DEAR SIR-In compliance with your request, we have the pleasure of submitting the following DEAR SIR—In compliance with your request, we have the pleasure of submitting the following statement in relation to the present condition of school-room accommodation, and also as to any action taken to provide the necessary room for all the children applying for admission to our public schools. At a meeting of the Board of Education, held on January 15, 1890, Commissioner Guggenheimer offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Special Committee of three be appointed to call upon the Trustees of the different wards, to devise means for the instruction of the children who are not able to attend the public schools by reason of the overcrowded condition of the same, and that such Committee consult said Trustees as to the advisability of hiring buildings or halls for this purpose until proper school accommodation can be obtained.

accommodation can be obtained.

This was unanimously adopted, and the President appointed as the Committee Commissioners Guggenheimer, Gallaway and Moriarty.

At the last meeting of the Board of Education, March 19, 1890, Commissioner Guggenheimer presented a report from the Special Committee on Additional School Accommodation, as follows:

To the Board of Education

The Committee appointed on Additional School Accommodation respectfully report, that they had a number of meetings; that they have requested the Chairmen of the different wards to attend the meetings for the purpose of suggesting to the Committee what, if any, means can be used for speedily giving children the necessary accommodation.

The Committee has also met jointly with the Building Committee, who have promised to recommend, upon proper application made by the Trustees, the hiring of temporary buildings suitable for the purpose, a list of which will be sent to them by the Trustees of the different wards. Of course, the Commissioners have no jurisdiction, and can only authorize the hiring of such buildings as the Ward Trustees may apply for.

The following reports from some of the wards, in which the schools are mostly overcrowded, will be read with interest:

The following reports from some of the wards, in which the schools are mostly overcrowded, will be read with interest:

The Thirteenth Ward Trustees report, that if they can get the new building this year, which will probably be commenced before June 1, they will not need any additional accommodation; that Grammar School No. 34, the only school in the ward which is overcrowded, has refused admission to children, one hundred of whom could, by walking three blocks to Primary School No. 40, in Norfolk street, find accommodation, while by walking tour or five blocks to Primary School No. 10, in Cannon street, they would find a school capable of accommodating over two hundred additional pupils, and that, therefore, there is no necessity of hiring additional buildings at present.

The Seventeenth Ward Trustees report that they want time to find suitable temporary quarters. They think one building will be sufficient, and that there is no such cry for school room as there is in the upper wards.

The Twelfth Ward, by its Trustees, reports that it is very hard to find temporary buildings suitable for the purpose; that what it needs most is a building in the neighborhood of One Hundred and Forty-first street and Eighth avenue.

The addition to Primary School No. 23, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Eighth avenue, will be ready in a few days and will afford relief to the extent of from five hundred to one

The Chairman, Mr. Guggenheimer, suggested to the Twelfth Ward Trustees that they make clication to lease vacant lots, and to put up temporary buildings, authority to do which the Board

application to lease vacant lots, and to put up composition of Education has the power to grant.

The Board has authorized the hiring, temporarily, of premises on Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-sixth and One Hundred and Twenty-seventh streets; this will provide additional accommodation for about three classes, and thereby relieve the overcrowded condition of Caboal No. 68.

The Twenty-second Ward reported that there were about three hundred and forty children unprovided for in the entire ward, and the Committee suggested and recommended to the Trustees

that they make immediate application to lease vacant lots for temporary buildings in the neighborhood of Eightieth street; also between Forty-fourth and Fifty-eighth streets, on the extreme west side, between Tenth and Twelfth avenues, where increased accommodation is now needed most.

The Nineteenth Ward reported, by its Board of Trustees, that on the first day of February there were twelve hundred children in the entire ward who require accommodation; and that if they were permitted to build temporary schools in the neighborhood of Eightieth to Eighty-fifth street and Avenue A, the required relief would be immediately obtained. If the premises No. 407 East Eighty-fifth street can be leased, accommodation will be furnished for three or four hundred children.

The Trustees of this ward are negotiating for the hiring and fitting up of the building known as the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, in East Seventy-seventh street; also for the hiring of rooms in the Central Turn Verein Hall, in Sixty-seventh street, between Second and Third avenues.

The Building Committee—Commissioner Devoe—suggested that applications be made to lease any vacant plot of ground suitable for school purposes, and for the erection of a building thereon; stating that the Building Committee could immediately report upon the same, so that the accommodation could be had pending the time of the erection of new buildings.

A site on Eighty-fifth street and Madison avenue was also suggested.

Mr. McBarron, Chairman of the Seventh Ward Board of Trustees, reported that they required additional accommodation for Grammar School No. 2 in Henry street; that there is a building immediately adjoining the school, which would be suitable for the purpose. The Building Committee suggested that the Trustees send in an application, and the Committee on Buildings would report authorizing the hiring of the same.

The Twenty-third Ward reported, through Trustee Brugman, that the section known as Highbridge very much needs increased accommodation; but that when the new building is completed this section of the ward will be provided for.

Authority has been granted this Board of Trustees to hire vacant lots on Beach avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and a report has been presented, authorizing them to advertise for proposals for the erection of a temporary building thereon, work upon which will no doubt be commenced as soon as the lease is executed.

After a thorough examination of all the wards which required additional accommodation, we find that the Trustees will be provided with temporary accommodation as soon as they file the proper applications with the Building Committee.

An examination of this report will show that all applications for additional school room, in any ward, must be made to the Board of Education by the Trustees of the ward. It will also show that in some locations where a school building is fully occupied, that within a short distance of it, in another school, there may be ample room for all the applicants, making it unnecessary to hire or erect any additional buildings. In some wards the Trustees find it very difficult to secure, for temporary use, any buildings suitable for school purposes.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have also, in the estimate for this year, authorized the Board of Education to erect temporary buildings on leased land, and with the applications now before us, we feel quite confident that during the coming summer vacation we will be able, by the completion of the new buildings now being erected and the hiring of temporary quarters, to make the necessary provision to accommodate the different localities which require aid.

We certainly shall give our best energies to accomplish this most desirable result.

My opinion is requested in relation to the propriety of the proposed action of the Board.

No bonds can be lawfully issued unless authorized by some statutory provision.

APPROVED PAPERS.

An Ordinance to amend section 25 of article IV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to carts and cartmen.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:
Section I. The last paragraph of section 25 of article IV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"In shipping or receiving goods, wares, or other merchandise at any of the shipping lines, by steamboat, canal-boat, sailing vessel, railroad, or from or to any warehouse during the specified hours for receipt or delivery of freight whenever a truckman is unreasonably detained over thirty minutes by reason of said steamboat, canal-boat, sailing vessel, railroad company or warehouse not employing sufficient help for prompt receipt or delivery of freight, or by reason of a failure to use all the facilities at their disposal for the prompt receipt and delivery of freight, said truckman shall be entitled to be paid the sum of one dollar per hour for every hour which he is so unreasonably detained. The amount to be paid by the company, corporation or person causing such delay."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting in any way with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT Act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1880), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property (who shall also be the owners of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

DUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

15t. All extra charges for water incurred from and after-June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretore been treated.

ad. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through

such billiong, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shalk include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$\sigma\) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
