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BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, February 3, 1890.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 1 P. M., at the office of his Honor, Mayor Grant.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Engineers of the Finance and Public Works Departments made the following report :

NEW YORK, January 22, 1890.

To the Armory Commission :

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, directed respectively by the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works, in accordance with the following resolution of the Armory Board, passed December 20, 1889 :

"Resolved, That the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works be each requested to send an Engineer from their respective departments at an early time to confer together and visit and inspect the Twenty-second Regiment Armory building, and report to the Armory Board as to the character of the building. Certain complaints as to the character of this building, anonymous and otherwise, having reached the Armory Board, an expert opinion is desired on the character of the building before passing certain payments now asked for."

—respectfully report :

That they have carefully examined the building now being erected as an armory for the Twenty-second Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., on the block bounded by Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets and Ninth avenue and the Boulevard, in connection with the plans and the reports, anonymous and otherwise, that have been urged against it.

The most definite complaint was made by the mason. He thinks that the balcony of the tower is not sufficiently strong. We have examined this point closely, and believe the plans are sufficient.

The indefinite rumors and unsigned complaints seem to refer to the thickness of the walls on the Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets sides, and appear to have been based on the idea that they sustain some portion of the pressure of the roof trusses. We find that these walls have the full thickness for the whole of the duty they have to perform, which is entirely disconnected from the roof trusses. The latter rest on piers built especially for them, and they are restrained from any outward sliding motion at the foot by ample tension rods, stretched from one end to the other of each truss, under the floor. Full space is left between the trusses and the walls to allow for expansion.

Another complaint referred to a certain iron column, supporting a wall above, not being fireproofed. This fireproofing has been completed since this investigation was commenced, and the column is now satisfactory.

We find some minor defects which may be mentioned, but we do not consider them as interfering with the strength of the building. For instance, in the arch over the main southern doorways on the Boulevard and Sixty-seventh street, there is defective cutting of stone, which will necessitate trimming, and some of the brickwork was not pointed where it was directed in the specifications. These defects can be easily remedied in finishing the work.

The brickwork of the walls appears to be as required by the specifications.

We are of opinion that the tin of the roof is somewhat thin for so large a space, but we find it is of the quality prescribed by the specifications.

And also that the building has been erected in substantial accordance with the plans and specifications.

Lantry, the contractor for carpentry in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, five thousand nine hundred and seventy-eight dollars and twenty-two cents (\$5,978.22), the amount due him on this date, in accordance with the Architect's certificate, and that a voucher for that amount be forwarded.

This resolution was adopted by the following vote :

The Mayor, aye ; the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, aye ; the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, aye ; and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, aye.

The application of James D. Murphy for a payment of six thousand and thirty-five dollars, which was laid over at the last meeting, was then taken up, and Commissioner Coleman offered the following :

Resolved, That the Comptroller be directed to pay to James D. Murphy, the contractor for masonry in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, six thousand and thirty-five dollars (\$6,035), the amount due him on this date, in accordance with the Architect's certificate, and that a voucher for that amount be forwarded.

This resolution was adopted by the following vote :

The Mayor, aye ; the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, aye ; the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, aye ; and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, aye.

A communication was received from J. Joseph, No. 55 Liberty street, offering a plot of ground at the southwest corner of Fourth avenue and Nineteenth street, as an armory site. It was ordered on file.

A communication was received from John L. Tonnele and John T. Hall, as and for the owners of the present Twenty-second Regiment Armory, calling attention to a clause in the lease relative to extending the same for another year. It was ordered on file.

The following communication was received from James D. Murphy, masonry contractor for the Twenty-second Regiment Armory. It was ordered on file.

NEW YORK, January 31, 1890.

To the Honorable Armory Board, New York City :

GENTLEMEN—On December 17, I made a formal application for a payment of \$6,035 on account of my contract and accompanied the same with the required affidavit that the work was furnished and in place.

On the same date the Architect certified that I was entitled to such payment. At your meeting on December 20, when my application was presented to your Board, the payment was deferred to await the report of the Engineers appointed to investigate the character of the building, owing to certain reports about the defective fireproofing of some iron columns and other work not affecting that for which my certificate was given.

As more than a month has since elapsed, and my payment is still held back, I can but call your attention to the fact that the payments under the stipulated conditions are as much a part of the contract as the execution of the work by me, and withholding the payments embarrass and retard my operations and will tend to prevent my completing the work in the time prescribed by the contract.

I beg, therefore, that you will give my application for a payment immediate consideration.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Comptroller be directed to pay to the Archer & Pancoast Manufacturing Company the sum of forty-six hundred and one dollars and sixty-nine cents, being the amount of their contract for furnishing gas fixtures for the Eighth Regiment Armory Building.

An application was made by Ambrose E. Barnes & Brother, for the payment to them of seven thousand four hundred and ninety dollars (\$7,490), for furniture, as per specifications for the Eighth Regiment Armory, as per their contract.

The same was duly certified by Secretary Coleman and John Guy, the Inspector.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Comptroller be directed to pay Ambrose E. Barnes & Brother seven thousand four hundred and ninety dollars, being the amount of their contract for furniture for the Eighth Regiment Armory building.

This resolution was passed by the following vote :

Resolved, That the Comptroller be directed to pay to Christopher Nally, twenty-four hundred and sixty-five dollars, the amount due him on this date, in accordance with the Architect's certificate, and that a voucher for that amount be forwarded.

This resolution was adopted by the following vote, namely :

The Mayor, aye ; the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, aye ; the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, aye ; and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, aye.

An application and affidavit were presented for a payment to Patrick K. Lantry of thirty-five hundred and twenty-two dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$3,522.87) on account of his contract for carpenter work in the erection of an armory building for the Twenty-second Regiment.

A certificate from the Architect, John P. Leo, was received, stating that materials and work have been furnished, entitling the contractor to that amount.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Comptroller be directed to pay to Patrick K. Lantry, thirty-five hundred and twenty-two dollars and eighty-seven cents, the amount due him on this date, in accordance with the Architect's certificate, and that a voucher for that amount be forwarded.

This resolution was adopted by the following vote, namely :

The Mayor, aye ; the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, aye ; the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, aye ; and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, aye.

The following communication was received from James D. Murphy, masonry contractor for the Twenty-second Regiment :

NEW YORK, January 31, 1890.

To the Honorable Armory Board, New York City :

GENTLEMEN—I herewith call your attention to the fact that spring or sewer water backs into the markers' pit of the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, making it unfit for use and occupancy even during construction. While putting in the walls at this point I kept it clear of water by the constant use of a pump. Anticipating this trouble, from extraneous water, I increased the thickness of the walls, from that called for under the specifications, namely, twenty-four inches, to forty inches ; and also exceeded the requirements of my specifications, by using Portland cement in place of Rosendale, as called for.

In anticipation of the necessity of a waterproof lining of brick and asphalt to this part of the work, I have also inserted in the stone-work as it progressed, suitable iron anchors for securing a waterproof brick and asphalt lining.

These changes have added materially to the cost of the work as it now stands and are not called for in my contract and specifications.

The waterproof lining of brick and asphalt will, in my opinion, as previously stated, be a necessity to the use and occupancy of the building as well as to the sanitary requirements thereof, but as my contract does not call for any such work, I take this means of notifying you, and asking that you take such action in the premises as you may deem advisable.

The need of prompt action is very essential, as the Rifle Range and Drill Room floor cannot well be finished until this work is done.

The Architect, who was present, was called upon to explain the situation. He said that his construction and intention in the plans and specifications was that the contractor was to make the markers' pit water-tight.

The Board accepted the Architect's statement as their construction of the contract, and resolved that the Architect should so notify the contractor.

Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Committee appointed at the meeting of the Armory Board on December 20, to whom the application of Troop "A" for quarters was referred, be authorized to select a site and find the approximate cost of the same, which shall accommodate both First and Second Batteries and Troop "A."

This resolution was unanimously adopted.

Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the map of the plot of ground selected for the Ninth Regiment Armory on Fourteenth street, be referred to the Committee for a report on the same.

This resolution was unanimously adopted.

Commissioner Coleman called attention of the Board to a claim of the contractor for the Eighth Regiment Armory building for a return to him of money paid for permits for sewers.

It was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioner of Taxes and Assessments, as a Committee, to report on.

The meeting then adjourned.

Requisitions on the Comptroller.

Each estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REJECT ALL BIDS RECEIVED FOR ANY PARTICULAR WORK IF HE DEEMS IT FOR THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CITY.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * *

The said Commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERY.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * *

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra-water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
