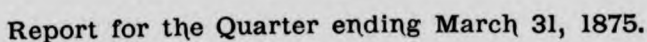

The Board of City Record met in the Mayor's office, Monday, June 21, 1875.

Present—The Mayor, the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Commissioner of Public Works.
