COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, December 4, 1907.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain; Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen, and John R. Davies, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meetings held November 13 and 27, 1907, were approved as printed.

The Chair called for a hearing on the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the purchase of certain waterfront property lying in the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, for the sum of \$85,000.

SIR—I transmit herewith for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a form of agreement to purchase certain property, more particularly described therein, lying in the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, in Astoria, Borough of Queens.

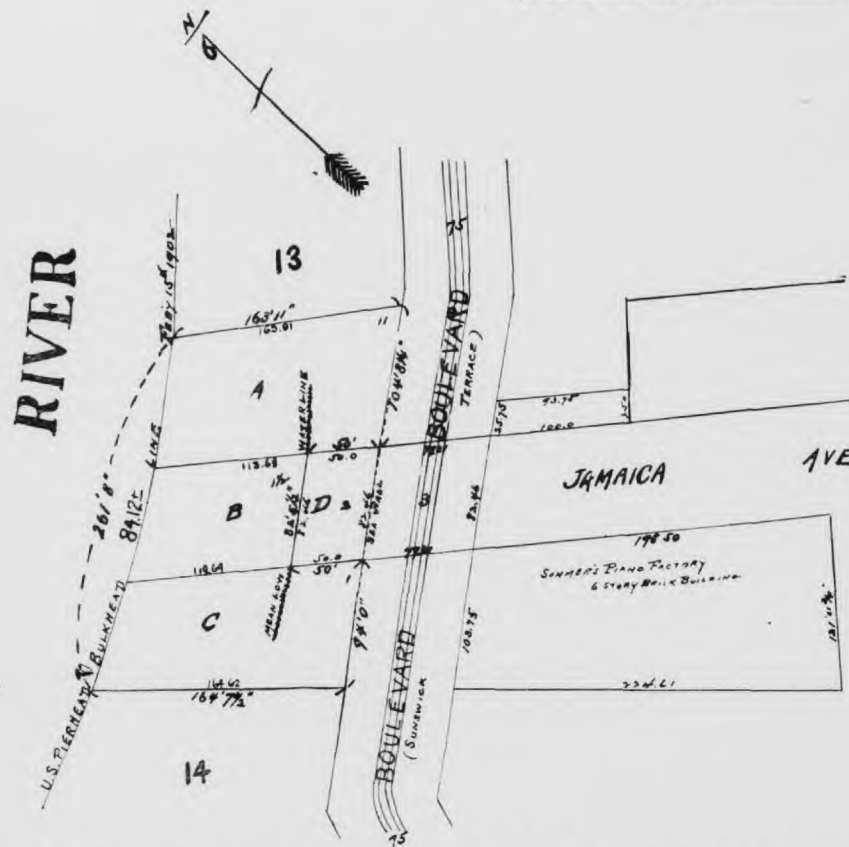
A petition has been received from the Astoria Taxpayers and Business Men's Association, and numerous applications from manufacturing concerns doing business in that vicinity, for additional public wharfage room, and the consensus of opinion among them seems to be that Jamaica avenue is the most desirable location for a public pier. It lies in a cove, which would protect the dock and also vessels unloading thereat from the especially rapid tides which run alongshore at this point, and Jamaica avenue itself is a wide granite-paved thoroughfare.

The pier at the foot of Broadway is, and has been for a long time, absolutely useless, and goods of every description must now be carted from Long Island City up and across the Ninety-second Street Ferry, or a private dock used, causing great inconvenience and expense to the people of this section.

This part of the greater city is growing very rapidly, and building is being carried on extensively, and there is certainly need of additional public docking facilities.

The following description is taken from deed by Alexa C. Bowden to Anthony McOwen, dated June 11, 1904, and recorded in the office of the Register of the County of New York on the 15th day of July, 1904, in block series (Conveyances), Section 5, Liber 103, page 50, indexed under Block 1373:

All that certain piece or parcel of land under the waters of the East river in front of and adjacent to lands of Phoebe Stevens, trustee, and others, in Long Island City (late the Village of Astoria), County of Queens, described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point in the late Village of Astoria (now Long Island City) at the boundary line of land of A. W. Winans, at high-water mark, running thence north 56 degrees 36 minutes west 163 feet 11 inches to the Harbor Commissioner's bulkhead and pier line; thence along said Harbor Commissioner's line south 50 degrees 11 minutes west 261 feet 8 inches; thence south 49 degrees 36 minutes east 164 feet 7½ inches to high-water mark on the boundary line of land of Dr. John W. Scott, and thence along high-water mark to the point or place of beginning, containing 43,408 square feet, be the said several courses, distances and the said area more or less, being the land under water and between high and low-water mark conveyed in letters patent from the people of the State of New York to Phoebe Stevens, trustee, under the will of Alexander H. Stevens, deceased, and others, bearing date the 17th day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy (1870), recorded in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York on the 3d day of February, 1877, in Liber 1405 of Conveyances, page 394; with the exceptions and reservations, however, to the People of the State of New York expressed in the said letters patent; and further excepting from the property hereinabove described all land or land under water to which The City of New York has acquired or may acquire title by virtue of proceedings now pending for condemnation of lands and premises for the opening and extending of Jamaica avenue (although not yet named by proper authority) from Old Bowery Bay road to East river, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, of The City of New York.

And it is further understood (in modification of the foregoing description if necessary) that the easterly line of the said premises hereby sold is the westerly line of the boulevard, subject to above exceptions as to Jamaica avenue, and the said premises are subject to the encroachment, if any, of the boulevard or the sea wall thereof as constructed, and the property hereby sold also includes the right to the compensation in the above Jamaica avenue proceedings for land taken or to be taken therein to the west of the westerly line of the boulevard.

This agreement, made and entered on the day of, 1907, by and between Anthony McOwen, party of the first part, and The City of New York, acting by the Commissioner of Docks of said City, party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The said party of the first part is the owner of all that certain piece or parcel of land under the waters of the East river, in front of and adjacent to the

lands of Phoebe Stevens, trustee, and others in Long Island City, late of the village of Astoria, County of Queens, described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the late village of Astoria (now Long Island City) at the boundary line of land of A. W. Winans, at high water mark, which point is also on the westerly line of the boulevard; running thence north 56 degrees 30 minutes west, 163 feet 11 inches to the Harbor Commissioners' bulkhead and pier line; thence along said Harbor Commissioners' line south 50 degrees 11 minutes west, 261 feet 8 inches to the northerly side of property belonging to John W. Scott; thence along northerly side of property belonging to John W. Scott, south 49 degrees 36 minutes east, 164 feet 7½ inches to the westerly side of the boulevard (the title of which was vested and confirmed in The City of New York, December 22, 1891); thence along said westerly side of the boulevard 94 feet to the southerly side of Jamaica avenue (the title of which was vested in The City of New York, June 16, 1902); thence westerly and along said southerly side of Jamaica avenue 50 feet to the line of low water as determined in 1902; thence northerly and along the line of mean low water as determined in 1902, 82 feet 5½ inches to the northerly side of Jamaica avenue aforesaid; thence easterly and along said northerly side of Jamaica avenue 50 feet to the westerly side of the boulevard above mentioned; thence northerly and along the westerly side of the boulevard 104 feet 8¼ inches to the point or place of beginning.

The distances in the above description are approximate, the property intended to be conveyed being shown on the accompanying map.

Whereas, By section 822 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Docks of the said City is authorized to acquire, by purchase, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of The City of New York, wharf property in said City and all rights appertaining thereto not now owned by the Corporation of The City of New York, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to pay to such owner the price agreed; and

Whereas, The said party of the second part is desirous of acquiring all the rights, title and interest of said property heretofore described, not now owned by The City of New York; now, therefore, this agreement witnesseth:

That said party of the first part, for and in consideration of the premises and the sum of one dollar to him in hand paid by the party of the second part, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, hereby agrees to sell and convey by good and sufficient deeds or conveyances, unto the said party of the second part, all the right, title, interest, privileges, etc., appertaining to the property heretofore described, for the sum of \$85,000, lawful money of the United States of America or by warrant on the City Treasury for that amount; it being stipulated by the party of the first part and it is of the essence of this agreement that the said party of the first part is to convey or cause to be conveyed good title to the said property with the right to the lands under water and riparian and other rights, if any, in front thereof and connected therewith, not now owned by said City of New York or by the people of the State of New York; and the said party hereto of the second part hereby agrees to purchase said property and pay said party of the first part therefor the sum of \$85,000 in manner aforesaid on the day of, 1907, subject nevertheless to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund;

And it is further agreed that said deed or deeds shall be delivered and the consideration paid at the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York, on the day of, 1907, at, and that the consideration may be paid in a warrant or warrants of the said Comptroller, drawn in favor of the party of the first part; and the said party of the first part on receiving such payment at the time and in the manner above mentioned, shall, at his own proper costs and expense, execute, acknowledge and deliver or cause to be executed, acknowledged and delivered to the party of the second part, a proper deed for the conveyance and assurance to it of all right, title and interest in said property hereinbefore mentioned, free and clear in all respects of all charges, liens or incumbrances of whatever kind, name or nature; and it is

Further mutually covenanted and agreed by and between the several parties hereto that this contract is made subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and the said party of the second part hereby agrees to submit this contract to said Commissioners for approval and to serve written notice of the action of said Commissioners upon the party of the first part within days from the approval hereof, and that unless said Commissioners shall approve the same, and the said party of the second part shall serve said notice within the days as aforesaid, and unless the said party of the second part shall complete this contract, if approved, on the day of, 1907, as hereinbefore mentioned, this contract shall, at the option of the said party of the first part, be utterly void, it being expressly understood that time is of the essence of this contract, and that the stipulations aforesaid are to apply to and bind the successors or assigns of the respective parties.

In witness whereof the said Commissioner, at the head of and governing the Department of Docks and Ferries, has caused these presents to be executed for and on behalf of the said City of New York, and said party of the first part has caused these presents to be subscribed by him, and the parties hereto have executed this agreement in four parts, one of which is to remain with the party of the first part, one with the Commissioner of Docks, one with the Corporation Counsel, and one with the Comptroller of The City of New York.

It appears that the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries, by a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitted for their approval, a form of agreement to purchase the property in question at the price of \$85,000, the communication states that a petition has been received from the Astoria Tax Payers and Business Men's Association, and numerous applications from manufacturing concerns doing business in that vicinity, for additional public wharfage room, and that the consensus of opinion among them seems to be that Jamaica avenue is the most desirable location for a public pier. It lies in a cove, which would protect the dock and also vessels unloading thereat, from the especially rapid tides which run along shore at this point, and Jamaica avenue itself is a wide granite paved thoroughfare. The communication further states that the pier at the foot of Broadway is, and has been for a long time, absolutely useless, and goods of every description must now be carted from Long Island City up and across the Ninety-second street ferry, or a private dock used, causing great inconvenience and expense to the people of this section.

An investigation into the details of the matter shows that the property described in the proposed contract from Anthony McOwen to the City covers only the parcels of land marked A, B and C on the blue print herewith attached, and does not include Parcel D. It appears that when the City's vendor acquired the property in the year 1904 from Alexa C. Bowden he obtained all the right, title and interest which the prior owner had in any award that might be made for Parcel D in the Jamaica avenue condemnation proceedings. Upon investigation at the Department of Docks and Ferries it appears that the title to Parcel D was vested in the City, together with all the other lands required for the opening of Jamaica avenue, by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted June 16, 1902, but that no award for the said parcel has been included in the list of preliminary awards.

One of my assistants brought this matter to the attention of Commissioner Benschel and he has informally agreed with me that the contract should include all the interest

the party of the first part has in and to Parcel D. Under this condition the price asked for the property is in my opinion not excessive.

The Corporation Counsel in an opinion under date of July 1, 1907, relative to the provisions of chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, in regard to the acquisition of property for the improvement of the water front states:

"The resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing the acquisition of the property cannot be adopted except at a public hearing, of which public notice must be given by publication for six consecutive days in the CITY RECORD, not less than seven nor more than thirty days before said public hearing."

And in a further opinion under date of July 15, 1907, states:

"The authority, therefore, under said section, to acquire by private purchase the title to wharf property, is vested in the Commissioner of Docks, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and no action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is necessary in connection therewith."

I would, therefore, respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hold a public hearing in the matter of the approval of the agreement to be entered into between Anthony McOwen and The City of New York, for the acquisition of water front property in the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, it being understood that the party of the first part will convey all his right, title and interest in and to any award that has or will be made for Parcel D, shown on the annexed blue print, and that the price to be paid for the entire property should be the sum of \$85,000.

SIR—I beg to advise you that after due consideration, I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would be best served by leasing to the Consolidated Gas Company of New York (which has made application therefor), five hundred feet of the northerly side of the pier foot of East Twenty-first street, beginning at the inshore end of said pier and extending outwardly five hundred feet, for a term of ten years, commencing on the first of the month next succeeding the date that the said lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of \$7,000 per annum; the lessee to have the privilege of renewing said lease for a further term of ten years at an advance of 10 per cent. on the rental for the first term. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those now in use by this Department, a copy of which may be seen and examined at the office of the Department, Pier "A," Battery place.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks requesting an amendment to the description of property on the East river, between Piers (old) 52 and 53, authorized on October 23, 1907, to be acquired by condemnation proceedings.

It being necessary in order to amend the description that another hearing be had, the following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix the hour of 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, January 8, 1908, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of premises Nos. 120 and 122 Livingston street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Board of Education (see page 900):

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held September 20, 1907, a resolution was adopted approving the request of the Board of Education and authorizing the entering into of certain leases of property in the Borough of Brooklyn, with the exception of property leased as an administrative building and known as Nos. 120 and 122 Livingston street. The approval to the leasing of this building was at a lower rate than that recommended by the Board of Education. The rent recommended by the Board of Education was \$2,500 per annum, while the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund recommended \$2,000 per annum.

At the time of the adoption of this resolution the Board of Education had been in possession since May 1, 1907. The owner was in Europe and could not be interviewed by the Department of Finance until his return, which was a week or so ago. He called at the Finance Department and stated that he executed the lease with the Board of Education in good faith, on terms which he deemed to be reasonable and fair. Believing this, he went to Europe, and on his return found that objection was made as to the rental value.

I am of the opinion that the owner might have good cause of action against the City, on the one hand, or could dispossess the Board of Education from the tenancy in the lease, and put the City to the expense of getting quarters elsewhere and refitting the rooms. It seems to me that the equities of the case are on the side of the owner and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should adopt a resolution amending their resolution of September 20, 1907, in regard to the premises Nos. 120 and 122 Livingston street, Borough of Brooklyn, by inserting the words "\$2,500 per annum" instead of "\$2,000 per annum."

All things considered and under the conditions under which this lease was made, and the fact that the lessor has not received any rent as yet, I deem the sum of \$2,500 per annum to be fair and just and reasonable.

SIR—You are aware that for a considerable period the office force of this Bureau has worked under considerable disadvantage owing to lack of room. There is one field party stationed in a part of one of the rooms of the office suite, and I have been endeavoring for some little while to find suitable accommodations for said party within a short distance of this building and have only now succeeded in locating a room, recently vacated, on the second floor (first above the street) of the Walter Building, on the northerly side of Tremont avenue, between Bathgate avenue and Third avenue. This room is at the front of the building, with three large windows opening on Tremont avenue; size of the room is 16 feet 8 inches by 33 feet, less a space about 5 feet 5 inches by 16 feet, taken from it on account of the main stairway of the building.

Mr. Walter, the owner, states that the rental for this room will be \$480 per year, which amount includes necessary heating.

I would, therefore, respectfully recommend that this room be secured for the use of the field party of this Bureau, above referred to, without delay, as such action is in every way for the best interests of the work of the Bureau, which is now being conducted somewhat to disadvantage on account of the lack of room available for us in the Municipal Building.

I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund request the Board of Aldermen to adopt a resolution turning over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for assignment to the Commissioner of the Fire Department for the use of said department, for the purpose of erecting thereon a fire department building, the following described property owned by The City of New York, located in the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, with the understanding that when he has completed the erection of his building thereon and has removed Engine Company 154 from its present site to the new one, he will immediately turn over the present site at Gravesend avenue and Avenue V to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as being no longer required for Fire Department purposes:

SIR—The fire insurance on passenger cars Nos. 25 to 84, inclusive (60 cars), on the bridge railway of the Brooklyn Bridge, expires on December 14, 1907, and I respectfully request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize me to renew said insurance in the amount of \$150,000 for a term from said December 14, 1907, to May 1, 1908, the premium on which will be about \$200.

In regard to effecting this insurance the attention of your Commission is called to paragraph 11 of part 3 of the contract between the Commissioner of Bridges and Frederick Uhlman, receiver of the Brooklyn Elevated Railroad Company, dated June 23, 1898, under which the Brooklyn Bridge Railroad is operated by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, which reads as follows:

"Eleventh—The rolling stock and appurtenances connected with said bridge and covered by this agreement are to be kept insured by the 'Commissioner.' In case of their destruction or injury by fire, the amount collected upon the policies covering the same is to be expended in replacing or repairing the same."

Your Commission has heretofore authorized previous applications of this nature at meetings held May 7, 1902, and December 21, 1904.

Upon the completion of the improvements now under way on the Brooklyn Bridge, the railroad company will operate through trains of their own cars and furnish special cars of their own for purely local bridge traffic, and there will be no further use for the cars mentioned in the above agreement. This improvement will be operative on or before May 1, 1908, and that is, therefore, the date to which this application for insurance under said agreement is requested.

Whereas, The Commissioner of Parks of the Borough of The Bronx, has requested the sale of the building now standing upon property owned by The City of New York, located in the Borough of The Bronx, acquired by it for park purposes, said building being situated upon land more particularly described as follows:

Being a 2-story frame structure 32 feet by 44 feet, situated on the northerly end of Poe Park, in the Borough of The Bronx, and which is more particularly described on a certain map on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, Room 141, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by virtue of the powers vested in them by law, hereby authorize and order the sale of the said building at public auction for the highest marketable price, on the following terms and conditions:

It being understood that the purchasers at the time of the auction sale, when the said bid is accepted by the City, shall execute a contract with The City of New York for the proper compliance with these terms and conditions, which contract shall provide for liquidated damages at so much per day for each and every day the removal of the buildings, etc., remains incomplete after the expiration of sixty days from the day of sale. A copy of the contract is on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, Room 141, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

The buildings and appurtenances thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay immediately cash or a certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must either give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale and contract. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of fifty dollars the sum of fifty dollars shall be the amount of the security deposited. This security must be deposited within forty-eight hours after the sale, and may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any work required under the contract but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

All the buildings, structures and parts thereof, their fixtures and foundations, of every class and description, within the described area are to be torn down to the existing curb level, and structures which may exist within any of the buildings such as engine beds, boiler settings, etc., and all stoops and area walls shall be torn down to the same level. All partitions, sheds and fences shall be removed from the premises. All brick laid in mortar, all floor beams, joists, studdings, flooring, ceiling, roofing, boards and woodwork of every description, and all gas, water, steam and soil piping shall be removed from the premises. All combustible matter, such as tar and felt roofing, broken laths and fragments of timber, chips, splinters, etc., which are of no value shall be gathered together by the contractor and burned or carried away.

The purchaser at the sale shall also shut off and cap all water pipes at the main pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Failure to remove said buildings or appurtenances, or any portion thereof, within sixty days from the day of sale, will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings or appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will without notice to the purchaser cause the same to be removed and the costs and expenses thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner and must be completed within sixty days from the day of sale, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damages and costs to which it, they or any of them, be put by reason of injury to the person or property or another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of the said buildings.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of the adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made water-tight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

"Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby requested to transmit a certified copy of this resolution, together with a copy of the report of the Appraiser of Real Estate of the Department of Finance, approved by the Comptroller, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the request that all action heretofore taken thereon closing said streets be rescinded, and that said streets, in accordance with the Charter, be restored to the map of The City of New York, after public hearing, as provided for in said Charter."

Resolved, That so much of said resolution as requests the Secretary to transmit a certified copy thereof to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the request that all action heretofore taken thereon closing said streets be rescinded, and that said streets, in accordance with the Charter, be restored to the map of The City of New York, after a public hearing, as provided for in said Charter, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

The following was received from the College of The City of New York turning over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the Twenty-second street portion of the old site of the College of The City of New York:

DEAR SIR—I transmit herewith certified copy of preamble and resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York on November 26, 1907, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to turn over to the Normal College the Twenty-second street annex of the old college building.

Whereas, The College of The City of New York now owns and possesses the old site of the college on Lexington avenue at Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets; and

Whereas, For the present, and perhaps for a short period of years to come, the Twenty-second street portion of such premises is not required for the purposes of the college, such portion being described as follows:

"Beginning at a point on the northerly line of East Twenty-second street distant one hundred (100) feet easterly from the point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of East Twenty-second street with the easterly line of Lexington avenue, and running thence northerly and parallel with Lexington avenue seventy-five (75) feet, thence easterly and parallel with East Twenty-second street one hundred (100) feet, thence southerly and again parallel with Lexington avenue seventy-five (75) feet to the northerly line of East Twenty-second street, thence westerly along the northerly line of East Twenty-second street one hundred (100) feet to the point or place of beginning."

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the Normal College of The City of New York desire to use such Twenty-second street portion of said building during the period during which the College of The City of New York shall not need to use the same; it is therefore

Resolved, That the College of The City of New York does hereby turn over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the said strip of land hereinbefore described with the buildings thereon for such use as the said Commissioners may deem advisable.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to an assignment of the Twenty-second street portion of the old College of The City of New York to the Trustees of the Normal College:

October 12, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—For some time past the Board of Education has been trying to obtain a portion of the property now used by the College of The City of New York, located on Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets and Lexington avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Normal College. Several communications have been transmitted from time to time to this Department and from this Department to the Board of Education and the College of The City of New York. Finally, on the 25th day of September, 1907, at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Normal College, a resolution was adopted which in substance requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of the occupancy of the Twenty-second street annex of the old building of the College of The City of New York by classes of the Normal College until such time as said annex may be required for the purposes of the College of The City of New York, and at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York, held October 2, 1907, a preamble and resolutions were adopted which in substance consented that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should assign to the use of the Normal College such Twenty-second street portion of the college building, but subject to certain terms and conditions, that is, the

occupancy to continue until July 1, 1908, and until such time thereafter as the Board of Trustees and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should approve. That the Trustees of the Normal College, at its own expense, was to construct separate lavatories and toilets for the Twenty-second street building, and also additional toilets for the Twenty-third street building; that the expense of heating, including compensation to Engineers and coal for both the Twenty-second and Twenty-third street buildings should be borne equally between the College of The City of New York and the Normal College. That the entrance to the Normal College portion should be exclusively on the Twenty-second street side, and that the College of The City of New York should retain possession of the entire yard with the exception of about one-half of the space between the present lavatory and the Twenty-second street building.

The proposition is that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should receive from the College of The City of New York the Twenty-second street annex and turn the same over to the Normal College for a definite period, that is, until July 1, 1908, and thereafter as long as the College of The City of New York chooses to consent to its occupancy by the Normal College. This proposition is to be in accordance with the provisions of section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, which states that

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall have power to assign to use for any public purposes any city property, for whatsoever purpose originally acquired, which may be found by the Department having control thereof to be no longer required for such purposes."

This provision of the Charter the College of The City of New York in their resolution of October 2 does not comply with, and they were requested to conform their resolution to the provision aforesaid, and at a meeting held on the 26th day of November, 1907, the Trustees of the College of The City of New York adopted the following preamble and resolution, which was transmitted by the Secretary in a communication dated November 27, 1907:

Whereas, The College of The City of New York now owns and possesses the old site of the College on Lexington avenue at Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets; and

Whereas, For the present, and perhaps for a short period of years to come, the Twenty-second street portion of such premises is not required for the purposes of the College, such portion being described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly line of East Twenty-third street distant one hundred (100) feet easterly from the point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of East Twenty-second street with the easterly line of Lexington avenue, and running thence northerly and parallel with Lexington avenue seventy-five (75) feet; thence easterly and parallel with East Twenty-second street one hundred (100) feet; thence southerly and again parallel with Lexington avenue seventy-five (75) feet to the northerly line of East Twenty-second street; thence westerly along the northerly line of East Twenty-second street one hundred (100) feet to the point or place of beginning.

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the Normal College of The City of New York desire to use such Twenty-second street portion of said building during the period during which the College of The City of New York shall not need to use the same; it is therefore

Resolved, That the College of The City of New York does hereby turn over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the said strip of land hereinbefore described, with the buildings thereon, for such use as the said Commissioners may deem advisable.

It seems to me that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly adopt a resolution which in substance would state that the College of The City of New York, by resolution, having consented that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall assign to use by the Normal College the portion of the College building on Lexington avenue, Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, which fronts on Twenty-second street, and is bounded northerly by a line parallel with Twenty-second street and 6 feet 6 inches distant therefrom, that the same be assigned to the use of the Normal College during the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. That in accepting such assignment, the Trustees of the Normal College agree at their own expense to construct upon such Twenty-second street portion, lavatories and toilets, the same to be completely separated from the corresponding lavatories and toilets in the college premises to the north of such Twenty-second street portion; and also at their own expense to construct additional toilets in the portion north of the Twenty-second street portion for the use of the Twenty-third street building; and further, that the Normal College, by accepting such assignment, in addition to the above, shall agree to pay one-half of the expense incurred in the matter of heating both the property assigned to such Normal College and that under the control of the College of The City of New York, such expenses including compensation to Engineers and coal. And further, in addition thereto, the Normal College to bear the expense of Janitor service for such Twenty-second street portion, and the expense of repairs to such portion; and further, that the entrance to the Normal College shall be exclusively on the Twenty-second street side; and further, that the only yard space to be allotted to the Normal College shall be one-half of the space between the present lavatory and the Twenty-second street building, and I so recommend.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby assign the said property to the Trustees of the Normal College, with the understanding that in accepting said assignment the Trustees of the Normal College will agree at their own expense to construct upon such Twenty-second street portion lavatories and toilets, the same to be completely separated from the corresponding lavatories and toilets in the college premises to the north of such Twenty-second street portion; and also at their own expense to construct additional toilets in the portion north of the Twenty-second street portion for the use of the Twenty-third street building; and further, that the Normal College, by accepting such assignment, in addition to the above, shall agree to pay one-half of the expense incurred in the matter of heating both the property assigned to such Normal College and that under the control of the College of The City of New York, such expenses including compensation to Engineers and coal. And further, in addition thereto, the Normal College to bear the expenses of janitor service for such Twenty-second street portion and the expense of repairs to such portion, and further, that the entrance to the Normal College shall be exclusively on the Twenty-second street side; and further, that the only yard space to be allotted to the Normal College shall be one-half of the space between the present lavatory and the Twenty-second street building.

—said assignment to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises at Nos. 66 to 72 Lafayette street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the First District Municipal Court:

December 2, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Legislature, at its last session, passed a law which met with the approval of the Governor, known as Chapter 603 of the Laws of 1907, which law amended the Greater New York Charter and the Municipal Court Act of The City of New York by providing for a reorganization of the Municipal Courts of The City of New York and for changes in the districts and in the powers of said court and in the practice therein, and Clerks, and to regulate the salaries of the Justices thereof.

The number of districts heretofore in Manhattan was fourteen. By this act they were reduced to nine, and additional Judges were elected at the last election, increasing the number of Justices to sit in these courts.

Section 15 of said act provided as follows:

"The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York may meet at any time to provide for the increase of salary of the Justices of the Municipal Court of The City of New York for the remainder of the year nineteen hundred and seven, for the expense of equipping the courts in the districts as rearranged by this act. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of this City shall provide by purchase, lease or otherwise, suitable quarters for the courts in such districts, and the Comptroller of said City, without the concurrence of any Board, officer or authority in said City, shall provide the necessary funds for the purpose aforesaid by the sale of Revenue Bonds of said City, to the end that the payment of the increased salaries aforesaid may be made and the said courts be fully provided for and equipped for full and effective operation on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and eight."

As to the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as defined by Section 15, it is not necessary at this time to report upon. The proposition to be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is for the purpose of establishing the new courts on the 1st day of January, 1908.

The new First District as now constituted was formerly—

Old First—Wooster and Prince streets. City owns building.

Old Second—No. 59 Madison street. Rented, \$3,000 per annum.

Old Third—Jefferson Market. City owns building.

These courts have been in use for a number of years past, and it was intended by the Justices to lease rooms in some building in the vicinity of City Hall, and do away with at least two, if not all, of these courtrooms. The City owns two of the buildings and the lease of the third one expired on May 1, but the City has been holding court in the building since that time.

It is proposed by the Judges to lease rooms in the building known as the Merchants' Association Building, Nos. 66 to 72 Lafayette street, for the use of the new First District Municipal Court. The owners will construct on the third and sixth floors in the building, in accordance with the plans which have been approved by the Justices of the courts, three courtrooms, sizes approximately as follows:

One 30 by 60 feet, one 33 by 51 feet and one 32 by 51 feet. A consultation room 17 by 21 feet can be utilized as a general meeting room for all of the Judges, not only of Manhattan, but also for the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond. A courtroom 10 by 15 by 16 feet and two jury rooms about 11 by 15 feet each. All of these rooms are on the third floor.

On the sixth floor will be constructed two Clerks' rooms, 11 by 17 feet each; one general Clerks' room, 28 by 47 feet; one record room, 10 feet 6 inches by 15 feet; three Judges' rooms, one 14 by 14 feet, one 11 by 14 feet and one 12 by 14 feet; a foyer, 10 by 16 feet. A corridor will be constructed on both of the floors, 5 feet wide by 100 feet in depth, connecting the rooms with the stairways, elevators and toilet rooms. The construction between each courtroom will be fireproof, hollow tile, hardwood trim doors and sashes. The owners suggest that the City make a ten-year lease, but it is impossible to do so, as the City cannot make a lease for a longer period than five years when there are tenants other than City tenants in the building. They agree to put in electric light fixtures and to furnish heat, light and elevator service.

The amount of room space which the City will occupy in this building is approximately 12,100 square feet, and the amount of money asked by the owner is \$15,300 per annum, which is approximately \$1.28 a square foot, but the owners have to build entirely new partitions and put additional toilet facilities in, which would practically amount to a new plumbing system. It was not done when the City leased the two upper floors for the Civil Service Board.

The rent asked being reasonable and just, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the lease of the entire third floor, containing about 8,700 square feet, and the front portion of the sixth floor, containing 3,400 square feet, in the building known as the Merchants' Association Building, Nos. 66 to 72 Lafayette street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the First District Municipal Court, for a period of five years from January 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$15,500, payable quarterly, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years upon the same terms and conditions, the lessor to furnish light, heat and elevator service; to put up partitions, put in new toilet facilities and to make such alterations, additions and repairs as are designated and shown on a plan approved by the Judges of said court. Lessors, Lippmann & Eisman, S. H. Stone, authorized agent.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a lease of premises at the southwest corner of Fifty-ninth street and Madison avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for the new Ninth District Municipal Court:

December 2, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—In accordance with the provisions of an act passed by the last Legislature, known as chapter 603 of the Laws of 1907, the fourteen Municipal Court Districts in the Borough of Manhattan were reduced to nine.

The new First was made up of the the old First, Second and Third.

The new Second was made of the old Fourth, Fifth and Thirteenth.

The new Third was made up of the the old Eighth and Tenth.

The new Fourth was made up of the old Sixth and Seventh.

The new Fifth was made up of the old Twelfth.

The new Sixth was made up of the old Seventh (part) and Ninth (part).

The new Seventh was made up of the old Eleventh.

The new Eighth was made up of the old Ninth.

The new Ninth was made up of the old Fourteenth.

Section 15 of said act reads as follows:

"The board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York may meet at any time to provide for the increase of salary of the justices of the municipal court of the city of New York for the remainder of the year nineteen hundred and seven, for the expense of equipping the courts in the districts as rearranged by this act. The commissioners of the sinking fund of this city shall provide by purchase, lease or otherwise, suitable quarters for the courts in such districts, and the comptroller of said city, without the concurrence of any board, officer or authority in said city shall provide the necessary funds for the purpose aforesaid by the sale of revenue bonds of said city, to the end that the payment of the increased salaries aforesaid may be made and the said courts be fully provided for and equipped for full and effective operation on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and eight."

It is intended to lease additional rooms for the new Ninth District in the Emmett Arcade, southwest corner of Fifty-ninth street and Madison avenue, Borough of Manhattan, where the old Fourteenth District is now located, so as to have two courts in the same building. The space it is proposed to lease is on the third and fourth floors. On the third floor a room 68 by 25 feet for a court room; a room 14 feet 3 inches by 12 feet as a jury room; with a room on the fourth floor 23 by 49 feet, to be divided into three rooms for the use of the Judges. The owner to furnish heat and janitor service, to make all alterations and repairs, and to put up the gas fixtures ready for the City to supply light.

The amount of space now occupied by the City in the present court room is 2,670 square feet, for which it is paying \$5,150 per annum. The additional amount of space which the City will take is 3,373 square feet, which the owner agrees to lease for the sum of \$5,000 per annum, which is at the same rate per square foot as the City now pays. The present lease which the City has on this building expires on January 1, 1911, and I am of the opinion that the new lease to be made should terminate at the same time.

The price being reasonable and just, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of law, authorize a lease of a room 68 by 25 feet on the third floor for a court room; a room 14 feet 3 inches by 12 feet, adjoining, as a jury room, and a room on the fourth floor, 23 by 49 feet, for the use of the judges, in the building known as the Emmett Arcade, southwest corner of Fifty-ninth street and Madison avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of three years, from January 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$5,000, payable quarterly; the owner to furnish heat and janitor service and to make all alterations and repairs, and to put in gas or electric light fixtures ready for the City to supply the light. Lessor, John D. Crimmins.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises at the southwest corner of Ninety-sixth street and Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Fifth District Municipal Court:

December 2, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—In accordance with the provisions of an act passed by the last Legislature, known as chapter 603 of the Laws of 1907, the fourteen Municipal Court Districts in the Borough of Manhattan were reduced to nine.

The new First was made up of the old First, Second and Third.

The new Second was made up of the old Fourth, Fifth and Thirteenth.

The new Third was made up of the old Eighth and Tenth.

The new Fourth was made up of the old Sixth and Seventh.

The new Fifth was made up of the old Twelfth.

The new Sixth was made up of the old Seventh (part) and Ninth (part).

The new Seventh was made up of the old Eleventh.

The new Eighth was made up of the old Ninth.

The new Ninth was made up of the old Fourteenth.

Section 15 of said act reads as follows:

"The board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York may meet at any time to provide for the increase of salary of the justices of the municipal court of the city of New York for the remainder of the year nineteen hundred and seven, for the expense of equipping the courts in the districts as rearranged by this act. The commissioners of the sinking fund of this city shall provide by purchase, lease or otherwise, suitable quarters for the courts in such districts, and the comptroller of said city without the concurrence of any board, officer or authority in said city shall provide the necessary funds for the purpose aforesaid by the sale of revenue bonds of said city, to the end that the payment of the increased salaries aforesaid may be made and the said courts be fully provided for and equipped for full and effective operation on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and eight."

Regarding the court room at Ninety-sixth street and Broadway, it is the intention to lease additional rooms in this building and provide for additional court rooms, one room 14 by 50 feet; one room 14 by 25 feet; one room 14 by 25 feet; and one room 9 by 11 feet, and, by removing partitions, provide a judge's room, a record room, a court room, a jury room, general toilet rooms and corridors.

The additional space required is approximately 1,499 square feet. The City at the present time has a lease on rooms in this building which expires June 1, 1911, which was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 13, 1905, and which ran for a period of five years, at an annual rental of \$3,500, payable quarterly; the lessor supplying steam heat, light and janitor service. The amount of floor space which the City had was approximately 5,000 square feet.

The lessors are willing to lease to the City the 1,499 square feet and to make all the alterations and repairs necessary; to cancel the present existing lease as of January 1, 1908, and to make a new lease running for five years from January 1, 1908, for not only the original space occupied for court room purposes, but for this additional space, for the sum of \$5,000 a year, the rent to be paid quarterly and the owner to supply heat, light and janitor service.

The rent being reasonable and just, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of a lease to the City from Samuel Jackson of the northerly portion of the second floor, size approximately 45 feet 8½ inches by 98 feet 3 inches, with the hall, containing about 5,000 square feet, together with four additional rooms containing 1,499 square feet, in the building at the southwest corner of Ninety-sixth street and Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Fifth District Municipal Court, for a period of five years, from January 1, 1908, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$5,000, payable quarterly; the lessor to supply steam heat, light and janitor service and to make such alterations in the four additional rooms by putting up or taking down such partitions as the

Justice of the Court may request. This lease to be executed simultaneously with the cancellation and surrender of the present existing lease held by the City in said building, which lease expires January 1, 1911, and which lease this newly authorized lease is to take the place of.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from Samuel Jackson, of the northerly portion of the second floor, size approximately 45 feet 8½ inches by 98 feet 3 inches, with the hall, containing about 5,000 square feet, together with four additional rooms containing 1,499 square feet, in the building at the southwest corner of Ninety-sixth street and Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Fifth District Municipal Court, for a period of five years from January 1, 1908, with the privilege of a renewal for an additional five years, upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$5,000, payable quarterly; the lessor to supply steam heat, light and janitor service, and to make such alterations in the four additional rooms by putting up or taking down such partitions as the Justice of the Court may request; the lease to contain a clause providing for the cancellation and surrender of the present existing lease held by the City in said building, which lease expires January 1, 1911, and which lease the foregoing is to take the place of; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same, when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a lease of premises at the northwest corner of Third avenue and Eighty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the new Sixth District Municipal Court:

December 2, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—In accordance with the provisions of an act passed by the last Legislature, known as chapter 603 of the Laws of 1907, the fourteen Municipal Court Districts in the Borough of Manhattan were reduced to nine.

The new First was made up of the old First, Second and Third; the new Second was made up of the old Fourth, Fifth and Thirteenth; the new Third was made up of the old Eighth and Tenth; the new Fourth was made up of the old Sixth and Seventh; the new Fifth was made up of the old Twelfth; the new Sixth was made up of the old Seventh (part) and Ninth (part); the new Seventh was made up of the old Eleventh; the new Eighth was made up of the old Ninth; the new Ninth was made up of the old Fourteenth.

Section 15 of said act reads as follows:

"The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York may meet at any time to provide for the increase of salary of the Justices of the Municipal Court of The City of New York for the remainder of the year nineteen hundred and seven, for the expense of equipping the courts in the districts as rearranged by this act. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of this City shall provide by purchase, lease or otherwise, suitable quarters for the courts in such districts, and the Comptroller of said City, without the concurrence of any board, officer or authority in said City, shall provide the necessary funds for the purposes aforesaid by the sale of Revenue Bonds of said City, to the end that the payment of the increased salaries aforesaid may be made and the said courts be fully provided for and equipped for full and effective operation on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and eight."

From part of the old Seventh and part of the old Ninth the new Sixth District was created. This district is bounded on the south by the centre line of Fifty-ninth street, extends north, its westerly line being Lexington avenue, from Fifty-ninth street to Ninety-sixth street, and there it travels west along Ninety-sixth street to Fifth avenue, which westerly line it keeps until it reaches One Hundred and Tenth street, the centre line of which is its northerly boundary, extending thence easterly to the East river, the easterly boundary line following along the waterfront to the centre line of Fifty-ninth street prolonged. The district also includes all of Blackwell's Island and Ward's Island.

There were four propositions to lease property within the area of this district, one on the northerly side of Sixty-seventh street, near Lexington avenue; one on the northwest corner of Eighty-third street and Third avenue, one on the northeasterly corner of Eighty-sixth street and Third avenue and one on the southerly side of Eighty-eighth street, near Third avenue.

It was proposed in the Sixty-seventh street site to take two floors and make them over for courtroom purposes, the rental of which was named at \$7,500 per annum. The Eighty-sixth street and Eighty-eighth street propositions were dismissed on account of their not being available for use on the 1st of January. The Eighty-third street proposition is the first floor above the store floor in the Wandell Building. The plot is 51 by 110 feet, and has two entrances, one for courtroom purposes and one private entrance for the Judge. The front part of the premises was formerly occupied by the Yorkville Bank and the Prudential Insurance Company. The Judge's private rooms are at present adapted for apartment purposes. The owner has agreed to make such alterations and repairs as will fit the property for court purposes; will cut additional windows in the north side of the building, furnishing additional light to Clerks' and jury rooms.

The rent asked for this property is \$5,500, the owner furnishing heat only. A representative of the Department of Public Buildings and Offices states that the rooms are easily adaptable for court purposes, and can be ready for occupancy on the 1st day of January.

The rent being reasonable, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the second floor of the building at the northwest corner of Third avenue and Eighty-third street, in the Borough of Manhattan, whereof the entrance is at No. 173 East Eighty-third street, and including the five-room apartment, the entrance to which is at No. 171 East Eighty-third street, the said five rooms to be used and occupied in connection with the other rooms, but for private rooms for the Judges and their personal Clerks or Stenographers, or for jury rooms, and not otherwise, access thereto by main entrance to the building to be had by such persons only, the said lease to be for a period of five years from January 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$5,500, payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish heat and to make such alterations in the premises as will be necessary to adapt the same for court purposes, and to put in additional windows where necessary; and also to install the necessary electric wiring and fixtures for lighting purposes in the apartment used for Judges' chambers and Clerks' rooms; the lessee to pay for the light used in the premises. Lessors, Townsend Wandell, Francis L. Wandell and Josephine Wandell, as executors, etc., of Benjamin C. Wandell, deceased.

District Municipal Court, and including a five-room apartment, the entrance to which is at No. 171 East Eighty-third street, the said five rooms to be used and occupied in connection with the other rooms, but for private rooms for the Judges and their personal Clerks or Stenographers or for jury rooms, and not otherwise. Access thereto by main entrance to the building to be had by such persons only, for a period of five years from January 1, 1908, at an annual rental of five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500), payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish heat and to make such alterations in the premises as will be necessary to adapt the same for court purposes, and to put in additional windows where necessary, also to install the necessary electric wiring and fixtures for lighting purposes in the apartment used for Judges' chambers and Clerks' rooms; the lessee to pay for light used in the premises; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same, when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to premises on Calyer street, Borough of Brooklyn, owned by the City and occupied by the Barbara Freitchie Post No. 11, G. A. R.:

November 29, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The City is the owner of a plot of land, 50 by 100 feet in area, situated on the south side of Calyer street, 50 feet west of Clifford place, formerly Dobbin street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which is known on the tax books for the purposes of taxation as Lot No. 22 in Block 2593, Section 9, on the land map of the County of Kings, and is assessed:

Land	\$4,000 00
Building	8,500 00
Total	\$12,500 00

—in the name of the Kings County armory, but of course is exempt from the payment of taxes.

The property was acquired in 1872 from Jane C. Cochrane and James W., her husband, by the County of Kings, by full covenant warranty deed dated November 1, 1872, recorded November 4, 1872, in Liber 1075 of Conveyances, page 36, the County paying \$3,400 for the property.

The building was first used by Company "I" of the Forty-seventh Regiment, N. G., N. Y., but that company moved out over twenty years ago and the property was turned over to the Barbara Freitchie Post No. 11, G. A. R., who is now in possession. The occupation of the property by the Grand Army Post was brought about by resolution adopted by the Supervisors of Kings County on November 22, 1883. The resolution reads as follows:

"Resolved, That permission is hereby given to the members of the Barbara Freitchie Post No. 11, G. A. R., Department of New York, to use the armory situated on Calyer street, Brooklyn, E. D., known as the armory of "I" Company, Forty-seventh Regiment, N. G., N. Y., for drilling, etc. (when vacated by said company), until further orders of this Board."

Another resolution was adopted on October 2, 1884, which reads as follows:

"Resolved, That the Colonel of the Forty-seventh Regiment, N. G., N. Y., be and he hereby is relieved from further care of or responsibility for the premises situated on Calyer street, Greenpoint, and lately occupied by "I" Company of said regiment, and that he be and hereby is directed to hand the keys of the same over to the Commander of Barbara Freitchie Post, No. 11, G. A. R., for use by said Post, in accordance with resolution of Board of Supervisors, adopted November 22, 1883, and further orders of the Board."

The building erected on the plot is a one and two story frame building, practically covering it. The front building, 50 by 22 feet, is two stories high. Back of this is a one-story hall with a stage and seating capacity of about 700. The Post pays no rent or water tax, but I understand pays for repairs and claims to have expended several thousand dollars for this purpose since it has been in possession. The front room upstairs, being about 48 by 18 feet, is leased by the Post to the Ladies' Relief Corps and the Sons of Veterans. The Post also leases the hall downstairs for public entertainments of various kinds, charging a rental of \$7 for the use of the hall up to midnight, or \$9 for the use of the hall up to 2 a. m., and furnish light, heat and janitor service for those amounts.

I am of the opinion that if the City furnishes free of charge a building to this Post, it certainly should be entitled to at least a portion of the rent collected for the leasing of the hall for various purposes.

I would respectfully recommend that the matter of this building be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and that it be spread at large upon the minutes of the Commissioners, and that they take such action as in their judgment is considered necessary and proper.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Engineer thereon, and that he had also transmitted with his communication copy of additional Report No. 1646 of the Chief Engineer, dated November 8, 1907, on the same subject.

The action of the President was approved and the report (No. 1646) ordered filed. Progress report of the Chief Engineer for the weeks ending October 31 and November 7, 1907, were received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Report No. 1647 of the Chief Engineer, dated November 8, 1907, with regard to communication of I. J. Beaudrias, dated October 31, 1907, relating to the Juengst claim at Croton Falls, and the diversion of the flood waters of the East Branch of the Croton river in connection therewith, was received and ordered filed, and the President directed to reply in accordance with said report.

Report No. 1648 of the Chief Engineer, dated November 11, 1907, with regard to communication of Deputy Comptroller McCooey, dated October 24, 1907, relating to the increase in cost and the additional length of time required for the completion of the Cross River Reservoir, was received and ordered filed, and the President directed to reply in accordance with said report.

The Chief Engineer presented the following report, which was ordered spread in full on the minutes and filed:

New York, November 12, 1907.

Report No. 1650.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

Gentlemen—On Wednesday, November 6, 1907, water first began to flow over the spillway at elevation 200 at the New Croton Dam. The water continued to rise and the first course of flashboards was put in place, bringing the water to elevation 201. Since this time the water has continued to accumulate behind the dam, the greatest elevation being 201.98. This flood is now gradually subsiding. I estimate that the amount of water which has flowed to waste during this period is approximately ten billion gallons, or enough to fill Cross River Reservoir. At the present writing the water is still flowing over the spillway.

The situation thus briefly described shows the culmination of many years of thought and labor and the confirmation of the plans long since adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and furnishes the best demonstration of the accuracy of their investigations and the wisdom of their plans. At the present time more than 75 billion gallons of water are stored behind the various reservoirs on the Croton watershed. The fact that water is now flowing to waste after all the storage reservoirs now completed are filled proves conclusively the wisdom of the construction of the two new reservoirs at Cross River and Croton Falls. On the completion of the Cross River Reservoir an additional amount of ten billion gallons will be added to the storage.

I present herewith several photographs showing the situation at the dam on Friday, November 8.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department, at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids in estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
