SIR—In compliance with the requirements of section 110 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 516 of Laws of 1884, we herewith transmit the results of our examination of the Chamberlain's Office for the fourth quarter of 1889 and submit statements, as follows:

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and miscellaneous accounts, on December 31, 1889, was \$11,959,087.59, which agrees with the balance as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also with the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date.

The Twenty-second Ward reported that there were about three hundred and forty children unprovided for in the entire ward, and the Committee suggested and recommended to the Trustees

that they make immediate application to lease vacant lots for temporary buildings in the neighborhood of Eightieth street; also between Forty-fourth and Fifty-eighth streets, on the extreme west side, between Tenth and Twelfth avenues, where increased accommodation is now needed most.

The Nineteenth Ward reported, by its Board of Trustees, that on the first day of February there were twelve hundred children in the entire ward who require accommodation; and that if they were permitted to build temporary schools in the neighborhood of Eightieth to Eighty-fifth street and Avenue A, the required relief would be immediately obtained. If the premises No. 407 East Eighty-fifth street can be leased, accommodation will be furnished for three or four hundred children.

The Trustees of this ward are negotiating for the hiring and fitting up of the building known as the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, in East Seventy-seventh street; also for the hiring of rooms in the Central Turn Verein Hall, in Sixty-seventh street, between Second and Third avenues.

The Building Committee—Commissioner Devoe—suggested that applications be made to lease any vacant plot of ground suitable for school purposes, and for the erection of a building thereon; stating that the Building Committee could immediately report upon the same, so that the accommodation could be had pending the time of the erection of new buildings.

A site on Eighty-fifth street and Madison avenue was also suggested.

Mr. McBarron, Chairman of the Seventh Ward Board of Trustees, reported that they required additional accommodation for Grammar School No. 2 in Henry street; that there is a building immediately adjoining the school, which would be suitable for the purpose. The Building Committee suggested that the Trustees send in an application, and the Committee on Buildings would report authorizing the hiring of the same.

The Twenty-third Ward reported, through Trustee Brugman, that the section known as High-bridge very much needs increased accommodation; but that when the new building is completed this section of the ward will be provided for.

Authority has been granted this Board of Trustees to hire vacant lots on Beach avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and a report has been presented, authorizing them to advertise for proposals for the erection of a temporary building thereon, work upon which will no doubt be commenced as soon as the lease is executed.

After a thorough examination of all the wards which required additional accommodation, we find that the Trustees will be provided with temporary accommodation as soon as they file the proper applications with the Building Committee.

Additional School Accommodation.

An examination of this report will show that all applications for additional school room, in any ward, must be made to the Board of Education by the Trustees of the ward. It will also show that in some locations where a school building is fully occupied, that within a short distance of it, in another school, there may be ample room for all the applicants, making it unnecessary to hire or erect any additional buildings. In some wards the Trustees find it very difficult to secure, for temporary use, any buildings suitable for school purposes.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have also, in the estimate for this year, authorized the Board of Education to erect temporary buildings on leased land, and with the applications now before us, we feel quite confident that during the coming summer vacation we will be able, by the completion of the new buildings now being erected and the hiring of temporary quarters, to make the necessary provision to accommodate the different localities which require aid.

We certainly shall give our best energies to accomplish this most desirable result.

CHARLES V. ADEE, Esq., Clerk, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I have received your letter of the 24th instant, inclosing a preamble reciting that the Department of Public Parks has made a requisition for the issue of bonds for preliminary surveys and plans for a bridge over the Harlem river at Seventh avenue, together with a proposed resolution now pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, directing the Comptroller to issue Consolidated Stock of the City of New York to the amount of \$5,000 for the purpose of making preliminary surveys and plans of the proposed bridge.

My opinion is requested in relation to the propriety of the proposed action of the Board.

I am unable to find in chapter 534 of the Laws of 1871, chapter 329 of the Laws of 1874, or chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, any provision authorizing the issue of bonds for the purpose of raising money for the object indicated.

No bonds can be lawfully issued unless authorized by some statutory provision.

Unless, therefore, there be some other provision of statute in relation to such bonds, to which my attention has not been called, I advise you that the bonds in question cannot be lawfully issued, and therefore the resolution should not be adopted.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to inform you of the adoption of the following resolutions at a meeting of the Board of Parks, held on the 27th instant:

Resolved, That in pursuance of authority vested in this Department by act of Legislature, chapter 210, Laws of 1889, the Board do hereby select and designate a site for the Zoological

Garden in Central Park the plot of land lying between Ninety-seventh and One Hundred and Fourth streets on the north and south, and between Eighth avenue and the West Drive on the west and east.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars for the purpose of preparing plans for the laying out of the land and the erection of the necessary buildings thereon, in accordance with the provisions of said act.

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the sum of one hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$130,000) be and is hereby appropriated from the proceeds of further additional bonds to be issued under and in pursuance of the provisions of the act, chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889, for the purchase of the piece or parcel of land situate on the south-westerly corner of Park, or Fourth, avenue and Fifty-ninth street, in the City of New York, being one hundred feet and five inches on said avenue and one hundred and twenty-five feet on said street, as and for a site for the erection of a building for the use of the Board of Education of said city; that the Comptroller of the City of New York be and he is hereby requested to issue such further additional bonds, for the purpose of providing the funds to meet the expenditure necessary for the purchase of said site; and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to approve of the same and of the purpose for which such expenditure is to be made; and to designate and appropriate the amount necessary to be expended for such purpose, and that when so designated and appropriated the same be paid by said Comptroller out of the proceeds of said bonds when issued, requisition therefor being hereby made, for the said piece or parcel of land above mentioned, upon the presentation to him of the deed or deeds for the same, together with the certificate of the Counsel to the Corporation that the title thereto is satisfactory and free from all restrictions and incumbrances and is vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1888, the costs, counsel fees and expenses incurred by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Charities and Correction, in the proper presentation of their official conduct before the State Board of Charities, be and the same are hereby audited and allowed as charges against the City, at the sum of one thousand three hundred and one dollars and twenty-five cents (\$1,301.25); and the amount so audited and allowed shall be included in the taxes to be levied and raised in the year 1891, to pay the bill of Messrs. Masten & Nichols.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented a communication from A. H. Rogers, relative to the insane on Ward's Island.

Which was received and referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Whereas, An appropriation was made in the Final Estimate for 1890 to pay the claims for services of certain Clerks of the Commissioners of Accounts in the year 1884, one of whom was erroneously named H. C. Archer.

Resolved, That the name of H. C. Acker be substituted for H. C. Archer, as printed in the Final Estimate for 1890, and that said Acker be paid the amount found due him in a final settlement.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

APPROVED PAPERS.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 25 of article IV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to carts and cartmen.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. The last paragraph of section 25 of article IV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"In shipping or receiving goods, wares, or other merchandise at any of the shipping lines, by steamboat, canal-boat, sailing vessel, railroad, or from or to any warehouse during the specified hours for receipt or delivery of freight whenever a truckman is unreasonably detained over thirty minutes by reason of said steamboat, canal-boat, sailing vessel, railroad company or warehouse not employing sufficient help for prompt receipt or delivery of freight, or by reason of a failure to use all the facilities at their disposal for the prompt receipt and delivery of freight, said truckman shall be entitled to be paid the sum of one dollar per hour for every hour which he is so unreasonably detained. The amount to be paid by the company, corporation or person causing such delay."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting in any way with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 11, 1890.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, March 26, 1890, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

If the weather should prove unfavorable on this date, the parade is hereby permitted to be given the first fair evening following.

About 400 piles from 80 feet to 85 feet long, not less than 16 inches in diameter at the butt, and not less than 6 inches in diameter at the point, measured exclusive of the bark.

N. B.—Bidders are required to submit their estimates upon the following express conditions, which shall apply to and become a part of every estimate received: 1st. Bidders must satisfy themselves, by personal examination of the location of the proposed deliveries of the materials, and by such other means as they may prefer, as to the accuracy of the foregoing Engineer's estimate, and shall not at any time after the submission of an estimate, dispute or complain of the above statement of quantities, nor assert that there was any misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the work to be done.

Any person making an estimate for furnishing the gas or other material shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing the Illuminating Material for, and Lighting, Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing and Maintaining the Public Lamps," and any person making an estimate for furnishing, operating and maintaining electric-lamps, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing, Operating and Maintaining Electric-Lamps," and also with the name of the person making the same and the date of its presentation.

Bidders for electric-lamps are required to state in their estimates the several streets, avenues, parks and public places, or parts of streets, avenues, parks and public places in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, giving in detail the number of lamps which it is proposed to furnish for lighting each street, etc., and in case the streets or any portion of the streets which are contemplated in the bid are not lighted by the bidder with electric arc lamps at the time of the making of the bid, then a map or sketch showing clearly the proposed locations of lamps, poles and conducting wires in such streets must be submitted with the bid.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
