

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 20, 1877.

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; and J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following report, viz.:

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,

NEW YORK, October 20, 1877.

The Comptroller would report, that at the sale of ferry franchises on October 11, 1877, the following franchises were sold to the highest bidder:

Ferry from Barclay street, North river, to Hoboken, New Jersey, was struck down to the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, at \$6,362.96 per annum.

Ferry from Houston street, East river, to Brooklyn, E. D., to the Nassau Ferry Company, at \$6,775, 17 per annum.

Ferry from Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, Long Island, to the Greenpoint Ferry Com-

pany, at \$1,810.17 per annum.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolutions, which, on motion, were adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be empowered to sell, at public auction, the lease of the franchise of the ferry from the bulkhead at the foot of Whitehall street, New York City, to Staten Island, as established by resolution of the Common Council, approved November 3, 1875, for the term extending from Iuly 15, 1877, to May 1, 1884.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby appraise and fix the value of the franchise of the ferry from the bulkhead at the foot of Whitehall street, New York City, to Staten Island, as established by resolution of Common Council, approved November 3, 1875, at \$1,500 per

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the communication from John O'Donnell, Chairman of Farmers' Co-operative Union, in relation to fines imposed on John S. Croucher and Skidmore Laugdon, for incumbrance of Hudson street, by market wagons, reported the following resolution, which,

non motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the sum of ten (\$10) dollars each be paid to John S. Croucher and Skidmore Langdon, the same being amount of fines collected from them illegally, for a supposed violation of the ordinances of the city, relative to market wagons, and paid into the Sinking Fund, October 5,

The Comptroller stated that on the 13th inst. there was a balance in the treasury to the credit of "The Sinking Fund, for the payment of interest on the City Debt," of \$747,749.41, and submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant be executed in favor of J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain, for the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) to be charged to the "Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt," on account of the "Surplus Revenues" of said Fund, for the year 1877, and credited to the "General Fund," in pursuance of chapter 163, Laws of 1862.

The following resolution of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor, October 15, 1877, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller, viz.:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby requested to report to this Board as early as convenient, what steps, if any, have been taken for increasing the revenue of the Corporation by disposing of the large quantity of land reclaimed from the waters of the North river by the Dock Department, west of West and other streets, in the erection of new bulkheads and the extension of piers on the western water-front of this city."

An application was received from the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction for "the use of the unoccupied fire-engine house in Beekman street, to be used as a reception hospital."

The Comptroller stated that the building referred to had been, by resolution of this Board, adopted January 22, 1877, "appropriated for public use as Offices of the Corporation Attorney and of the Public Administrator;" and recommended that the premises leased from the New York Dispensary, at the northwest corner of Centre and White streets, be designated as a Reception Hospital, and that the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction be authorized to take possession thereof and to occupy the same for such purposes; which, on motion, was adopted.

An application was received from William P. Patten, 62 Clinton place, "to be allowed to temporarily occupy the unoccupied School-house, at No. 61 Thompson street, for the purposes of holding religious meetings and school therein, during the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund;" which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

Section 189. Whenever a nuisance in any place at or
upon any premises in the City of New York, shall have
been found or declared by resolution of the Board of
Health to exist, and an order shall have been made
directing the owner or lessee of such premises to make
suitable and necessary repairs or improvements, or to
abate the said nuisance, such repairs or improvements
shall be made, and such nuisance shall be fully abated in
the manner directed by the Board of Health, within five
days after notice thereof.

Section 190. All sinks, basins, and stationary tubs in
every hotel, lodging, tenement, or boarding-house in the
City of New York, shall be provided with proper stench
traps directly under each sink, basin or stationary tub, so
connected with the waste or soil-pipe, and so constructed
as directed or approved by the Board of Health, and with
the traps so adjusted as to prevent the escape therefrom of
foul odors and gases.

Section 191. All privy vaults in the yard of any house
in the City of New York, within twenty feet of any dwelling, shall be ventilated by means of an eight-inch earthenware pipe, laid at least six inches below the surface of the
yard, from the said vault to the nearest wall of the building of the greatest altitude at or upon said premises, and
there connected with a vertical metallic shaft of like diameter extending not less than two feet above the roof of
such building. And every privy vault in the City of New
York shall be ventilated in this way, nnless a permit in
writing specially exce such building. And every privy vault in the City of New York shall be ventilated in this way, naless a permit in writing specially excepting such vault from the requirements of this ordinance be granted, and it be otherwise ordered by the Board of Health.

Section 192. Privy-vaults shall be ventilated and shall be constructed or repaired; and manure-vaults shall be covered, provided with drains, and built or repaired in the City of New York in accordance with directions from and orders made therefor by the Board of Health.

Section 193. The waste or soil pipe in every tenement or lodging house in the City of New York shall be ventilated by extending the same by means of a pipe of the same size to a height of not less than two feet above the roof of the building, or pursuant to the terms of a permit in writing from the Board of Health.

Resolved, That section 86 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended by adding thereto the following, "unless in accordance with the terms of a special permit in writing from this Board."
