sq. yds.

Restoring Cuts Made by Corporations, Plumbers, Etc.—Granite on concrete, 5,806 sq. yds.; granite on sand, 6,243 sq. yds.; Belgian block, 352 sq. yds.; cobblestone, 56 sq. yds.; Medina, 297 sq. yds.; asphalt block, 396 sq. yds.; 6-inch concrete foundation, 11,664 sq. yds.; macadam, 2,156 sq. yds.; wood block, 277 sq. yds.; brick, 33 sq. yds.; iron slag block, 182 sq. yds.

Sidewalk Repairs.—Bluestone walks, 261,196 sq. ft.; cement walk, 20,360 sq. ft.; brick walk, 473 sq. ft.; bluestone curb, 1,584 lin. ft.; bridging, 1,640 sq. ft.; cement curb, 1,850 lin. ft.; Medina, 478 lin. ft.; concrete curb foundation, 717 lin. ft.

Shaping Up and Repairing Dirt and Unimproved Roadways.—Macadam repairs, 42,576 sq. yds.; macadam cleaned, 228,614 sq. yds.; dirt roadways repaired (hand), 463,501 sq. yds.; dirt roadways repaired (machine), 293,681 sq. yds.; ash sidewalks, 24,161 sq. yds.; sand removed West 23d st., Coney Island, 96 cu. yds.; cesspools built, 3; cesspools cleaned, 82; paved gutters cleaned, 23,869 sq. yds.; dirt sidewalks, 4,110 sq. yds.

In addition, there was considerable miscellaneous work, consisting of bridge repairs, drainage, miscellaneous trucking, repairing tools and equipment, filling wash-outs, removing incumbrances, etc.

Municipal Asphalt Plant.

The total plant product was: 12,831 boxes of wearing surface mixture, 120,611.40 cu. ft.; 3,435 boxes of binder mixture, 33,491.25 cu. ft.

Work performed by gangs: 107,289.25 cu. ft. wearing surface mixture laid; 24,974.63 cu. ft. binder surface; plant repairs, inspections, etc.

Chemical Testing Laboratory.

Hydraulic cements, 556 samples; asphalt surface mixtures, 389 samples; miscellaneous samples, 716; total, 1661 samples tested.

Division of Incumbrances.

The total number of complaints received from all sources during the quarter was 951, divided as follows: Bureau of Complaints, 93; mail, 208; office, 124; inspectors, 424; police, 65; Street Cleaning Department, 37.

Incumbrances removed by the bureau: Signs, 22; boulders, 212; trees, etc., 187; posts, poles, etc., 6; miscellaneous (loads of earth dumped), 591; dangerous excavations made safe, 24; produce (bags) 21; incumbrances seized, 7; redemptions, 3.

Permits to the number of 3,302 were issued for: Building material on streets, 427; crosswalks, 364; vaults (new), 12; vaults (repairs), 43; cement walks, 246; driveways, 129; specials, 2,081.

The total number of permits to the various corporations to make openings in streets amounted to 3,889, of this number 1953 were granted to the Gas Company to lay mains and make repairs to gas services; 1,219 to the Edison Electric Illuminating Co. to lay conduits, make repairs, etc.; 297 to the railroad companies, and 420 were miscellaneous permits.

BUREAU OF SEWERS.

On March 31, 1914, there were 973,776 miles of sewers in the borough, and during the quarter there were built 75,589.74 lin. ft. of all sizes of sewers, or an equivalent of 14,316 miles. The mileage is not increased by this amount, however, as 0.023 miles were reconstruction, making a net increase of 14,293 miles, which makes the total mileage of sewers at the end of the quarter 988,069. The sizes of the different sewers constructed are as follows:

Vitrified pipe sewers, 8-in. to 30-in. (66,410.77 lin. ft.), 12,578 miles; brick sewers, 30-in. to 180-in. (6,301.68 lin. ft.), 1,193 miles; reinforced concrete sewers, 54-in. to 180-in. (2,877.29 lin. ft.), 0.545 mile. Total (75,589.74 lin. ft.), 14,316 miles.

Reports to the number of 107 were made, 60 of which were for sewers to precede paving at a cost of \$3,100, the balance being for sewers petitioned for in the regular course, the estimated cost being \$413,650. These reports cover a total of 8.42 miles of sewers.

Assessment lists were prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors for 53 contracts, amounting to \$130,538.45, and 48 contracts, amounting to \$906,986.00, were completed and accepted up to the close of the quarter, but had not been sent to the Board of Assessors.

Division of Maintenance and Repairs.

Permits issued to make new connections, 1,503; permits issued for repairs to connections, 427; basins repaired, 707; manholes repaired, 418; lateral sewers examined, 2,515,990 linear feet; lateral sewers cleaned, 1,154,092 linear feet; large brick sewers cleaned, 947 linear feet; deposit removed from sewers, 641 cubic yards; lateral sewers repaired, 405½ linear feet.

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

The work done by this bureau during the quarter was as follows: 50,400 feet precise chaining, 707,550 feet approximate chaining, 70,300 feet precise line work, 220 precise angles measured, 29,557 feet profiles for regulating, grading, etc. (original improvement of streets), 83,177 feet line and grade stakes set (original improvement of streets), 9 monument points set, 10 monuments referenced, 32 monuments reset, 6 monument covers set, 11 cement walks cut to render monuments accessible.

A number of maps were completed and transmitted to this office affecting changes of the established elevation of streets, reduction in the width of streets, widening, locating and laying out, closing and discontinuing, etc., all requiring action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In addition there was furnished considerable information in the preparation of statements of facts for submission to the Corporation Counsel for determination as to whether same were sufficient to authorize the city to commence public improvements without the need of condemnation proceedings.

BUREAU OF BUILDINGS.

Violations reported: Plastering, 3; defective plumbing and drainage, 242; defective construction and materials, 452; elevators, 18; erecting and altering without permit, 320; unsafe buildings, 59.

Notices issued: Removal of violations, 889; removal of unsafe buildings, 59; repairing passenger elevators, 18.

Thirty-three complaints were received and, upon investigation, remedied.

Passenger elevators to the number of 1,243 were inspected, of which 18 were found not in compliance with the law.

There were filed 711 plans for new construction, affecting 1,376 buildings, the estimated cost of which was \$13,644,900; 53 of which were for 272 one-family brick buildings, at an estimated cost of less than \$20,000 each, total, \$1,164,500; 81 for 243 two-family brick buildings, each to cost less than \$20,000, total, \$958,200; 140 for 224 tenements, each to cost over \$20,000, total, \$7,027,000; 21 for 31 tenements, each to cost less than \$20,000, total, \$317,000; 1 for a brick store, to cost \$95,000 or over; 8 for 9 stores, to cost less than \$15,000, total, \$17,550; 29 for 63 two-family brick houses with stores, total cost, \$373,800; 2 for 2 office buildings, total cost, \$16,200; 21 for factories and workshops, total cost, \$519,700; 3 for school houses, total cost, \$215,000; 2 churches, total cost, \$104,500; 3 for public buildings, total cost, \$87,000; 19 for places of amusement, hotels, lodging houses, etc., total cost, \$618,950; 45 were for brick stables and garages, total cost, \$120,800; 22 for miscellaneous brick buildings, such as ash stations, etc., total cost, \$140,350; 121 for 244 one-family frame buildings, total cost, \$628,100; 35 for 54 two-family frame dwellings, total cost, \$182,000; 3 for 5 frame tenements, total cost, \$30,500; 1 for a frame two-family building with store, total cost, \$4,000; 2 for frame factories and workshops, total cost, \$2,600; 96 for 105 frame structures of a miscellaneous nature, total cost, \$62,150; 3 for ware-houses and loft buildings, total cost, \$960,000.

DIVISION OF SUBSTRUCTURES.

Surveys have been completed in DeKalb ave., between Grand ave. and Taaffe place; in Grand ave., from Myrtle ave. to DeKalb ave.; in Taaffe place, between DeKalb and Willoughby aves.; in Washington ave., from Flushing ave. to Taylor st., and parts of intersecting streets, in all about 1.2 miles.

Investigations of substructures were in progress in Myrtle ave., from Washington ave. to Kent ave., and in Flushing ave., from Hudson ave. to Grand ave. A resurvey of Flushing ave., between Hudson and Washington aves., for a distance of 382.5 feet, was made owing to the widening of the roadway and the changing of manholes and catch basins.

Requests for subsurface information were made and furnished to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Department of Taxes, the Public Service Commission, the Department of Finance, the Bureau of Sewers, Long Island Railroad, Flatbush Water Co., New York Telephone Co., Edison Co. and H. G. Dangler, architect.

Additional information was asked by the Borough of Queens concerning the work of this division, and every courtesy was extended to the representatives of that borough.

BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Supplies amounting to \$14,576.49 were purchased on open market orders and five contracts were entered into at a cost of \$18,439.22.

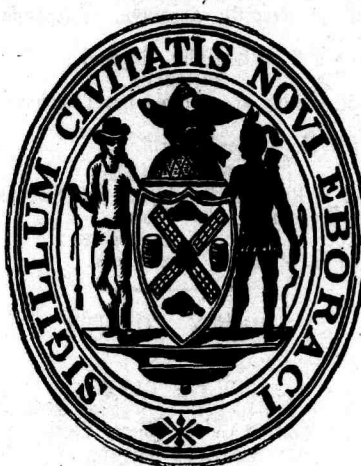

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature, issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
