AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1911.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of one hundred and thirty-six million three hundred and fifty-nine thousand six hundred and eighty-six dollars and ninety-six cents (\$136,359,686.96), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1911, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes, pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and seventy-three million nine hundred and sixty-seven thousand eight hundred and thirty-five dollars and sixteen cents (\$173,967,835.16), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of five million four hundred and fifty-three thousand eight hundred and five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,453,805.25), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of thirty-two million one hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and forty-two dollars and ninety-five cents (\$32,154,342.95), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated June 5, 1911, transmitting his certificates of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1911, copies of which communication and certificates and of the said Budget are as follows:

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, June 5, 1911.
To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows: "It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purposes of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the payment of interest on the City Debt of the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and caused to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows: "In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and the other County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said Counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County; to the end that each of said Counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget in detail for the year 1911.

Second—The amount of County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1910 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said Counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz., one hundred and fifty-eight million six hundred and twenty-five thousand five hundred and twenty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$158,625,529.91); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz., five million four hundred and fifty-three thousand eight hundred and five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,453,805.25), and, third, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1910, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz., ten million dollars (\$10,000,000); be it further

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles of "Salaries," "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—

- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Regular Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Compensation, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Compensation, Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein for the various kinds of supplies and contingencies to any other than to a supply or contingency account.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," herein contained, except (a) when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and (b) in the case of schedules under the title of "Salaries" or "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages, Regular Employees," when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries," "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages, Regular Employees," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments, and (c) in the case of schedules under the titles of "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," when such change will not increase the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—

- That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with

the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and

- That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payroll is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedules supporting any such appropriations, or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed.
- That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the facts, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.
- That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.
- That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.
- That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payrolls to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations for (1) supplies; (2) general supplies; (3) materials for repairs and replacements; (4) fuel, and (5) forage, to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for the purchase of such "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage hereafter to be promulgated by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may hereafter be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying as to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which contracts for "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies or materials, from which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform with such standard specifications; be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedules, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules entitled "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Compensation, Temporary Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Compensation, Temporary Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.
FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

CONDITIONS GOVERNING PAYMENTS TO CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions, and acceptance of moneys by an institution shall be an acceptance of such conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts from all sources, all expenditures, population, addresses of parents, guardian or nearest relatives of inmates and such other information as shall be designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institution, and shall be in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts relating to all funds and from whatsoever source received shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance, and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. All institutions receiving public moneys shall, not later than March 31 of each year, submit to the Comptroller an annual report covering the period of the preceding calendar year, showing receipts from all sources and expenditures for all purposes in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall, in his discretion, suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and, upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

6. Where apportionments are made upon a per capita basis for inmates of private charitable institutions, there will be no payments unless the inmates shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City; and except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals.

In determining the acceptance of patients, in private hospitals as proper charges, the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the services actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding the acceptances of the Commissioner of Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*

7. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

8. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

9. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over during ten months in the year, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving money under this section shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

11. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that the per capita rates hereinafter provided are too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate or rates for any or all institutions.

There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of one hundred and seventeen thousand five hundred and eighty dollars and forty-seven cents (\$117,580.47), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1911, included in the Budget, and the further sum of eleven thousand one hundred and ten dollars and thirteen cents (\$11,110.13), paid during the year 1910, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one hundred and twenty-eight thousand six hundred and ninety dollars and sixty cents (\$128,690.60).

The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within The City of New York, for the year 1911, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed, and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of eight billion two hundred and sixteen million seven hundred and sixty-three thousand two hundred and eighty-seven dollars (\$8,216,763,287), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year, submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the 3d day of July, 1911.

In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of fifty-three thousand four hundred and two dollars and forty-seven cents (\$53,402.47), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land, in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making such improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of four thousand nine hundred and fifty-one dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$4,951.27), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessment on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successor; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of forty-three thousand eight hundred and fourteen dollars and twenty-five cents (\$43,814.25), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush), in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the district of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, under authority of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, and amendments thereto, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of thirty-one thousand five hundred and eighty-one dollars and thirty-four cents (\$31,581.34), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 364 of article 4 of chapter 7 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "stands within the stoop lines."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 364 of article 4 of chapter 7 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "stands within the stoop lines," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 364. Every such stand must be strictly within the stoop line and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public, and shall not exceed the space of (6) 10 feet long by 4 feet wide, except that in the case of boot-black stands, a space not more than 3 feet wide and 4 feet long may be occupied by each chair of such stand. The construction and erection of all stands permitted by this ordinance shall be at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which said stand is located. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of the structure or hold more than one license. The Mayor, or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, shall have the power to transfer a permit or license to another location for the period of its unexpired term; provided, however, that the application for such transfer shall be accompanied by the consent of the owner of the premises to which the proposed transfer is to be made and by the consent of the Alderman of the district in which such premises are located.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the more conspicuous numbering of certain buildings in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The owner, agent, lessee or other person in charge of each and every residence or building used for residential purposes in The City of New York, shall cause to be placed or affixed on the fanlight or on the inner door the proper street number or numbers of said building and shall have said number or numbers kept and retained or renewed thereon so that the same may at all times be legible.

Sec. 2. If the owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of any residence or building used for residential purposes in The City of New York, shall fail to provide, place and keep such number or numbers on any such building within thirty days after this ordinance shall take effect, the President of the Borough shall forthwith serve such owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of the building with a copy of this ordinance, and if after thirty days service the owner, lessee, agent or other person in charge of a building shall fail or neglect to com-

ply with the provisions of this ordinance he shall be subject to a penalty of ten dollars (\$10), which shall be sued for and collected in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, or rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale and the time of their delivery to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the De-

partment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department, for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
