

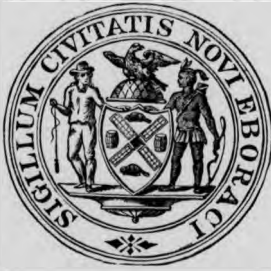

### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Mar. 13, 1886.*

AN ORDINANCE to amend "An ordinance for licensing drivers of railroad cars driven on the surface of the streets in the City of New York," adopted January 12, 1886.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section two of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by adding thereto at the end thereof the following sentence, to wit: "Every such driver shall while at work wear conspicuously upon his breast a badge having legibly engraved thereon the words 'Licensed car-driver,' together with the number of his license, such badge to be approved and furnished by the Mayor's Marshal."

Sec. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 23, 1886.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, March 10, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Central Park Apartment Association to lay a crosswalk of two courses of bluestone across Sixth avenue, near the northerly intersection of Fifty-eighth street, the work to be done at the expense of the Association, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 2, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, March 10, 1886.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to F. E. Perkins & Brother to pave the sidewalk in front of their premises, No. 405 South street, with Belgian pavement, a roadway about eight feet wide, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 2, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, March 10, 1886.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to the "Ladies' Fair of the Fourth Presbyterian Church," in the City of New York, to place a transparency over the public street-lamp at the southwest corner of Thirty-fourth street and Broadway, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, such transparency not to remain longer than the twenty-fifth day of March, 1886, and only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 9, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, March 11, 1886.

Resolved, That Wednesday, the 31st day of March, 1886, at 1 o'clock P. M., in the chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and is hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of The Forty-second Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company to the Common Council of the City of New York, for its consent and permission for the construction, maintenance, operation and use of an extension or branch of its street surface railroad, proposed to be constructed and maintained by said company as mentioned in its petition for such consent, will be first considered; and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board, by publishing the same for fourteen days, excluding Sundays, in two daily newspapers of and published in this City, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 9, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, March 12, 1886, and the "Evening Post" and "New York Sun" were designated as such papers.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to transfer from the unexpended balance of appropriation for the reception of the Bartholdi statue made for the year 1885, the sum of two hundred and seventy-five dollars, and add that amount to the appropriation for "Contingencies of the Common Council," for the year 1885, which is insufficient for the objects and purposes thereof; and be it further

Resolved, That when such transfer of appropriation shall be made, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to draw a warrant in favor of Benjamin F. Brady for the sum of two hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$275), to be in full payment for engraving, binding and procuring case for the preamble and resolutions passed by the Common Council, relating to the death of General U. S. Grant, as set forth in the bill hereto annexed.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 9, 1886.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 27, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 4,804.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 244.

During the past week 152 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 28 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits.

There was issued, under the Sanitary Code, 1 miscellaneous permit.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 25 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 84 visits were made, and 31 disinfections and 14 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 10.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,426, of which 16 were primary, and 1,410 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 6,550 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 97, and the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 60.

The certificates of 605 births, 50 still-births, 200 marriages and 697 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 27, 1886. This shows an increase of 5 births and 23 deaths, and a decrease of 26 still-births and 24 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 17 births, and a decrease of 6 still-births, 53 marriages and 126 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 9; erysipelas, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 2; aneurism, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 6; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; while the deaths from small-pox increased 4; scarlatina, 1; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 6; diarrheal diseases, 1; rheumatism and gout, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 3; pneumonia, 10; heart diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; premature and preterm births, 2; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 2; and drowning, 3. The number of deaths from measles, diphtheria, whooping-cough, and apoplexy was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 142 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 202 under two years, 259 under five years, and 56 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 23 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 37.16 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Special Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, Saturday, March 6, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Spencer, Dowd and Baldwin; also, Chief Engineer Church.

The minutes of stated meeting of the 3d instant were read and approved.  
 Commissioner Dowd, having been absent from the meeting of the 3d inst., stated that had he been present he should have voted against the resolutions removing Engineer of Construction Craven, and wished to be so recorded, and the Commissioners directed that the vote of Commissioner Dowd be now recorded in the negative upon that resolution.

Commissioners Loew and Baldwin, pursuant to request of the Commissioners at their last meeting, stated that from amongst the eminent engineers who had expressed their willingness to serve as an investigating committee, they had deemed it advisable to recommend the selection of those who were most generally known to the New York public; and they therefore offered the following resolution, viz:

Resolved, That Messrs. John Newton, George S. Greene, and O. A. Gilmore are hereby appointed a Commission of Engineers to investigate the charges made against the efficiency of the Chief Engineer of this Commission, and of imperfect work in the construction of the New Aqueduct, with full power to send for persons and papers, and to make their examination thorough and complete so far as the same relates to the engineering and construction of the work in question.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Chief Engineer reported that in compliance with directions of the Commissioners at their last meeting, he had conferred with the Counsel to the Corporation, and had obtained, and now presented, an opinion from him in relation to the matter of the cave-in upon the Aqueduct tunnel on the lands of Cyrus W. Field, Esq., south of Shaft No. 13.

The opinion was read; and as the Counsel therein stated that "This opinion is based upon the state of facts hereinafter set forth; if there is any misconception of these facts on my part, attention should be called to it before such opinion is acted on,"—the Mayor asked the Chief Engineer whether the facts were correctly set forth by the Counsel in said opinion, and stated that he wished the answer made part of the record.

Chief Engineer Church replied that the facts were correctly set forth by the Counsel to the Corporation in the opinion just read.

Commissioner Spencer then offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Secretary is hereby directed to confer with Mr. Cyrus W. Field, and request his consent and agreement in writing with this Commission that the Aqueduct Commissioners may enter upon his lands near to and south of Shaft No. 13, where there has been a settlement or cave-in from the surface towards the Aqueduct tunnel, and there excavate downwards from the surface as shall be necessary to secure the same from further settlement or caving, provided this Commission shall restore the surface to its original condition. The Secretary shall report progress, and any consent or agreement that Mr. Field will make in the premises, to the Committee on Construction, and the Committee of Finance and Audit is authorized to approve of and execute any such agreement on behalf of the Aqueduct Commissioners.

Resolved, That the Committee on Construction and the Chief Engineer are hereby authorized and directed, when advised that the consent of Mr. Cyrus W. Field has been obtained pursuant to the foregoing resolution to enter upon said premises, and under agreement with the present contractors or other competent persons, for doing the work pursuant to section 33, chapter 490, Laws of 1883, to make such excavations as shall be necessary to reach from the surface the base of the caving portion thereof, into and over the Aqueduct tunnel at that point, and then and there secure the same at a cost and expense and involving an expenditure not exceeding five thousand dollars; provided, also, that the fissure can be closed and effectually secured for a distance of twenty feet on the line of the tunnel beyond the present limit of the heading. That said work shall be under the direction and superintendence of the Chief Engineer; and the Commissioners hereby certify that in their opinion it is for the public interest that such work shall be so done, and our reasons for the same are that in this way the work can be promptly and efficiently done, and the Aqueduct work properly continued and progressed, and that the City of New York will be saved the payment of large damages to the owner of the land on the surface over and near the Aqueduct line, at the locality of the break or caving portion of said surface.

The resolutions were unanimously adopted.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

1. There shall be appointed by the Board of Public Charities and Correction a General Superintendent of the Insane, who shall have general supervision of the insane coming under the care of the Department.

2. The institutions subject to his supervision shall be as follows, to wit: The Reception Pavilion for the Insane at Bellevue Hospital; the New York City Lunatic Asylum on Blackwell's Island; the New York City Asylum for the Insane on Ward's Island, and the branches thereof upon Ward's, Randall's, and Hart's Islands, and the Farm on Long Island.

3. It shall be his duty to visit each of the several institutions above named once in each week, or as often as may be necessary, to advise with the officers in charge thereof, and to inspect the wards, buildings, etc., and the patients confined therein.

4. He shall attend at the office of the Commissioners once in each week, or more often if required, and shall then make to them such reports and recommendations as he may see fit, for their action thereupon.

5. All reports and communications from the various institutions, other than such as are matters of routine or provided for by orders from the Board, shall be made to it from the heads of the several institutions through the General Superintendent, and, as far as possible, in writing, at the time herein provided.

6. He shall forthwith establish, so far as may be practicable, schools for the instruction of the attendants upon the insane employed in the various institutions; shall prepare and submit to the Board for approval, rules for their government, and shall have power to call upon the various medical officers of these institutions to take part in the giving of instruction thereon.

7. He shall report to the Board such recommendations and plans as may conduce, in his judgment, to the more extended employment of the insane in such useful occupations as may be of benefit to themselves and the Department.

8. Transfers of patients from any one to another of the institutions named, and the return of patients from the several branches to the main asylum, or from the latter to the Reception Pavilion, shall be made only with his knowledge and approval.

Resolved, That, under resolutions passed this day, Dr. A. E. Macdonald is appointed General Superintendent of the Insane of this Department.

The Secretary to furnish the head of each Institution, having the care of the Insane, with a copy of these resolutions.

THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON Aqueduct reports to me to-day that during the past twenty days the water in the city reservoirs has gone down three feet three inches, equal to 98,000,000 gallons, showing that this amount of water was used, and wasted over and above the supply received through the Croton Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit. The Department has no means to stop this enormous waste, which is caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night to prevent freezing in the winter by any means, and I make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and notify them that unless it is stopped the pressures in the water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days the water will not be sufficient to the basements and cellars in thousands of buildings.

SEALED PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING eight thousand (8,000) feet of 2 1/2 inch Baker seamless fabric, four-ply cotton rubber-lined hose, with clamps, and coupling attachments, all of which will be made to order by the Board of Commissioners at the head of the Fire Department, at the office of said Department, Nos. 155 and 157 Mercer street, in the City of New York, until 11 o'clock Wednesday, March 17, 1886, at which time and place they will be publicly opened by the head of said Department and read.

Special attention is directed to the test of the hose by the Fire Department and the guarantee of the hose by the contractor, retested by the specifications.

No estimate will be received or considered after the hour named.

For information as to the description of the hose, bidders are referred to the specifications which form part of these proposals.

The form of the agreement, with specifications, and showing the manner of payment for the work, may be seen and forms of proposals may be obtained at the office of the Department.

Bidders will write out the amount of their estimate, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The hose is to be delivered at the Repair Shops of the Fire Department, Nos. 155 and 157 Mercer street, on or before the thirtieth (30) day after the execution of the contract.

The damages to be paid by the contractor for each day that the contract is not completed within the time specified for the completion thereof shall have no effect, but by a clause in the contract, fixed and liquidated at twenty-five (\$25) dollars per day.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Any person making an estimate for the work shall present the same in a sealed envelope, to said Board, at said office, on or before the day and hour above named, and the envelope containing the estimate, and the name of the person or persons presenting the same, the date of its presentation, and a statement of the supply to which it relates.

The Fire Department reserves the right to decline any and all bids or estimates if deemed to be for the public interest. No bid or estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

Each bid or estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same; the names of all persons interested with him or them therein; and if no other person be so interested, the bidder shall distinctly state that fact; that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true, and that there more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as sureties for its faithful performance in the sum of four thousand (4,000) dollars; and that he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled on its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of this contract, over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties offered shall be approved by the Comptroller of the City of New York before the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the National Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of two hundred dollars (\$200). Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the Estimate-book, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been received, and if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled on its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or delay to commence the work or any portion thereof, on the 1st day of May, 1886, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning will perform the said work or any portion thereof for such period of neglect or delay, and charge the whole expense of the same against the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded.

Bidders will state a price per annum for doing the work.

The price must be written in the bid or estimate and also stated in figures.

Permission will not be given for the withdrawal of any bid or estimate, and the right is expressly reserved by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to reject any or all bids, or to select the bid or bids which he may deem to be the most advantageous to the efficient performance of the work.

No bids will be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.
