SIR—In pursuance of section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, I have the honor to transmit to you the following brief summary of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending March

Hon. William R. Martin, who was appointed Commissioner, assumed the duties of his office.

The Common Council directed that Third avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-seventh street to the Harlem river, in the Twenty-third Ward, be graded, under the supervision of this Department.

Four new wheels were placed under the Draw of Third Avenue Bridge.

A modified plan of the Public place, at the intersection of the Boulevard, Ninth avenue, and Sixty-third street, was adopted, by omitting the urinal proposed to be placed therein.

The bridge built by the New York and Harlem Railroad Co. along the Third avenue and over the track leading to Port Morris was accepted by the Board, as directed by section 17, chapter 545, Laws of 1872.

The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. III.—That the limits embraced by the assessment aforesaid are as follows, to wit.: All those certain lots, pieces or parcels of land situate in the City of New York, bounded by, included and contained within the iollowing limits, that is to say: Beginning at a point on the easterly line of the new avenue (next westerly from the Boulevard), distant ninety feet and eleven inches north of the northerly line of One Hundred and Tenth street: running thence easterly and parallel with One Hundred and Tenth street to a point distant three hundred and eighty-seven feet and six inches east of the easterly line of Eighth avenue; thence southerly and parallel even inches south of the southerly line of One Hundred and Tenth street as the same is widened; thence westerly and parallel with Sad southerly line of One Hundred and Tenth street as the same is widened; thence westerly and parallel with sad southerly line of One Hundred and Tenth street to the easterly line of the New Avenue, "next westerly from the Boulevard;" thence northerly along the easterly line of said New avenue to the point or place of beginning.
