

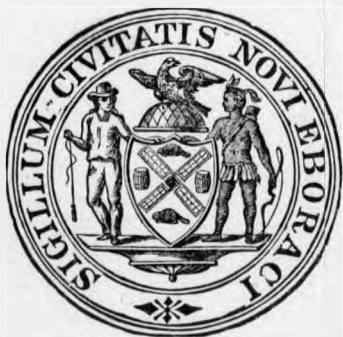

SIR—Pursuant to the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, we make the following report of the operations and actions of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending March 31, 1901:

The books of Annual Record of Assessed Valuations of Real and Personal Estates of The City of New York were completed and opened for inspection and correction on the second Monday of January last, as required by law.

Previous to that time, and since then, the fact that such books were open for inspection and correction has been advertised in the authorized and required number of papers in the several boroughs and in the CITY RECORD, in compliance with section 892, and the Commissioners have been in constant attendance during this time, for the purpose of hearing applications for the correction of assessments.

Believing that publicity is conducive to creating a proper public spirit regarding personal assessments, we offered additional facilities to the public this year for conveniently inspecting the personal assessment list and are hopeful of good results therefrom.

Being determined to reduce as much as possible the loss the City sustains annually through the unavoidable escape of a vast amount of personal property, the Department has made strenuous efforts to secure a larger amount of this class of property than has heretofore been obtainable and we expect to show a material increase in this year's valuations over those held last year. Our Bureau of Information has been of great assistance in securing valuable data in this line.

The Annual Table of Equalization was adopted in compliance with the provisions of section 899, and will be substantially contained in our July report.
