## MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Summary of Proceedings During the Month of June, 1911.

The Municipal Explosives Commission held twenty-six meetings during the month of June; Fire Commissioner Jos. Johnson, Chairman. Commissioners Eaton and Acritelli were present at each meeting. Commissioner Harris was absent from eight meetings, and Commissioner Wainwright attended only the meetings held on June 1.

During the month four public hearings were held; one on June 3, on the subject of ammunition; one on June 16, on the subject of matches; one on June 22, on the subject of inflammable and combustible mixtures, and one on June 26, on the subject of dry cleaning establishments and the sponging of garments with volatile inflammable oil. These hearings were largely attended, and the proposed regulations covering the above-mentioned subjects were thoroughly discussed. Since these hearings, the Commission has received numerous briefs submitted by interested parties, giving their views in writing on the regulations.

The Commission tested during the month of June several new brands of high explosives in an effort to ascertain whether there are explosives that do not contain nitro-glycerine available as substitutes for the ordinary dynamite; also a number of apparatus were tested and examined in order to determine their suitability for use in garages and other places where volatile inflammable oils are used.

Considerable time was devoted to the investigation of the present methods of handling high explosives and blasting supplies at public piers, both in connection with



Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood

terials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

chasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read,

and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true. and is in all respects fair and without collusion

herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned be-

No bid or estimate will be considered unless No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-

envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality

of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
