Commissioners Meyer and Murphy, to whom was referred on March 23, 1900, the application of the Manhattan Railway Company for a lease of the bulkhead to be constructed between Seventy-fourth and Seventy-fifth streets, East river, submitted reports thereon, Commissioner Murphy recommending that the application be denied, and Commissioner Meyer recommending that a lease be granted for a term of ten years at an annual rental of \$6,500, with the privilege of four renewal terms of ten years each at an advanced rental of five per cent. per annum on the rental of the preceding term.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Meyer, the report recommending that a lease be granted was approved, and the following resolution adopted, Commissioner Murphy voting in the negative:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm-out to the Manhattan Railway Company, all and singular the wharfeage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of all that certain wharf property situated on the East river, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, known and described as follows: The bulkhead to be built in accordance with the New Plan between the southerly side of East Seventy-fourth street and the northerly side of East Seventy-fifth street, about three hundred and twenty-five feet in length; the lease to commence from the date said bulkhead is completed and ready for occupancy, and to be for a term of ten years, with the privilege of four renewals of ten years each, the rental for the first term to be six thousand five hundred dollars per annum, and for each renewal term five per centum advance on the rental for the preceding term; the lessee shall have the right to construct and maintain intake and discharge pipes for condensing purposes under the marginal street and through the bulkhead-wall, and to erect on said bulkhead suitable cranes or coal-receiving and sub-discharging devices, with the privilege of placing a coal and ash conveyor under or over the marginal street from the bulkhead in its buildings fronting on the marginal street between Seventy-fourth and Seventy-fifth streets, East river; all the work of said company to be done in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and under his direction and supervision, the work of filling-in behind the bulkhead-wall to be done by this Department; it being understood and agreed that the above resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Manhattan Railway Company shall, within ten days after receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and shall agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base blocks for the bulkhead or river wall between the southerly side of East Seventy-fourth street and the northerly side of East Seventy-fifth street, East river, and that all the work hereby ordered to be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 521 of the Greater New York Charter, and that it be done by the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, tools and dredging necessary for the above-mentioned work, not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

On motion of the President, the Secretary was directed to again request the Corporation Counsel to join the New Jersey Central Railroad Company from operating the ferry from the foot of Whitehall street, said company not having obtained any franchise therefor.
